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PREFACE.

this the twenty-sixth issue of the YEAR Book, we give an increased number of portraits. These are easier obtained than when the present Editor took hold of the publication, twelve years ago. We determined to put in such illustrations as we could, and as the income of the YEAR BOOK would warrant; and began modestly with one portrait on wood, which cost \$10. Three of our ministers were afterwards exceedingly well represented by the lithographic art, each of

which pictures cost \$20. By this time the new art of photogravure was coming in, and the printers were gradually learning how to put the new style of pictures through the press: and the portraits have been increasing. Twenty eight portraits have appeared from time to time, before this year, not including a group of African helpers, nor the "Union of 1868"; and with this issue—and no doubt in years to come—the proportion will be greatly increased.

We give, this year, the historical chart of the Union Meetings, from the beginning; and it must be accepted as full and perfect. No one else has the same opportunity of making it correct as the Editor; and he has done his best.

To be perfect in all things would make us conceited; and the Editor refers to the back of the title page for some corrections and omissions. One can interline a letter, but one cannot put in an omitted name after the sheets are printed. The particular brethren thus distinguished, will, however, not be likely to be omitted again!

If we thought this preface would be read and noted by everybody, and within time, we would say a good deal about ordering copies for the church members in good season. A denominational Year Book is something like a savory dish of pancakes; which must be eaten warm! A Year Book twelve months old is simply a book of historical reference; three months old, it has lost much of its freshness and value. Let it be known, therefore, that our Year Book is issued every year on the first day of September. We note that this preface—the rest of the book is all in type—is written on the very same day of August as last year!

Let the orders from the churches (and it is always best to "vote" a few dollars, to supply each family with a copy) come in at once; and read the reports of the Union, the College and the Societies, within "three months from date!"

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POSTAL INFORMATION.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer, or to any other person.

Letters bearing multilated stamps, or stamps so soiled and defaced as to make it impossible for the sorting clerks to decide whether they have been used before or not, will be sent to the Postmaster General for his adjudication.

Register all valuable letters.

Address all complaints and inquiries respecting late or incorrect delivery to the Postmaster. With a view to facilitate investigation always transmit the envelope of a letter which is the subject matter of inquiry.

Letters for the United States should bear the name of the State as well as

that of the Post Office.

Letters addressed to mere initials, or fictitious names, will not be delivered

unless addressed in care of a resident or to some box in the Post Office.

The public are cautioned against doing up book packets in envelopes notched at the ends or corners; nor must the postage stamp be attached to both wrapper and contents. The contents of a book packet must be so tied or fastened up as to permit of being withdrawn for inspection.

FIRST CLASS MATTER

LETTERS.

Letters addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland and United States, 3 cents per oz., or fraction thereof.

Great Britain (by Canadian or New York Mail Steamers), 5 cents per ½ oz. or fraction thereof.

Drop letters, where there is free delivery by carriers, 2 cents per oz.

Where no delivery by carriers, 1 cent per oz.

Letters addressed to places in Canada must be at least partially prepaid,

and those addressed to the United States must be prepaid at least a full rate (3 cents), otherwise they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Letters addressed to places in Canada and partly prepaid, will be forwarded,

subject on delivery to double the amount of unpaid postage.

Letter postage is expected to be reduced to 2c. in a few months.—Ed.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Re-directed letters are not liable to any additional postage if handed back to the Post Office with a changed address at the moment of delivery, or as soon as possible thereafter, provided always the change in the address does not require the letter to be sent to any place to which the postage rate is higher than was at first payable. Re-directed letters should not be dropped into a Post Office Box or receiver unless additional postage has been put on to carry them to their second destination.

REQUEST LETTERS.

Letters from places in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States, covered by envelopes having either printed or written thereon a REQUEST that

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the letters be returned to the sender if not delivered with a certain specified time, will be returned as requested if not delivered in the time stated.

POST CARDS.

For Canada and the United States, one cent. each. For Great Britain, Newfoundland, and all Postal countries, two cents each. Reply Cards, for Canada and the United States, two cents each. Nothing must be attached to a Post Card.

Private Post Cards, under certain regulations as to size and material, may be prepaid by affixing on each a one-cent stamp, for Canada and the United States; and by a prepayment of two cents may be sent to a certain number of countries.

SECOND CLASS MATTER.

Newspapers and Periodicals posted from the office of publication, are authorized to pass free of postage to regular subscribers in Canada, the United States, and Newfoundland

Specimen numbers may be sent at one cent per lb.

British periodical publications, and other foreign publications, can be remailed by newsdealers to subscribers in Canada, at the bulk rate of 1 cent per lb.

THIRD CLASS MATTER.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Transient newspapers for any place in Canada or United States, 1c. per 4 oz.; but a paper not more than 1 oz., will go for ½c. For Great Britain and other countries in the Postal Union, one cent per two ounces.

BOOKS, ETC., AND MISCELLANEOUS MATTER.

The postage on Books, Pamphlets, Circulars, (wholly in print) occasional publications, etc., addressed to Canada, is 1c. per 4 oz. To the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain and all other countries, 1c. per 2 oz. Circulars, typewritten, are liable to letter rate.

The Postage on Printed Stationery, Printers' Proof Sheets, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Lithographs, Photographs, Sheet Music (whether printed or written, including Music Books, whether stitched or bound), etc., addressed to Canada, the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain, or any European country is 1c. per 2 oz. No package must exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. The limit of weight for Canada and United States is 5 lbs., for other Postal Union Countries 4 lbs.

Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots and Scions or Grafts, can only be sent to the United States as 5th Class Matter; when posted for delivery in Canada, the postage is 1c. per 4 oz., and the limit of weight 5 lbs.

PATTERNS AND SAMPLES.

Bona fide Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada at 1 cent per 4 oz. Must be put up

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ounces in be put up so as to admit of inspection Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible.

Packages of tea, etc., posted as samples must not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. in weight. The limit of weight to United Kingdom is 5 lbs.; limit of size, 2 ft. in length by one foot in width or depth. Limit of weight to United States, 8 oz.

FOURTH CLASS MATTER.

CLOSED PARCELS.

Parcels for Canada must be prepaid 6c. for 4 oz., and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight, nor 2 feet in length, by 1 foot in width or depth. No correspondence must be enclosed. Invoices, accounts, or receipts may be enclosed in parcels.

FIFTH CLASS MATTER.

Comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. Postage 1c. per oz., or fraction thereof. Limit of weight 5 lbs.; of size, 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. Matter claiming to be 5th class must be open to inspection, and there must be no correspondence enclosed, (except invoices and accounts.) Packages of 5th Class Matter may be sent to the United States for the same prepayment as is required within the Dominion, but the contents will be liable to customs inspection and collection of duty in the United States.

PARCEL POST.

WITH THE UNITED KINGDOM, NEWFOUNDLAND, JAPAN, AND CERTAIN OTHER

COUNTRIES.

Closed parcels may be sent to places in Newfoundland, Jamaica, the United Kingdom, Japan and all other countries and colonies with which the United Kingdom maintains a parcel post. No correspondence must be enclosed. A customs' Declaration of the contents and value of each parcel must be filled up at the Post Office by the sender.

Parcels for Newfoundland must be prepaid 15c. per lb. or a fraction of a lb., limit of weight, 7 lbs. For Great Britain, 16c. for the first lb., and 12c. for each additional lb. Limit of weight, 11 lbs.

REGISTRATION.

The fee on letters, and on all classes of articles addressed to places in Canada and all countries to which matter may be registered, is 5 cents. Receipts may be obtained for all registered matter.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS

are established at many Post-offices. Any sum over \$1.00 can be deposited. Interest three per cent.

POSTAL REGULATIONS.

MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

In sending money by mail it it is always best to transmit by Money Order when possible. If sent by letter, it should always be registered.

In the Dominion of Canada and the Island of Newfoundland there are two Congregational Unions (that of "Ontario and Quebec," and the "Nova Scotia and New Brunswick" Union); 5 Associations; 123 Churches; 105 Ministers, 17 of whom are not in pastoral work, and 5 are on Foreign Missions; and 10,680 members as follows:

We have taken much pains in making the above summary full and correct, supplementing the carelessness of a number of churches in Ontario, Quebec and the North-West (some of them large and important), in not sending returns, by adding former figures.

II. ENGLAND AND WALES.

England and Wales have one Congregational Union, Meeting in London in May, and in some place in the provinces in Autumn. London has a Metropolitan Congregational Union, 374 churches, mission rooms and stations, with 221,292 sittings.

There are 47 County Associations, 2,881 ministers, (including London as above); seating accommodation for 1,636,032 persons; 4,618 churches and mission stations.

III. SCOTLAND.

Scotland has one Congregational Union, 186 churches, of which 12 were without pastors. There are 5 ministers' associations, 201 ministers, of whom 31 are without pastoral charge.

IV. IRELAND.

Ireland has one Congregational Union; 29 churches; 30 ministers, of whom three are without charge; 96 preaching stations, at which the various ministers preach, assisted by 46 lay preachers. Church members 2,000.

V. CHANNEL ISLANDS.

One Congregational Union; 11 churches, in three of which the services are in English, the others in French; 8 ministers, 4 without charges.

Total.—The English Congregational Year Book for 1898 says: "The number of churches and mission stations reported in the several county returns for England and Wales is 4,452. Adding to this as was done for the last eleven years, 166 stations known to be supported by individual churches, a total is reached of 4,618." In Scotland we have 186 churches. Ireland, 125 churches and preaching stations. Channel Islands, 11 churches. Following our authorities, we have a total for the British Isles of 4,940 churches and Mission stations.

VI. UNITED STATES.

The number of Congregational churches in the United States, as given in the U.S. Congregational Year Book for 1898, is 5,614. Ministers, 5,475, of whom 1,786 are not in pastoral work. Number of church members, 625,864; in Sunday schools, 752,324. Number in Christian Endeavor Societies, 216,043.

VII. AUSTRALASIA.

In Australia and New Zealand there are 7 Congregational Unions, 317 churches and preaching stations, 226 ministers, including 47 without pastoral charge.

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VIII. EUROPE.

In Bohemia are 12 free churches, under the auspices of the "American Board," Boston: 2 Congregational churches in Paris, France; the "McAll Mission," founded by the late Dr. McAll, has about 120 Mission Stations; 24 small Congregational churches in the Netherlands; 6 free churches in Spain, under the auspices of "The American Board."

IX. SWEDEN AND NORWAY.

About 400 churches in these countries are formed on the Congregational model. Membership over 100,000. The largest Independent meeting-house in the world is the Gothenburg, and seats 5,000. There has also been a marvellous extension of free churches, on the Congregational model, in Denmark, within the last few years; set in motion by a Scandinavian who had been deeply interested in Moody's work in Chicago.

X. AFRICA.

The Congregational churches in South Africa are grouped under the Unions of Natal and South Africa In Natal there are 16 pastors and ordained missionaries, and (exclusive of stations among the heathen) 34 churches and preaching places. In South Africa there are 167 churches and stations, and 74 ministers and missionaries, 8 of them without pastoral charge.

XI. WEST INDIES.

The Jamaica Congregational Union includes 40 churches and preaching stations, with 7 ministers. In British Guiana, the Congregational Union there comprises 48 churches and preaching stations, and 10 ministers.

XII. INDIA.

There are 14 self-sustaining churches, and 9 sustained by the London Missionary Society, with 15 native churches, presided over by ordained native pastors, and 3 English "Union" churches.

XIII. CHINA AND JAPAN.

There are a number of native churches in China, under the care of British and American Societies, formed on the Congregational model; and a large number of self-governing churches in Japan: the "Kumai" churches.

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XIV. MADAGASCAR.

Before the French obtained possession of the Island, there were 909 native Congregational Churches, under the charge of the London Missionary Society, and 400 self-supporting Congregational Churches; with 4600 day-schools. The Jesuits had many churches seized (nominally for Government use), and much confusion resulted. Now the worst of the troubles seem to be over. The French Protestants have been active. This year (1898) the May Chronicle of the L. M. S., quotes:

"The period of violent struggles on the parts of the Jesuits and their disciples seems to be ending. The need of addressing protests to the Resident grows less. A few exemplary proceedings have sufficed to bring about this happy result. The Hovas who have been expelled from the Betsileo Province are allowed to return. The children are coming back to our schools; worship is celebrated in most of the villages where it had been suppressed." "670 churches to-day, as against nearly 1,500 before the war commenced. We have given a large number of the churches to the French Protestant Mission, who will, I hope, work side by side with us happily and earnestly for the evangelization of Madagascar."

XV. HAWAII.

These islands contain about 60 Congregational churches, with a membership of 7,000. The Theological Institute at Honolula educates ministers both for the home and foreign field. These islands have, within seventy years, been so entirely Christianized, under the efforts of the American missionaries, that now the Hawaiian Evangelical Association sustains missionaries on the Marquesas and Gilbert Islands. These islands have now become part of the United States, and will hereafter be included in the statistics of that country.

XVI. FOREIGN MISSIONS..

1. The London Missionary Society's income, 1897, £136,-193; British missionaries, 261; Native ordained missionaries and pastors, 398. Native agents and workers, 1,657; Day schools and Sunday schools, 2,028; raised by the Missions, £22,467. [The figures are exclusive of Madagascar.]

Lands occupied: Africa, Turkey, India, China, Japan; three Roman Catholic countries; Micronesia, Hawaii.

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
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Obituary,

MR. JAMES JARVIS, OTTAWA.



The First Congregational Church in Ottawa has suffered a great loss in the removal, by death, of its senior deacon, and next to its oldest member, Mr. James Jarvis, after a long and painful illness.

His connection with the church dates from 1865. His earnest interest in its prosperity soon led to his becoming prominent in the management of its affairs, and to his election to the diaconate, in which capacity he served the Church for thirty years. His chief delight may be said to have been looking after the house of God, in which he often spent his Saturday

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afternoons in sweeping and dusting, and putting things in order for the Sabbath services. He was always in his place, when able, both on the Lord's Day and on the Wednesday evening, which he used to keep sacred for the prayer-meeting, and was always ready to take part in its exercises. He will long be remembered for the pleasant smile and the warm hand shake he

had for those he met on such occasions.

Mr. Jarvis had been Superintendent of the Sabbath School, previous to his long illness, for over twenty years, and was a model one for the order and efficiency he maintained in the school. Indeed, whatever he did, he did well, and threw all his heart into it. And as it was in church work, so it was in the responsible position he occupied in secular business. It was the testimony of his employer, not long before his death, that "there are few men like James Jarvis;" and it is a pleasure to know that the firm he had served for over thirty years treated him most gen-

erously during his seven months' illness.

His end was peace. Release from suffering came April 28th, 1898. A bright vision of the glory beyond suffused his countenance with a heavenly sunlight just before he departed; and the struggle was over! A memorial service, in which his pastor Rev. William McIntosh preached from Acts 13:36, "For David, after he had served his own generation by the will of God, fell on sleep," and was assisted by the former pastor, Rev. John Wood, was held May 8th. Mr. Jarvis was twice married, and leaves a widow and two sons, Mr. Samuel J. and Mr. Alfred H. Jarvis and an adopted daughter, Mrs. H. H. Gervan, to mourn their loss.—W.

DR. F. A. GUNNER, LISTOWEL.

Rev. Frederick Alfred Gunner, M.D., was born in Clapham, England, Nov. 21st, 1823; and was therefore in his 74th year when he died. Early in life he became greatly interested in religious matters, and joined the Second Advent Church, and engaged in evangelistic work in England. On coming to America he settled in New York, and, after being successfully engaged in business for a few years, felt that he was especially called to engage in religious work, and completed the education for that end which had been begun in England, and gave himself to the work of the Advent Church in this country. In his

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ooking turday ministerial connection he labored in a number of places in Vermont, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Minnesota, and in Ontario and Quebec. He married Miss Elizabeth Owen Scott, of Camden, N. J., and of their family of six children all are dead but the youngest, Lillian, who has always lived with her father.

In 1883 he came to Listowel, Ont., in response to a call from the Congregational ('hurch there; and afterwards remained connected with that body. He was pastor of the Listowel Church for five years, when he resigned on account of ill-health; and though occasionally engaged in evangelistic work of late years, has been unable to pursue any employment with regularity. During his active life he studied medicine, and graduated from the medical college of Philadelphia, using his medical skill in connection with his ministerial duties. The funeral took place Nov. 4th, 1897, from the Congregational Church to Fairview Cemetery, and was conducted by Rev. Matthew Kelly, the present pastor of the Listowel Church.

DR. FLEMING, BRANDON, MAN.

The Congregational Church of Brandon lost one of its staunchest supporters in the very sudden death of Dr. Fleming, on the 26th of November, 1897. He was one of the pioneers of Brandon, and was recognized as one of the leading members of his profession in Manitoba. All that "Ian Maclaren" has written of Dr. Maclure might have been written of Dr. Fleming, with these exceptions, that Dr. Fleming made no secret of his religious convictions, and had none of the uncouthness of manner with which Dr. Maclure is credited.

Dr. Fleming was born in Scotland, and studied in Glasgow University, but before graduating he came to Canada with his parents, and settled in New Brunswick. He studied medicine first at Harvard, but afterwards went to Edinburgh and secured a diploma there. He always kept up with the newest things in his profession, and only recently spent some months in Chicago as a student. For the last sixteen years he has been one of Manitoba's leading citizens.

No good cause ever failed to receive his support. He was an enthusiast on the Temperance Question, and on every other question looking toward the uplifting of Humanity. Dr. Fleming had been brought up in the Presbyterian Church, but for

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reasons into which it is not necessary to enter at this time, threw his lot in with the Congregational Church when it was organized in Brandon, and was ever after one of its strongest supporters, though too busy a man to give much of his time to ordinary Church work. He leaves behind him a wife, five sons and five daughters.

WILLIAM G. SILCOX, FROME, ONT.

He was son of Rev. Joseph Silcox, who came from England in 1817, and organized the first Congregational Church in what is now the Province of Ontario, in 1819, in the township of Southwold. The deceased, along with the late Rev. W. H. Allworth, were among the oldest recently surviving members of the Church, now known as the Frome Church. Mr. Silcox was born in Wiltshire, England, May 3rd, 1815, and came to Canada as a very young child. The family had a tedious experience in "coming out," a stormy voyage of more than six weeks; then tug-boats above Montreal, drawn by oxen, then through bushroads in a heavy wagon to where they settled down. The father "took up" the lot on the front of which now stands the handsome brick Church. On becoming of "age," Mr. Silcox bought the hundred acres next adjoining, and lived there thereafter, and there died. He married Miss Nancy Phillips. To them were born twelve children, seven of whom "are not, for God took them." In their old age they were familiarly known all through the district, as "Uncle William," and "Aunt Nancy."

