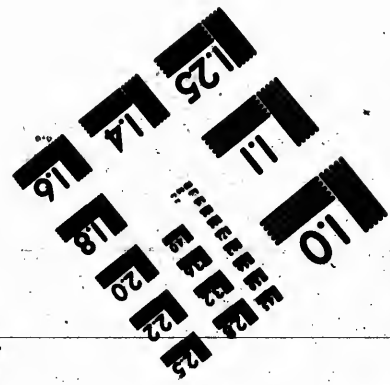
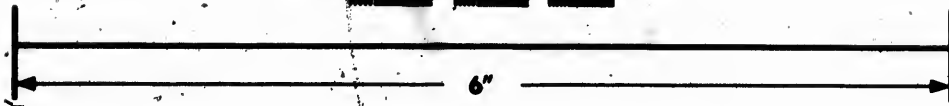
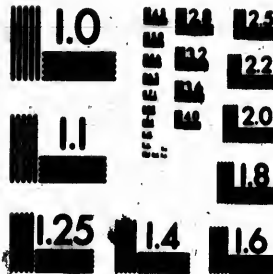


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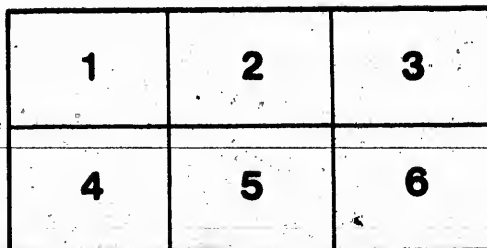
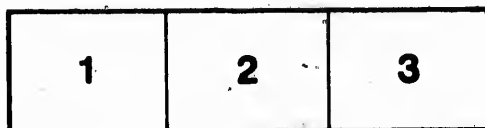
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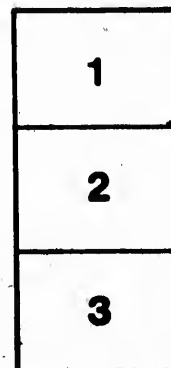
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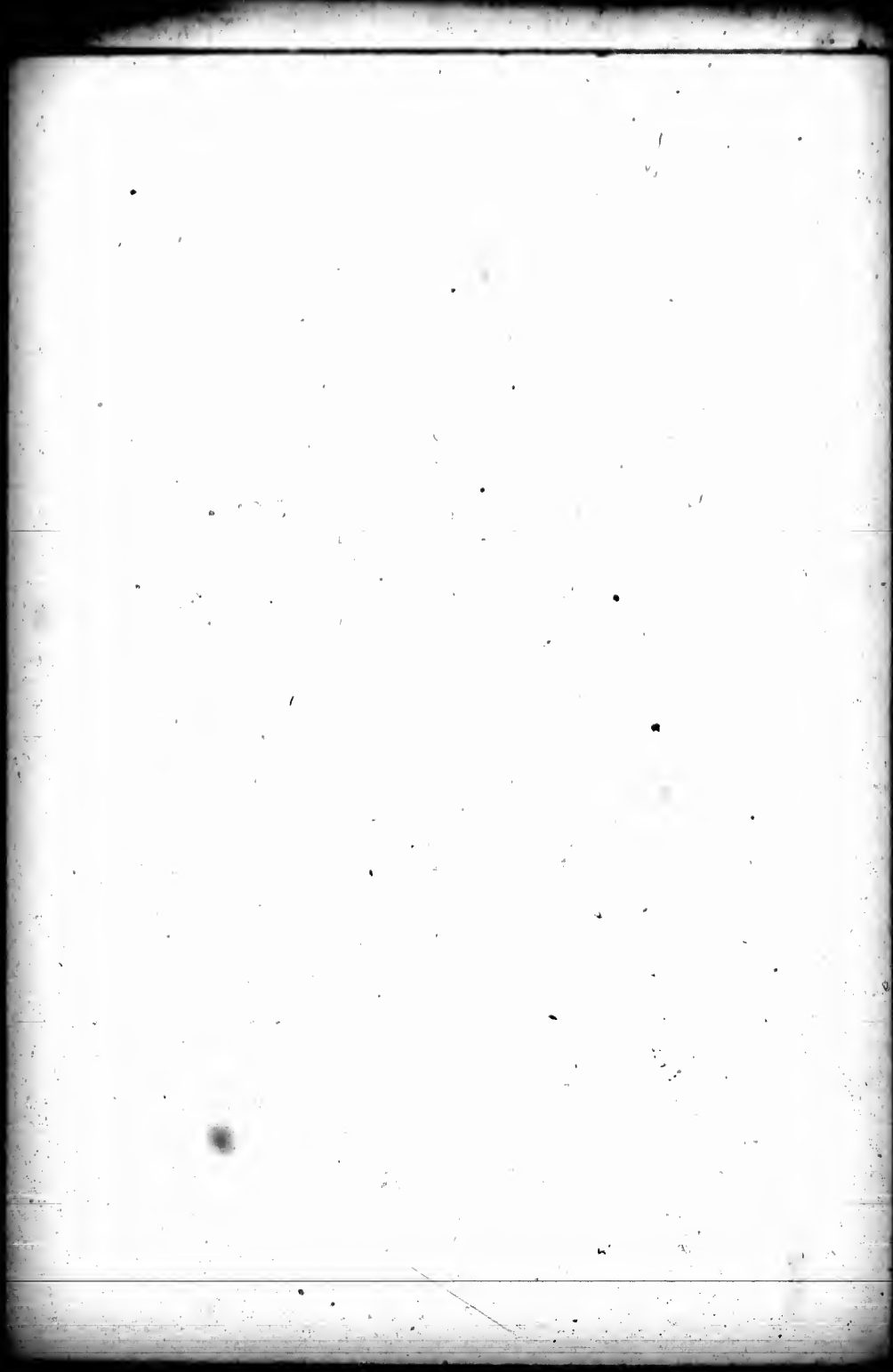
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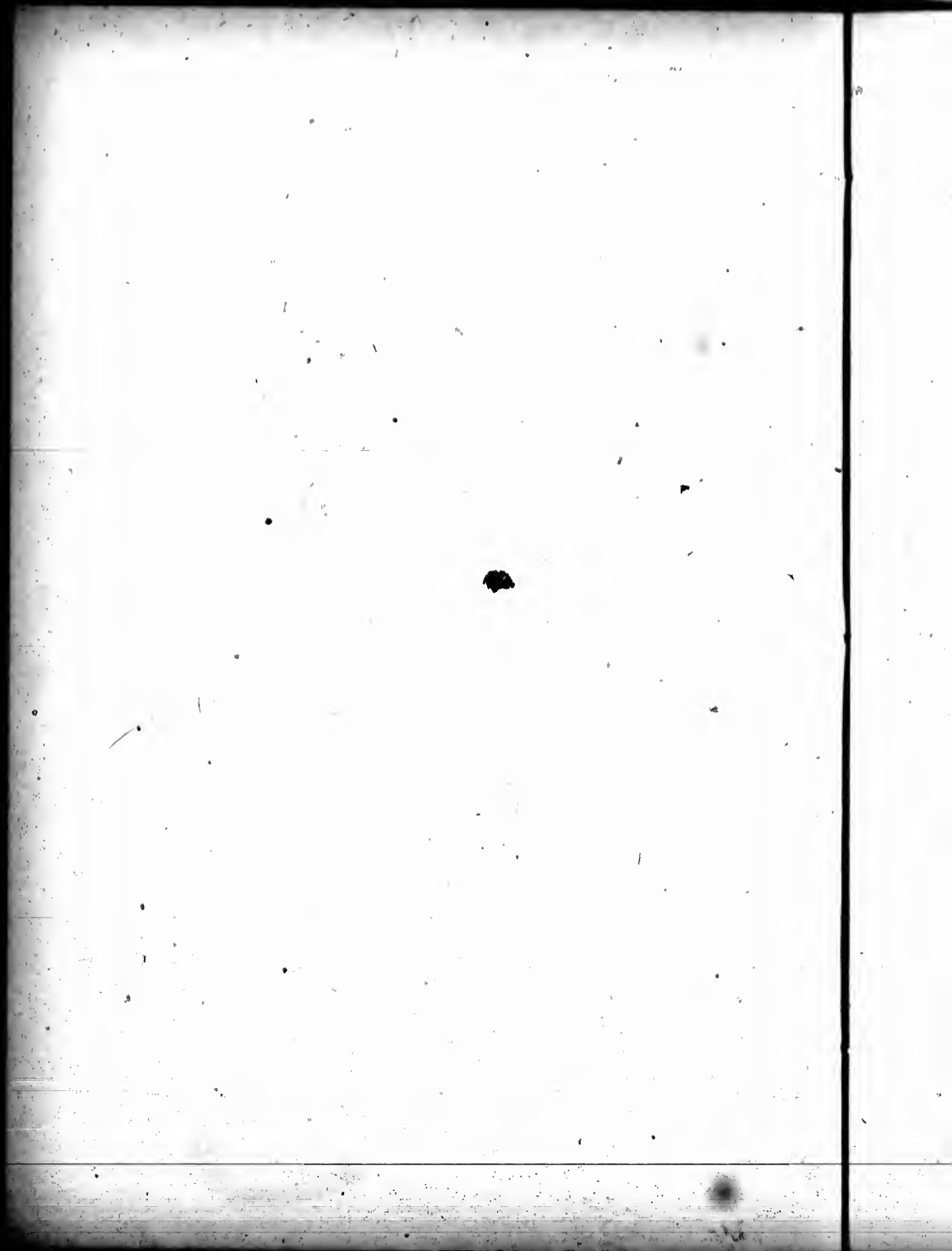
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Ontario Architects' Act.

