Phillip Scheidemann Characterizes Terms Presented by the Allies As a "Brutal Dictate d Peace" --- Declares Wilson's Fourteen Points Are Not Mentioned as Basis for Treaty.

London, May 12.—The possibility of a change in the Government of Germany as a result of the presentation of the allied peace terms, was discussed by Fhillip Scheidemann, German chancellor, at Berlin today, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from that city. The chancellor denounced the peace terms, which he said represented a "brutal, dictated peace," it is said. The statement was made to foreign journalists in the former chancellor's palace, and in part follows:

"We thought that we Social Democrats were strong enough to prevent a peace by violence, but doubted whether the masses in enemy countries could support us, because they are less strongly organized than we. Certain

The anxious days of war have drifted into long periods of peace, and then out into war again, many times during the lifetime of one of London's oldest cit-Apartments, father of Charles G. Forrester, superintendent of the London
division G. T. R. This Crimean veteran, although 83 years of age, finds

The story of his military career is a long and varied one, beginning with his enlistment in the British army on September 20, in the year 1854. After a short training at Birr in Queen's County, Ireland, he was sent to Malta and Gibraltar, later going to Russia and engaging in the Crimean war for eight months. At this time he was a private attached to the 63rd Regiment, and now wears two medals won during that war. One is a regulation Crimean War Medal with a bar to indicate that he actually took part in the engagement of Sebastopol, and the other is a decoration awarded by the Turkish Government.

In connection with the Crimean war,
Mr. Forrester speaks the greatest praise
of Florence Nightingale and her work
among the wounded men, who adored
her. Since he was neither wounded nor
sick throughout the whole of the war,
he was not privileged to be a patient

with him.

It was not until several years later that he made the trip to America with his own 63rd Regiment, when trouble threatened between Canada and the United States over the "Trent Affair." After on 18-days' crossing on the steamship Hamilia, a passenger ship converted for the time into a troop ship, he was stationed at Halifax, remaining there until the year 1862, when he left with his regiment for London.

The troops traveled via steamship to St. John's, N. B., and from there journeyed to Montreal by sleighs, averaging a rate of about 50 miles a day. Traveling was very cold, and as each sleigh held but ten men, it was quite a difficult task to transfer them so great a distance without the assistance of trains. 

There was a rush of speculators to the Lambton swales and hardwood forests to dig for oil when the news of Williams' discovery got out; and the rush was accentuated when a similar discovery in Pennsylvania was noised abroad.

First Rumor Died Down.
The early drilling, undertaken by the nost primitive methods and carried to no very great depths, developed no spectacular discoveries. A little oil was secured in a number of shallow wells, some at Oil Springs and others at Petrolea. Interest in the Lambton fields was, however, on the wane by the early



Government Will Loan Up To \$4,500, Repayable in 25 Years.

BILL TO ASSIST

Purchase of Privately-Owned Land Is Also Provided For.

OTTAWA, May 12.—The soldier set-tlement bill introduced by Hon. Arthur Meighen in the House this afternoon extends the scope of the legislation passed in 1917, by which Dominion lands passed in 1917, by which Dominion lands within thirteen miles of a railway were made available for soldier settlement, and it now provides for the purchase of privately-owned lands in any province for resale to eligible soldier settlers. It also enables the soldier settlement board to compulsorily purchase lands which are held to be retarding agricultural development.

Those eligible to participate in the benefits of the act are members of the Canadian, imperial or colonial forces who served with an honorable record in an actual theatre of war, or outside the country of enlistment; or members of the Canadian forces in Canadia ply who are in receipt of penor members of the Canadian forces in Canada only who are in receipt of pensions for injury occasioned during such service. The privileges are also extended to widows of such persons.

For the purchase of privately-owned lands in any province the soldier settlement board may loan up to \$4,500, reparable, in 25 equal annual install-

The bill also provides for agricultural training for those eligible soldiers who are not ready to go immediately on the land, and for the payment of allowances for subsistence for the settler and his dependents during the time of training. This training may be at a training centre specially equipped or with specially selected farmers. Instructors and inspectors of the board will visit and assist settlers who participate in the benefits of the act.

With regard to the compulsory purchase of land, the bill provides that a "settlement area" shall be established only in districts wherein by reason of lands remaining undeveloped, agricultural production is being retarded.

Rebuilding Plans Certain to Make People Think

The man whom the chamber of commerce brought to the city to make a survey of the problems of London, particularly our physical problems, is Noulan Cauchon, a Canadian, for many ments of effort in a town, he has a broader conception of rebuilding which has its basis in a rennaissance not only of material things, but of the whole civic and social system.

Some of Mr. Cauchon's ideas will be called revolutionary. His plan for a cross-town railway link may be regarded as visionary by ninety per cent of the London people who read about it. They cannot believe at present that it would be much short of lunacy to construct a railway line from Grand Trunk to Canadian Pacific, which would cut through between Colborne and Wellington streets in a fine residential district. They would think a municipal building raised above Dundas street and surmounting the whole street with street lines on either side moved back two hundred feet an impossible dream. The separation of the street and railway grades would appeal to them as reasonable; they may even think it a wise thing to plan for the joining of the two main railway lines, but when it comes to altering the face of the city, cutting streets in two, running a line above the house tops from north to south, so that all passenger traffic may be converged at a central centre containing all city buildings, as well as a public hall, they find themselves thinking away from the comfortable unaltered London idea of forty years ago.