His first house was rather of the better sort, of hewn logs, ("chinked and daubed,") and the lower flat lathed and plastered—this latter a "great luxury" in those days. A huge open fireplace gave light, warmth and cheer to the house of one room. A bed in one corner, with a trundle bed tucked below it in the daytime: After, as the "bairns" increased, another bed in the other corner. Then a "frame" addition of two rooms, and a kitchen at the rear. As years went on, a large tasteful frame house replaced the former composite structure.

Mrs. Silcox died, 18th Sept., 1897, at the age of 78. She was a true spiritual descendant of those women who sent their sons to fight with Cromwell's "Ironsides," or to carry the seeds of liberty from the old Plymouth to the new. She was proud of her two sons, preaching the Gospel of Christ with power and

success. Another son died, and she took his family of little children, and tenderly cared for them as her own. As age drew on her, powers of mind and body failed: she would sometimes even fail to remember the names of her children, but she would quote the Bible with freedom and accuracy. She was borne to the grave by two sons, two nephews, a son-in-law and a grand-

son. "The memory of the just is blessed!"

Mr. Silcox was a man of no ordinary intelligence, and an attractive conversationalist. He, with his partner in life, were great readers; and encouraged their children to read. He had a prodigious memory: would tell of "going to mill" in the old days—sixty miles on horseback, with a bag of wheat-or the Rebellion of 1837, which he turned out to help to put down; and the history of the country, as he had seen events come to pass. He was trusted by all his neighbors, and tried to live by the "Golden Rule." He died on 20th January, 1898, at Frome, Ont; his two sons, Rev. John B. Silcox, now of California, and Rev. Edwin D. Silcox, of Paris, Ont., being present and taking part in the funeral services.

MR. GEORGE GERRIE, WEST GARAFRAXA, ONT.

Mr. Gerrie was born in Aberdeenshire, Scotland, March 1822; and at the age of sixteen came with his father to Canada, living two years in Nichol Township, and then settled in Garafraxa. This old township of the County of Wellington, (now in two townships and two counties), was then solid forest-land. The beautiful homestead where Mr. Gerrie died was hewn by himself out of an unbroken "bush." Very interesting were his reviews and experiences of the early days among wolves, bears, and the Red Men of the forest. The long and difficult journeys to mill and market helped to lend a further romance to those first years of Canadian life. During all his life in Canada, Mr. Gerrie took an intelligent interest in the political affairs of the country; and among all the leaders of days gone by, no men were more admired by him than George Brown and Alexander Mackenzie.

When a young man, Mr. Gerrie united with the Congregational Church of Garafraxa, where he ever remained a consistent member, as well as a faithful deacon during the greater part of its history. Mr. Gerrie's success in life was in no small

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gregaa congreater small measure due to his late wife, Miss Mary Petrie, whom he married in 1854, and who died thirteen years ago. Five sons and one daughter were their family, all of whom survive the parents. The eldest, George, was a successful farmer in Manitoba, and later a merchant in Carberry, where he still resides.

Two are graduates of McGill University, (Montreal), Rev. A. W. Gerrie, of West Torrington, Ct., and Rev. J. P. Gerrie, of Toronto, Editor of the Canadian Congregationalist. Alexander is a Justice of the Peace, and succeeds to the old farm. The youngest son, Rev. W. A. Gerrie, is a "B.D." of Oberlin, O. The daughter, Mary, is wife of Mr. George Martin.

Mr. Gerrie's death took place at the old homestead in West Garafraxa, on Tuesday, 8th March, 1898, he being seventy-six years of age. An intelligent, incorruptible and independent

man.

MR. JAMES DICKIE, TORONTO.

Mr. James Dickie, an honored and respected member and deacon of Zion Church, passed away on 28th September, 1897. He left Scotland, the land of his birth, in 1831, and came to Canada in 1869. In his youth he had the privilege of attending the ministry of Rev. James Morison, afterwards the far-famed Commentator, and for many years the leading spirit of the Evangelical Union, now merged with the Congregational Union of Scotland. Mr. Dickie tirst joined Zion Church in 1873, though for a part of the intervening time he was connected with Bond St. Church.

After a brief illness of two weeks, he departed this life: a man of exemplary character, and much beloved. He leaves a widow and three daughters, one of whom has recently gone to

Turkey as a Missionary, (Mrs. C. R. Ashdown.)

HENRY HUBBARD, SHERBROOKE, QUE.

Mr. Henry Hubbard, long a member and deacon in the Congregational Church of Sherbrooke, Province of Quebec, died at the residence of his son, in Cambridge, Mass., on 25th May, 1898. He was for many years School Inspector under the Government, and S. S. Superintendent and Treasurer, on behalf of the Church. In every department of Church and benevolent work he was a ready and efficient helper. Mr. Hubbard will be greatly missed in the Church, and in the city where he lived and labored for nearly thirty years.

THE UNION MEETINGS, 1898.

[EDITORIAL.]

HE Union meeting at Bond St. Church, Toronto, this year, was the 45th since the amalgamation of the "Unions" of Upper and Lower Canada. The Rev. John Wood, out of the active work of the ministry and living at Ottawa, stated that he had been at every one of the forty-five meetings! The only man who could give that testimony! Our own connection with the Union, (at first as a delegate,) dates from 1859; and the only ministers present this year who were present (in Mr. Marling's church, Richmond St., Toronto,) then, were Mr. Wood, W. F. Clarke, R. Hay, J. McKillican and D. Macallum. In the historical picture of "The Union of 1868," the lapse of thirty years has carried off in death seventy out of the one hundred and twenty-eight there represented.

Time rolls its ceaseless course!

THE UNION WAS GOOD

and inspiriting. The greeting of brethren who meet but once a year is something worth seeing, and still more participating in! and in such a country of magnificent distances, it often happens that early friends and dear classmates have their homes a thousand miles apart. After organizing, first as a Union, and then as Home Missionary Society, Wednesday, after the noon hour, was given up to Committee work. At an after-session some sharp criticism was expended on the fact that the bulk of the "Union" had nothing to do for a whole afternoon. But the reason for this arrangement was considered a good one at the time: for such a committee as the General Committee of the Home Missionary Society, which consists of thirty members seventeen of whom were, to our knowledge, present at this Union—when out in the Committee-room, leaves the Union much depleted. Naturally, leaders and active men are put on the Executive of the different Societies; and it was felt, years ago, that it was better to give them a whole afternoon for committee work, and then afterward demand (more than before,) their presence in the "Union."

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CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS.

The substance of the first night's meeting was the Welcome, and the response, and the Address from the Chair. Rev. Morgan Wood, the new pastor of Bond St. church, made the members of the Union feel that they had come among friends, who not only knew how to word a hearty welcome, but also to act accordingly. Prof. Warriner responded in a neat speech. The theme of the Chairman, Rev. William McIntosh, of Ottawa, was "Our Mission as Congregationalists in this Dominion." Congregationalism, which is Republicanism in the Church, needs people trained to bear and work their liberty: and we seek to train men and women for this responsibility and work. He had a good word for the "Institutional" Church, and for closer connection with the Puritan Churches of the United States. Spoke of the Canadian Congregationalist; the College and its new energetic Principal, Dr. George; and a needed Home Missionary Superintendent.

THE PRAYER MEETINGS,

as on other occasions of late years, were found very refreshing and helpful. A brother to lead is appointed the day before, and can think out some timely topic. Generally the leader speaks ten or fifteen minutes, (and this limit should not be exceeded,) and his remarks give a "key note" to the remarks of others. In this way, for four mornings—one hour each—several aspects of spiritual life may be touched on, greatly to the benefit and pleasure of those present. Largely in consequence of better preparation on the part of the leaders, and more interest centreing in these meetings, they are much better attended than in some former years.

THE COLLEGE.

Rev. Principal George pleaded for \$100,000 Endowment for the College in Montreal. He said Quebec had given \$31,000, Ontario \$3,000 to the new movement of increasing the Endowment. A good deal of that promised was on condition that the whole should be raised; but the donors were paying 5 or 6 per cent. interest on their subscriptions in the mean time! Of the \$64,000 needed, more than one half had been promised. The class consisted of 15 young men.

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A MISSIONARY SUPERINTENDENT.

The Rev. John Wood was once Home Missionary Superintendent; and after him the Rev. Thomas Hall. Both good men; but neither of them perfectly successful in his office: Mr. Wood from having far too many things to do-conduct the Canadian Independent, supply preaching to vacant churches, and generally to do everything that nobody else had time or inclination to do: and Mr. Hall because the churches that had appointed him forgot that it was necessary to give him their entire confidence. It is no wonder therefore that the brethren this yearunanimous about the desirability of having a Home Missionary Superintendent—seemed also unanimous on the point that they did not know where to lay hands on the right person! Our former experience will make us more reasonable in our demands. But with the population setting toward the cities, (which began about twenty years ago,) more care and counsel is necessary for the country churches, as well as prospecting in new regions: for all which we need a man on the field. For this year, probably the offers of the bordering Home Missionary Superintendents in the United States will be accepted, for an occasional glance and a little care over our newer fields.

THE FOREIGN FIELD.

A cheerful note pervaded the Foreign Missionary meeting. Missionary Currie will be installed in the future history of Africa as one of the founders of in civilization. His station at Chisamba, 300 miles inland from Benguella, is becoming a great centre of light for the region. He now wants a "mill"; for the pounding of grain occupies half the time of all the women of Africa: time that might be saved, and better employed. A "Maple Leaf Grinder" is going from Brantford; and "power" is also being provided. And now they call for a "mechanic" to run the mill, etc. The Mission itself will support the mechanic!

SUNDAY WAS A GOOD DAY

for the Union. The only complaint was that some of the brethren, preaching or attending elsewhere, could not gather in at 9 p.m. to be at the Lord's Supper in Bond St. church. Some modification of the rule may be made; for many brethren would like to g Gunn, th morning in the ev the mini afternoo ton Pedl

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like to go with their hosts to their own churches. Rev. W. T. Gunn, the alternate preacher appointed last year, preached the morning sermon; and Dr. H. S. Beavis, of Hamilton, preached in the evening. A few other pulpits were likewise supplied by the ministers attending the Union. The S. S. gathering in the afternoon was addressed by Rev. Messrs. McGregor, Wood, Hilton Pedley, and Mr. Henry Cox.

THE VISITORS.

As on former Unions, we had some honored and welcome visitors. The new Principal of the College, Dr. George—though he was on the platform last year, but not in an official capacity —had to us all the charm and interest of a new visitor. And so of Rev. Hilton Pedley, the youngest of a family of preachers, and descended from preachers, on a furlough from the Mission in Japan. We scarcely knew much of him before, for he went from the College to his field. He has had his eyes open in Japan, and enabled us to see a good many things of interest in that interesting land, in this day of its intellectual and spiritual birth. And Dr. Fitch, of Buffalo, so strong, clear, persuasive and helpful—we were glad to have him with us again. The Methodists sent from their District Conference three genial delegates, Drs. German and Harper, and Mr. Preston. It was pleasant to have a word of appreciation from Christian brethren who are not in our counsels but see what we are striving to do. Revs. C. Duff and E. E. Braithwaite were appointed as Delegates to this Union from the Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Mr. Braithwaite was present and courteously heard.

BOND STREET.

is encouraged, with a strong and progressive pastor, a united and growing membership, and a complete one ness with all the other churches. The pastor, Rev. Morgan Wood, told us that "notwithstanding things that had been lightly said about Bond Street not being in a true sense a Congregational Church, it would be found to be Congregational with a capital 'C'; and capitals all through!" And when in the evening Principal George spoke for the College, Mr. Wood "pledged Bond Street for a share in this new College Endowment!"

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CONSTITUTION.

I.—That the name of this Association be "The Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec.

II.—That it shall consist of Congregational or Independent Churches, and of ministers of the same church order who are either in the pastoral office, or (being members of Congregational churches) are engaged in evangelistic or educational service, approved or received at a general meeting, and those laymen who have been Chairmen of the Union and are members in any of their churches.

III.—That this Union is founded on a full recognition of the distinctive principles of Congregational churches, namely, the Scriptural right of every separate church to maintain perfect independence in its government and administration, and therefore, that the Union shall not assume legislative or administrative authority, or in any case become a court of appeal.

IV.—That the following are the objects contemplated in its formation:—
1. To promote evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational denomination. 2. To cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything relating to the interests of the associated churches. 3. To establish a fraternal correspondence with similar bodies elsewhere. 4. To address an annual or occasional letter to the associated churches accompanied with such information as may be deemed necessary. 5. To obtain accurate statistical information relative to the Congregational churches throughout the British American Provinces. 6. To hold consultation on questions of interest connected with the cause of Christ in general.

V.—To promote the accomplishment of these objects, and the general interests of the Union, an annual meeting of its members shall be held, each of the associated churches being represented by two lay delegates; the meetings to be held at such time and place as may be appointed at each annual meeting.

VI.—That the Officers of this Union be a chairman, secretary-treasurer, statistical secretary, minute secretary and committee, all to be chosen annually from its members, who shall execute the instructions of the Union, and prepare a docket of business for the annual meeting.

VII.—That alterations may be made in this constitution at any annual meeting, providing that notice of such alterations has been given at the meeting next preceding.

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STANDING RULES.

1.—Applications for admission to the Union, whether by churches or ministers, should be made in writing; and after having been read to the Union, shall be referred to a standing committee on membership. Churches so applying shall present the written recommendation of three members of the Union. Ministers bearing regular letters of dis issal from a kindred Congregational organization, and those who furnish evidence of having completed a course of study in the Congregational College of Canada, and having been ordained to the ministry, may be received at once on these grounds. Other ministers shall be required to bring proof of (1) their membership in a Congregational church; (2) their ordination to the ministry; (3) if they have come from any other denomination, their good standing therein; and they shall satisfy the membership committee in relation to their literary acquirements, and their doctrinal and ecclesiastical views. (4) Should the membership committee be satisfied on these points and recommend the applicant for membership, the recommendation shall be filed with the secretary, and the application and recommendation shall then lie over until the next annual meeting, when a two-thirds vote of the members present shall be requisite for admission into membership.

2.—The Union shall meet annually on the Wednesday after the first Sabbath in June, at 9 a.m., when, if the elected chairman be absent, a chairman pro tem. shall be chosen. After a devotional service, minute secretaries and reporters shall be appointed, the Report of the Committee presented, and the Standing Committee on Business, Membership, Nomination and Finance, chosen on nomination by the Committee of the Union. At 11 a.m., the Union will rise, to give place to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society.

3.—On Wednesday afternoon the Union will hold no public session in order that time may be given to the work of several committees.

4.—The Chairman's address shall be delivered on Wednesday evening.

5.—On Thursday morning the Chairman for the next year shall be elected by ballot without nomination. Ballot papers shall be furnished to all members of the Union present, if required; and the votes shall be counted by scrutineers appointed by the chairman. If no candidate have a majority of the votes cast, the names of two persons having the highest number shall be reported, and another vote taken. The Union will adjourn at 11 a.m. on Thursday, in favor of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society.

6.—The meetings shall be daily opened and closed with prayer; the morning devotional exercises to extend to an hour.

7.—No motion shall be discussed unless seconded; no member shall speak twice to the same motion without permission from the chair, and every motion shall be presented in writing by the mover, if required by the chair.

8.—The members of the Union shall register their attendance with the Secretary in a book kept for this purpose. The minutes of the preceding day shall be read at the opening of each day's session, and the minutes of the last day at the close of the session.

9.— The church in whose locality the annual meeting shall be held, shall be requested to celebrate the Lord's Supper in connection with such meeting.

10.—On Monday evening, during the sitting of the Union, a public meeting of the Union shall be held, the programme of which shall be arranged by the Union Committee.

11.—Application shall be made by the Statistical-Secretary, one month at least before the annual meeting, for statistics of the several churches, and a brief narrative of the state of religion among them, that he may prepare a condensed narrative of the whole for the annual meeting, and for publication if so ordered.

12.—A collection for the funds of the Union shall be made annually in each church, on or near the Lord's Day prior to the meeting. From this source, the Finance Committee, after providing for other necessary expenses, shall pay in full, if possible, the travelling fares of its ministerial members (provided always that no member of the Union whether ministerial or lay, attending the meetings, shall receive anything for travelling expenses, unless such ministerial member shall have contributed not less than one dollar, and the church represented by the delegate not less than five dollars to its funds); or if unable to pay in full, shall deduct from the claim of each, such equal amount as may be found necessary; such payment shall not be made until after the final adjournment, except with leave of the Union.

13.—The delegates from the Union to corresponding bodies, who may fail to fulfil their appointment by personal attendance, shall address these bodies by letter, communicating in substance such information and sentiments as they would furnish if they were present at their annual convocations.

14.—All supplies of pulpits required during the Sunday in which the Union is in session, which are not otherwise provided for, shall be filled by the Nomination Committee in connection with the pastor of the church where the Union is held, and a copy of such appointment shall be posted on the door of the church where the Union is assembled.

15.—In order to facilitate the introduction of properly accredited preachers to churches connected with this Union which may require pulpit supply, the secretary is authorized to send to secretaries or pastors of churches a list of preachers; but on the understanding that only the names on the list shall be of those. 1. Who are pastors of churches in connection with the Union. 2. Who have been students of the Canada Congregational College, and who have left that institution with the confidence of the College authorities. 3. Who are carrying on their studies at the College, but who are certified by the Principal or Secretary as qualified to undertake preaching engagements. 4. Who have been pastors connected with the Union, and who are still members of the churches of the Union. 5. Who are recommended by a District Committee. 6 Who are accredited by the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, England and Wales, Scotland, Ireland and the British Colonies, or by any Local Association, or National organization in the United States of America. 7. Lay preachers and evangelists accredited by any District Association.

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MINUTES OF THE FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

The Report of the Union Committee was then read by the Secretary, Rev. J. P. Gerrie, as follows:—

FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

OUR GREETINGS.

The members of your Committee desire to place on record their appreciation of the cordial invitation of Bond Street, and the other churches of Toronto to the Union to enjoy their hospitality. It is a pleasure to come back again to Bond Street, after a period of eleven years, and hold our meetings in this Church, which is now surrounded by bright and encouraging prospects. We pray that the outlook may be more than realized, and that under the inspiring leadership of the new pastor, Rev. Morgan Wood, increasing prosperity and usefulness may be granted the church. We pray too, that the sister churches of the city may continue to witness with greater power and earnestness for Congregationalism and Christ. Canada has need of Congregationalism, and no where should there be a surer and more aggressive stronghold than in this beautiful City of Toronto. In opening the Union, we would therefore extend to the Congregational Churches of this city our heartiest greetings and bid them God-speed in the work of our common Master.

IN MEMORY.

