Tutmania rampant in Toronto

Close on the heels of Farrah power and disco fever, a new phenomenon has swept over North America: Tutmania. In every city that the 4,000-year old relics of the legendary King Tut have appeared, local populations have reacted almost fanatically, and, inevitably, commercial interests have responded with the same

Last year the priceless artifacts toured seven American cities: currently they are on display at the Art Gallery of Ontario at Toronto. The exhibit is open seven days a week; an estimated 1,500 people are passing through it per hour. This is the sole Canadian stop in the worldwide tour; after December 31, the Tut treasures will move on to Europe. At the completion of the tour, they will return to Cairo, never to travel again, according to the sponsors of the project, the Egyptian government.

But the Egyptians are not sending out such an exhibit for pure aesthetic and cultural reasons; rather, they are selling a bit of their history. But it's no stores have baked giant cookies in

bargain: they receive the entire take from ticket sales (an estimated \$140 million from the Toronto stop alone!), plus commissions on all sales of official" souvenirs, which range from gold Tut goblets at \$3,000 apiece to lapel buttons and postcards which sell for under a dollar.

Not only are the owners capitalizing on the show. Shrewd businessmen here are cashing in on the public fascination with the boy king Tutankhamun, whose untimely death at the age of 18 is the reason all these treasures exist in the first place. Tut is hot stuff now, and everyone is into the act. A number of "Tut Huts" have set up in Toronto malls, selling unofficial memorabilia ranging from the incredibly tacky to the at least semi-tasteful. Much is overpriced junk, but people are buying it, both because everybody else is doing it and as "an investment", a claim which is based on current value of similar nostalgic items such as Coke trays and Tiffany lamps.

But true marketing ingenuity has been brought to Tut. Cookie

the shape of the gold Tut death mask, and Laura Secord is displaying chocolate sarcophagi and King Tut suckers, presumably aimed at the younger crowd. The old Canadian institutions have not escaped the temptation, either; both Eaton's and Simpson's have set up special Tut departments in their stores, mainly selling jewellry reproductions but also posters and T-shirts.

T-shirt makers have not stopped at emblazoning Tut's mask on their products; slogans such as "Don't touch my Tuts" and "I'm a Tut nut" have appeared on people's chests. But perhaps the most timely Tut invention is the new dance, the Tut Strut, which was first demonstrated by a group of belly dancers in the Four Seasons Hotel last week. Soon to be released is an Egyptian-like disco song of the same name, so everyone can Tut Strut around their own living room.

So King Tut, in a way, has achieved the immortality he prepared for so long ago. Yet as sat there on that dry sun-beaten Egyptian day, he never imagined that his rebirth would be gauged, not on sandy desert altars to the sun, but at cash registers and bank accounts in downtown Toronto. His golden afterlife has been tarnished into a search for green, so to speak; Tutankhamun would certainly be disappointed.

The Earth is slowing down. No, that's not a Chicken Little joke. It's a fact. Little by little friction between tides and the ocean bottom are putting the brakes on the Earth's rotation -which not only makes the days grow longer, but according to Australian meteorologist B.G. Hunt, also affects the climate.

Roughly speaking, Hunt says, the slower the Earth spins, the wilder the weather gets. One-anda-half billion years ago, days were only 10 or 12 hours long -- and to add a single second to the

probably relatively uncommon. As the planet lost some of its spin, big storm systems became more likely -- which may seem like a piece of bad luck until you realize that storms are responsible for much of the rain that falls on the Northern Hemisphere.

Can we expect the Earth's slowdown to create drastic changes in our weather in the near future? Don't count on it. At the moment, it takes 50,000 years major storms and hurricanes were length of a day. (NEWSCRIPT)

\$400,000 granted for forests

UNB and the province's forest industries have announced a joint venture to improve the quality of our forest resources.

Eight major forest product companies have agreed to provide UNB with \$400,000, payable at \$80,000 per year, to support a "chair" in forest tree improve-

The industry grant was announced recently by Acting President Thomas J. Condon.

"This tremendously important step in strengthening the department of forest resources at UNB will enhance the application of advanced science and technology to reforestation and stand improvement problems," he said.

"Assuring a continuing and improving supply of economic roundwood for future harvesting is vital to the economy of the province.

The grant will cover hiring of a professor of tree genetics and a technician, as well as such research costs as equipment, travel and computer time. The university is seeking a senior researcher with an established international reputation for this presitigious academic post.