BILL.

An Act Respecting the Profession of Architects.

[Assented to 7th April, 1890.]

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient for the better protection Provisional
of the public interests in the erection of public and private
buildings in the Province of Ontario, and in order to enable persons
requiring professional aid in architecture to distinguish between
qualified and unqualified architects, and to ensure a standard of
efficiency in the persons practising the profession of architecture
in the Province, and for the furtherance and advancement of the
art of architecture;

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of
the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as
follows:—

1. This act may be cited as "*The Ontario Architects' Act.*" Short title.

2. All persons who shall cause their names to be registered Incorporation
under the provisions of this Act, shall be, and are hereby incorpor- of Ontario
ated under the name and style of "*The Ontario Association of* Association of

3. The Ontario Association of Architects shall be a body cor- Corporate
porate by the name aforesaid, having a perpetual succession and Powers.
a common seal, with power to acquire, hold and dispose of personal
and real estate, for the purposes of this Act, and to sue and be
sued, in the manner usual with such corporations.

6.—(1) The Council shall be composed of nine persons, who shall Council, how Com-
in the first instance be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in posed.
Council within one month after the passing of this Act, and shall
be British subjects, both residing and practising the profession of
architecture within the said Province for at least ten years before
the passing of this Act. The members of said council so appointed
shall meet in the city of Toronto, in the county of York, for the
purpose of organization within one month after appointment, at

such time and place as may be directed by proclamation in the *Ontario Gazette*.

Quorum.

(2). Any five members of the the council shall form a quorum.

Terms of office of first members of council.

7. The members of the council so appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, shall hold office for the following terms respectively: the first three names mentioned for the term of three years; the second three names mentioned for the term of two years; the third and last three names mentioned for the term of one year.

Subsequent appointments of members of council.

8. All subsequent members of the council shall be elected by ballot, in such manner as may be provided for by the by-laws of the Association, at the annual meeting of said association, or at a special meeting called for that purpose; and the member, or members, obtaining the greatest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Qualifications of members of council.

9. No person shall be eligible for election to the council, or qualified to fill any vacancy thereon, or to vote for any member thereof unless duly qualified under the provisions of this Act and the bylaws of the association.

Term of office.

10. All elected members of the council shall hold office for the term of three years, except as hereinafter provided, and five shall form a quorum.

Vacancies how filled.

11.—(1). In case of the resignation or death of any member or members of the council not exceeding four, the other members of the council shall have power to fill all vacancies so caused, until the time of the holding of the next annual meeting, provided said annual meeting is not to be held within a period of three months of the occurring of such vacancy or vacancies.

(2). In case of the resignation or death of five or more members of the council, the president or vice-president of the association, or in case of their, or either of their default for a period of ten days, any five members in good standing, shall have power to call a special meeting of the association upon a notice of not less than ten days, for the purpose of filling the vacancies so caused.

(3) In case of an election to fill the vacancies referred to in subsections 1 and 2, the member receiving the greater number of votes shall be considered the member elected to fill the vacancy which will require the longer term to expire, and so on until the vacancies are filled.

Proceedings where election disputed.

12. In case of any doubt or dispute as to who has or have been elected a member or members of the council, or as to the legality of the election of any member or members of the council, it shall be lawful for the other duly elected members to be, and they are hereby constituted a committee to hold an enquiry and decide who, if any, is, or are, the legally elected member or members of the council, and the person, or persons, if any, whom they decide to have been elected shall be and be deemed to be the member, or members legally

electd, and if the election is found to have been illegal, the said committee shall have power to order a new election.

13. Meetings of the association and the council shall be held at such times and places as may be fixed by the by-laws of the association or council respectively; and in the absence of any rule or regulation as to the summoning of meetings of the association, or of the council, it shall be lawful for the president, or in the event of his absence or death, for the registrar, to summon the same at such time and place as to such officer seems fit, by circular letter to be mailed to each member. Power to regulate meetings of council and association.

14. In the event of the absence of the president from any meeting, either of the vice-presidents, or in their absence, some other member to be chosen from among the members present, shall act as president. Who is preside of meeting.