It is seldom that we meet without the consciousness that the ranks of our ministers have been broken by the hand of death. We so meet this year, and would here record our gratitude to the Giver of all good for the blessings of health and life which have been given the members of our Union. There are, however, prominent members of different churches whose presence we remember at former Unions, who, since our last gathering, have crossed the bar. We hold them in loving memory, and to bereaved friends and churches we extend our warmest sympathy.

AMONG THE CHURCHES.

It will be the duty of the Statistical Secretary to guide us on a tour among the churches, but we might now express our gratitude for a year, which has brought us many encourgements in the service of the Master. The gratifying annual reports of the churches certainly betoken an encouraging condition of

affairs. "I despected mine a special purand prospero bright that if our denomine soon be filled better services."

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affairs. "I don't remember," writes one of our oldest and most respected ministers who was asked to examine these reports for a special purpose, "that we ever had so many cheerful, helpful and prosperous reports. The outlook in so many fields seems so bright that it is a cause for thankfulness to all well-wishers of our denomination." We trust that all present vacancies may soon be filled, and that this Union may be an inspiration for better service by all the churches within its bounds.

OUR COMMON INTERESTS.

The officers of our various organizations will present at their regular meetings the statements of the year, and we might in anticipation congratulate them on the work that has been accomplished. The College deserves credit for the splendid efforts which have been made to increase the Endowment Fund, and for the successful session under Principal George and his colleagues. The Home Missionary Society has kept its needs prominently before the churches, and we are glad to quote these words from a note by the Treasurer, dated June 1st, "The Missionary Society will come out all right this year I am glad to say." The Foreign Missionary Society has also done good service in the abundance of interesting and instructive literature, which has been circulated among the churches, and it is gratifying to know that here too substantial financial returns have been made. Nor would we omit to mention The Congregationalist, which has been more than usually well-sustained by correspondence from the churches, and contributions from various members. We would commend to every member of the Union the annual meetings of those different interests, not of course forgetting the Provident Fund Society, which is also worthy of hearty support.

FRATERNAL RELATIONSHIPS.

We are pleased to have present the Rev. E. E. Braithwaite, delegate from the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, who will convey to us the greetings of the churches by the sea. We trust that this Union may be represented at the coming Union of the Maritime Provinces at Yarmouth. We are also glad to welcome Rev. F. S. Fitch, D.D., a delegate of the National Council of the Congregational

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Churches of the United States, who will carry back to our brethren across the line our warmest greetings. It is our desire that Dr. Fitch may be supported in this by a personal representative of our Union at the coming Triennial Council at Portland, Oregon. It is a further pleasure to be brought in touch with the churches of the Old Land by Mr. Halley Stewart, M.P., President of one of the Congregational Associations of England, and with those of Japan through Rev. Hilton Pedley, missionary of the American Board, and to be thus better prepared for the International Congregational Council to be held in Boston in 1899. We would commend all these fraternal relationships, and especially the report of the committee on closer fellowship with the churches of the United States, to the early and earnest attention of the Union.

PUBLIC QUESTIONS.

The usual docket of public questions will be presented by the Committees who have them in charge. This Union. always interested in these matters, will hear with pleasure the records concerning Sunday Observance, Progress of Church Union, and Temperance Activity, and no doubt will be ready to give united deliverances on these important themes. The Rev. Robert Hopkin, of Westmount, we are pleased to say, will read a paper on "The Best Way to Reach the Ideal State," which we trust will be followed by a profitable discussion. Though deeply regretting the war between the United States and Spain, we would recommend that the examples of the Congregational Union of England and Wales be followed, and that a resolution of sympathy with our brethern across the line be placed on record, and that the Union make some suitable deliverance on the much talked about Anglo-American Alliance. We would also ask that the Business Committee formulate some suitable expression of our feeling with regard to the late Rt. Hon. Wm. Ewart Gladstone, who belonged to more than any land or any church.

UNION CONSIDERATIONS.

Among the matters more definitely concerning the Union are the statistical reports of the Secretary, Rev. D. S. Hamilton; the Christian Endeavor Conference under the leadership of the

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the Union Hamilton; ship of the Rev. W. J. Hindley; and that of the Sunday School guided by Mr. S. P. Leet. Your Committee would suggest that the membership of Rev. J. C. Madill be referred to the Membership Committee for further report, and that the resolutions of Rev. G. H. Craik on the Finances of the Union be adopted with the substitution of the word "percentage," instead of the word's "equal amount" in the fifth line.

Trusting that Divine wisdom may be granted us we, would enter upon the Union of 1898 with the earnest desire to do what

we can to further the Kingdom of Jesus Christ.

2nd-That the above-named Societies be requested to make the changes in their constitution and by-laws necessary to carry the above-named recommenda-

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

Rev. Wm. McIntosh, the Chairman, presided. The address of welcome to the Union was given by Rev. Morgan Wood; the response being made by Rev. Prof. Warriner. The Chairman gave his Annual Address on "Our Mission."

THURSDAY Morning, June 9th, 1898.

The devotional hour opened at 9 o'clock, and was conducted by Rev. F. J. Day, of Sherbrooke, after which the minutes of the previous sessions were read and confirmed.

tary.

On the second ballot Rev. J. W. Pedley, of London, was elected. Mr. Pedley briefly acknowledged the honor.

It was moved and seconded that the Annual Address of the

Chairman be printed in the YEAR BOOK. Carried.

Applications for membership were received from Rev. J. L. Alexander, Middleville; Rev. Geo. Extence, Alton; Rev. A. F. Pollock, Speedside, and Rev. D. C. McIntosh, Lanark. These were referred to the Membership Committee.

The following further report from the Membership Com-

mittee was presented:—

In the case of Rev. J. C. Madill, we submit the finding of the Committee at the last Union, and report that we are not satisfied that there is such a change in the conditions of the case as would warrant his restoration to good standing in the Union, and recommend that his name be dropped from the roll.

It was moved and seconded that the discussion on this report be deferred till to-morrow morning, to take precedence after routine business.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

An application from Rev. J. McGuire for membership was referred to the Membership Committee.

It was moved and seconded, that after free discussion, opportunity be given to Rev. J. C. Madill and his supporters, to speak on his behalf. Carried.

The Secretary read the finding of the Committee of last

year, after which Mr. Madill made a statement.

Rev. T. B. Hyde spoke to the recommendations of the

Membership Committee.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that the Chairman of the Membership Committee and Mr. Madill be each given five minutes to close the discussion.

It was then moved and seconded that the report of the Membership Committee be received and adopted. Carried.

The Union then adjourned.

FRIDAY Evening.

Rev. Wm. McIntosh occupied the chair.

Secretary J. P. Gerrie moved that Rev. Prof. Warriner and Mr. J. R. Dougall be our delegates to-morrow morning to the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church, now in session in this city. Carried.

It was moved by Rev. Morgan Wood, that we send the greetings of this Union to the General Assembly of the Presby-

terian Church now in session in Montreal. Carried

Rev. M. Kelly, Listowel, addressed the Union on "Specialists in Goodness." The Rev. Hilton Pedley, Japan, gave an address, on "The Message that Christianity has for the people of Japan."

Rev. Frank S. Fitch, D.D., Buffalo, gave an address, "An

Elect Race; or the Mission of the Anglo-Saxon people."

The audience joined in singing one verse each of "My Country 'tis of Thee." and "God Save the Queen." After which the Benediction was pronounced.

The meeting then adjourned.

The report of the Finance Committee was received and adopted.

It was moved and seconded, that the usual sum of \$50 be given as honorarium to the Secretary of the Union. Carried.

It was moved and seconded, that a Committee be appointed to take into consideration closer relationship with the Congregational Churches of Great Britain and the United States, and that the Committee report at an early stage of the next Annual Meeting.

Rev. Dr. Fitch addressed the Union, after which the motion

was carried.

The Statistical Secretary presented his report, which was adopted,

And on resolution it was decided that in future the Churches be requested to furnish the Statistical Secretary with the statistical returns from their annual report immediately after their Annual Meeting.

The retiring Statistical Secretary, the present Statistical Secretary, and the Secretary of the Union, were named a Committee to revise the present method of securing statistical reports.

The present ministerial list of the Union was also submitted

to the Membership Committee for revision.

Rev. D. S. Hamilton requested to be relieved from the office of Statistical Secretary, and it was moved and seconded in amendment to the report, that Rev. H. E. Mason be appointed to that office. Report as amended was adopted.

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The Chairman then introduced to the Union, from the Toronto Methodist Conference, Rev. Dr. German, W. T. R. Preston, Esq., and Rev. Dr. Harper, who conveyed the greetings of their Conference to the Union. A verse of "Blest be the tie that binds" was sung by the Union.

The Union then adjourned.

Monday Morning, June 13th.

The devotional hour opened at 9 o'clock, and was conducted by Rev. A. W. Main.

At ten o'clock the Chairman called the business session to order. The minutes of the Saturday's meetings were read, and

after due correction, confirmed.

Moved by Mr. Yeigh, and seconded, that permission be granted him to form a voluntary fund for the purpose of sharing responsibility in connection with the expenses of the Union. Carried.

It was moved seconded and carried, that Mr. E. Yeigh, be appointed a committee of the Union to co-operate with the officers of the Brantford Church in the matter of the place of next Union meeting; and that after the meeting of that Union an assessment pro rata be made to cover the deficits.

The Business Committee recommended the following resolu-

tions:

(1) That this Union of the Congregational Churches of Ontario and Quebec desires to place on record its high appreciation of the eminent services of the Right Hon. William Ewart Gladstone, four times Premier of Great Britain and Ireland; whose recent death at a ripe old age is regretted throughout the world. As a Statesman and orator Mr. Gladstone, for nearly half a century held a foremost place, and his words and deeds showed him to be ever the friend of the wronged and downtrodden. While all may not agree with every cause which he advocated, his championing of the Ionian Islanders, his denunciation of the Bulgarian atrocities, and only eighteen months ago his great efforts for the persecuted Armenians, will ever be remembered with appreciation by his fellow-countrymen, and will cause his name to be revered by the peoples of these countries.

His abilities as an orator, his acts as statesman, and his personal conduct as a man, were regulated by a high and lofty ideal. Mr. Gladstone was a Christian, and the depth and fervor of this Christian life directed his actions throughout his political career. The example of his life has raised the standard of political life in Great Britain, and will not be without its effect upon the political life of other countries. It will be as the Christian who was the foremost advocate for liberty of conscience, for freedom of public worship, and the rights of

Non-conformists in Great Britain, that Mr. Gladstone will ever be remembered.

While we cannot but deplore the loss of so great a man, we can rejoice that God did not call him home until he had reached a ripe old age, and until his life's work was done. Adopted.

Concerning Dr. Weir's communication, already read:

(2) "Whereas the public Sabbath services of our churches are held not only for the comfort and edification of those who profess the name of Christ, but for the quickening and ingathering of those who are as yet outside the fold: It is very meet that these services cause no offence by reason of light behaviour on the part of those who attend them, and that they be conducted and concluded with the utmost reverence of spirit and demeanor, and,

Whereas our public Sabbath services cannot be fruitful unless the power of the Holy Spirit be there present, it is earnestly recommended to the entire fellowship of the churches to observe as a devout and profitable exercise, the practice of engaging with unfailing regularity and faith in silent prayer and meditation from the time that the church is entered until the service begins, and that at such moments prayer be specially offered by each worshipper, for himself, for those who as yet know not the Lord, for the minister, and for the church, that to all these, the service about to be engaged in may prove of special spiritual blessing."

Your Committee reports that:

Recognizing that reverence is the very essence of religion, and that the outward manifestation of reverence is the first essential of public worship, your Committee cordially approves of the spirit of the resolutions submitted by Dr. Weir, and recommends that they be printed in the Congregationalist for the consideration of the churches. Adopted.

(3) Your Committee recommends the following as expressions of the sentiment of the Union with regard to circumstances now occurring in the world. That we behold with reverent wonder the crumbling of ancient empires and the extension of the power and influence of that race in which the Gospel has most fully developed liberty and manhood. That while we sympathize deeply with our brethren of the same race, but of another allegiance, in passing as they are now doing, through the agonies of war, and while we pray earnestly that these may soon be brought to an end, we rejoice exceedingly that a spirit of mutual loving-kindness has united the long severed branches of the Anglo-Saxon people. We have reason to hope as we devoutly pray, that as the world-wide interests of these two kindred powers assimilate, and as their responsibilities to the human race are more and more found to be alike, the unity of spirit which now prevails between them will become habitual. As united they are able to impose peace and liberty upon the world, and as their disunion would obstruct these so great blessings, we pray that co-operation between them to prepare the way of the Lord and make His paths straight may become matter of established agreement, and compact. Adopted.

(4) After considering the motion of Mr. Craik with suggested amendment by the Union Committee, your Committee is of the opinion that it is fairer to all members of the Union that an equal amount be deducted from each member's claim.

Your Committee considers that the motion of Rev. Mr. Craik, discriminates against the ministerial member in charge of the Church, placing him on a less favorable basis than either a ministerial member not in charge of a Church or a lay member of the Union. That the proposed change bears especially upon the

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ministers in the weaker Churches, making it possible in some cases to bar the minister from attendance at the Union.

We therefore recommend that the rule that now obtains be adhered to.—Adopted.

(5) Your Committee finds that, after being before the Union and the Societies for a series of years, the subject matter of this resolution was referred to a joint Committee of the Union and of the Societies respectively involved in the changes it proposes; that the said Committee presented the following report:

1. That the Union be requested to make a place upon the Union Committee for a member to be elected by each Association. Also that the secretaries of the various denominational societies be made ex-officio members of the Union Committee.

2. That the various denominational societies meeting with the Union be requested to change their Constitutions so as to make delegates to the Union from contributing Churches ex-officio members of the societies to which these Churches have contributed.

3. That this report was adopted.

4. That these proposals constitute the action which the Union at that recent date saw fit to take upon the matter which forms the subject of the resolution now referred to it.

5. That so far as known to your Committee, nothing has occurred since this deliverance was reached to alter the conditions under which it was arrived at.

That sufficient time has not been passed to give shape to the proposals of the report in question, much less to test their value in bettering or otherwise the relations between the Union and the denominational societies.

Your Committee therefore submits that our course in view of the action already taken, is to carry out the resolutions already passed and to take no contradictory course till new cause shall appear.—Lost.

It was moved by Mr. Geo. Pim, and seconded by Rev. T. B. Hyde, that the scheme of Mr. Leet be accorded an early place at the meeting of the next Union. Carried.

On Motion, the Union Committee's reports with amendment as suggested, was adopted.

The Secretary read a communication from Rev. J. C. Madill requesting return of document belonging to him.

It was moved and seconded that the matter be referred to Mr. Leet and Rev. T. B. Hyde, chairman of the Membership Committee. Carried.

Rev. Mr. Hyde made a statement asking that the reporters present would take notice and contradict certain statements contained in one of the morning papers.

The Membership Committee recommended that all ministerial members who have been absent from the Dominion for three years be communicated with by the Secretary, suggesting transfer to such association as they may be near; and in case of no satisfactory reply, such names be dropped from the roll. Carried.

Rev. W. H. Warriner, reported for Committee on International Congregational Council as follows:

(1) That the delegation be composed as follows: One to be chosen by each of our four societies—the College, the Home Missionary Society, the Foreign Missionary Society, and the Woman's Board, and ten to be named by this Union, being fourteen in all.

(2) That the Secretary be instructed to write to the Societies and acquaint

them with this action.

Committee.

(3) That the Nomination Committee of this Union bring in a nomination of ten names to this Union.

(4) That the same committee also nominate a committee of three, who shall be a Committee of Arrangements to co-operate with a similar committee of the

National Council. Adopted.

Prof. Warriner, Rev. J. P. Gerrie, and Mr. J. R. Dougall were appointed a Committee of arrangements to deal with the

matter of the International Council.

The secretary read a communication from the Ontario Council of the W. C. T. U., which was referred to the Business

The Nomination Committee recommended that Revs. A. F. McGregor, John Morton and Wm. McIntosh and Messrs. H. O'Hara, J. R. Dougall and C. Cushing, as a Committee on Closer Relations with Great Britain and United States. Carried.

The invitation of J. Scholfield on behalf of the Brantford

Church for the next meeting of the Union was accepted.

The Union then adjourned.

Monday Afternoon.

The Union met at 2.30, Rev. M. S. Gray led in prayer.

The minutes of the Morning's Session were read and confirmed.

The recommendation of the Nomination Committee on delegates to the International Council in Boston 1899 was read as follows:

Revs. Prof. Warriner, John Morton, T. Hall, E. D. Silcox, J. P. Gerrie, J. Scholfield, Morgan Wood, Messrs. J. R. Dougall, H. O'Hara and Mr. St Croix.

The Business Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution, concerning the communication from the Ontario Council of W. C. T. U:

This Union expresses its sympathy with the efforts of the W. C. T. U. in discouraging the use of narcotics. Carried.

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The secretary on behalf of Rev. John Morton, said that there was nothing special to report this year on Church Union.

Rev. A. F. McGregor gave a brief report on behalf of the

Christian Endeavor Committee.

It was moved and seconded that the Union Committee consider the recasting of the programme for the Union Meetings. Carried.

On behalf of the Lord's Day Alliance, Mr. Geo. Pim moved.

and Mr. J. M. M. Duff seconded, the following:

That we have heard with pleasure the account given to us by Mr. John C Copp, of the operations of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance. We sympathize with the Alliance in its work, and would urge our ministers and churches to co-operate actively with the Alliance as much as possible.

Further, we regret that efforts have been made to induce the Government to change their regulations whereby the canals have heretofore been closed on Sundays, and we trust that these efforts may not prevail, but that the canals shall continue to be closed on the Lord's Day. Carried.

In the course of debate it was the opinion of some of those present that the Government had refused to open the canals on Sunday.

Mr. S. P. Leet conducted a conference on the relation of the

Church to the Sunday School.

The following report in regard to Temperance was presented by the Temperance Committee;

That there is reason for congratulation that the efforts of the friends of Prohibition to have the Government submit the question of the continuance of the Liquor traffic to the vote of the people, pure and simple, have been entirely successful, notwithstanding the fact that the makers and vendors of strong drink through their several organizations, have brought their mightiest influences to bear upon the Government to induce them to do otherwise. The form, therefore, in which the question will be submitted to the people will be: Question.—Are you in favor of the prohibition of the importation, manufacture, or sale of spirits, wine, beer, cider, and alcoholic beverages? Yes or No? The date of the taking of the vote has been left to be fixed by the Governor-in-Council, and has not yet been announced, although a general intimation has been given that it will be early in the autumn; and already the various Temperance organizations, throughout the Dominion, are marshalling their forces for the coming conflict, the importance of which, to the future well-being of Canada, can hardly be overestimated. The distinct understanding with the Government is, that if the vote shall show a substantial majority of the electors to be in favor of prohibition, the Government will give effect to the will of the people by the enactment of a Prohibitory Law.