Participating in the project are Acadia Forest Products Limited; Boise Cascade Canada Ltd.; Canadian International Paper Company; Consolidated-Bathurst Limited; Fraser Inc.; J.D. Irving

Limited; MacMillan-Rothesay Limited; and St. Anne-Nackawick Pulp & Paper Company Ltd.

Groundwork for establishing the tree improvement chair was laid by UNB's former president, John M. Anderson. He hoped that in strengthening relationships between the university and the industry, the joint project would prove to be a step towards, the forestry complex which is proposed for New Brunswick.

Dr. Condon hailed former President Anderson's "skillful efforts in bringing together so imaginatively the university's needs and the needs of the forest industries."

bloody good story

Would you believe that donating blood has entered the competition arena? Yes, thats right, a real competative exercise. As a matter of fact some members of the houses on campus were encouraged to go and have their names signed off the list because they had a medical or religious reason for not being able to take part in the exercise. To me, the key ideas was, "We won, we had the highest percentage among the houses" another sporting event!

Blood is vital to life and tranfusing human blood holds a prominent position in modern medical practice. But what are the problems connected with the use of blood? Well for the unwary there are many. The book "Clinical Hematology" by Professor Maxwell M. Wintrobe, p. 474 says "A frank appraisal of the facts proves that blood transfusion must honestly be regarded as a procedure involving considerable danger and even as potentially lethal." And the "Oasis", February 1976,p. 23-24, which is a United States Government publication, carried an article on the dangers of blood said, 'Donating blood can be compared to sending a loaded gun to an unsuspecting or aprepared person...like the load-

gun there is a safety lever or utton governing the transfusions. But, how many persons have died from gun shot wounds as a result of believing that the lever was on

Winfield S. Miller wrote in Medical Economics, "No biologic product has a greater potential for fatal mistakes in medical practice than blood. More than one doctor has learned to his sorrow that every bottle of blood in the blood banks is a potential bottle of nitroglycerin." The Southe 1 Medical Journal recently su pested that "Between 3,000 and 30,000 deaths attributable to transfusions" is probably a conservative estimate

Stanford University's Dr. J. Garrott Allen, a leading expert on the blood problem, estimated that blood transfusions kill at least 35,000 Americans each year and injure another 50,000. (The National Observer, January 29, 1972, p. 1) Just think, these figures are for just one country saying nothing for the rest of the world.

Blood is unique. It is so unique that reference works state that there are some fifteen know group systems. Regarding only one of these groups, the Rh blood group system, it is said that, "at the present time nearly 300 different Rh types may theoretically be recognized." (God, blood and Society, 1972, by A.D. Farr, p. 32). Dr. Herbert Silver from the Blood Bank and Immunohematology Division of the Hartford (Connecticut) Hospital wrote concerning blood matching. He said that "there is a less than 1 in a 100,000 chance of giving a person blood exactly like his own." (The Journal of the American Medical Associcition, April 12, 1976, p.1611) Since blood is so risky, are there alternative therapies? Yes there are. LThe doctor can "build up the patients blood" before and after surgery with amino acids and oral and injected iron compounds. (The Journal of Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery, July, 1974, p. 3). Others include deep hypoterma (lowering the patients body temperature), inducing hypotension (lowering blood pressure); also the use of saline solution, ringers lactate, Haemaccel and Hydroscyethye starch solution are being used as non-blood fluids quite effectively.

A point to note in all this is, even after you are given a transfusion, this additional blood does not enhance the blood's oxygen-carrying capacity. A recent editorial in Anaesthesia made this significant point, "It is worth remembering also that the

haemoglobin of stored, citrated red cells is not fully available for the transfer of oxygen to the tissues for some 24 hours after transfusion..., rapid blood transfusion must therefore be regarded

primarily as a mere volume expander in the initial stages. (Anaesthesia, March 1975, p. 150) So plasma replacement could be done by saline solution, Ringers lactate or laemacce and Hydroxyethyl starch solution to mention a few.

After a number of preliminary heats, with commentary being provided by Barry King from the Moosehead van, flaws in both design and driving ability came to



Guelph to go FM

Guelph, Ont. (CUP) -- FM radio will be coming to the University of Guelph on January 28, 1980.

