HAYWOOD MUST FACE JURY. Judge Refuses Motion for Acquittal on Murder Charge.

Boise, Idaho, June 22.—When the state yesterday closed its case against Wm. D. Haywood, charged with the murder of ex-Governor Frank Steunenberg, the defence made an unsuccessful attempt to have the court direct the jury to acquite the prisoner on the ground that the state had not proved its charge. Judge Woods' ruling, which requires the defence to meet with evidence the case that the state has presented, was made at the close of court, and it was then arranged that Haywood's counsel should make their opening statement and present their first testimony on Monday.

JUDGE ADMITTED PLEA

Unexpected Ruling in the Emmerson Libel Suit.

Pugsley's Argument Failed - Crocket Scores - Prosecution Says Public Life Would Be Made Intolerable-Not In Public Interest - Defence Quotes Parnell and Dilke Cases as Precedent for Newspaper Comment.

Precedent for Newspaper Comment.

Fredericton, N. B., June 21.—In the Emmerson libel suit yesterday the prosecution filed the promised demurrer to the plea of justification presented to the Crocket counsel, and the six lawyers at once fell to work to convince the judge on the one hand that the plea should not stand, and on the other that it should.

As soon as Judge Landry had taken his seat, Mr. Pugsley began. He was ready with a reply to the plea of the defence, a denial of the truth of the allegation and demurrer. The defence must, under the code, prove that the publication of the matter complained of was in the public interest and that the matter was true. Facts showing in what way the publication was for the public benefit must be set forth in the plea.

This was the stand where J. D. Hazen, K.C., leading counsel for J. P. Crocket, might have been expected to ask for delay.

"I was not served with this demurrer till this morning," he told the court. "Two ex-Attorneys-General had been all day yesterday preparing the document. Mr. Hazen would have

been all day yesterday preparing the document. Mr. Hazen would have been justified in asking for same. I do not ask it. I am ready to go on with the arguments." Mr. Pugsley considered that this little speech of his learned friend's called for remarks.

Another of Mr. White's contentions was that a newspaper could not attack any minister in this way. It was not arguable "reductio ad absurdum," said Mr. White, and he also said, "how could the Government of the country be carried on."

J. H. Barry quoted authorities in support of the contention that the private character of public men could

private character of public men could not be discussed as matters of pub-lic interest. It had been said that a public man's character was a mat-ter for investigation only by his con-

"I should think that rather narrow," said Judge Landry. "If the accusation were against the Prime Minister and only his constituents were to know of it, it might prevent other constituencies from judging as to his worthiness."

RED CLOVER SEED CROP.

A circular recently received from T. F. Raynor, Seed Inspector for Ontario, gives some very valuable information to farmers. On account of partial failure in Canada and the United States of the 1906 crop of red clover seed, large quantities were imported from Europe for the past season's trade. The supply was depleted early in May and the retail prices have been unusually high in consequence.

No red clover seed is being carried over for next season's trade. The red clover crop, not only in Canada but in the United States and in Europe, is now reported to have suffered severely from prolonged cold weather during March, April and May; and on account of proba-ble reduction in the yield of hay and other fodder crops, but particularly because most fields of red clover are killed out in places, it is anticipated that the areas left for red clover seed will be considerably below the average for Canada and that the supply of good, clean, No. 1 seed will again be short for the

In view of the present conditions of the trade in red clover seeds and of the red clover crop, it is the desire to advise farmers in the Pro-vince of Ontario that it will be well for them to consider the expediency of utilizing as far as possible those fields or portions of fields of red clover that can be made clean by weeding, and of saving them for the purpose of seed.



Louis XIV., a Greedy Physician and an

Unscrupulous Surgeon. In 1693, when Louis XIV. began to feel the first touches of age, his physicians ordered him to be bled once a month. That duty was of course intrusted to Marechal, his Irish surgeon.