It is therefore of immense importance that every man and woman who desires to see our Country delivered from the awful curse of the Liquor traffic, should record his or her vote, on that occasion, at any cost or inconvenience. Let us show our colors. "Who is on the Lord's side?" Certainly not the man or woman who aids or sympathizes with the traffickers in strong drink.

It is also very desirable that this Union, and the several Churches connected with it, should be well represented at the Conventions of the provincial Branches of the Dominion Alliance, shortly to be held, notably the one called to meet in Toronto on the 5th July.

And inasmuch as the cost of travel and entertainment in attending such Conventions is often the reason for the non-attendance of the delegates appointed, the Committee recommend that, if possible, the expenses of delegates sent from this Union be defrayed from its funds.

It was moved by Rev. John Wood, and seconded by Rev. J. McKillican, that the report be adopted. Carried.

The Union adjourned.

Monday Evening.

The meeting opened at 8 o'clock, with Rev. Wm. McIntosh in the chair.

Rev. A. W. Gerrie, West Torrington, Ct., spoke on "The World-wide Mission of the Individual Church"; Rev. Dr. Beavis on "The Congregational Fathers of Canada"; and Rev. Prof. W. H. Warriner, on "Our Contribution to the Life of Today."

Rev. Morgan Wood, briefly addressed the Union. The Business Committee moved,

- (1) That Dr. Beavis be asked to prepare his address for printing; and that the Secretary be instructed to have it printed in pamphlet form and circulated throughout the Churches of the Dominion. Carried.
- (2) That we have had a good chairman, and that he gave us an inspiring address.
 - (3) That the various secretaries have been the right men in the right places.
- (4) That it was a pleasure to have with us again the Revs. F. S. Fitch, D.D., A. W. Gerrie, and E. E. Braithwaite.
- (5) That Rev. W. T. Gunn, M.A., preached an acceptable sermon on Sunday morning.
 - (6) That the organist and choir have rendered efficient service.
- (7) That the kindness of Toronto people is very great, if the treatment we have received from our hosts and hostesses be a criterion.
- (8) We all appreciated the bountiful spreads in the dining room down stairs, but did not all know that the ladies of all the Churches had a hand in providing them.
- (9) The ministers who failed to bring their wives with them have all thought it a splendid idea to have free stamps provided at the Church office. They and all of us who found the office so convenient are under great obligation to Miss Willson, who has been in charge.
- (10) We have all thought the press very attentive. We have not all known that the reporter who came with the prayer meeting in the morning and

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(11) We have all been thinking that Bond Street and the other associate Churches have given us a splendid reception. The local arrangements have been perfect. Our comfort and conveniences for all the details have been provided for with wonderful thoughtfulness. Not all of us have known that the gentleman who brought about this perfection was Mr. G. R. Copping.

(12) That to these and all who have helped to make our meeting a success, our hearty thanks be and are hereby tendered.

The resolutions were carried.

The secretary of the Union then moved that the minutes,

be taken as read, and adopted. Carried.

That this Union after the closing exercises, do stand adjourned to meet at Brantford at the usual date next year. Carried.

After singing a hymn, the chairman pronounced the benediction, and the meeting adjourned.

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STATISTICAL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Of the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, for the year ending May 8th, 1898.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND BRETHREN:-

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The pastors and representatives of the churches have been reminded year after year of the difficulty of preparing a satisfactory "statistical statement," owing to the tardiness of many of the church officers in sending in their returns. Unfortunately this year little improvement has been made, and indeed some correspondents have grown more negligent than ever; and the Secretary would again respectfully urge all concerned, to do what they can in future to assist in compiling complete statements for the Union. When you learn that only fifty-two churches of the seventy-two on the roll in Ontario, and fourteen of the nineteen on the roll in Quebec, had sent in returns up to June 7th—the day before the meetings began—you will understand the need of an appeal for co-operation and promptness, if an interesting and satisfactory report is to be made by the Statistical Secretary from year to year.

QUEBEC.

Quebec, with its nineteen churches, has sent in only fourteen church reports, as against nineteen last year; fifteen Sabbath Schools have responded, as against twenty last year; and only ten Christian Endeavor Societies have sent reports, as against fourteen last year. There is no object therefore in comparing the totals with last year's figures; but it may be well to note that there has been a net increase in the membership of the churches reporting of thirty-five. Eight churches show an increase of membership, five show a decrease, while one remains stationary. Of the addition, fifty-two joined the church from the Sabbath School, and nineteen from the Christian Endeavor.

Four churches have become vacant during the year; namely, Cowansville, Brigham, Franklin and Granby. The three last named being now supplied by students of the College.

Two churches vacant a year ago, now have settled pastors:

Fitch Bay, with Rev. R. G. Watt, B.D., in charge; and St. Andrews, with Rev. B. W. Day, and cheering reports come from both fields. The Quebec churches have lost Rev. W. P. Jackson, who is now settled in Vermont, and Rev. J. L. Brown, who is doing faithful service in Brandon, Man.

ONTARIO.

Turning to Ontario, although there are seventy-two churches on the roll, seven of these are practically dead, which leaves sixty-five; from which reports should have come. Only fifty-five have reported however; and, as in the case of Quebec, there is nothing to be gained by giving the totals here, and for detailed information you are referred to the Statistical Tables in the YEAR BOOK. The fifty-five churches reporting show a net increase in membership of 296; and it is fair to assume that on the whole we have gained in membership during the past year, as well as in "average attendance" and "total under pastoral care."

Fifty-five Sabbath schools in Ontario have made returns, as against sixty last year; and the attendance and condition of the schools in general is much the same as last year, showing considerable spiritual interests, and efficiency in officers and teachers. It is pleasing to note that 168 have united with the churches from the Sabbath Schools during the year, being twenty-six more than united from the same department last year. This number would be in all likelihood increased if we had the returns from the other five schools which reported last year, but failed to do so this.

The largest school in the Province, and indeed in the Union, is Olivet, Toronto, with 306 on the roll. Zion, Montreal leads in Quebec, and comes second in the Union, with 293 on the roll.

Forty-three Y.P.S.C.E.'s have made returns, instead of fifty-two as last year; and these show an increase in membership of 119, and also an increase in spiritual interests, as 106 have joined the church from the Society during the year. The contributions of these forty-three societies exceed the total contributions of the fifty-two which reported last year; but the amount raised by the Christian Endeavorers, as well as by the Sabbath Schools, cannot be very well determined, as many of the reports state that the school or society has contributed to "current expenses," or "Home and Foreign Missions,' without giving the amount.

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The financial condition of the churches remains much the same, with debts slightly reduced here and there, and contributions better in some cases, and a falling away in others. On the whole there is much to encourage in the general tone of the reports sent in, and many of the churches have had spiritual refreshing, and speak hopefully of the outlook for the current

year.

It is a cause for congratulation that there are fewer vacancies in the pastorates of the Ontario churches than there was a year ago; and there has been much less changing of pastors than there was during the previous year. We have lost Revs. J. R. Black, H. Peckover, Wm. Johnson, and W. Lee, and gained some valued helpers in Revs. C. A. Wookey, Morgan Wood, Chas. Routliffe and Mr. W. W. Mowle, who is in charge of Calvary Church, Kingston.

Fifty-two churches have the same pastors as before, four have secured pastors during the year, four at present have "student supply," and five are vacant, making sixty-five in all. It may be well to mention seven other churches referred to as "practically dead," but which make up the number on the roll to seventy-two. These are: Hawksbury, Kelvin, Newmarket, Tilbury North, Concord Avenue, Vespra, and West Toronto

Junction.

Your Secretary regrets that a more complete report cannot be given, but hopes this one will not be entirely without interest; and in handing on the statistical work for the future to some one else would again urge the importance of cordial cooperation on the part of all pastors and church secretaries with my successor in office, in order that a more satisfactory showing may be made a year hence.



CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS.

CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

"OUR MISSION."



That we have had a mission, and that we have in some goodly measure fulfilled it, is acknowledged by others, even our enemies themselves being the judges. It is just as

true that we have a mission to the present generation and for the future, and that as important as ever the past has known.

It is not necessary in order to do good work and exercise great influence that we be a large body or denomination. It is well for us to remember this, for we may become discouraged if we forget that each one of us has a task to perform, however humble, and that the quality of manhood is not evidenced alone by the magnitude of the work, but by the spirit which the worker brings to bear on the work he performs. Leaders we must have, and will have, but our very isolation, the thinness of

our ranks, of every inchero. The apparent graph not always accretion, where days truth that of the numbers, nor be with others in statistic

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our ranks, calls forth into action every latent power and energy of every individual worker, so as to make the humblest a real hero. Then we are too ready to measure our success by our apparent growth, or the absence of it, forgetting that growth is not always a true evidence of life. There may be growth by accretion, without the first element of true development. In these days of statistical comparison, we lose sight of the sad truth that churches are often strengthened in the inverse ratio of the numbers added. So let us not measure our life by numbers, nor be discouraged if we suffer in statistical comparison with others. A true estimate of life and power cannot be given in statistical figures nor measured by comparison of numbers.

I once heard of a Sunday school superintendent, who thought that the business of a Sunday school was simply to have a school, forgetting that the business of a Sunday school is to save the children. So the business of a church is not so much to grow in bigness, not to have, or be, a pleasant club, a literary society, or even a school of religion, but to save men; save them from their baser selves, from wrong views of truth, from wrong ideals in life, from wrong thoughts of God. Save them to the highest and noblest within the range of the divine possibilities. It is the business of the church to preach to men the gospel of God's great love to them and for them, preach it from the sacred desk, preach it in the work shop, at the desk of commerce, at the counter of trade, the gospel of fair dealing; truth in buying and selling. Preach it in the mining camp, that gain is not godliness; preach it on the battlefield, where fierce passions strive for the mastery; in the reeking hospital, where men pray for death. Everywhere, wherever human hearts in anguish consciously or unconsciously cry out for a balm or a deliverer above themselves. Preach to men a gospel that touches life in every part, a gospel as much needed by, and as well suited to the life that now is, as that which is to come. The life that now is is all the life that most men know anything about, or care anything about; and, after all, it is a terribly real life. We cannot help sympathizing with men who say to us, "Your theories or doctrines of the other world are all very nice, and perhaps good for the people who understand them, but we don't. The present life is enough for us. We did not ask to be created; we did not ask to be born into this life. Existence was thrust upon us without our wish or consent, and that with dispositions and passions we are unable to control, and

under conditions where it is practically impossible for us to be better or other than we are. If there is a heaven, we want a little of it here and now; and if there is a hell elsewhere, we don't want to hear about it; we have enough of hell in our life now." Our cities and towns are full of such men; and our mission is to save them, save them from despair, save them from soul-crushing infidelity—put faith into them by personal contact, infuse life and warmth into them as did the living throbbing body of Elisha to the cold dead body of the Shune-mite's son.

THE INSTITUTIONAL CHURCH.

Our natures and wants are many-sided, and our bodily wants are as much the divine care as are our soul-necessities. This is a truth the recognition of which will give impetus to the Institutional Church. It has been little less than a scandal to our boasted Protestantism, that our church edifices, many of them imposing and expensive structures, should remain closed for six days out of the seven, and then only opened for two or three hours on the seventh, and that principally to the welldressed respectable people, who rent the pews, and pay for them. Surely it is time that all this invested capital were used to better advantage. We, as business men, would not so handle our worldly business. But then, "the sons of this world are, for their generation, wiser than the sons of light." Surely it is time we were putting into our church work a little more of the business common sense that characterises our administration of our worldly affairs! It is our boast that our church polity enables us to adapt our methods to the changes with which we meet; but I fear it is too frequently an empty boast; and that we are even more conservative than our brethren of less democratic name and history. The conditions of society are not what they were twenty-five years ago. They are not what they were even ten years ago. Times are changing fast; customs, modes of life and thought are changing. Development means change, indeed it is only another name for the same thing. So of our church polity; it ought to be such as can adapt itself to the continually changing conditions in which we find ourselves. It may be our calling to break the bread of life to an audience in our pews comfortably seated. It may be of infinitely more importance to find a loaf of "strong bakers" for some poor fellow whose children

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are crying from hunger. It may be our privilege to teach a lad the truths of justification, adoption, and sanctification; but we may do vastly more for him by teaching him a trade, or putting him in the way whereby he may have a manly, clean and useful life.

Our towns are rapidly becoming cities, and our cities are growing larger. They are being filled by streams, ever atom of which is fraught with infinite possibilities. Our churches ought to be ready to take hold of this fresh young life, guard it, mould it, train it, consecrate it to the service of God and man. Warm cheery parlors, good reading-rooms, good music, sweet Christian society, should be within the reach of every young man or woman coming into or growing up in the city. The saloon, even the secular literary society, (to say the least, non-Christian,) ought not to be the only door open to the lonely heart when the labors of the day are over.

Circumstances and financial ability must regulate our course; but every church, if even from the lowest motive—self-preservation—must make some effort in this direction. The church that is needed to-day is the church that reaches men, meets their wants, ministers to them in body, soul and spirit.

MODERN THOUGHT.

The gospel committed to our trust is "good news to all men" —to the common people—to the poor—to the submerged in our populous centres. But it is just as good for the thoughtful, the studious disciples of science—a class too often forgotten in our efforts to seek and to save. It goes without saying that the church has no monoply of the culture or scientific research of today. There are strong and earnest minds, seeking for truth, who do not find themselves in congenial atmosphere within the pale of the Christian church; and because they do not, the attitude of organized Christianity has not always been such as to conciliate or attract them. Too often a narrowness approaching bigotry has been exhibited, and an unintelligent fear of their investigations that has betrayed weakness on the part of Christian advocates, where there ought to have been the calm fearlessness that comes from perfect confidence. It has been forgotten, that while truth is unchangeable, our apprehension and definition of it may, yea, must change with our changing perspective. The church has no reason to shrink from the most rigid analysis, the

most searching criticism of all she holds precious, even sacred. Why should we be afraid of modern criticism? of scientific investigation? even if some forms of truth, to us dear from their hallowed associations, be swept away. Let us have truth whatever we lose; whatever pangs we suffer; in the end we shall be the richer for it all. It is well, however, to wait until newlypropounded theories are supported by well-ascertained facts, before we accept them; and we can wait with confidence, for many loudly heralded discoveries are soon disproved by other so-called discoveries, and the lack of agreement among the discoveries may well warrant us in "making haste slowly" in changing our accepted forms of doctrine. But if the theory of evolution have in it the truth, why should we fear it? It is not so very long since the theory of six literal days of twenty-four hours each, · covering the period of creation as given in the first chapters of the book of Genesis, was given up by a large portion of. the Christian church. The science of Geology forced the most conservative minds to leave the old landmarks. If the science of Biology has more light to shed on the origin and nature of our race, I for one am not afraid of it; but calmly wait for it, and will gladly welcolme its help when it comes. If biblical research by cultured and reverent minds, show us that some of our ideas of inspiration will bear modification, shall we not thankfully receive it? Who can claim to have found the finality of truth? "Thy word is truth," said our Divine Teacher; but we do well to seek to know what is God's word, and what, however venerated, is merely the setting in which it is presented to us. I am aware there are those who are ready to fly off at every tangent that has the merit of being new, but that is no good reason why we should not calmly wait, patiently examine, and thankfully receive, every contribution to the better understanding of the wonderful word of our wonderful God. It is not too much to claim that with our glorious freedom from ecclesiastical trammels, and with our sense of individual responsibility we are fitted to stand upon the mountain peaks, touching the very clouds of mystery, waiting for the first outcoming gleams of light, and ready to flash them downward on the toiling millions in the valleys beneath. Oh, no, whatever it may be for others, it does not become Congregationalists to shrink from new views of truth, nor refuse to accept light from whatever quarter it may come. This is our particular mission, and our only warrant to exist as a separate denomination.

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Said an intelligent representative from one of our churches to me the other day, "What are we going to do? Don't you think it is time that our churches inaugurated some new departure, something that will make our influence felt in the country?" I fully agree with that sentiment. The history of our churches in this Dominion is not such as to cause us to be perfectly content with the progress we have made. Something must be done, it seems to me, to bring our churches into closer touch with each other.

Whether or not the scheme so frequently brought before this Union by a former chairman, or any modification of it, can be adopted, will be for you to consider. I believe there is much in it that would be helpful. Any way, some definite steps should be taken to let our weaker churches know that Congregationalism is as good for the poor as for the rich and influential.

It goes without saying that we ought to have—must have
—a Missionary Superintendent, call him Superintendent or Secretary, or whatever you like—but a representative man to go
among the churches is an imperative necessity. I know the
difficulty is in getting the right man. The last one we had was
the nearest to perfection we are likely to get, and he had no
flower-bestrown pathway to tread; but we have lost every year
since the office became vacant. We need three: one for the
Maritime Provinces, one for Ontario and Quebec, and one for
Manitoba and the Northwest. But let us begin with one, and
that without further delay.

AFFILIATION WITH THE UNITED STATES.

And this leads me to speak of our national or international affiliations. It is well understood that the Chairman of this Union speaks for himself alone, and that the Union is in no way responsible for his utterances. So I speak for myself now, when I say, that it is time for the churches of Canada to do what some of us have been hoping and praying for for twenty-five years; seek affiliation with our brethren across the line. I say this with full respect for and gratitude to the church in the mother country. But I have felt for a long time that they have not understood our circumstances or our difficulties in this Dominion, in conditions so different from anything in their experi-

ence; and even when worthy brethren from them have visited us, they have not always succeeded in understanding Canadian affairs. Political returns as to the bigness of our country or financial wealth, do not imply ability on the part of our churches to overtake the work in the newer sections, nor to strengthen our position in important centres we have occupied for years. Conditions in the United States are much more like our own, especially is this true in our great western country both north and south: our work there is one. The same is true as to Maine and our Maritime Provinces, Vermont, New Hampshire and Quebec; Northern New York and Eastern Ontario; Western New York, Ohio, and Michigan with Western Ontario.

Personally I hope for growth only by organic union with the strong onward march of the churches in these states. It is not that we are looking for their financial support. They would be a tower of strength to us, and I do not believe that we would be a weakness to them. Events and forces are at work to-day, that are bringing together peoples that ought to have been together years ago; indeed, ought never to have been separated. I have been asked what I would do, if Great Britain and the United States should go to war? I have ever answered, "I refuse to consider such a contingency: it is past, and past forever."