15. All questions submitted to the association, or the council, shall be decided by a majority of the members present, not being less than five in number in case of the council, and twenty in case of the association. Majority to decide questions.

16. At all meetings the president for the time being shall have only a casting vote. President to have casting vote.

17. There shall be paid to the members of the council such fees for attendance, and such reasonable travelling expenses as may be fixed by by-law passed by the association at the annual meeting. Payment of expenses of councilmen.

18. The council shall annually elect from among its members a president and two vice-presidents, and shall appoint a registrar, treasurer, solicitor and such other officers as may be necessary for the working of this Act, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the council, and who shall, as well as being officers of the council, hold the like position as officers of the association. Election of officers.

19. The council shall have power to fix by by-law the salaries or fees to be paid to such officers, and to the board of examiners hereinafter appointed. Salaries of officers.

20. The council shall have power and authority:

(1) to appoint an examiner, or examiners, for the purpose of ascertaining and reporting upon the qualification, Power of Council.

(a) Of all persons who shall present themselves for admission and enrolment as students at any of the matriculation, preliminary, intermediate or final examinations.

(2) To make all necessary rules, regulations and by-laws respecting the admission and registration of students, the periods and conditions of study, and the enrolment of architects as members of the association and all matters relating to the discipline and honor of

the profession.

Power to pass by-laws.

(3) To regulate and fix the annual and admission fees payable by architects and students, and to make all rules, regulations, and by-laws, necessary for the proper working or carrying out of the provisions of this Act.

Accepting diplomas of foreign institutions.

(4) To enact by-laws as to the terms upon which it will receive the matriculation or other certificates of colleges and other institutions not in the Province of Ontario.

Matriculants in arts not required to pass pre-inary examinations.

21. Any student who has matriculated in arts in any university in Her Majesty's dominions, or in the Ontario School of Practical Science, shall not be required to pass the preliminary examinations.

Registration of present practitioners.

22.—(1) Any person practising the profession of architecture within this province, on the coming into force of this Act, may become a member of the association, by causing his name to be registered with the registrar of the association within three months from the appointment of such registrar, and by paying to the registrar such fees as may by by-law or otherwise be made payable in that behalf.

(2) In case any such person as aforesaid, omits to be registered within said period of three months, through absence, illness, or inadvertence, such person may, at the discretion of the council be admitted to enrolment as an architect.

Admission of other persons.

23. Any person who applies for admission to registration as an architect after the coming into force of this Act, shall be not less than twenty-one years of age, shall have served as a student not less than five years with a principal or principals entitled to register under this Act, or with any other principal or principals approved by the council and have passed such qualifying examinations as may be required by this Act.

Admission of students to practice.

24.—(1) All students desirous of entering the profession of architecture shall be presented by a member of the council, and shall cause their full names to be entered with the registrar and shall pay such fees, and submit to such examinations as shall be necessary in that behalf; provided that any person who, before the passing of this Act, was entered as a student for a shorter term than five years, but not less than three years, with a principal or principals qualified to be registered under this Act, or with any other principal or principals approved by the council shall, on serving the full term of his indenture and passing the examinations prescribed by the council, be entitled to register under the Act.

(2) Notice and evidence of existing studentship shall be given to the registrar within six months after the passing of this Act, and shall be accompanied with such fee as the council shall from time to time direct, and with properly executed articles of indenture for the said term.

Province.

(3) Any person who has graduated from the Ontario School of

Practical Science shall be required to serve only three years as a student, one of which three years may be served during the vacations of such school.

(4) Upon and after the passing of this Act, students shall serve such term as is required to be served by the provisions of this Act, under indenture, to a registered architect, which indenture and any assignment thereof with affidavit of execution thereto attached shall be filed with the registrar upon payment of such fee as the council may by regulation direct.

25. From and after the first day of July, 1890, no person shall be entitled to take or use the title of "Registered Architect," either alone or in combination with any other word or words, or any name, title, or description, implying that he is registered under this Act, unless he be so registered. Any person, who, after the above date, not being registered under this Act, takes or uses any such name, title, or description, as aforesaid, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding \$25 for the first offence, and not exceeding \$100 for each subsequent offence.

Penalty for using title of architect while unregistered.

26. The registrar of the council shall, in every year, cause to be printed, published, and kept for inspection at his office, free of charge, under the direction of the council, a correct register of the names, in alphabetical order according to the surnames, with the respective residences, in the form set forth in schedule A to this Act, or to the like effect, of all persons appearing on the general register on the first day of January in every year, and such register shall be called "The Architects' Register," and a copy of such register for the time being purporting to be so printed and published as aforesaid, shall be evidence in all courts, and before all justices of the peace and others, that the persons therein specified are registered according to the provisions of this Act; provided always, that in case of any person whose name does not appear in such copy, a certified copy under the hand of the registrar of the council, of the entry of the name of such person in the register, shall be evidence that such person is registered under the provisions of this Act.

Register of names persons to be kept.

27. If the registrar shall wilfully make, or cause to be made, any falsification in any matters relating to the register, he shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, on conviction thereof, be imprisoned for any term not exceeding twelve months,

Penalty for registrar falsifying register.

28. Any person who wilfully procures, or attempts to procure registration under this Act by making, or producing, or causing to be produced, or made any false or fraudulent representation, or declaration, either verbally or in writing, that he is entitled to such registration, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, on conviction thereof, be sentenced to imprisonment for any term not exceeding twelve months.

Penalty for procuring false registration.

29. There shall be paid to every registered architect summoned Witness fees of architects.

to attend any court, civil or criminal, for the purpose of giving evidence in his professional capacity, or in consequence of professional services rendered by him as an architect, for each day he so attends, in addition to his travelling expenses (if any), and to be taxed and paid in the manner by law provided with regard to the payment of witnesses attending such court the same fee or allowance as is payable to provincial land surveyors.

Recovery of fees and collection of penalties.

30.—(1) All fees payable under this Act may be recovered as ordinary debts due to the association, and all penalties under this Act may be recovered and enforced before one or more justices of the peace, in manner directed by the Revised Statutes of Canada, chap. 178, entitled the *Summary Convictions Act*, and any Act amending the same.

(2) Any sum or sums of money arising from conviction and recovery of penalties as aforesaid, shall be paid immediately upon the recovery thereof by the convicting magistrate to the registrar of the council.

(3) Any person may be prosecutor or complainant under this Act, and the council may allot such portion of the penalties as may be expedient towards the payment of such prosecutor.

Service of notices.

31. Subject to the other provisions of this Act, all notices and documents required by or for the purposes of this Act to be sent, may be sent by post, and shall be deemed to have been received at the time when the letter containing the same would be delivered in the ordinary course of the mail, and in proving such sending it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice or document was prepaid and properly addressed and put in the post. Such notices and documents may be in writing, or in print, or partly in writing and partly in print, and when sent to the council or other authorities shall be deemed to be properly addressed if addressed to the said bodies or authorities, or to some officer of the council or authority at the principal place of business of the council or authority, and when sent to a person registered under this Act, shall be deemed to be properly addressed if addressed to him according to his address registered in the register of the Association.