There was at the time in Paris, says the British Medical Journal, a young brother of the craft who conceived the lidea of making his fortune by bleeding the king. The enterprise was difficult, but he knew that the most solid doors can often be opened with a colddoors can often be opened with a gold-

Following the advice of Iago, he put money in his purse and sought an in-troduction to Antoine Daquin, the king's chief physician. The negotiation was conducted on a strict busi-ness footing. Daquin, who was known to love money, was told that 10,000 crowns were deposited with a notary who had instructions to transfer the sum to him as soon as the surgeon had got the job.

It was not an easy thing to manage, as Marechal never left the king. One day, however, he asked permission to leave Versailles for three days. Daquin seized the opportunity to intro-duce his protege, whom he had ready at hand for the purpose. Feeling the king's pulse one morning, as usual, he pretended to be alarmed at its strength pretended to be alarmed at its strength and volume and ordered the illustrious patient to be bled forthwith. As Marechal was away, the king hesitated, but fear soon made him yield to his physician's proposal. The young surgeon bled the king, and Daquin got

is money. In the meantime a message had been In the meantime a message had been dispatched for Marechal, who was not far off. He returned to Versailles in haste and was much surprised to find that the king, whom he had left in the best of health, had been bled. He was not on friendly terms with Daquin, and he quickly grasped the situation. He went to see the young surgeon and forced him to disclose the whole plet. When the king learned the truth, he fiew into a terrible rage, ordered Daquin to be arrested and placed the matter in the hands of the council of state.

FOREST FIRES RAGING.

Six Bridges Burned—Smoke Rendered Traffic Dangerous.



Redmond Says Commission On Convents Dissolves Alliance.

London, June 21.—Despite an angry Irish protest the House of Commons, by a vote of 125 to 121, carried a motion permitting the introduction of a bill for the appointment of a commission to enquire into the need of inspection of monastic and conventual institutions.

Mr. Redmond, the Irish leader, declared that this action implied a gross offence and insult to Roman Catholics in Ireland and England. On learning the result of the division, Mr. Redmond declared:

"This puts an end to the Liberal alliance anyhow."

WILL ASK HIS DISCHARGE

State Closes Its Case Against Haywood To-Day.

Prosecution Shows Direct Connection Between Orchard and Pettibane-Remittances Sent at Time of Murder - Denounced Steunenberg-Proof of Animus Afforded by Magazine Articles.

Boise, Idaho, June 21.—Unless nine o'clock should bring unforeseen delay in obtaining a few final pieces of evidence, the state will close its case to-day against Wm. D. Haywood, whom it charges with the murder of Frank Steunenberg.

This announcement was made yesterday afternoon by Senator Borah of the prosecution, and when Clarence Darrow of the defence took up the discussion of the arrangement of time he made it clear that directly the state closed, he and his associates would move the court for an ciates would move the court for an instruction directing a verdict of ac-

The prosecution succeeded again yesterday in showing a direct connection between the store of George Pettibone in Denver, and Harry Orchard while he was at work on the Bradley crime in San Francisco, and promised to prove the connection which Orchard says he had with Pettibone personally by handwriting experts who will be called to-day. Original records of the Pacific Postal Telegraph Co. were produced, showing that in September and October, 1904, remittances of \$97.50 and \$48 respectively were made, the first by "J. Wolff" and the second by "P. Bone."

Judge Wood admitted as evidence many of the strongly-worded articles of The Miners' Magazine, in which Steunenberg was bitterly denounced. Mr. Borah read thom to the jury. These were admitted as showing the animus of the federation officials against Steunenberg and against Jus-tices Goddard and Gabbert of the Su-preme Court of Colorado, whom Or-chard swore he tried many times to kill.
The state introduced in evidence

The state introduced in evidence the decisions of the judges on the Colorado eight-hour law, and the habeas corpus application of Charles H. Moyer. To practically every piece of evidence offered during the day the defence took an exception.

