By beginning in a small way and expanding each year, not only could the produce of the orchard be more economically handled, but cooperation could also be applied spraying orchards, making boxes or barrels for shipping, buying new nursery stock, etc. Mr. McNeil outlined two schemes: One by which a number of orchardists could join together and agree to ship their apples through the association, each grower packing his own apples, and delivering them at the point of shipment; the other (the one he recommended to the meeting) was the formation of a joint stock company, having a central packing house, where all apples would be brought direct from orchards and entirely handled by the association. The meeting favored the central packing house scheme, and a motion to organize an association for this pur-

### The Turn of the Tide.

If the bye-elections are a true sign of the drift of public sentiment in Great Britain, Lord Rosebery is justi fied in his assertion that the Liberals will sweep the country when the Government decides to make the appeal. Since the beginning of the year there have been six contested elections and only one Conservative has survived. He ran in the city of Birmingham, which is Mr. Chamberlain's private preserve. Since the beginning of 1902 there have been 28 bye-elections, the Liberals winning 15 and the Conservatives 13. The remarkable turn-over

1902-4 In 1885 when the Conservatives reached their highest mark before 1900 these constituencies returned 13 Liberals and 15 Conservatives. Undoubtedly the tariff question has contributed very largely to the results of the bye elections, but the tide had begun to turn before the Government was suspected of fiscal heresy. The education act, the war commission report and, lately, the question of Chinese labor in the Transvaal, have been very important factors. The Conservatives were carried into power on a wave of popular enthusiasm over the war, bu: with the khaki issue out of the way, the people are turning their attention to domestic problems.

The one ray of consolation for the Government has been the election of Lord Morpeth by an overwhelming majority in South Birmingham, on a platform of imperial preferential trade. The result is proof of the phenomenai hold which Mr. Chamberlain has kept on the Midland district since he became a political figure. Birmingham, previous to 1885, was a radical hotbed staunchly free trade and at war with the aristocracy and the church establishment. Mr. Chamberlain, himself. had been a "red republican" and was a product of the Birmingham spirit. In 1885 out of the 39 constituencies in Warwickshire, Worcestershire and Staffordshire, 31 were represented by Liberals. In 1900 only six Liberals were elected in these Midland ridings, which are within Mr. Chamberlain's elections in these counties since 1900 have been carried by the Government. The Liberal tide may overwhelm the Conservative party elsewhere, but it breaks in vain against the Chamberlain stronghold.

### Port Arthur's Defense.