Application of funds.

32. All moneys arising from fees payable on registration or the annual renewal fees, or from the sale of copies of the register, or otherwise, shall be paid to the registrar of the council, and by him paid over to the treasurer, to be applied in accordance with such regulations as may be made by the council for defraying the expenses of registration and the other expenses of the execution of this Act, and subject thereto towards the support of museums, libraries, or lectureships, or for other public purposes connected with the profession of architecture, or towards the promotion of learning and education in connection with architecture.

(2) The council shall have power to invest any sum not expended as above in such securities as shall be approved by the Govern-

ment of the Dominion of Canada, or of the Province of Ontario, in the name of any three of their number appointed as trustees, and any income derived from such invested sums shall be added to and considered as part of the ordinary income of the association.

(3) The association may also use surplus funds or invested capital for the rental or purchase of lands or premises, or for the building of premises, to serve as offices, examination halls, libraries, museums, or for any other public purpose connected with architecture.

33. The registrar and treasurer of the council shall enter in Accounts of association. books to be kept for that purpose, a true account of all sums of money by them, or either of them, received and paid under this Act, and such account shall be audited and submitted to the council at such time, or times, as the council may require.

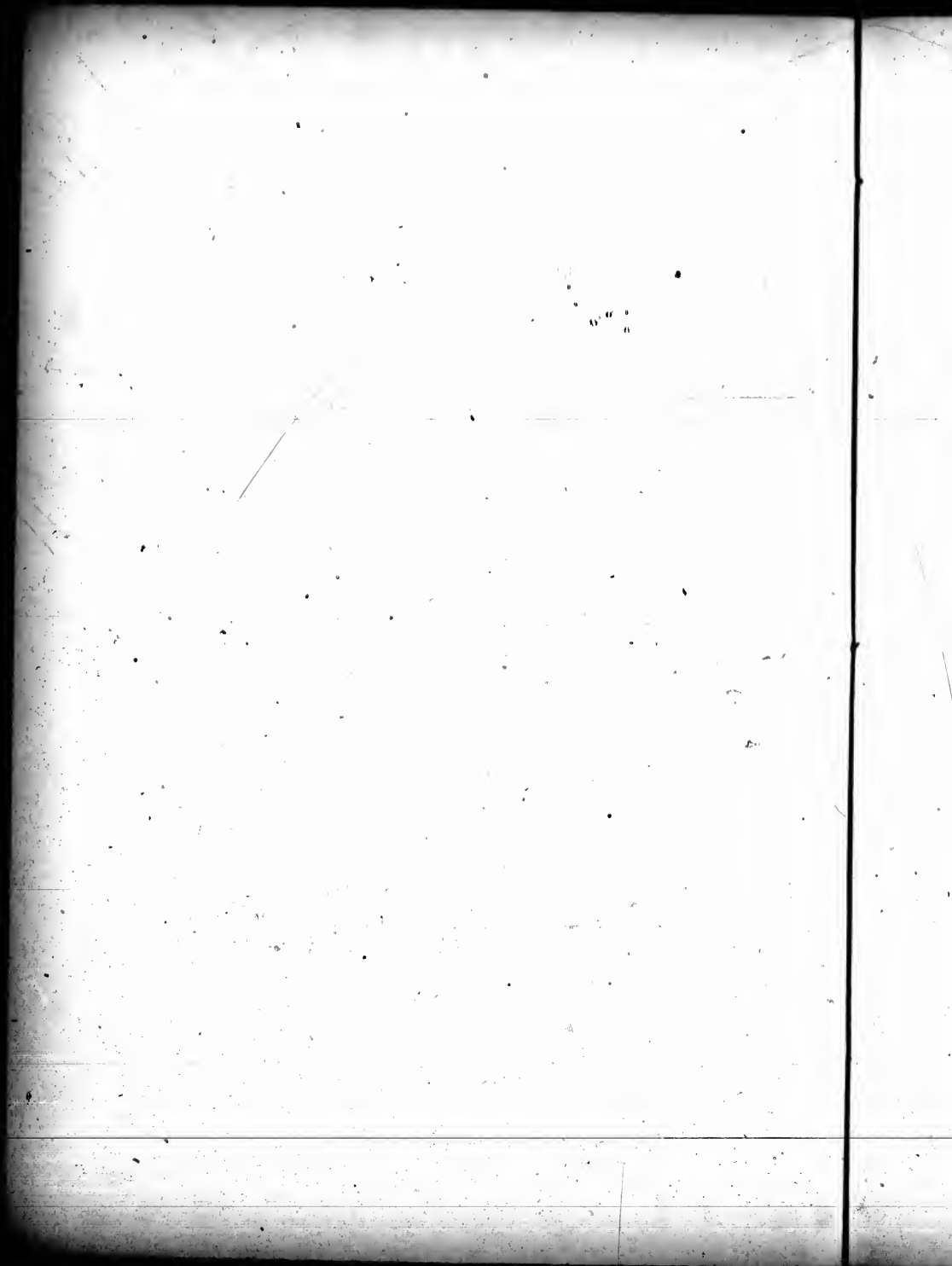
34. It shall be the duty of the registrar to keep the register in Register to keep correct register. accordance with the provisions of this Act, and the by-laws, orders and regulations of the council.