FIRES WERE TO PLEASE GIRL.

Queer Tale Related by Lad—Planned Many Blazes.

Belleville, June 21.—Dorland Foote, the 10-year-old boy who set fire to the police station on Wednesday, appeared in the Police Court yesterday before Magistrate Masson, on a charge of incendiarism.

The lad said that Amy Stewart, a girl of 16, said to be weak-minded, had put the idea in his head some time before May 24, and had proposed burning all the barns and frame buildings along the east side of the river between the lower bridges, a distance of about 200 yards.

Both of them, Foote said, set fire to Jenkin's livery stable twice, but each time the fire was extinguished. He said he told Chief Newton to ring





SOLDIERS FIRE ON MOB PATERSON'S

Troops Shot Straight at the Narbonne Rioters

Three Persons Killed and One Hundred Injured-Score of Women Included-Military Were Ordered to Fire In the Air But Disobeyed-Whole Army Corps In Motion-Grave News From Midi.

Grave News From Midi.

Paris, June 21.—The brief despatches which reached Paris yesterday showed that the conflicts which have occurred between the troops and mobs in the south were more sanguinary than at first suspected. At Narbonne three persons were killed and a hundred soldjers and civilians, including a score of women, are said to have been wounded, a number of them fatally. The troops, who were ordered to fire in the air, shot straight at the mob besieging them in the courtyard mob besieging them in the courtyard of the superstructure. A whole army corps has been put in motion to deal with the rebellious

wine-growers.

State Banquet Cancelled. The state banquet which was to have been given last night in honor of the King of Siam, was countermanded in consequence of the bloodshed. The newspapers report another attempt to burn the sub-prefecture at Narbonne. Gendarmes fired from the

shed. The newspapers report another attempt to burn the sub-prefecture at Narbonne. Gendarmes fired from the upper stórey and the attackers fied. It is also announced that there has been further shooting in the streets of Narbonne, and that many persons have been wounded. Many winegrowers continue to pour into Narbonne, and threaten to set fire to the hotels occupied by the army officers. Fresh troops are arriving there.

Tried to Rescue Prisoners.

Montpelier, France, June 21.—Serious rioting broke out here Wednesday night, lasting all evening. The mob attempted to burn down the door of the prison and rescue the prisoners. The troops were turned out, but were received with volleys of stones and bottles. Troopers were pulled off their horses and clubbed. A prominent police official was seriously wounded by a broken bottle. Many soldiers were less seriously injured. Incendiaries Driven Off.

Narbonne, France, June 21.—A violent mob from the outlying villages gathered Wednesday night. They poured petroleum over the door of the sub-prefecture, which they set on fire, but were driven off after repeated deharges by the troops. In the course of the fighting the manifestants fired revolvers, but no one was hit. The disorder was augmented by the absence of lights, the mob having cut the electric cables. In other parts of the town barricades were erected. These were stormed by the troops and torn down, only to be set up again by the rioters.

Late last night Premier Clemenceau received grave news from the Midi, the district of the discontented winegrowers, where the exasperation of the people is increasing. Messages to the Premier came indirectly by way of Lyons, indicating that the wires had been cut. The Argelieres committee has been reconstituted, a third committee being named in case the members of the second committee also were arrested. It is now certain that Marcelin Albert has not been arrested, and it is admitted that the police have no idea of his whereabouts.

Before daybreak all roads leading to M. Ferroul's house were held by guirassiers in strong force. His body-guard of wine growers, among whom were many Amazons, which had been nightly watching over the safety of their leader, was on duty as usual, but when the wine-growers found themselves surrounded by troops they did not attempt rescuance. When M. Ferroul appeared in custody of a police commissary the crowd momentarily threatened to rescue him, but the mayor begged that there be no conflict with the troops, and he was placed in a carriage, escorted by 150 cuirassiers, and taken to the railroad station at Narbonne, where a special train was awaiting and started with him for Montpelier.
