On Thursday last Dr. James Hall and staff of assistants arrived here, having in charge 140 Fresh-air children from New York City. The children of Athens, with characteristic liberality, had prepared a substantial lunch for the little way-farers at the Methodist church, and thither they marched to the beat of drum, and were soon seated on the lawn parkings with their refreshments provided. They were conveyed to Charlton the same evening and immediately returned to their temporary home in every respect suitable, their tents being pitched just beyond Cedar Park. The surroundings are just such as one would wish for who desired to impress a city-bred child with the beauties of nature. Broad spreading oaks, interspersed with the shapely cedars, for which the Park is noted, give ample shade; grassy slopes and sudden rising rocks are around the tents; to the east a wall of rock, and beyond a fine grassy plateau, from which a grand view can be obtained; to the south are High Rocks, noted for their echoes; to the west the waters of Charlton set a model camp ground. Here the characteristics of the children could be studied at leisure, and we found many bright, promising little ones, and all of them far superior to what we had been led to expect. Almost every nationality is represented, but they are all apparently speaking English. On the occasion of our visit they were being addressed by Dr. Hall, and their decorum and the manner in which they answered when catechized, were very pleasing. They sing well in unison and their past songs were well rendered, several very sweet voices being among the number.
