Portuguese Force Meets With Disaster.

Fifteen Officers Were Among the Killed and Wounded-109 Men Are Missing.

Lisbon, Oct. 6. - The Minister of Marine announced in the chamber today that a detachment of Portuguese troops, belonging to a column operating in Portuguese West Africa against the Cuanhamas, was surprised by the tribesmen while crossing the Cunene River. The detachment, which numbered 499 officers and men, lost 254 killed, including 15 officers, and 50

It is officially announced that Germany will put 8,000 European troops in the field against the Herreros, in German Southwest Africa, who are neighbors of the Cuanhamas. Both tribes are established in the Cunen district. The Cunen River forms the houndary between German and Portuguese Southwest Africa.

The Portuguese force included 255 Europeans, of whom 109 are missing. The force was ambushed at night. The Government is considering the organization of a force of 5,000 men to suppress the Cuanhamas, and will dispatch warships to strengthen the Angola naval division.





### "SPIT" BALL WILL CHANGE GAME OF BASEBALL GREATLY

The 2-year-old division of the Ken-cucky Futurity was won at Lexington baseball fully as much as the curve did baseball fully as much as the curve did twenty years ago. This ball, said to be discovered by Stricklett while playing with the California League last season, has made double score games out of the question, Jack Chesbro, of the New York Highlanders, has worked it to the best advantage for his club for over three months. Chesbro was wise enough to Chesbro was wise enough to tell the players it was giving him a sore arm, but now the pitchers have discovered that it is simply a medium-paced straight ball, and is less likely to lame the arm than curve pitching.

The batsmen of the American League say that it is utterly impressible to hit y that it is utterly impossible to hit e ball square, as it breaks in so many different ways just as it reaches the plate. The ball is sent about waist high, and usually shoots or drops.

Chesbro and Powell are using it constantly with Griffith's team. Mullen, of Detroit, has now mastered it, while Gibson, of the Boston Americans, has used it for some time without his opponents being wise to the fact. Billy Dineen has also mastered the new invention, and