As regularly as in public services I pray for our honored and beloved Queen—God bless her; and for the Governor-General of our Dominion, I pray for the President of the United States and his advisers. We are one; and are beginning to open our eyes to the magnitude of our mission, as a united people, to the world. An alliance, offensive as well as defensive, (for the one is often as imperative a duty as the other,) would be the guarantee of civil and religious liberty to the world. It would be for peace. Its object would not be war. But if war must come, led by the old "Union Jack," entwined with "Stars and Stripes," we would go into the thickest of the fight as only the sons of the Puritans can: aye, and come out of it too as they ever have come, VICTORIOUS. I believe that Congregationalism has a mission, in the bringing together of the great family of Anglo-Saxondom, that none other can fulfil.

AN UPWARD GRADE.

Our statistics will not, I fear, show great increase during

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the past year. Yet if I interpret aright the spirit that is in us, it is one of hopefulness. The present position and prospects of our college are cause for encouragement. We have been favored in the past with faithful men as Principals; but never more so than at present. Last year we were receiving a new, and, to most of us, an untried man. To-day, we are confident that we have the right man in the right place! I believe the history of the college will contain the interesting record, that "There was a man sent from God, whose man was George."

But we shall use him not only unjustly, but cruelly, and ourselves also, if we fail to stand by him and strengthen his hands in the heavy task he has undertaken. It is hopeful to see our business men taking an additional interest in the college. It needs no remarkable wisdom to see that with all the additions, (and valuable ones,) made to our ranks from other quarters the success of our churches in large measure is dependent upon the work done in our School of the Prophets. We are in need of men, trained men, godly men, patriotic men, men who out of love for their country as well as love for their fellow-men, will stay in our country even at a financial loss, to build up our Canadian churches. And whom may we expect to do this, if not our own home trained Canadian sons? Given the right kind of men, there are a score of places where churches could be built up, to the spiritual benefit of the community.

My heart is often saddened as I pass through our towns and cities where once we had churches that are now no more. I would not advocate entering into places where another denomination is struggling on in the Master's service, in an already too small parish; but I think we may fairly claim to have contributed sufficiently to the fund of modest self-denial, and may let some others have a share in withdrawing from overchurched fields. "Fair play is bonnie play," and one-sided play is not fair play. I would like to proclaim from the chair of this Union that the days of our processional retreat are over; and that wherever we have a cause, however weak, if there are half a dozen faithful intelligent Congregationalists, we will stand by them, and help them, until they become strong!

Our towns and villages need our churches. Where do you find a village with a Congregational church—even a small one—where there is not a strong temperance sentiment? I am not narrow, I am not a sectarian, I love my brethren of other com-

munions, but when I enter a village or small town, I can tell almost at once, by the very intellectual and spiritual atmosphere, whether or not there is a Congregational church in it. Yes, I am more than ever persuaded that we have a mission to the people of this Canada, to this country of unlimited resources, the freest and best governed country in the world!

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OUR DENOMINATIONAL PAPER.

Another department of our work that deserves hearty recognition is our denominational paper. So far as the management goes, and with the means at their disposal, those in charge have done wonders. The editor deserves our best thanks. He gives us a paper of which he has no reason to be ashamed. But we have much reason to be ashamed of our meagre subscriptionlist, by which the managers are so heavily handicapped. So frequently has this subject been brought before the Union, that I have shrunk from the mention of it now. But why cannot the circulation be raised to 2,000, and that at once?

Even if in these days of fierce competition, more can be obtained for a dollar, surely there is loyalty enough among us to subscribe the sum of one dollar a year, just to keep up an organ of intercommunication between the churches! But that is the quality that is too much lacking with us—loyalty to our denomination. In the rebound from sectarian narrowness, there is just the danger that we kick away the sturdy ladder by which we have reached the altitude of free air; and thus prevent others from attaining to the same precious liberty.

THE CLOSING OF THE CENTURY.

And now how shall we celebrate the closing of this nine-teenth century? Other honored brethren are moving in this matter. Tremendous energies for good will be aroused towards crowning this eventful epoch of the world's history with some mighty achievement for the glory of God, and the good of man. Shall we take our place among them? What shall it be? How shall we go about it? Is it too much for us to attempt to raise \$250,000, and free every one of our churches in the Dominion from the horrible incubus of debt, and put our college on a strong financial basis? Such a suggestion may be ruled out of

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the range of possibilities; but it can be done! There is enough and more than enough to do it, if we ourselves, and what we have, were fully consecrated to the Lord; and nothing we can think of would do more to hasten in the final triumph for which we are looking. May we not hope to receive such spiritual uplift from our meeting in this good city, as shall send us back to our fields of labor purposing great things? and that with such a determination in the Divine strength as shall carry them out to a successful accomplishment?

Such are some of the thoughts and purposes that have presented themselves to my mind in view of our meeting this year. I am painfully aware of their fragmentary and unfinished nature. Intentions of early preparation and careful revision, with me, too often fail to materialize, as they have done at this time. It is more in the nature of suggestions than of a finished treatise they are presented; and if in any small measure they tend to widen the horizon of our vision, and nerve us to attempt greater things than in the past, they will not have been offered in vain. Here we take each other by the hand, in the grasp of true brotherly affection. Shall we not pledge ourselves to each other here, under the shadow of the cross, in full view of that unique picture of love and sacrifice higher than an angel's dream? Shall we not catch the gaze of that eye, once dimmed in agony and blood for us; the glory of that face that enobles sacrifice, and transfigures pain? And shall we not return to our common work again with something of the shining in our own faces, that will reveal the mountain-top communion! that will prove to the world, better than all works of controversy, that the Lord God, Omnipotent liveth, and reigneth in the hearts and lives of men to-day!




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

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MINUTES OF THE UNION.

The Fifty-first Annual Meeting of the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick met with Tabernacle Church in Yarmouth, N. S., Tuesday, July 5th, 1898, at 7.30 p.m.

After a short devotional service led by the Chairman, the Rev. Chas. Duff, M.A., of Brooklyn, preached the annual Union Sermon from Phil. 3, 13. After the sermon some matters of preliminary business were attended to and the meeting was brought to a close with the benediction.

On Wednesday morning at 9.30 a devotional service was held, presided over by Rev. J. M. Austin, of Sheffield, N. B.

At 10.30 the Union was called to order by the Chairman. The Nominating Committee appointed at the previous session recommended the following committees:

SATURDAY, 9.30 A.M.

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The devotional meeting was led by A. N. Tupper, Esq. of Truro; the theme of the hour being "Jesus Christ and Him crucified."

At 10 a.m. Union was called to order by the chairman.

It was recommended by Business Committee and adopted, —That the Chairman's retiring address be placed in the hands of the Maritime Editor of the Congregationalist, for publication.

Upon recommendation of Union Committee, it was Resolved,—That Rev. E. E. Braithwaite be Missionary Superintendent for the Congregational Union of N. S. and N. B., and that he have as a Board of Conference, the Interim Committee, whose business it shall be to care for the churches that are without pastors and do everything possible for them in their necessity.

Maitland church property was, by a separate resolution, placed in the hands of the Interim Committee, who were empowered to act in the premises.

Rev. Mr. Braithwaite was made convener of that committee.

SATURDAY, 2.30 P.M.

Cablegrams were received from Memorial Hall, London, and St. Johns, Newfoundland. The words of the latter were: "The Congregationalists of Newfoundland pray God's richest blessing on your assembly."

Rev. Mr. Braine read a splendid paper upon Church Music.

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Rev. Mr. Austin read a paper upon "The Needs of Congregationalism."

Rev. Mr. Braithwaite, upon "Bearing of recent criticism upon the Bible."

Saturday, 7.45 p.m.

A. Y. P. S. C. E. Rally was held.

The body of the church was well filled with young people, composing the Yarmouth C. E. Local Union.

Mr. C. Starratt, President of the Local Union, presided. Rev. J. L. Scholfield, of Brantford, Ont., gave a spirited address upon "Aggressive Christianity."

Mr. Frank H. Hutchison conducted an open Parliament, upon "Some live problems of Christian Endeavor."

Short reports were given by the Societies represented. Rev. Dr. Clark, of Salem, Mass., spoke upon Christian Endeavor, "The C. E. Society, its rise, practical working, and future."

Rev. J. W. Cox led a solemn Consecration service, in which the whole audience participated.

The meeting closed with the Mizpah benediction.

SUNDAY.

At 11 a.m. Rev. Alexander McGregor, of Pawtucket, R. I. preached from Lev. xxv. 10, "It shall be a jubilee unto you."

At 2.30 there was a Sunday School meeting, addressed by Revs. Austin, McGregor and Scholfield. Miss Duff, of Toronto, gave a recitation, which was well received.

At 7 p.m. Rev. Dr. George preached from Luke ii. 49, "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" After the sermon, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed, presided over by the Pastor, assisted by Rev. Alexander McGregor, and Rev. Dr. Clark, of Salem, Mass.

All the churches of the town, as well as the old Zion church of Chebogue, were supplied by ministers of the Union.

Monday, 9.30 a.m.

Mr. Freeman Dennis led the half-hour devotional service, which was a real time of refreshing.

At 10 a.m. the Union was called to order.

Rev. E. C. Wall having requested a letter of dismission to the Free Baptist Conference of N. S., on recommendation of the Membership Committee, it was Resolved,—That his wish be granted, and that the Secretary write him a kindly letter to that effect.

It was moved, seconded and Resolved,—That the Congregationalist Church of St. Johns, Newfoundland, be invited to become a member of this Union, and that the letter be written by the Committee appointed to reply to the telegram.

The following resolutions were moved during the session:

TEMPERANCE.

That whereas the present Government has wisely resolved to appeal to the people by way of special vote throughout the Dominion, to obtain, if possible, accurate knowledge concerning the will of the people upon the great question, Prohibition of the liquor traffic, the Congregational Union of N. S. & N. B., now assembled, do urge upon our ministers and members that effort be made to sustain and assist the Government in obtaining a Plebescite upon that question, that shall be the honest expression of the will of the people of these Provinces. And that Mr. W. W. Buchanan's contemplated visit with a view to the forwarding that object, be aided in every possible way.

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THE COLLEGE.

Whereas the members of this Union having listened to the statements of the Rev. Principal George, and witnessed the energy with which the work of enlarging the Endowment Fund has been carried on throughout the year,

Resolved, That this Union most heartily commends both the Endowment Fund of the Canadian Congregational College and its current yearly expenditure, to the prayerful consideration and Christian liberality of our churches.

And we do also most cordially urge upon them the duty of encouraging any of their young men who may be looking forward to the work of the ministry, to avail themselves at once of the advantage that our College affords to all such in their preparation for their life-work.

Resolved, That this Union recommends to the attention and liberality of the churches the Provident Fund Society, and trusts it shall continue to be a blessing in the future as it has in the past.

Monday afternoon and evening were given up to Jubilee addresses, this being the half century anniversary of the Yarmouth church. Revs. Purdon, Braithwaite, McGregor, Dr. Clark, of Salem, and S. B. Flint M.P., were the speakers.

At the close of the evening service the usual votes of thanks were moved, and the Union adjourned to meet in Sheffield in 1899, the time to be left to the Interim Committee.

Rev. Simeon Sykes pronounced the benediction, and the best and brightest meetings ever held by the Congregational Union of N. S. & N. B, were brought to a close.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL SECRETARY FOR UNION OF NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

On the list of churches there are twenty-one names, and one other church in New Brunswick is identified with the Maine Conference. Of the fifteen churches reported, twelve have pastoral oversight, one is supplied by a Presbyterian minister, and two are desirous of having pastors settled. Pastors in charge are Revs. D. W. Purdon, C. Duff, S. Sykes, Edwin Rose, A. Braine, J. W. Cox, E. E. Braithwaite, J. M. Austin, Geo. Ball and Wm. J. Minchin. The average length of pastorates in this Union at the present time is three and a half years, but it is probable that changes will not for some time be as frequent as in recent years.

According to information supplied there are twenty-five preaching stations, services being held at eleven places in other than church buildings. There is seating capacity for 3,785 persons, while the average attendance is given as 1,410. The membership of these churches is 993, with 170 absentees, while under pastoral care there are 1,996, inclusive of children. During the past year 62 persons have united with the churches, 20 by letter and 39 by confession; but by death, removal, and other causes the relative increase is brought down to 20. Milton reports a gain of 14 (10 by letter and 3 by confession); Truro a gain of 12 (2 by letter and 10 by confession); Lake and Bear Island a gain of 6 (by confession). Gains to church membership are generally offset by removals or deaths, but the influences for good are beyond estimation.

Of baptisms there are reported 13 adults and 29 infants, a total of 42. There are 13 schools reported, with 102 officers and teachers, an enrolled membership of 481, and an average attendance of 403. Two churches report Home Departments in connection with their Sunday Schools, one of which adds 12 to its Sunday School enrollment. Nine Endeavor Societies are reported (7 Senior, 1 Intermediate and 1 Junior), with 381 members. At Liverpool there is a White Ribbon Army with 84 members. It is probable that other like societies exist, which have not reported.

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Two churches report that they own in part their church edifices, while the others own theirs in whole. The value of church properties is probably about \$74,800, and the debt reported is \$6,345, or nearly one-twelfth of the whole. For Local Church Objects raised during the year, \$5,527.79 is reported, but the sum is probably much larger. For the Union of N.S. and N.B., \$48.61 is reported. For the C.C.C. the treasurer reports having received \$108.01. The treasurer of the C.C.M.S. reports as received in contributions from the churches of this Union \$418.25, and per the Gorham Estate \$400.78 a total of \$819.03, while in grants he reports \$930.08, an excess of \$111.65. Amounts received for the C.C.M.F.S, aggregate the sum of \$221.03. The Woman's Board of N.B. and N.S. will report at their meetings and give a more accurate statement than is possible in this instance. For Unspecified Denominational Objects, \$293.55, and for General Benevolence \$130.55. Total amounts raised, as given in the reports so far received, is \$8,058.57, or an average of \$8.12 per member.

In one case, the church reports that the pastor was absent for three months, and that at present there is "no strife or unrest or division." Another reports the field of labor as a difficult one, the workers having to walk by faith not by sight; encouraging features in the attendance at church services, in the work of the Junior Christian Endeavor Society, and in the increase of membership during the year. One church is "hopeful and vigorous," and is endeavoring to build a parsonage. Another testifies that "propects are brighter than ever." One church tells of being without a pastor for some months past, notwithstanding which it meets on Sunday mornings for service, carries on the Sunday School and the Christian Endeavor, and means to hold on, by the grace of God. Another tells of being without a pastor for two years, and expresses a great desire to have one settled.





- (3) By the endowing in full, or contributing toward the endowment of any particular Chair, or
 - (4) Lectureship.
 - (5) By the founding of Scholarships or Exhibitions.
 - (6) By the donation of books for the Library.
 - (7) By furnishing requisites for the College building.

FORM OF A BEQUEST FOR THE COLLEGE.

I give and bequeath to the Treasurer, for the time being, of the Congregational College of Canada, a body corporate, by Act of Parliament of the Province of Canada, A.D. 1864, the sum of[either without designation, or "to be added to the Endowment Fund of said College,"] out of my estate, without any charge or deduction whatever, to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease; and I direct that the receipt for the said sum of the Treasurer for the time being of the said College shall be a sufficient and valid discharge of said legacy.

BY-LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

CHAPTER I.

OF THE CORPORATION.

- 1. The Corporation is called "The Congregational College of Canada."
- 2. Its object is to educate ministers for the Congregational Churches of Canada and the other Provinces of British North America, and for Foreign Missionary service.
- 3. Contributors of two dollars annually to the funds of the College are members of the Corporation. A contributor in arrears one year shall not be qualified to vote at the meetings of the Corporation, or to exercise his other rights of membership. The Treasurer's Subscription-lists shall be taken as evidence of contribution.
- 4. Churches contributing for the previous year to the current expense fund of the College, the sum of ten dollars or upwards, may be represented at the meeting of the Corporation by one delegate for each church; those contributing twenty-five dollars or upwards, for the previous year, by two delegates; and those contributing fifty dollars or upwards, for the previous year, by three delegates.
- 5. All who contribute, or may have contributed at any one time, the sum of two hundred dollars or upwards, not including annual subscriptions, to any one or more of the objects set forth on page four,* or to any other special object or objects, shall be life-members of the Corporation.
- 6. A regular meeting of the Corporation is held annually, for the reception of the report of the Directors, the election of a new Board, according to provision hereinafter named, and the transaction of other necessary business.
- 7. The annual meeting is held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec.
- 8. Special meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business, at the call of the Board of Directors, or on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Directors, signed by at least twenty members of the Corporation; provided always that no such special meetings be held without one month's public notice thereof in an accredited newspaper in Toronto and Montreal, and also in the Canadian Independent.

CHAPTER II.

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

1. The Board of Directors is elected from members of the Corporation, and consists of a Chairman, Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and twenty-five

members, two of whom may be nominated by the Alumni Association. Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

2. Five members of the Board shall retire annually, in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election.

3. The powers and duties of the Board are:

(1) The management of the finances of the College. (2) The appointment and removal of officers of the College, subject to the revision of the Corporation. (3) The general oversight and management of the affairs of the College. (4) The framing of by-laws for the domestic economy of the College and the conduct and discipline of the students, and (5) the presentation of an annual report of the general condition of the College to the Corporation at the next regular meeting.

4. Any member of the Board absent from its meetings for a year shall be held, ipso facto, to have vacated his seat, but may be re-appointed or re-elected

thereto.

5. The proceedings of the Board are subject to and regulated by by-laws, which may be enacted, amended, or repealed, after due notice thereof, at any annual regular meeting of the Corporation.

6. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death, or resignation, or otherwise, may be filled by the Board as soon after their occurrence as it may see fit.

CHAPTER III.

OF THE PROFESSORS.

1. The officers of the College shall be a Principal, and such other Professors and Lecturers as may be associated with him from time to time, of whom the Principal and Professors shall be members of a Congregational church.

2. The officers of the College shall receive their appointment from the Board of Directors, as before provided; and in case of resignation or removal from office, except for cause, three months' notice thereof shall be required; provided always, that no appointment or removal shall be valid unless made at a meeting of the Board specially called for that purpose, at which not less than a majority of the Board must be present.

3. The duties and salaries of the officers of the College shall be determined by such regulations as the Board of Directors may from time to time ordain in that behalf.

4. The Principal and Professors, with such clerical members of the Board as from time to time may be appointed by it, constitute the Faculty of Theology, and as such are entrusted with the educational work of the College, subject to the sanction and control of the Board of Directors.

5. In cases of discipline, the Faculty may admonish or reprimand a student, or prohibit his attendance on the classes, preliminary to reporting him to the Board to be further dealt with.

6. Meetings of the Faculty shall be held monthly during the session, and the Faculty are required to make regular reports of their proceedings to the Board.

7. The Principal of the College shall be ex-officio chairman of the Faculty, and one of its members shall be appointed annually by the Board to act as Secretary of the Faculty.

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CHAPTER IV.