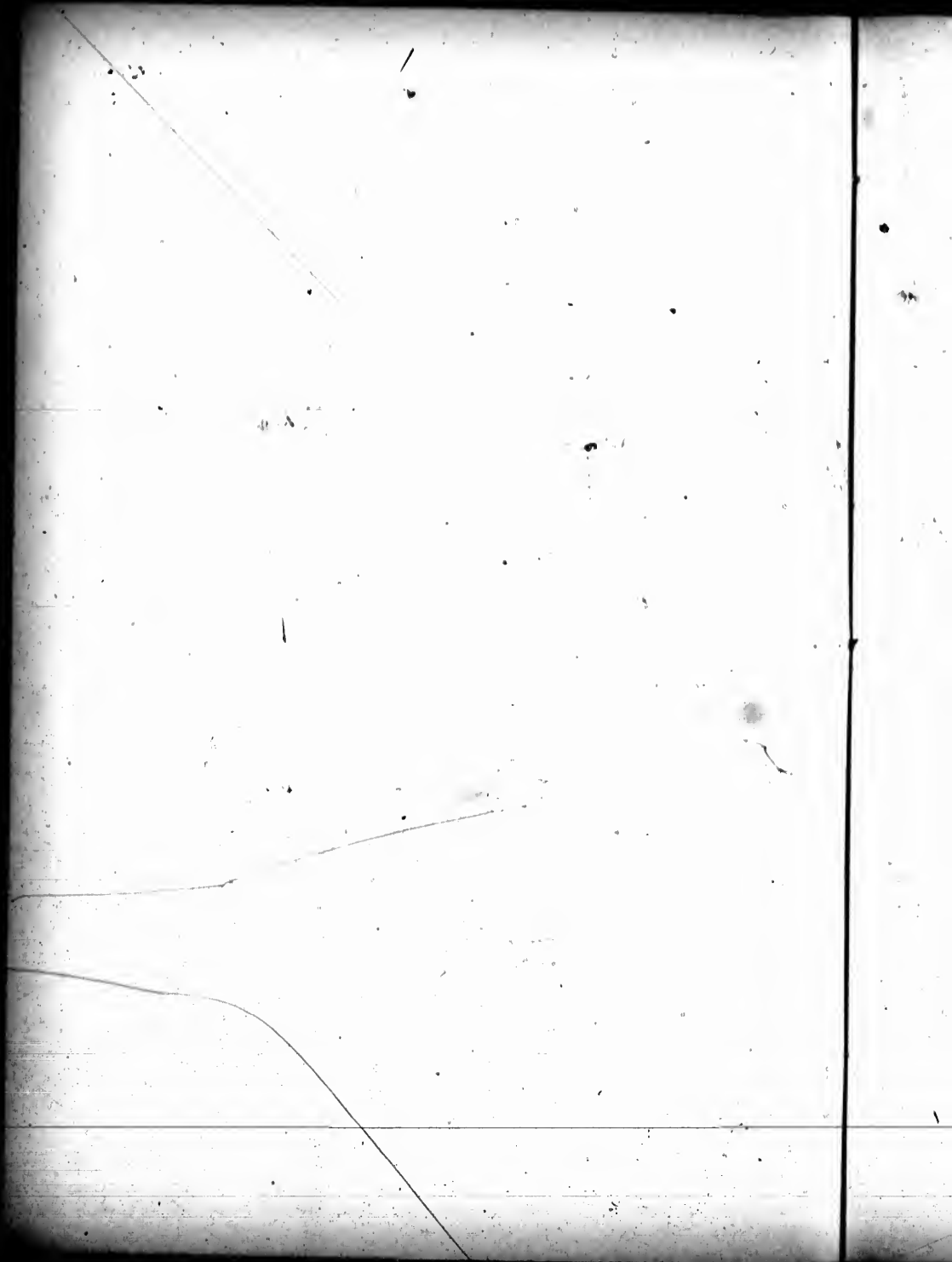


BY-LAWS

OF

The Ontario Association of Architects.

TORONTO, 1891.



BY-LAWS
PASSED BY THE ASSOCIATION.
AT THE
Annual Meeting, February 18, 1891.

1. The Association shall meet on the first Tuesday in February of each year, at such time and place as shall be determined by the Council and designated in the notice calling the meeting.
2. Any person being a British subject who has for ten years been practicing the profession of Architecture and residing within this Province and is, at the time of his nomination, a member in good standing of this Association shall be eligible for election as a member of the Council.
3. Nominations to membership of the Council shall be in writing upon blanks to be mailed by the Registrar to each member at least two months before the Annual Meeting, and must be returned and in the hands of the Registrar at least one month before the date of the said meeting.
4. Each member in good standing is entitled to nominate and vote for as many candidates for election to the Council as there are vacancies to be filled.
5. After the nominations are closed, an alphabetical printed list of all nominations made will be forwarded to each member of the Association at least two weeks before the date of the Annual Meeting.
6. The nomination blanks shall state the date upon which the nomination will close, and list of nominations shall state the date at which and the place where the Annual Meeting will be held.
7. The election to membership in the Council shall be by ballot, and shall be held upon the last day of the Annual Meeting of the Association.
8. There shall be paid to each member of the Council, for attendance at each meeting of the Council, his actual and necessary traveling and hotel expenses.
9. A special meeting of the Association shall be called by the Registrar upon the requisition of the Council or of twenty-five members of the Association in good standing. The requisition shall state the time, place and object of such meeting; and a copy of the requisition shall be sent to each

member, with the notice calling the meeting, at least ten days beforehand.

No business shall be transacted at any special meeting other than that mentioned upon the notice paper.

10. At each annual meeting of the Association, two Auditors, not members of the council, shall be elected. They shall have access at all reasonable times to the books, accounts and securities of the Association, and shall report thereon at the next annual meeting. In the event of death or resignation of an Auditor, the vacancy shall be filled by the Council.



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BY-LAWS
PASSED BY THE COUNCIL
UNDER AUTHORITY OF
The Ontario Architects' Act.

Election of Officers.

All officers of the Council shall be elected by ballot.

Duties of Officers.

THE PRESIDENT.

It shall be the duty of the President :

1. To preside at all meetings of the Association and of the Council.
2. To instruct the Registrar with regard to calling meetings.
3. To countersign all cheques.

No person shall be eligible for election to the office of President for two consecutive years.

THE VICE-PRESIDENT.

In the absence of the President it shall be the duty of the 1st Vice-President, and in the absence of the President and of the 1st Vice-President, it shall be the duty of the 2nd Vice-President to perform all the duties of President.

THE REGISTRAR.

It shall be the duty of the Registrar :

1. To attend all meetings of the Association and of the Council; and meetings of such Committees of the Council in Toronto as may require his attendance; and to record in books, to be provided for that purpose, the minutes of the proceedings of all such meetings.
2. To give notice of meetings of the Association and of the Council to the members thereof, as and when directed by the proper officers in their behalf.
3. To conduct all correspondence under the direction of the proper officers in that behalf.
4. To keep the Register as required by the Ontario Architects' Act.
5. To keep such books of account and record as may be required of him by the Council from time to time.

6. To affix, in the presence of the President or the Vice-President who may be acting for him, the seal of the Association to all documents ordered by the Council to be sealed.

7. To pay over to the Treasurer from time to time all moneys of the Association coming into his hands, and take receipts therefor.

8. To perform such other and further duties as shall from time to time be designated by the Council.

9. The Registrar shall at any time, upon being presented with a requisition demanding the same and signed by four members, call a special meeting of the Council; giving five days notice of the holding of such meeting.

THE TREASURER.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer:—

1. To receive from time to time from the Registrar, all monies of the Association, and to deposit the same as received to the credit of the Association in such bank as may be designated by the Council.

2. To keep, in a book or books provided for that purpose, a record of all monies received or paid out; and to perform such other duties as usually appertain to the office of Treasurer.

No moneys shall be withdrawn from the funds of the Association except by cheque signed by the Treasurer and President.

THE LIBRARIAN.

It shall be the duty of the Librarian:—

To have charge of the library of the Association subject to the direction of the Council, and to discharge the duties usually pertaining to the office of Librarian.

THE EXAMINERS.

It shall be the duty of the Examiners:—

1. To attend at such time and place or times and places not exceeding twice a year, as may be designated by the Council, and to conduct the examination and to report upon the qualification of all persons who shall present themselves at any of the Matriculation, Intermediate or Final Examinations. Such examinations to be conducted as instructed by the Council from time to time.