But, says Cauchon, who and what is hurt by a railway line built on artistic principles being above the street? What matter if it go through high-class residential property? There must be money spent some day to make the city over, and when this is being done do not look too closely to the old conventional methods which are being scrapped. Come back to Athens, the greatest city of history, in which 80,000 people of another age were inspired to an ethical as well as an architectural culture that has never been matched. The city gate of Athens cost what would now represent \$5,000,000, and these people were willing to spend it. Can we think of the mayor of London asking for \$5,000,000 to construct a city gate? Would the ratepayers praise his name or seek the first convenient horse pond?

Cauchon might not go in for city gates. He might not want to make much of the customary civic centre display in a town-planning movement. But he would not put a great building on a street where it could never be seen when it might be put in or over the street where it would replace the diminishing point that is all the straight street gives. He does not believe in parks or lawns that restrict business growth in a business area, but he does believe in parks in the proper areas. And he subscribes to a definite zone theory for industries and the building up of revenue-producing railway lines for the city. Industrial development might come along the line of the London and Port Stanley, and further residential development along this line appeals to him, with a right-ofway for motor cars and restricted to motor cars that may run at high speed. Cauchon believes that the steam lines of the future must face the indefinitely and get a lot of fancy advertising. competition of the motor truck and the tractor running over special rights-of-way more than the competition of the electric line.

When London builds anew it must build with the realization that the territory adjacent other to the city is quite as much London in one sense as the territory within the city borders. For this reason he urges that the city should strive to have intensive cultivation near the cities, with small farms for soldiers close to the cities and with the advantages of the cities for their children. The more produce grown near the cities the lower will be the high cost of living, and until the cost of food comes down, there is no hope that we shall have industrial contentment. He would have community work on small farms with the most improved implements doing the work of many and forcing the soil, perhaps by means of irrigation, and he believes that all farmers will come to the point where the growing of five bushels at a low price is more to be desired than the growing of one bushel at a high price. Machinery, he predicts, will bring about increased production in farm, and factory as well, and only increased production can pay for our war debt.







RIOT ACT AND SOLDIERS TO ASSIST IN OPERATION OF CARS

Windsor Mob Cuts Ropes, Breaks Windows, and Company Abandon Effort-Will Make Another Start Today Under Rifles of London Soldiers.

WINDSOR, May 12.-There was an incipient riot on Ouellette avenue early today when five street cars, manned by strikebreakers, attempted to operate in an effort to break the eight days' old strike of motormen and conductors of the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Street Railway Company.

Waiting until the cars became separated, a crowd of men and boys attacked each in turn. Trolley ropes were cut, a few car windows broken, and one of the car crew was forced to flee to the shelter of a neighboring house, where he remained until rescued by the police.

ABANDONED THE EFFORT. After realizing that without additional protection cars could not be operated, Manager Anderson ordered the five cars brought back to the barns. As the strikebreakers had abandoned them it was necessary to send out a work car to tow the cars in, which was done without trouble. For the remainder of the day no effort was made to run the cars Instead, Crown Attorney Rodd was formally notified by the company that violence had occurred, and the latter, after a conference with the mayors of Windsor, Walkerville and Ford, Magistrate Miers and Justice of the Peace Cheyne, caused a telegram to be dispatched to Brig.-Gen. L. W.

Shannon at London, requesting that troops be sent.

This evening 250 men under command of Major Hirsch and Capt. E. A. Shuttleworth of London arrived, and were marched to the race track, where they will be quartered while here. CAUSE OF WRECK AT DUNNVILLE TO

Farmer Saw Baggage Car Topple Over.

PULLED THE ENGINE OFF

Engineer Lost Life Saving Train, Was Opinion Expressed.

DUNVILLE, May 12.—That Frederlck J. Bechley and Emery Bellows,
engineer and fireman on train No. 3
Wablash, came to their death by accident on May 8th at 10:10 a.m., by
reason of the engine turning over in
the ditch while in operation on the air
line of the G. T. R.—Wabash. Cause
of said accident unknown. This was
the decision of a coroner's jury, who
sat at the town hall today before Coroner Dr. William Jamieson. There were
a number of witnesses heard, but the
actual cause of the accident will remain
a mystery apparently. From the eviactual cause of the accident will remain a mystery apparently. From the evi-dence, however, it appears that the engine was pulled over into the ditch by an express coach. Whether this coach was defective in any way is not known. It was completely demolished in the wreck, and there is no way of finding out.

inding out. E. Deiner of Canboro Township. farmer who happens to reside near the scene of the accident, was the first wit-ness called. He testified that he saw a baggage car on the train in question rise up over two fet and settle to the south side of the track. He declared emphatically, that in his estimation this baggage car caused the trouble this baggage car caused the trouble. He saw the engineer apparently applying the brakes. He saw the fireman come over to the engineer's side of the engine cab. Everything then became hidden by steam. He telephoned to Dunnville, and when he went back, the engineer and fireman were unable to answer his calls. He would not say that the tracks were responsible, and he thought the engineer lost his life in saving the train.

Whole Train Derailed. George Fisher of St. Thomas, who had charge of the wrecking crew on the night of the accident, said that he the night of the accident, said that he found the entire train off the track and part in the ditch. The car behind the tender was the one that he found in the worst condition. He had no theory as to how the accident happened. The cars were not overloaded, and the tracks were in good condition.