OF CANDIDATES FOR ADMISSION.

- 1. Every candidate for admission into the College must present to the Directors the testimony of the church of which he is a member, respecting his piety and suitableness to the work of the ministry, together with a written statement of the grounds of his conviction that he is called of God to that work, and of his views of Christian doctrine and Church government.
- 2. Candidates for admission to the full course must be prepared to pass the Matriculation Examination in the McGill University.
- 3. Candidates who are graduates of any University, or who can satisfy the Board that they are otherwise possessed of sufficient requirements, may be at once admitted to the Theological course; also, as exceptional cases, such candidates may be admitted to that course as it may be expedient, in the judgment of the Directors, to train as preachers, without the ordinary literary culture.
- 4. Candidates, other than University graduates, on entering shall be subjected to a written examination in the following subjects:—
- (a) In English:—Writing from dictation; Composition; Grammar; History of England.
 - (b) In Mathematics:—Arithmetic; Euclid's Elements, Book I. II.
- (c) In Classics:—Elements of Greek Grammar, and translation from the Greek into English of a portion of one of the Gospels.
- 5. They shall be required to take a full year in the University in the study of such subjects as the Faculty may designate, previous to commencing their Theological work.
- 6. Approved candidates are received on a probation of four months; at the close of which, if the result of their probation be satisfactory, they are admitted as regular students of the College.

CHAPTER V.

OF THE STUDENTS.

- 1. Students are, during their Literary course, under the general supervision of the Theological Professors, and take such subjects in the Theological department as the Board may direct.
- 2. The students, both in the Literary and Theological departments, are required to attend exclusively to the studies approved by the Board.
- 3. Every student on his admission to the College, is required to sign a declaration of obedience and consent to the By-laws and Regulations of the College.
- 4. Pecuniary aid, when necessary, may be granted to them from the funds, the amount in each case to be fixed by the Board at the beginning of the session.
- 5. Attendance upon the classes in the College, and the use of the Library, are allowed without charge to the students.†

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[†] Students, entering September, 1898, and afterwards, will be required to pay fees in McGill University. Seven Bursaries of \$40 each will be established to aid deserving students.—Sec.

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6. As a part of their preparation for their future work, the students, under the sanction of the Directors, may preach the Gospel, as they have the

opportunity.

7. Every student, when admitted into the College, on the expiration of the term of his probation, is required to procure a formal dismissal from the church to which he formerly belonged, and, without delay, to obtain admission into a Congregational church in Montreal. Such dismissal and admission must be reported by him to the Board. Furthermore, he is expected to be as regular as possible in his attendance upon the services, ordinances and church meetings of the church to which he belongs during his College course.

8. Students are not allowed, during their College course, to enter into the marriage relationship without the knowledge and consent of the Board of

Directors.

9. Students who leave College without obtaining the official sanction and discharge of the Board, are required to refund to the College the amount expended by it for their education.

10. Churches who desire the services of students with the view of permanent settlement in the pastorate, or otherwise, are requested to communicate with the Board through the Secretary.

CHAPTER VI.

OF THE COURSE OF STUDY AND EXAMINATIONS.

- 1. The full course of study extends over five sessions, and is divided into a Literary course of two sessions and a Theological course of three sessions.
- 2. In the Theological department, the course of study includes the original Languages of the Scriptures, Biblical Literature, Systematic and Pastoral Theology, Church History, Homiletics and Exegesis of the Greek Testament, with such other accessory subjects as the Board of Directors may from time to time appoint.
- 3. In the Theological course, the students are examined at the close of each session in all the subjects of the year. The examinations are conducted by examiners (among whom the Theological Professors are included) chosen by the Board of Directors, and by means of printed questions and written answers to the same. Those who pass are arranged according to their proficiency, as 1st class, 2nd class and 3rd class. If a student fails to pass in any subject he is required to undergo a supplementary examination in the same. The results of these sessional examinations are recorded by the Board and reported to the Corporation at the next annual meeting.
- 4. The session of the Theological department begins in the first week in October, and ends the second week in April.
- 5. The Professors are at liberty to hold, during the session, such class examinations as they may deem necessary, either in the manner aforesaid or orally.
- 6. In the Literary course, students are required to pass such examinations as may be appointed by the Faculty of Arts of the McGill University. The Board of Directors are required to obtain from the said Faculty of Arts, a report of the examinations of the students in the several subjects thereof, and also of their attendance and conduct during the session in the University, and to present the same at the annual meeting of the Corporation.

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CHAPTER VII.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1. Alterations may be made in these By-laws and Regulations, or new ones added, by any regular meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such alterations or additions has been given at the meeting next preceding.

COURSE OF STUDY.

I.—THE FULL COURSE.

The Full Course of Study extends over five sessions, and includes both the Arts Course in McGill and the Theological Course in our College, as described below. Candidates for admission to the Full Course must be prepared to pass the Matriculation Examination of the McGill University, for the details of which intending students are referred to the Calendar of McGill, which can be obtained on application to Mr. W. Vaughan, Registrar, McGill College.

For further information concerning fees, dates of examinations, exhibitions and scholarships, specially the twelve exhibitions of the value of \$60 each offered this year (1898) "to residents in any part of Canada except the Island of Montreal," reference must also be made to the Calendar of McGill.

For the literary and scientific subjects of this course, the students attend the classes of the Faculty of Arts in McGill College, according to the terms of affiliation with the University; in which Faculty, this course extends over four years, and leads to the degree of B.A. But in the third and fourth years, Theological students are allowed exemptions from attendance on certain classes, should they desire it. Thus, the studies of the third and fourth year of this, course are prosecuted simultaneously in the Faculty of Theology and in thes Faculty of Arts. The work of the fifth year is confined to the Faculty of Theology.

II.—THE SHORTER OR THEOLOGICAL COURSE.

The Theological Course proper begins with the third year of the Full Course, and extends over three full sessions. It embraces the following subjects:—(1) Systematic Theology; (2) Historical Theology; (3) Pastoral Theology; (4) Homiletics; (5) Greek Testament Exegesis; (6) Church History; (7) Evidences and Biblical Literature. A Preliminary year is added for students of the Shorter Course.

Students who enter for the Shorter Course only, in accordance with sec. 3, chap. 4 of the Regulations, are also required to attend the following classes in McGill, viz., English, Mental and Moral Philosophy, and Hebrew, and also to pass the examinations of such classes. After the first year the student may choose Hebrew or one of the Natural Sciences.

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SESSIONAL DATES AND EXAMINATIONS.

In the Arts department the session begins at the middle of September; in the Theological, the first week in October; and examinations are held at Christmas, and in the end of the session in the several subjects of the year. Students must pass these examinations as a condition of maintaining their proper status.

MEDAL.

The Calvary Church Silver Medal will be offered for the best answering in a special examination in the final examinations of the Theological course.

REGULATIONS FOR THE COURSE OF STUDY AND EXAMINATIONS FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

- 1. Candidates for the Degree of BD. must be graduates in Arts of a recognized University; provided, however, that this condition shall not be made to apply to former Alumni of the College, nor to those now (1885) passing through their course.
- 2. There shall be three examinations for the degree of B. D., viz.:—I. The Entrance; II. The Intermediate; and III. The Final Examination; arranged as to subjects and time as follows:
- I. Entrance Examinations, at the end of the First Year of the Theological Course, and in the following subjects:
 - (a) Greek—Gospel by St. Mark.

- 2. The following commentaries are recommended, viz., on Genesis, Lange; on the Psalms, Delitzsch, Vol. I.; on Proverbs, Zochler (in Lange's series); on Isaiah, Cheyne; on Amos, Pusey on the Minor Prophets; on Mark, Morison; on John, Lange; on Acts, Hackett; on Romans, Beet; on Hebrews, Westcott.

The examinations shall be held at the same time and place, annually, as the Sessional Examinations of the College, and the Degree shall be conferred at the public closing service of the College. Local examinations, however, may be held when in the judgment of the Faculty, it shall be deemed expedient, and in such manner as the Faculty may from time to time appoint.

4. Candidates for examination, at any of the above-named Examinations, must notify the Secretary of the Faculty of their intention to present themselves for examination, not later than January 1st; and Candidates other than students now (1885), or hereafter passing through their College Course, must produce certificates of having duly completed their course in the College.

5. The fee for the Degree of B.D. shall be ten dollars, to be paid to the Secretary of the Faculty prior to the conferring of the Degree.

The Hood of the Bachelor of Divinity shall be of black corded silk, lined with white silk, with a three inch border of Bishop's purple.

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PROCEEDINGS OF THE FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF CANADA.

Held in Bond St. Congregational Church, Toronto, Thursday, June 9th, 1898.

2.30 o'clock, p.m.

1. J. R. Dougall, Esq., M.A., was appointed Chairman.

2. The Rev. Galen H. Craik, BA., was appointed Minute Secretary.

3. The Rev. A. F. Pollock led in prayer.

4. The Report of the Board of Directors was read by the Secretary, the Rev. Prof. Warriner, after which the Treasurer, Mr. Thomas Moodie, presented his report and statements.

5. Moved by the Rev. T. B. Hyde; seconded by Mr. J. C.

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"That the reports and statements now presented be severally received and adopted, and with the customary addenda be printed in the Year Book." Adopted.

6. In regard to the anticipated draft of new By-laws and regulations, Dr. George reported that the Board was not able at present to submit a detailed draft, instead of which he gave a general outline of the proposed changes and moved, seconded by Prof. Warriner—

"That the Board be instructed and authorized to revise the By-laws and Regulations and report at the next meeting of the Corporation, and that, in the meantime, the Board be empowered to act in the best interests of the College, according to its judgment." Adopted.

7. Dr. George presented a report concerning the Endowment Fund on behalf of the Chairman of the Endowment Com-

mittee, Mr. S. H. C. Miner.

8. Rev. Morgan Wood moved the following resolution, seconded by Mr. H. O'Hara:—

"That in the opinion of this Corporation it is very desirable that the \$64,000 necessary to raise the Endowment of the College to \$100,000 be speedily obtained. We rejoice to hear of the good beginning already made, and earnestly commend the matter to the serious consideration and Christian generosity of all our churches." Adopted.

9. Revs. D. S. Hamilton and J. T. Daley were appointed Directors on the nomination of the Alumni Association. Mr. B. W. Robertson, Mr. C. Gurd, Dr. R. S. Weir, were re-appointed as Directors.

10. The Chairman Mr. J. R. Dougall, the Secretary Prof. Warriner, the Treasurer Mr. T. Moodie, were all re-elected.

11. Resolved, that the thanks of the Corporation be tendered the Auditors, Mr. C. T. Williams and Mr. Archibald Wright, and that they be re-appointed auditors for the coming year.

12. The Rev. Dr. George spoke on the work of the College.

13. Moved that the Minutes be taken as read and that we do now adjourn. Carried.

The meeting closed with the benediction, pronounced by the Rev. W. F. Clarke.

FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT.

Session of 1897-98.

In presenting their last Annual Report your Directors announced that it was anticipated that the Rev. Dr. George, then of St. Louis, Missouri, would accept the Principalship of the College. We have now to report that our anticipations were realized. Dr. George early in September arrived in Montreal and at once took charge of the Institution, devoting himself heart and soul to everything relating to the life of the College

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and the welfare of the churches generally, with results that must be gratifying to himself as they are to all who have been in any way associated with him in the life of the College.

The Opening Exercises which were held on Thursday, Oct. 7th, 1897, took the form of a conversazione and reception to Principal and Mrs. George. Addresses of welcome were delivered by the Rev. W. McIntosh as representing the churches, the Rev. G. Ellery Read as representing the Alumni, and His Worship the Mayor of Montreal, to which Dr. George suitably replied.

APPLICATIONS FOR ADMISSION.

Applications for admission to the College were received from the following, viz., J. Manville Williams, of Watford, for the full course; William Munroe, of Woodstock, and Brandon Greenaway, of Hamilton, for the short course These were admitted and passed the usual probation. D. D. Hambly, B.A., of the Central Church, Winnipeg, was admitted to the second half of the middle year of the Theological Course, and J. A. Mitchell, a member of the church in Sherbrooke, now taking a medical training in preparation for the Foreign Missionary service, was admitted as a partial student and attended two courses of Lectures in the College.

Student A. R. Ross, B.A., was allowed leave of absence for one year.

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ENLARGING THE STAFF.

15. A. R. Ross, BA..... Absent on leave.

Arrangements were made at the beginning of the session to enlarge the staff and to increase the number and efficiency of the courses of lectures. We are glad to say that this has been done without increase of expense to the College. Dr. Evans has lectured weekly on Ecclesiastical History. Dr. Weir has delivered a valuable course of lectures on "Music and Church Law." The Rev. T. B. Hyde came from Toronto for a series of lectures on "The Minister and the Bible," and the Rev. Graham Taylor, of Chicago Theological Seminary, lectured on "The Relation of the Minister to Social Questions."

The two latter courses were opened to the general public, a considerable number of whom availed themselves of the privilege.

The Rev. D. S Hamilton also conducted a class in Bible History during the latter half of the session.

The thanks of the Corporation are due to these gentlemen who have greatly added to the efficiency of the College by their gratuitous services.

EXAMINATIONS.

The Christmas and Sessional examinations were held with satisfactory results.

The Rev. W. T. Gunn, M.A., successfully passed his examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. D. D. Hambly, B.A., also passed several examinations, covering most of the work of the first year in the B.D. course.

By the kindness of D. Macdonald of San Francisco, prizes in elocution were offered aggregating twenty dollars in value. The first was awarded to A. Secord (value \$10), the second to T. A. Munroe (value \$6). The third was divided between R. B. Blyth and W. Johnston (value \$4).

In the Sessional Examinations of McGill, Mr. A. B. Ross

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A. B. Ross

very creditably passed his examinations for the degree of B.A. Mr. R. B. Blyth, who was taking the Honor Course in Philosophy, fell sick in the midst of his examinations. His degree was, however, granted to him. Horace G. Rice took First Rank Honors in Semitic Languages and Literature in the third year, together with the prize in Hebrew, while J. Manville Williams of the first year took First Rank honors and Prize in Mathematics, First Rank General Standing, prize in French, prize in Hebrew, and stood second man in his year in McGill. We are pleased to report these facts as alike creditable to the students themselves and to the institution which they represent, and we cherish the hope that our men will always be in the van of Mc-Gill students. The closing exercises of the College for the conferring of degrees and prizes were held on the 12th of April last. The Rev. Dr. Stimson, Pastor of the Manhattan Congregational Church, New York, gave the address The Vice-Chancellor of McGill, Dr. Peterson, was also present, and expressed his interest in the work of this College.

In reviewing the history of the session as a whole, there are two or three items which seem to call for special mention.

And first, as to the

DOMESTIC LIFE OF THE STUDENTS.

Arrangements have been made by which the students, under their own management and without additional cost to the College, again take their meals together in the College building. This we believe to be the ideal plan and most conducive to the interests of the true family life of the College. A beginning has also been made towards the equipment of a gymnasium in the College building. The students themselves take a lively interest in all that concerns the general good, and are ready to co-operate with the Principal and the Board in everything that promises to make College life more efficient. They have supplied vacant churches under the Principal's direction, and of their own motion have organized a Students' Missionary Society. This Society is organized to co-operate with the Home Missionary Society. Its special objects are to supply preaching stations and vacant churches during the summer and winter, and also to organize and develop new causes. A beginning has already been made, and this summer three students laboring in Ontario are assisted by the Society. The President is Mr. T. Munroe, and Mr. H. G. Rice is Recording-Secretary.

The Ladies' Auxiliary to the House Committee has been very active during the past winter, and by their efforts, aided by the kindness of many friends throughout the country, many additions have been made to the house furniture, and the comfort of the students has been greatly increased.

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The thanks of the Corporation are due to these ladies for the substantial aid they have rendered, also to Mr. T. B. Macaulay for the generous gift of a quantity of apparatus for the gymnasium.

LIBRARY.

We are pleased also to report that by the kindness of a friend, it has been possible to engage a student to spend part of this summer in re-arranging the library under the direction of the librarian, the Rev. E. M. Hill. The library has received some accessions during the year, but it is greatly in need of funds for the purchase of new books.

MCGILL FEES.

The Governors of McGill University have raised the fees of Undergraduates to \$60 per session, and of Partial Students of the First and Second years to \$20 for one course and \$16 for each additional course of lectures, while in the Third and Fourth Years Partial Students must pay \$25 for the first, and \$20 for each additional course of lectures.

This, it will be seen at once, is a matter of very great concern to us as well as to other affiliated Theological Colleges. In respect of Partial Students, the fees are so high as to be well nigh prohibitory, if not altogether so. Your Board has earnestly considered how this College may adapt itself to the new condition of things. The Principal has conferred with the Principals of the other Colleges interested, but whether the outcome will be some united action looking to the supplying of these courses now taken by our Partial Students in McGill or some independent provision on the part of this College alone, we cannot now say. Happily the enlarged fees will not be required of those students at present in attendance, and before the new schedule can grow to be a very great burden, we hope to be able to report that we have not only met the new conditions, but have made them auxiliary to the further advancement of our work.

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In the meantime your Board feels that this College cannot any longer promise to pay the McGill fees of incoming students. But instead thereof the Board has established seven

BURSARIES

of the value of forty dollars each to be earned by examinations, the conditions of which will be announced later.

BEQUEST.

Your Board has received from the Trustees of the Robert Anderson estate the sum of \$1,800, being the net proceeds of a legacy left by him to this College. It has been placed to the credit of the Endowment Fund.

BY-LAWS.

A suggestion was made in the last Annual Report, and approved of by the Corporation, that the incoming Board should prepare a new draft of the Constitution and By-laws for presentation to this meeting. Your Board has had the matter under consideration at various times, and a committee was appointed to prepare such draft, and notices of motion may be given later, embodying the principles of the proposed changes.

ORGANIZATION.

We have also to report that Dr. George was appointed a member of the Board, to take the place of the Rev. Dr. Barbour, and Col. J. H. Burland was chosen to succeed the late Henry Lyman, Esq. The members who retire by reason of the time limit of their appointment are Revs. D. Macallum and J. T. Daley, and Messrs. C. Gurd, R. S. Weir and B. W. Robertson. These are all eligible for re-election.

The Report of the Treasurer, which will be submitted, will

set forth the financial position of the College.

OUTLOOK.

In conclusion your Board would express its gratification at the many signs of a revived interest in the College on the part of our churches. Its purpose is to make the College more and more worthy of the confidence and affection of all young men desirous of entering the Christian ministry, and of the churches which they may ultimately serve. The College exists not for one section or party, nor for one locality, but for all our churches throughout the entire Dominion.