Salaries of Officers.

1 The salary of the Registrar shall be \$200 per annum.

2 The salary of the Librarian shall be fixed by the Council from time to time.

3 The fee of each Examiner shall be fixed by the Council from time to time.

Members' Fees.

1 The admission fee to membership in the Association shall be the sum

of \$15.00, which sum shall include the annual fee for the year current at the time of admission.

2 The annual fee payable by resident members (that is members residing in the City of Toronto, or elsewhere in the County of York,) shall be \$15.00; for non-resident members the sum of \$10.00; which annual sums shall be due and payable on the first day of January of each year, and if not paid before the first day of July following, the said annual fee shall be the sums of \$20.00 and \$15.00 respectively.

3 No member shall be eligible for election to the Council, and no member shall be entitled to take any part in the meetings of the Association or Council who is in arrears in the payment of his annual or other fees or dues to the Association.

4 Any member of the Association who shall allow the payment of his annual fees to remain in arrear for the period of one year after the time appointed for the payment thereof, shall (*ipso facto*) cease to be a member of the Association. Nevertheless any such member may be reinstated in his membership under such terms as the Council shall determine.

Students' Fees.

The following fees shall be paid by students.

- 1 Upon admission as a student a fee of \$5.00.
- 2 Upon filing his indentures or any assignment thereof a fee of \$1.00.
- 3 Upon each examination a fee of \$1.00.

Expulsion.

1 No member of this Association shall retain in his office any student unless such student is properly registered and in good standing upon the books of the Association.

2 Any member of the Association who shall be guilty of any act in violation of the true spirit, intent and meaning of the declaration of membership shall render himself liable to be expelled from the Association or to be suspended from membership therein: but no member shall be expelled or suspended unless upon a vote of the majority of the Council and only after such member shall have received notice of the charges against him and have been afforded an opportunity of defending himself against the same.

3 Any member convicted of any criminal act shall thereby become liable to be expelled by a vote of the majority of the Council.

Examinations.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.

Candidates, except as provided in clause 21 of the Ontario Architects' Act, must have passed the Examination of the Second Form of a High School or Collegiate Institute; or, as an alternative, the Entrance Examination to a High School or Collegiate Institute and an examination in Mathematics and either French or German equivalent to that of the Second Form of a High School or Collegiate Institute.

In addition to the Preliminary Examination, every student shall pass three examinations, two of which shall be intermediate and one final. The First Intermediate must be taken not less than one and not more than two years from the time of passing the Preliminary, and the Second not less than one nor more than two years after passing the First Intermediate. The Council shall have power from time to time to extend the time of passing examinations in particular cases, or permit candidates who may have failed to pass an examination, to come up again for examination. The Final Examination may be taken at the expiring of the indenture or at any time thereafter that he may choose to come forward.

Students shall be examined in the two Intermediate Examinations in places designated by the Council from time to time as required. The Final Examination shall (in all cases) be held in Toronto.

The examinations shall be held in April in each year. All candidates must give to the Registrar one month's notice of presenting themselves for examination.

The examination fee in all cases to accompany the notice.

FIRST INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION.

Every candidate must, at least one month prior to the date fixed for the First Intermediate Examination, send to the Registrar the following drawings, which must be certified by his principal to be his own work.

Four sheets of drawings illustrating different architectural periods designated by the examiners.

One sheet of mouldings and ornament containing examples of each of the above periods.

The subjects for the First Intermediate will be:

- Elements of construction.
- History of Architecture.
- Mathematics.
- Technical terms.
- Applied mechanics.

SECOND INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION.

Every candidate must, at least one month prior to the date fixed for the Second Intermediate Examination, send to the Registrar the following drawings, which must be certified by his principal to be his own work.

- One perspective drawing.
- One sheet of drawings measured from existing examples.
- One sheet constructional details as directed by the Examiners.

The subjects for the Second Intermediate Examination will be:

- History of Architecture, (carried further), characteristics of styles.
- Strength of materials.
- Graphic statics.
- Structural iron work.
- Mathematics.

FINAL EXAMINATION.

The subjects for the Final Examination will be:

History of Architecture.—The leading characteristics, including mouldings, features and ornaments of all styles; and special characteristics with mouldings, features and ornament in detail of any one style or period the student may select.

Design as illustrated by drawings for a building of moderate dimensions from particulars given; with details of construction and ornament, and with specifications.

Nature and properties of materials—limes—cements—stones—bricks—timber.

Foundations.

Architectural jurisprudence.

Practical knowledge of building trades.

Applied Mathematics.

Heating and ventilation. *

Sanitary science.