The CRTC granted a license in August to a broadcast at 93.3 FM using

power of 50 watts to station CFRU at Guelph. Radio at Guelph started in 1965, when the Guelph Radio Society

began preparing one-hour programs for broadcast as station CJOY. Attempts to join an FM station for Guelph began in 1967, but were stopped when the CRTC froze applications for FM licences in 1969. In 1970 CFRU began broadcasting on an AM carrier current, in 1973 started regular AM broadcasts to the university residences.


The Radio society (now called Radio Gryphon) made a second application for an FM license in 1978, but had to re-write it to give a more exact idea of what the programming would be like. The

application was then re-submitted and accepted. In keeping with CRTC regulations, the station will be run by a non-profit corporation independent of the university. The corporation

will be called University of Guelph Radio Radio Gryphon. It will be over seen by a Board of Directors with students at Guelph forming half its members, the rest being a graduate student, faculty, staff, a graduate and two members of the Guelph community.

CFRU-FM, as a non commercial station, is limited in the type and amount of paid advertisements it can accept. The station can only take sponsorships which can only mention who is paying for the time and not advertisements. CFRU-FM is mainly supported by a \$1.50 levy on the students at Guelph.

cause cancer

Drinking coffee may lead to breast cancer, say scientists at Andrews University in Michigan. Their study also found that women who drink coffee and eat meat have double the cancer risk of those who do not.

The research was part of a number of breast cancer studies sponsored by the Seventh Day Adventist, which compared 50,000 members of the church to the general population. Adventists-who abstain from drinking coffeehad 35 per cent less fatal cases of breast cancer than other test subjects. Coffee drinking meat eaters, on the other hand, had a 140 per cent cancer mortality rate compared to the general public.

Meanwhile, in another blow to the coffee industry, a scientist says that drinking coffee may make you fat. The reason? Well, John Tongs-- a Canadian psychologist--says coffee causes hunger pangs by making the stomach contract. And everyone knows what hunger pangs can lead

Try to bring in a variety of people to student government and get them more involved with campus organizations.



rears ago, regularly spends up to 6 hours a day studying. But when he does watch TV, his favorite show is none other than "Monty Python's Flying Circus."


According to an interview published in the London Daily Mirror, Sirhan is in remarkably good shape, considering his long

Hostage taking---- Middle East vogue

THE 33rd Annual Red'n Black Revue -- Reviewed

This week's Red 'n Black, the 33rd annual, had fewer acts than last year. As well, the Tuesday performance was marred with sound problems and a general sense of

But the performers were talented and the acts were varied and, for tradition's sake if nothing else, the audience responded enthusiastically to the efforts of the entertainers.

John "Spell" Issemen emceed the show. While he didn't attempt to be a spectacular showman in his own right, his selection of jokes - old and sort-of-new made the scene changes go a little faster.

The first singer of the evening was Anne McMillan, who did the Atlantic Rhythm Section's "Spooky" and Barbra Streisand's "Evergreen." She was accompanied on Evergreen, the first number, by only the pit band's keyboardist, Wilfred Langmaid. She was joined on the next selection by the entire pit band, consisting of Brian McTigue on drums, Peter Giffin on guitar, and Tim Kelly on bass. McMillan's vocals were consistently good, and Kelly's bass playing excelled.

The next act was a comedy skit entitled In Search of a President. It parodied UNB's search for a leader by presenting several candidates – e.g. Richard Nixon, Pole Casino (a "safe bet"), and Elvis Presley - for the

Nigel Yeo performed two of pop music's greatest songs: the Beatles' Blackbird and Simon and Garfunkel's The Boxer. Yeo gave a brief explanation of each song's meaning before singing each one in a beautiful, sensitive voice that quieted the crowd down significantly.

Karate and Tai Kwon Do expert Jin Chong demanded quiet from the audience and got it, as he and a number of his students demonstrated various techniques related to the martial arts. For his finale, Chong jumped over a group of four of his students and smashed a number of thicknesses of boards with his feet.

A rock band consisting of Marc Pepin on bass, Jeff Browne and Charles Gregoire on guitars, and Barry Edwards on drums performed next. Gregoire's vocals were adequate for the material attempted, Dire Strait's Sultans of Swing and the Beatles classic Back in the U.S.S.R.

The Jugband wrapped up act one in typical rowdy fashion. The eight students in the band played beer and liquor bottles filled to different levels with water, and finished up with a song about UNB sung to the tune of Glory Glory Hallelujah.


A jazz band performing Dave Brubeck's Take 5 opened act two. John Lam and Ray Melanson traded guitar solos while bassist Tom Turner provided a solid bottom for the piece. Drummervictor Lentini excelled.