We are happy to announce that there is every prospect that the next Session shall even be better than the past. We have the promise of the kindly assistance of the Rev. Douglas McKenzie, D.D., Professor of Systematic Theology in the Chicago Theological Seminary, who has consented to deliver a course of lectures on the "Philosophy of Religion," at the beginning of the next session. These will be thrown open to the public, and doubtless many will esteem it a privilege to attend.

We trust that the growing years will witness the ever widening influence of this College to the glory of our Redeemer and Lord.

TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT.

The Treasurer in presenting his Annual Financial Statement for year 1897-'8, has not a pleasant task, when I report that there is a deficit on the year's work of \$2,463, increasing the floating debt to \$6,809, you can imagine how discouraging it is, to those who are making such efforts to put the College in a good financial position to be so poorly supported by the constituency.

The Annual Circular was sent to all the churches last September, in time for the October collection, giving a plain and urgent statement of the needs of the work; and I may here state that the work is very economically carried on, when the question is asked, where can we economize? we find nowhere.

There has been a slight increase in the subscriptions from all the Provinces except Manitoba. Quebec has increased from $71\frac{1}{2}$ cents per member last year to $72\frac{3}{4}$ cents this year; Ontario from $11\frac{1}{2}$ cents to 19 cents; Maritime from $6\frac{1}{8}$ cents to $10\frac{3}{4}$ cents; North-West has decreased from $13\frac{1}{2}$ cents to $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents.

In Quebec only two churches have failed to send a collection; in Ontario, 48 out of 66 churches have remitted; in the Maritime Provinces twelve have sent subscriptions this year against eight last year; in the North-West the same two, Winnipeg Central and Brandon.

The increase in Ontario's subscriptions is largely due to

Mr. Secord's work last summer.

Georgetown heads the Ontario list with \$62.50; Middle-ville, Hopetown and Rosetta are second, with \$61.70; Paris third, with \$58.85; Maxville and St. Elmo fourth, with \$54.50.

Three churches in Quebec exceed the \$100 mark, and two

the \$75 mark; none elsewhere.

Very few of the churches appear to have taken into consideration their responsibility to the College in the way they should; very few give more or as much for a year's subscription as they would give for an evening entertainment.

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We are indebted to Mr. S. H. C. Miner, of Granby, a member of the Board, for \$500 towards the Principal's salary. Two hundred and fifty dollars of this was received just too late for this year's accounts, and also seven dollars from Olivet Church, Toronto, \$2.65 from Eaton, \$10.00 from Ottawa.

There is an increase in expenditure over last year of \$2,300. This is largely made up by the following items:—In teaching, by a quarter's salary due the late Principal in July last, and lectureships, but these last were met by special subscriptions which would not otherwise have been received. The students' fees to McGill were less.

House Maintenance, the principal items being for increased pay to the Janitor, his duties having been increased; cost of telephone, which has been found a necessity; coal, the two buildings being now heated from one centre, and an item for some fixtures purchased from Mrs. Barlow when leaving the house.

Repairs, a very heavy item, \$1,337. New furnaces were required in both the College and Principal's residence. It was decided to heat both buildings from one centre; and extensive repairs were required in the Principal's house, the first since it was built.

Interest is a heavy item, and getting heavier all the time. The result of these annual deficits is, that \$300 of revenue is lost to the College for teaching purposes.

Under the heading of Management, there have been some extra expenses for engraving and printing, which will not be required again for years.

Travelling is made up principally by Dr. George's expenses in removing from St. Louis to Montreal, and Mr. Secord's work among the churches.

Now, to take a look at the coming year, what are the prospects?

Take our income, what is it to be? That is for the churches to say, but to give you an idea, I submit the following estimate:

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which will not do more than allow the work to go on as in the past, and will not allow us to think of a second Professor to give his whole time to the work, which is a very pressing necessity. Will not the pastors and delegates present seriously consider these facts, and report them to their congregations, taking active means to increase the subscriptions, not merely a halfhearted appeal on the day of the collection, but have a set time to review our Denominational work and the obligations every member is under to support it. Then, if you have not already done so, could you not appoint some live, energetic man or woman in your church to interview every one and get a subscription according to their means.

On behalf of the Trustees of the Endowment Fund I have to report 3,100 dollars paid on account of new subscriptions, and the Robert Anderson bequest of two thousand, less Government tax of ten per cent. has been paid The annual interest of the bequest is to be applied in procuring prizes to be awarded to the deserving students in said College; also a legacy of \$500 from the estate of the late Mrs. John Leeming, of Montreal.

The fund now amounts to \$53,875.51, but only the revenue on \$35,066.04 is available for the work of the College, as the revenue of \$4,000 goes to the donors during life, and \$8,000 is a mortgage on the Principal's residence, the balance being the floating debt.

I herewith present the Financial Statement, duly audited.

NOTICE.

It is becoming more than ever a practice among Christian people to recognize the Lord's portion in their Last Wills and Testaments, whereby though they be dead they speak and act in the furtherance of Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent objects. American Congregationalists are among the most wise and generous in this way, and have left legacies of blessings for succeeding generations. Among the members of our Congregational churches in Canada there have also been those who have followed a likewise generous course.

For the guidance of those who may desire to make like bequests, the following legal form is subjoined. The amount bequeathed may be devoted specially to the Church Extension and Building Fund, in which case the income would only be used, or may be given for the general purposes of the Society.

FORM FOR A BEQUEST.

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CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. -NAME.

This Corporation shall be called "THE CANADA CONGREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY," and shall conduct its operations within the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

ARTICLE II. -OBJECTS.

The objects of the Society shall be as set forth in the Act of Incorporation, namely, to plant and to foster Congregational churches in suitable localities; to aid churches in sustaining their pastors where required.

ARTICLE III. - MEMBERSHIP.

All persons being members or adherents of Congregational churches, paying two dollars annually into the funds of the Society, shall be members, and those who subscribe at one time twenty dollars or more, shall be life members. Churches subscribing annually ten dollars or more, may be represented at the annual meeting of the Society by one delegate, and churches subscribing fifty dollars or more may be represented by two delegates. Each Auxiliary branch contributing annually to the funds of the Society ten dollars or more, may be represented by one delegate. The above mentioned subscribers and delegates shall constitute the membership of the Corporation.

ARTICLE IV. -OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

The officers of the Society shall be a President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Superintendent and two Auditors. The Standing Committee shall be a General Committee and an Executive Committee. These officers and committees shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the Society, and shall all be members of the Corporation. The General Committee shall consist of the President, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendent, and not more than twenty-five members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Superintendent, the Honorary Secretary, and one member from each District Association within the bounds of the operations of the Society, who may be nominated by the Association.

ARTICLE V .- DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and its Committees, when practicable, and shall seek to promote the general interest of the Society's work.

The Secretary shall have charge of the books and correspondence of the Society, shall call the meetings of the Society and its Committees, and shall exhibit the records of the proceedings at each meeting.

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The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Society, disbursing them as directed by the General or Executive Committee, and shall present annually a full account of all receipts and disbursements.

The Superintendent shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, to whom he shall report quarterly, visit the churches of the Congregational order within the bounds of the Society's operations with a view of deepening their interest in its work, and of securing liberal contributions for the Society, and shall explore new mission fields, secure missionaries for vacant churches, and have a general oversight of the interests and work of the Society.

The Auditors shall examine the accounts of the Society when required, and make an annual audit of the Treasurer's books previous to the annual meeting of the Society.

The General Committee shall exercise all the corporate powers of the Society, have charge of annual mission grants made to the churches, examine, employ and direct all the missionaries of the Society, and have a general supervision of its affairs. They shall present a report of the work of the Society at each of its annual meetings.

The Executive Committee shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society during the interval between the annual meetings of the General Committee; shall receive all applications from churches for aid from the Society, and report thereon to the General Committee, to whom they shall also make an annual report of their proceedings.

ARTICLE VI. - MEETINGS.

The Corporation shall meet annually on the first Wednesday after the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec assembles. A public annual missionary meeting shall be held on the evening of the next day. Special meetings for the despatch of special business may be called by the Executive Committee at such time and place as may be deemed desirable, provided that a month's notice be given thereof. The General Committee shall hold their meeting at the same time and place as the Corporation, at the call of the Secretary; and the Executive Committee shall hold their quarterly meeting at the time and place it may be agreed upon.

ARTICLE VII.—CHURCH EXTENSION AND BUILDING FUND.

All sums of money specially collected, given or bequeathed for the purpose, together with the proceeds received from the sale of disused church property, shall form a Church Extension and Bui ding Fund, which shall be invested by the Corporation, who may apply the income thereof, by the General or the Executive Committee, by the way of loans, or otherwise, for the organization of churches in new fields, and for the erection or enlargement of places of worship where they may be required.

ARTICLE VIII. - AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Auxiliary branches of this Society may be formed in churches and localities, to so-operate in the work of the Society. Each branch shall, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, make an annual report to the Secretary, and send to the Treasurer all funds collected on its behalf.

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ARTICLE IX. - MISSIONARIES.

Each missionary in the employment of this Society must be a regularly accredited member of a Congregational church, and shall endeavor faithfully to promote all the interests of the Congregational denomination in Canada. He shall send to the Secretary a half-yearly statement of his work, on or before the first day of December and May in each year, and furnish such statistical returns as may be called for.

ARTICLE X. -MISSIONS.

Each church requiring a missionary grant by the General Committee, must make application therefor through the Secretary, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, according to the printed forms provided, in which a certificate to the effect that all previous pledges of support to its pastor have been fulfilled, shall be inserted. Churches aided by this Society are required to make an annual collection for the funds, and to keep their property sufficiently insured; and such churches acquiring property, shall have inserted in the Trust Deed a clause providing that in case the church shall at any time be disbanded or cease to exist, the property shall revert to the Society.

ARTICLE XI.—RECEIVING AND DISMISSING PASTORS.

Churches aided by this Society are required, as far as practicable, in the settlement and dismissal of pastors, to carry out the recommendations passed by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, in 1876, in relation to Councils. In cases where this is impracticable, the sanction of the Executive Committee must be obtained before a settlement or dismissal of a pastor is consummated.

ARTICLE XII.—CONVEYING PROPERTY.

The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or any two of them, shall be the duly authorized persons on behalf of the Corporation to convey real estate, and to discharge mortgages; and the Treasurer shall be the duly authorized person, on behalf of the Corporation, to accept conveyances of real estate, and to receive mortgages. The Treasurer shall affix the Corporation seal to all documents which may require it.

(Amendment adopted at Annual Meeting, June 8th, 1898.)

That all conveyances of real estate and discharges of mortgages, signed by the President and Treasurer on behalf of the Society, up to this date be, and are, hereby ratified and confirmed.

ARTICLE XIII. - AMENDING THE CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, one day's notice having previously been given of the proposed amendment, in writing.

MEETING OF CORPORATION.

The annual meeting of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society was held in Bond St. Church, Toronto, at eleven o'clock on Wednesday morning, June 8th, with Mr Charles Cushing, B.C.L., in the chair.

Rev. F. J. Day, of Sherbrooke, was appointed minute Secretary.

Rev. Prof. Warriner offered prayer.

The Secretary, Rev. A. F. McGregor, read the annual report.

On motion of Mr. S. P. Leet and Rev. J. Wood, the report was received.

The report of the Treasurer, Mr. C. R. Black was read by the Chairman.

On motion of Mr. O'Hara the reports were adopted.

The following officers were nominated and elected:-

President, Mr. Chas. Cushing; Secretary, Rev. A. F. Mc-Gregor; Treasurer, Chas. R. Black.

The following motions, of which notice was given by Mr. C. R. Black at the last annual meeting were then read by the Chairman, and were carried, i. e.

(1) That Article XII. of the Constitution be changed to read as follows:

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"The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or any two of them, shall be the duly authorized persons on behalf of the Corporation to convey real estate and to discharge mortgages, and the Treasurer shall be the duly authorized person on behalf of the Corporation to accept conveyances of real estate and to receive mortgages.

The Treasurer shall affix the Corporation seal to all documents which may

require it."

(2) "That all conveyances of real estate and discharges of mortgages, signed by the President and Treasurer on behalf of the Society, up to this date be, and are, hereby ratified and confirmed."

The meeting then adjourned to meet again the following morning.

The adjourned meeting was held on Thursday morning January 9th. Student R. B. Blyth, gave an interesting account of the organization and work of the Students' Missionary Society of the Canada Congregational College.

It was then moved by Rev. W. F. Clarke, seconded by Rev. Thos. Hall, that the following be added as a rider to the resolution regarding the appointment of a Missionary Superintendent:

"Said officer must combine the suaviter in modo with the fortiter in re."

On motion of Mr. S. P. Leet it was resolved:

"That the Executive Committee be authorized to use the balance on hand, or so much as they may deem advisable for the purpose of employing a man, or men, to visit such of our churches as they may think desirable in the interests of the Society.

The meeting then adjourned.

FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANADA CONGREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

In presenting the Forty-fifth Annual Report of the Society, the Officers and Committees would most heartily express their gratitude to God for continued proofs of His blessing upon the work of another year. Forty-five years of fruitful service to individuals, to Churches, to communities, and to our beloved country is no small privilege for which to thank the ever blessed God.

By the help of this Society ministers and churches have been enabled to bear witness to the great facts of the spiritual world—the Being of God, the Redemption of Christ, the sacred seventh day rest, and the social influences of Christian brother-hood. It is an inspiration to reflect that week by week for all these forty-five years by the agency of this Society the Gospel call has been sounded forth from various stations in this broad land.

"Serve the Lord with gladness, come before His Presence with singing. Enter into His gates with thanksgiving and into His Courts with praise! Be thankful unto Him and bless His Name."

The past twelve months' work, though not marked by any great change, have yet been characterized by steady, patient successful labor on the part of our Missionary pastors and their helpers.

At the beginning of this year the Rev. A. W. Main, at the request of the Executive of this Society, and by the kind consent of his own Church in Danville, was enabled to conduct special services for weeks together in connection with our Churches in Fitch Bay, Melbourne, Stouffville, Hamilton (Immanuel), Coldsprings, and Kingston (Bethel). In each of these places there were gracious results following the evangelistic services, and were the evangelist only free to devote himself entirely to this work, his services could be profitably utilized in many places and throughout the whole year. The Executive

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devoted much earnest thought to the situation and its needs of the Church in Vancouver. It will be a cause of general gladness that, as the result of the co-operation of the Colonial Society and our own, the Vancouver Church property is saved to the Church and the Denomination, and a pastor found, the Rev. J. H. Bainton, whose record in England and his manifest abilities give every promise of large success in the work in Vancouver.

In this connection we have again to record our sense of obligation to Rev. A. J. Bailey, Missionary Superintendent for Washington, for efficient services generously rendered in visits to our churches in Victoria and Vancouver. It is by such practical evidences of good will and fellowship that our churches can make real and actual the contemplated grand Anglo-American Alliance. For this reason also we note with approval the efforts of the Congregational Club of Montreal, to cultivate a closer union with our American brethren. We remember with pleasure the inspiring visit at our annual meeting last year of Revs. W. G. Puddefoot, and A. K. Wray, and it gives us pleasure this year to welcome Rev. Dr. Fitch, of Buffalo, N. Y.

The Executive recognizing the special need of helpful oversight for our churches in the Maritime Provinces, appointed in October of last year the Rev. E. E. Braithwaite, B.D., to act as Hon. Miss. Supt. for the Maritime Provinces, and it affords us pleasure to say that Mr. Braithwaite accepted the appointment, and has by personal visits and correspondence done much to encourage and establish the work in those churches so remote from us here in distance though not in sympathy.

An important advance step has been taken in the formation of a Students' Home Missionary Society through the joint efforts of Rev. Dr. George and the Montreal members of our Board. This step means not only an addition to the funds for Home Mission work, but also the cultivation of a deeper interest on the part of the students in our Home Missionary fields, and an added sense of responsibility for the welfare of the Missionary churches.

Another encouraging feature is the wider observance by our pastors and churches of Home Missionary Sunday, the second Sunday in March. From information received, the day was all but universally observed, and may now be regarded as a regular and most important part of the programme of the year.

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It is not necessary in this report to give the figures which the Treasurer's report furnishes; it will suffice to mention here that the financial statement gives us new confidence and courage, showing as it does a balance on the right side amounting to \$1,000. As the value of that for which Congregationalism stands is more clearly and more generally perceived by the members of our churches there cannot but be better collections and more self-denial in giving.

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To this end it is worthy of notice and special commendation that efforts are being put forth in a number of our churches to interest our young people in the study of Congregational History and Principles. Whether by the stimulus of a banner as in the Western Association or by other means, we must encourage our young people to study in some regular and systematic way the rationale of Congregationalism. Trite as the truth is, it is too valuable to be lost sight of that if your churches are to live and make progress, all care must be taken to hold and to make loyal the rising youth of our homes. There need be no fear for the future of the C. C. M. S., if our young people intelligently identify themselves with its life and fortunes. Let us glance at the fields in which our forces are at work, contenting ourselves with glimpses only, recognizing the limitations of the time and space at our disposal.

Our funds have gone during the past year into thirty-one home fields, two of them in British Columbia, two in Manitoba, one in Alberta, thirteen in Ontario, seven in Quebec, five in

Nova Scotia and one in New Brunswick.

Visiting first of all the historic grounds of Nova Scotia, we note the earnest labors of Rev. J. W. Cox, in Noel and Lower gures which nention here fidence and side amountCongregaly perceived at be better

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Selma and Maitland, six having during the year made a profession of faith. Writing in December of last year, he remarks, since coming here, "we have bought two first-class organs for the Noel and Lower Selma Churches, and have paid for them on their arrival." Would that every church could say the same of their organ! In Noel "a week night service is held, to which nearly one hundred young people and children often come." A field like that is surely good Congregational soil. Perhaps the scarcest thing in Bro. Cox's field is money. Millionaires are not numerous, yet the people have raised more money for denominational purposes this year than last year.

Rev. Edwin Rose, in Truro, one of the best growing towns of Nova Scotia, reports the organization of a "Rescue Temperance Society," to save the worst drunkards. About five hundred men have taken the pledge, and, with few exceptions, are faithful to it. "Every Friday evening our little Church is over-crowded, not one-quarter of the members can get in." It is something to have a Congregational church over-crowded on a week evening every week. The plebiscite will be popular in at least one church in that community. It would, however, be strange if it were otherwise, when it is remembered that the present pastor and his predecessor, Rev. John Wood, are doughty champions of the cause of Temperance.

In his May report, Mr. Rose adds: "The building of the parsonage has made our sister churches think that we really have come to stay"; and "really" why should we not stay? It might be well in other places to set the doubts of our brethren to rest by building a parsonage. Besides settling doubts, it would settle the pastor—comfortably of course.