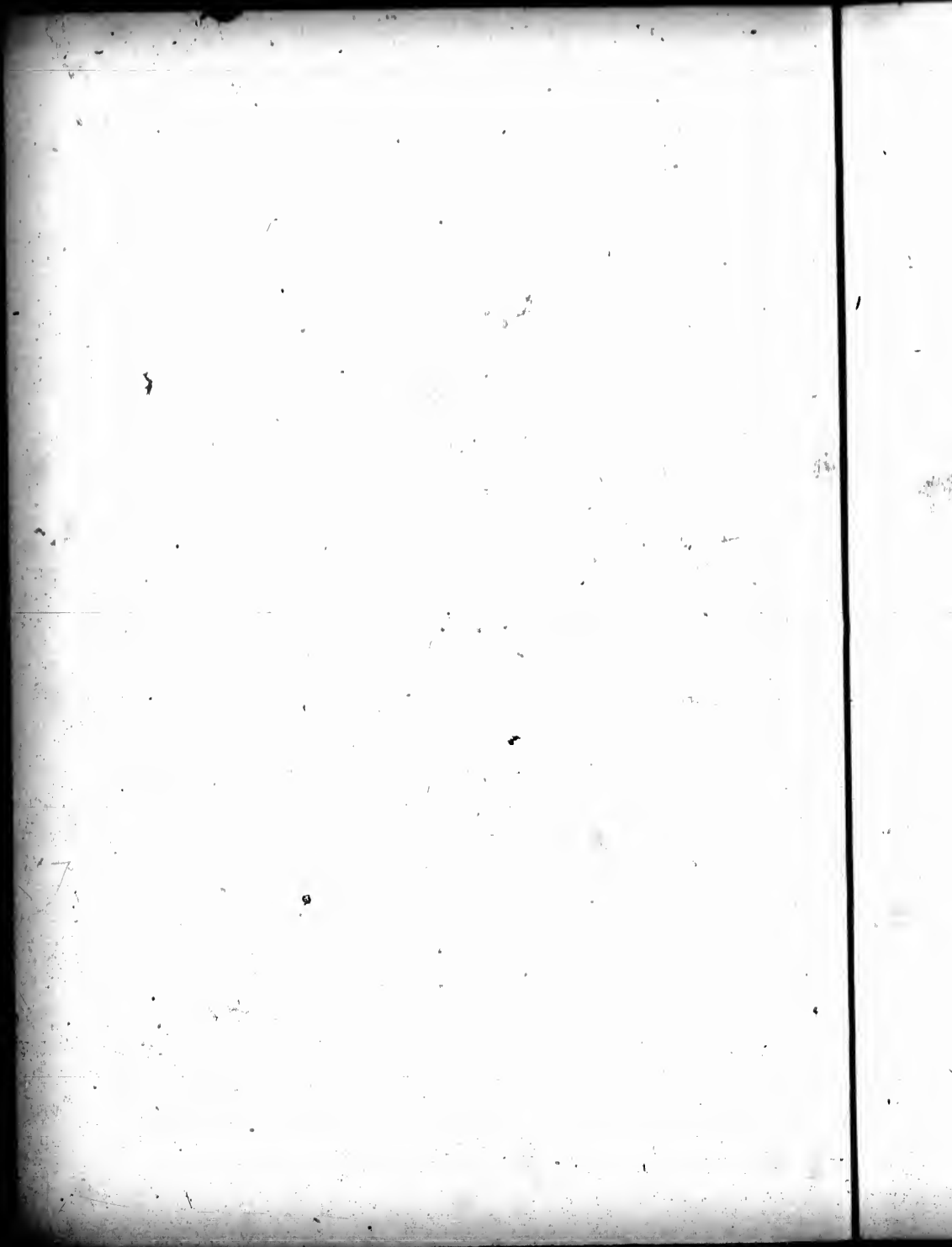

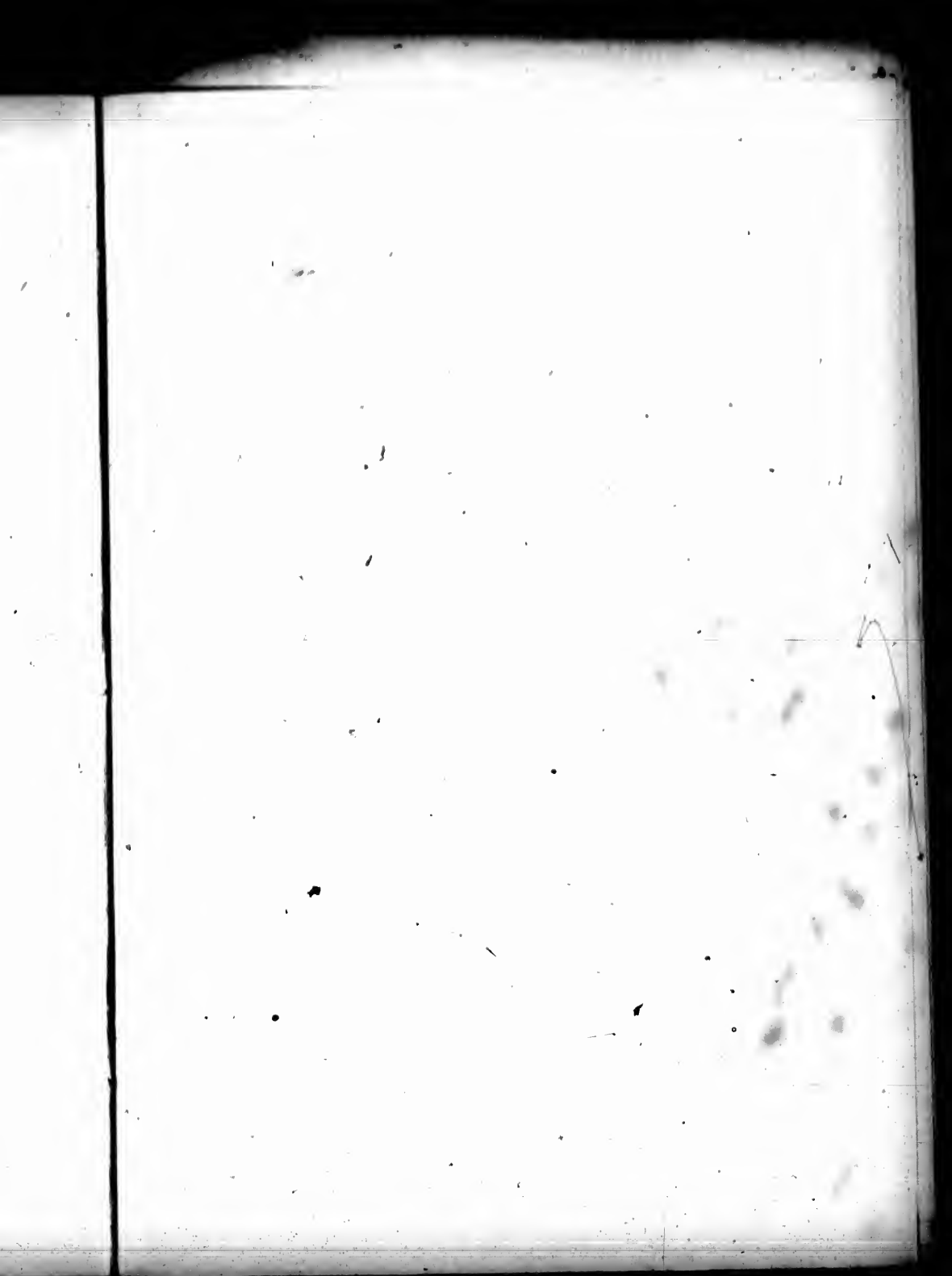

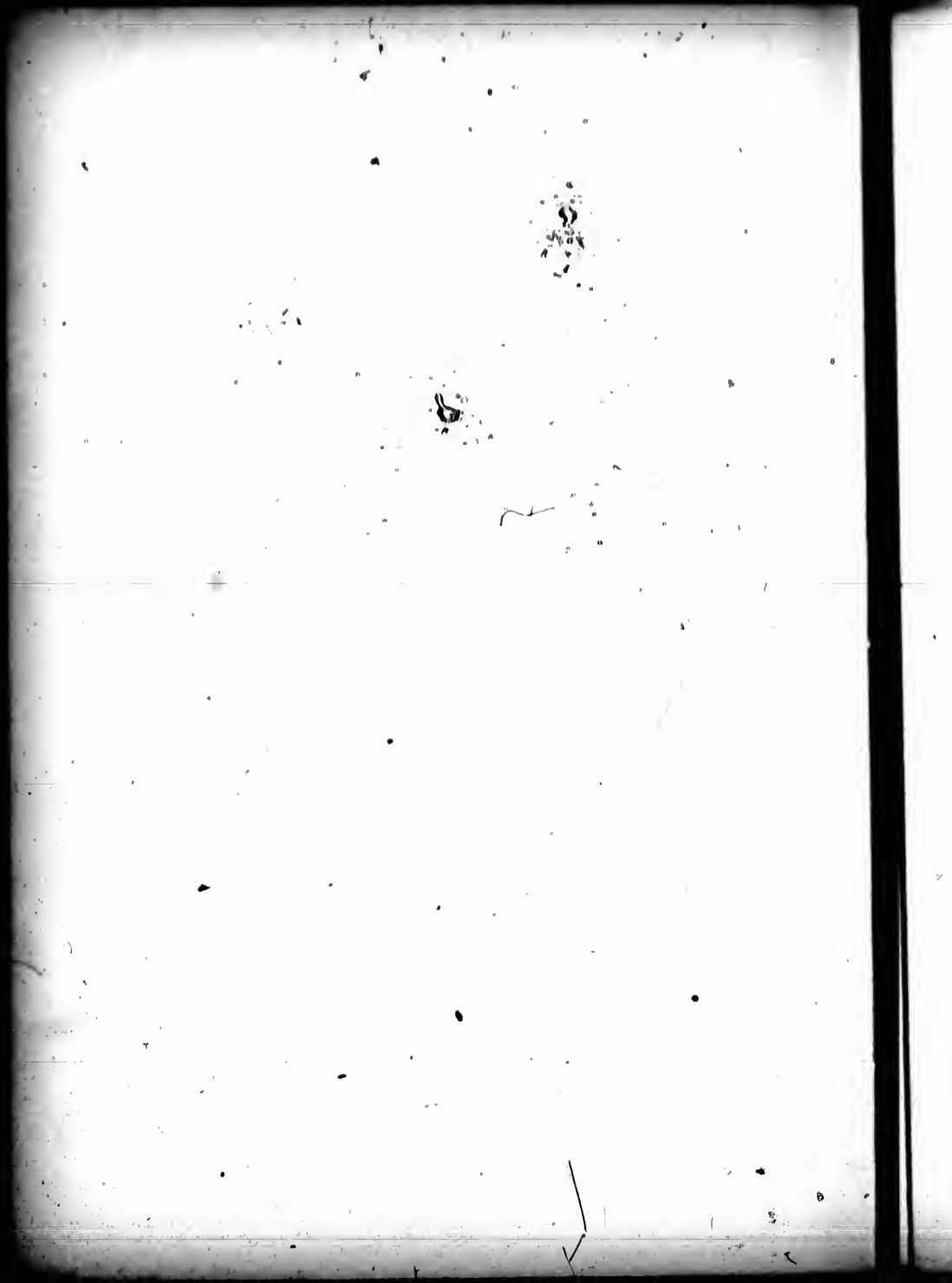

EXAMINATIONS

TO BE HELD ON

THURSDAY, APRIL 7TH, 1892.

Every candidate for examination must send in his name to the Registrar at least one month before the date fixed for the examinations.

Preliminary Examination.

Candidates, except such as have matriculated in arts in any university in Her Majesty's dominions, or in the Ontario School of Practical Science, must have passed the examination of the second form of a High School or Collegiate Institute; or, as an alternative, must have passed the entrance examination to a High School or Collegiate Institute and submit to an examination in Mathematics and either French or German equivalent to that of the second form of a High School or Collegiate Institute.

The first time of sending in his name as a candidate for examination the student shall send also a certificate of his status with reference to the Preliminary Examination.



First Intermediate Examination.

Every candidate must, at least one month prior to the date fixed for the examination, send to the Registrar the following drawings, which must be certified by his principal to be his own work :—

Four sheets of drawings, one of each of the following orders :—
Grecian Doric, Grecian Ionic, Grecian Corinthian and the Composite Order of the Romans.

One sheet of the mouldings and ornaments of these orders, drawn to a larger scale.

(Each sheet to be of the size of a half sheet of Whatman's Double Elephant paper, i. e., 30 in. by 45 in.)

The subjects for examination will be :—

Elements of Construction.

Text Book : Mitchell's Building Construction.

Mathematics.

Euclid : Books I., II. and III.

Plane Trigonometry : Including the solution of plane triangles.

Algebra : Including quadratic equations.

Technical Terms.

A knowledge of the terms necessary to understand the description of a monumental building and its parts.

History of Architecture.

An outline only will be required, such as may be learned from reading such works as Rosengarten's Architectural Styles.

Second Intermediate Examination.

Every candidate must, at least one month prior to the date fixed for the examination, send to the Registrar the following drawings, which must be certified by his principal to be his own work :—

One sheet of Romanesque architecture.

Two sheets of Gothic architecture.

One sheet of drawings measured from existing examples.

One sheet of constructional details.

(Each sheet to be of the size of a half sheet of Whatman's Double Elephant paper, i. e., 20 in. by 26 in.)

The subjects for examination will be :

Statics, Graphical and Analytical.

Strength of Materials.