Following a humorous skit, entitled Maytag Mania (about a frosh being swallowed by a washing machine), Andrew Bartlett took the stage and performed two of his own compositions on tenor guitar (i.e., an overgrown ukelele). The audience was responsive to his sensitive emotional songs.

Tributary Room, a skit which was basically an excuse for repeating old faggot jokes, was followed by a performance by the evening's final vocalist, Diane Cook. Ms. Cook, spunding a bit like Kate Bush, sang two Olivia Newton-John numbers, Dancin' Round and Round and Boats Against the Current.

Following an appearance by the whistling pygmies (a group of men with peinted stomachs and wearing cardboard hats over their head and shoulders) the famous kickline appeared to captivate the audience. N.B.Drama Festival continues

the curtain goes up on the third entry in the 1979 New Brunswick Drama Festival being held in the Centre Sainte-Anne. The production is a musical comedy The Fantasticks by Mount Allison's Windsor Players.

The Fantasticks is the longest running musical ever, still playing Off-Broadway after more than twenty years. The story itself is timeless and it is told for us by a narrator, El Gallo. It concerns a girl, Luisa, and a boy, Matt, who fall in love with the active encouragement of their fathers who think the best way to bring about a match is to tell the children they don't approve of it. This is, in fact, the theme of one of their comic songs - "To Manipulate Children You Merely Say No" - and manipulate it they do, with the aid of El Gallo, the narrator, who doubles as the villian of the piece, and a down-and-out old actor, Henry, with his equally seedy companion, Mortimer. But the course of true love, as everyone knows, is never smooth; and the boy and girl have to suffer some of the harder lessons of life before they are finally mature enough to appreciate what they have.

The musical will be performed by Windsor Theatre from Mount Allison University, and features some of the top actors and singers from the Music Department, Last year's production of The Caretaker was taken by Windsor Theatre to the Atlantic Drama, Festival in Newfoundland where it successfully represented the province of New Brunswick and came away with top honors. All major productions in English at Windsor Theatre are directed by Arthur A'AjisJaniunprofessor of English at the University and director of Drama; and the design for "The Caretaker" last year and for The Fantasticks this year has been by Ian Gaskell, lecturer in Drama at the university and technical and administrative director of Windsor Theatre. Movie Review: By SIOBHAN LASKEY ...And Justice For All Now Playing: Gaiety Theatre 7 & 9 Starring: Al Pacino, John Forsythe

I wouldn't be surprised to see And Justice For All succeed as 'Movie of the Year'. It has all the qualities that make a movie great: the acting was impecable; the story line plausible; the comic relief left us laughing, almost in tears; and the drama was intense and grabbing.

The movie reaches at the insanities and absurdities of the conflict between the law and actual justice. Its approach is comparable to that of Network, in that it treats the plot situations as real yet always hangs on the verge of salue.

Al Pacino starts as a young Baltimore lawyer whose outstanding quality is his honesty, but when forced to defend a judge (John Forsythe), whom he personally despises, in a rape case he begins to examine his personal integrity while the world around him begins to collapse. One of his partners goes mad after a client he defended, knowing he was guilty, is released as innocent and commits another hideous crime, while the other partner's major concern is with the profit aspect of law. His affair with a member of the Ethics Committee only complicates his crisis, especially when she tells him that there has been talk of an investigation into his practise. His turmoil is peaking; his partners, his lover, his grandfather (the only stabilizing influence on his life) is becoming senile, and he is being blackmailed to defend the man he hates most. "They want me for my moral integrity and if I don't take it (the case) they'll have me disbarred for being

The whole movie is a study of contrasts: there's a judge who is sane of the surface, but is actually insane and another who is openly suicidual but serves on the bench making rational judgements; the law and justice contrast, the concerned dedicated lawyer and the unemotional "I'm only in the business to make money" lawyer. The largest and most obvious contradiction is that the genre of the movie itself. It oscilates between high drama and comic spoof. It handles this inner tension masterfully and creates an unusual and beautiful movie. Although similar to Network in this respect ...And Justice For All escapes being an obvious satire and really captures the insanities of real life.

The movie has a host of sub plots, none of which detract from the story but instead enhance the flavor

And Justice For All is excellent from beginning to end. It's intense, but it leaves the audience satisfied with the immediate situation and concerned with the questions relative to the story.