Text book for both the above heads : Lessons in Applied Mechanics, by Cotterill & Spide ; Part II.

Structural Iron Work.

The candidate will be required to draw details of the forms of iron construction in use in ordinary practice, viz., the construction of columns and girders, and the framing of beams and trusses.

History of Architecture.

The candidate will be expected to have a knowledge of the development of architecture and the characteristics of the different styles.

Text book : Fergusson's History of Architecture.

Handbooks recommended :

Parker's Introduction to Gothic Architecture.

Bloxam's Gothic Architecture.

Rickman's Gothic Architecture.

Final Examination.

Every candidate must, at least one month prior to the date fixed for the examination, send to the Registrar a perspective drawing which must be certified to be his own work. Drawing to be on a sheet of paper, 20 in. by 26 in., and not mounted on cardboard.

The subjects for final examination will be :—

History of Architecture.

The leading characteristics, including mouldings, features and ornaments of all styles ; and special characteristics, with mouldings, features and ornaments in detail, of any one style or period the candidate may select.

Design.

As illustrated by drawings for a building of moderate dimensions, from particulars given, with details of construction and ornament and with specifications.

Nature and Properties of Materials.

Limes, cements, stones, bricks, timber.

Foundations.

Text-book : Foundations, by Geo. T. Powell.

Architectural Jurisprudence.

Text-book : The Law Relating to Civil Engineers, Architects and Contractors, by Macassey & Strahan.

Practical Knowledge of Building Trades.

Sufficient for the purposes of ordinary building.

Strength of Materials.

Designing structures of an ordinary kind from data, with computation of the strains involved.

Heating and Ventilation.

Text-book : Ventilation and Heating, by John S. Billings.

Sanitary Science.

Text-book : Gerhard's House Drainage ; Bayles' House Drainage and Water Supply.

Second Intermediate Examination

FOR 1892.

As many students who were in service at the time of the passing of the Act are allowed to begin their course of examinations (after the Preliminary) at the Second Intermediate Examination, this examination will for this year comprise parts of the First Intermediate and of the Second Intermediate Examinations, as follows:—

The drawings to be submitted, and the examinations on Structural Iron Work and the History of Architecture will be as in the programme for the Second Intermediate Examination. Graphical and Analytical Statics and Strength of Materials will be omitted, and in their place will be taken the Elements of Construction and Mathematics of the First Intermediate Examination.