In Chebogue, Pastor D. W. Purdon, though last year incapacitated by ill-health for about seven months, is completely restored, and reports arrangements for celebrating the 130th year of the church's existence; it daughter, the Yarmouth church, attaining her jubilee this year. It is likely that the brethren of other denominations, in the case of those two churches, have resigned themselves to the conclusion that Congregationalism is really there to stay.

Rev. G. W. Ball, of LIVERPOOL, reports signs of genuine vitality and progress. Organizations holding together firmly. Extensive repairs and improvements made to the building; a

new organ, costing \$130, paid for. "We are out of debt." Good for the Liverpool church.

MILTON church, Rev. Abraham Brain, pastor, received past year, six on profession of faith, with a church membership roll of fifty.

We learn with great sadness, that Rev. Simeon Sykes, of Keswick Ridge, New Brunswick, has been dangerously ill, and feels that he cannot remain pastor very much longer. The field is one of considerable importance. An average congregation of 300.

QUEBEC, AYER'S FLAT—Rev. Churchill Moore says: "The services have been well sustained throughout the year. The Sunday School here and at Brighton kept at work every Sunday in the year. The Y. P. S. C. E. has made its influence felt in the place. Twelve have united with the church on profession of faith, one by letter."

Rev. R. G. Watt is at work in FITCH BAY, having taken up work immediately on his leaving Oberlin. Grave difficulties met our young friend on the threshold. Of the heads of families in the locality, half the total number never enter a church. A few days ago Mr. Watt wrote, saying: "We received a great spiritual uplift, through the special services held by Mr. Main. They did not result in many additions to the church roll, but the Spirit's power was felt in breaking down hard feelings which existed for a year or two." Larger collections have been made for the C. C. M. S., and Foreign work.

EATON—Rev. Robert Hay, Pastor. He reports an unusual number of old people who have been church-goers all their lives, but have never made any public profession of religion. Mr. Hay believes he has helped some to stand on the firm foundation. Old people who have not been churchgoers have been visited by him and have heard through him God's word of hope for all. Congregations are increasing.

Rev. Thomas Hall has continued his faithful labors in Melbourne and Ulverton and Danby, preaching four and five times a week, conducting prayer meetings and Bible classes. The congregations are improving, so are the Sunday Schools, and so are the finances. The debt in Melbourne

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was \$3,000 when Mr. Hall took charge. It has been reduced to \$1,650. A new driving shed has been built at Danby. There has also been an outlay on the parsonage. More spiritual results are earnestly desired, only a few in each place have confessed Christ during the year.

Franklin Centre has suffered through the removal to Brandon of Rev. J. L. Brown, the pastor. The church is being supplied for the summer by student A. B. Ross.

Montreal, Point St. Charles-Rev. D. S. Hamilton, B.A., pastor, believes that the work is steadily shaping in the right direction, there being a marked improvement in the spirit of the church. Nine names are before the church for reception on confession of faith, which, with five already received, will make the total additions almost equal to those of the two previous years. Mr. Hamilton adds: "Financial strength is not the only gauge by which to measure a church, and while we devoutly pray for a more rapid growth, there is a steady moral growth in strength and usefulness." The Sabbath School has been maintained in a very efficient state under the Superintendency of Mr. Cushing. Two hundred scholars on the roll, an average attendance of 140 to 145. The Junior C. E. S. meetings in the winter had an attendance of from 40 to 70; 400 pastoral visits were made. There is room for growth and expansion in a district with a population of about 13,000.

Westmount—Bethlehem church is also moving forward. Rev. Robert Hopkin reporting in December last, wrote: "During 1897, 31 members were added to the church roll, 22 by profession, 9 by letter,—making the total membership 83. We raised in the year, from all sources, about \$1,800. A floating debt of \$900, at the beginning of the year, has been, through special efforts, reduced to \$200. Blessings on the church that harpoons out of existence a floating debt. More than the Devilfish is it a foe to be dreaded. Too seldom, indeed, is it heroically assailed. Every organization," Mr. Hopkin says, "gives evidence of being in a flourishing condition." A church so favorably situated may well be expected to do with less and less missionary aid in the near future.

Ontario, Alton-Rev. George Extence, pastor, rejoices,

as also do his people, over the discharge of that doubtful modern improvement—a church mortgage. He writes: "When the church, about a year ago, was in a very low condition and unable to keep the interest on mortgage paid, or support a minister, the C. C. M. S. came to the rescue and helped to support a minister and pay off the mortgage." In May of this year he writes: "In another year we shall have rallied sufficiently to do without further aid from the Society. Our Endeavor Society is growing numerically and helps the church in many ways. The Sunday School is also improving."

Bowmanville, with Rev. John H. Barnett, pastor, has received 9 members into church fellowship on confession of faith. Sixty-three members on the roll, and 92 scholars.

Warwick, Ebenezer and Lake Shore.—Rev. E. C. W. MacColl, M.A., in his last report remarks on the fact of removals affecting those fields: "Even a marriage," he says, "may prove a calamity to a weak church, as in our case removing valuable members to other residences beyond our church bounds." Mr. MacColl must remember, however, that other fields besides his are afflicted in the same calamitous way. Whether it will deter any parties in Warwick and Lake shore from taking a step which will mean weakening and calamity to their mourning pastor is somewhat open to doubt! There are 40 members in Warwick and 27 at Lake Shore.

LISTOWEL.—Rev. Matthew Kelly, pastor. Here, also, the church has suffered much through sickness and removals. Yet the church is courageous. Pastor and people working very harmoniously. Mr. Kelly has given special attention to the country members with good results. Seven persons from that source having been received into church fellowship.

Hamilton, Immanuel.—Rev. W. H. Watson, in December last reported: "Though I resigned in view of difficulties which arose and for the sake of peace, the church would not accept my resignation and after reconsidering and seeking advice from above and around I decided to stay on. The Sabbath school keeps up." In May Mr. Watson reported fifteen members received for the year—ten by profession. Of those joining all were young people except four. Church attendance is on the increase and so is that of the school. The pastor thinks that

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December ties which accept my vice from the school of the

the present year will be the testing year. If the church, he says, "stands and goes ahead ever so little it will prosper." The Rev. A. W. Main labored with the church for several weeks and with appreciable good results, particularly among the young.

KINCARDINE.—Rev. John Maguire. In his first half yearly report the pastor writes: "Our average Sunday morning attendance is 125; evening, from 200 to 300. Sunday school attendance, 40; Y. P. S. C. E, 80 to 175. Repairs have been made to the church and parsonage. I find the people kindly and it is a pleasure to work with them." His May report states that recently he held special services and that some careless lives were turned to holy living. Four were received into communion and five more stand proposed. Attention has been paid to the better caretaking of the building. Whereby Mr. McGuire says: "The Ho se of God will be regularly kept clean if labor and love can make it so."

STRATFORD.—The pastor, Rev. G. T. Carr, reports: "During the year we have lost heavily in church, congregation and school through removals to the U. S. and North-west. Seven have joined the church. Among the additions the present Sec.-Treasurer of the church, an experienced journalist and a most efficient church officer. Sometimes I get a crowd at service, but here a crowd in church and a full collection plate do not go together." Seldom do they; the crowd have no special fondness for the collection plate.

Ottawa, Zion.—Rev. H. I. Horsey, pastor. Reporting May 7th, Mr. Horsey says: "We now have a church property worth about \$2,700 and a debt of \$1,300. On Easter day we had 15 unite with the church and 3 in May, making for the whole year 32. The members of the congregation are 93 adult, 163 children and 60 church members." For an unmarried young man to have 163 children in charge must surely be adequate occupation! The average attendance of the Sunday school is 129; 162 teachers and scholars. The prayer meeting, teachers' meeting, Ladies Association, Y. P. S. C. E. and Junior Society, Boys' Brigade—all are in good order and progressive.

OTTAWA, FIRST.—Rev. Wm. McIntosh, pastor. There are 153 members on the church roll, an average congregation of 150, a Sunday School of 100. The debt on the church is \$12,000.

WINGHAM.—Rev. Harry E. Mason, pastor, has uphill work, but enjoys the confidence of the church and the esteem of the community; sixty members on the church roll, forty-seven Sunday School scholars, an average congregation of seventy-five, which is an increase of 25 per cent. over that of the previous two years. A church debt of \$400.

Toronto, Broadview Ave.—Rev. J. P. Gerrie, B.A., in his report for the first six months wrote: "The annual meeting reports show that the regular income was in excess of that of 1896, but our current expenses have necessarily increased. There is a very considerable floating debt confronting us." Our Sunday evening congregations are particularly good. The Sunday School has grown very rapidly during the past few months, and has given an average of 225. The Junior C.E.S. meets before the morning service with an attendance of over 100. The Boy's Brigade has grown. A Girl's Club for sewing has been organized. The choir is better equipped than ever before. The pastor has charge of a Current Question Club, which is productive of great good. The term before Christmas brought to the meetings quite a number of men who do not attend any church. In closing the report Mr. Gerrie refers to the editorship of the Congregutionalist, which the Executive Committee of this Society along with many others desired him again to accept. His own church having given its consent, Mr. Gerrie, therefore is found in the editorial chair, and with decidedly general acceptance and satisfaction. In Mr. Gerrie's May report special stress is put on the work among young men. Some four are proposed for membership, and others likely to follow. Quite a number of young men now attend the week night prayer meeting.

Barrie.—Rev. Alex. Lennox, pastor. With a membership of 120, an average congregation of 100, and a Sunday School of 150, this church is doing good work in a thriving town of 6,000 people. Thirty were received last year on profession of faith. A debt of \$1,150 is being reduced at the rate of \$50 a year.

WETASKIWIN (ALBERTA).—Mr. Anton Andreason, Secretary of the church, under date of 2nd May reports: "We have not had a pastor since the first of October. We have tried in various ways but have not succeeded. Services are, however, regularly held in the church building, and also frequently in two or three

Secretary e have not in various , regularly o or three other places. There are several members who are able and are experienced in Home Missionary work, but their circumstances will not allow them to devote as much time as the work needs. The population of this place is steadily growing. The last pastorate was an unfortunate one, resulting in hindering rather than in helping the good work. Meantime there is much good seed continuously sown both by sermons and Sunday Schools."

Brandon, Manitoba.—Rev. J. L. Brown, pastor. Mr. Brown found things at a low ebb when he took charge last September. The congregations have considerably improved, though as he remarks: "There are still many empty pews. The prayer meeting has been well attended. The most hopeful feature is the Sunday School, average attendance between seventy and eighty, which is large considering the size of the congregation. Floating debt has been considerably reduced. The quarterly statement rendered at our last meeting showed a gain over the corresponding quarter of last year of \$2 a week. Our people are all poor, many of them struggling with private liabilities. (Many, many of the same brand outside of Brandon, Brother Brown!) A number of the leaders among the young people are inquiring whether there is enough difference between our church and the Presbyterian or Methodist to justify the existence of a small church. Of course, if the young people are "small" in their own eyes the difference is not enough. A course of historical studies might reveal to them, however, that the best of to-day is the product of small struggling bands that risked everything and spared nothing in order to be really free and true.

Vancouver, B. C.—Rev. J. H. Bainton, M.A., late of Ilkeston, England, the pastor elect, has recently come to take up the work in Vancouver. Thoroughly endorsed by the Colonial Society, and approved by all who have known him, there is little doubt that good times are again in store for the brave Vancouver friends. The Secretary of the church, Mr. Herbert O. Foster, in a communication dated May 26th writes: "I am instructed by the church to thank you for the prompt action taken by your society in arranging for the coming of Mr. Bainton."

VICTORIA.—Rev. P. C. L. Harris, pastor. The church is handicapped by its building. It is a building owned by a

Temperance Society, and not pleasantly located, nor in good condition. The members want to build on a suitable site. In the circumstances they are doing good work. Seven were received during the year on profession. There are forty-eight members now on the roll, and sixty Sunday School scholars. The financial strength of the church is very limited.

Winnipeg, Maple St.—Rev. D. H. Jacobs, pastor. The pastor writes: "The special difficulty which our church has to contend with is the migratory character of our congregation. No sooner is a man settled with us than his work takes him away. However a faithful few have done their very utmost to carry on the work, and though we have had no great increase to our strength during the last year good honest work has been done. Five new members added on profession of faith. Fifty church members on roll. Sunday morning congregation averages 80, evening 120. The Ladies' Aid have rendered substantial aid to the church.

This, then, completes our review of the work for the year. We have again to tender our cordial thanks to the Woman's Board for their valuable financial assistance. We have reason to hope for a deepening interest on the part of the ladies in the work carried on in our Canadian fields. With the eyes of the world turning toward Canada, and under the kindly watching of the friendly powers above, what can we do but go forward courageously and joyously to do the Will that is all good and the work divinely given us to finish?

For Year Ending May 31st, 1898.

The statements herewith presented for the current year show an improvement in general contributions to the extent of \$444.

By districts, the comparisons are as follows:-

It is encouraging to note the material increase from Ontario Central District, mainly from Bond Street Church, Toronto; and it is earnestly hoped that the interest thus evinced may become regular and permanent.

The Winnipeg subscriptions have not been received at this writing; hence the large decrease from Manitoba If those having charge of the subscriptions in the churches would kindly remember that in order to ensure acknowledgements in the report, the moneys should be in the Treasurer's hands not later than the 27th of May, disappointment in this respect would be avoided.

The average subscription according to church membership this year is $32\frac{1}{2}$ c. per head on the whole. For Quebec 67c., for Ontario 24c., and for Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and Manitoba 26c.

Can we not make the average fifty cents for next year? A number of our churches do not subscribe at all. Could not the District Associations take this up, and bring Christian brotherly pressure to bear on the delinquent churches, so that every church of our faith and order in the Dominion should be brought into line?

The Society has again to thank the ladies of the C.C.W.B. M. for their generous donation of \$600. Including this amount, the free contributions for the year amount to \$3,908, as against

\$3,464 for 1897.

Grants paid for the twelve months ending 1st March, have been \$6443; against \$6,061 for the previous twelve months; and the General Mission Fund commences the coming year with a credit balance of \$805.

This is the third year in succession, with a balance on the

right side.

Might I suggest that this balance be put aside and used towards the support of a Missionary Superintendent, and that the Executive Committee be empowered to engage the services of such superintendent, so soon as, in their judgment, the right man can be found?

The Executors of the late Mrs. John Leeming, of Montreal, have paid to the Society during the year, the sum of \$500, bequeathed by her, to be paid on the expiration of a life-rent. Mrs. Leeming during her life-time, was a very warm friend to the Society.

This sum has been placed to the credit of the Church Ex-

tension and Building Fund, Revenue Account.

The Books have been thoroughly audited and the entries compared with the vouchers by the Society's auditors, Messrs. Murphy and Hanna; to whom the best thanks of the Society are due.

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Society.

CONSTITUTION.

I.-NAME.

This Corporation shall be called THE CANADA CONGREGATIONAL FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

II. - OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to spread the knowledge of the Gospel among the heathen and other unenlightened people.

III. -- MEMBERSHIP.

The members of this Society shall be persons subscribing \$2 annually, ministers of all contributing churches, one other representative from each church contributing \$10 annually, and two representatives from each church contributing \$50, or over, annually. Every benefactor making a donation of \$40 at one time shall be a life member.

IV. -OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Board of Directors, to be elected at the annual meeting of the Society.

V. - MEETINGS.

An annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the Thursday following the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec assembles.

VI.—AMENDMENTS.

This constitution can be amended by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, notice of the proposed alteration having been given in two successive numbers of the "Canadian Independent."*

BY-LAWS.

I.-FUNDS.

All funds arising from donations, legacies, subscriptions or otherwise, shall be lodged by the Treasurer, as soon as collected, with some chartered bank, to be named by the Executive Committee. Money can be drawn from such accounts only by cheques, signed by the Secretary and Treasurer, but the President or Vice President may sign for either in their absence.

II. -MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Directors shall consist of not more than twenty-five members of the Society, including the officers, and shall be elected at the annual meeting, who shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society. Immediately after their election they shall appoint an Executive Committee, and such other committees as they shall deem expedient for the interests of the Society. The Executive Committee shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between the meetings of that Board, and shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and six other members. together with two members of the Woman's Board, to be appointed by that Board, and who are members of this Society.

III. - MEETINGS

The Board of Directors shall meet at least once during the year, immediately before the annual meeting of the Society, at the call of the Secretary, to prepare reports, and a list of officers and committees to be nominated at the annual meeting, as well as to transact any other business connected with the interests of the Society.

IV.—PRESENTATION TO CHURCHES.

The work of the Society shall be presented, and a Foreign Missionary sermon preached, in each of the churches of the constituency at least once in each year. The Executive Committee shall see that news from the Society's work is distributed to the churches, and one per cent. of the annual income shall be available for that purpose.

V .- DONATIONS FOR SPECIAL WORK.

When money is donated for missionary work outside the Society's missions, it may be forwarded to societies working in that field.

VI. -- AMENDMENTS.

These By-laws may be altered in the same manner as the Constitution.

FORM OF BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath to the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, incorporated by Act of the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, A.D. 1889, the sum of out of my estate, to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, without charge or deduction whatever. And I direct that the receipt of the Treasurer and Secretary for the time of the Society, shall constitute and be a sufficient discharge of said legacy.

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ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CANADA CONGREGATIONAL FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

TORONTO, THURSDAY, June 9, 1898.

The President, Rev. T. B. Hyde, took the chair, and called the meeting to order.

Rev. W. H. Watson was elected as Minute Secretary.

After prayer by Mr. S. P. Leet, the meeting was adjourned to give place to the annual meeting of the College Corporation, since Dr. George, the new Principal, was obliged to leave early.

FRIDAY, June 10.

The President took the chair, and the minutes were read and approved. The Treasurer's report was presented, and on motion was adopted. The report of the Secretary was read in his absence, by the Minute Secretary, who moved that it be adopted, and it was carried. It was further voted that the Secretary's report, when prepared, should be printed and circulated.

The President made a few statements in regard to the condition of the field in West Central Africa. He spoke, further, of the Prayer-Union; mention was made of the difficulty of the wording in the Prayer card, and the suggestion to drop the two words, "Each Day," from it was adopted.

It was Resolved,—"That we accept the offer of the First Church Sabbath School, Hamilton, to have a share in conveying the mill and power frame inland to Chisamba."

Resolved,—"That the C. C. F. M. S. accept the generous offer of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Yeigh, to give a 'Maple Leaf' mill to the Chisamba station, and that we thank them heartily for this gift, that promises so much helpfulness to our work there."

Resolved,—"That we accept, also, the generous gift of the Gleaners," of Georgetown, through Mrs. J. R. Barber, to provide

the horse-power necessary to run the mill, and that we thank them also in our own name and in the name of the missionaries.

"We commend the purchase of the 8 horse-power, mounted, of the Sawyer-Massey Co., to cost \$140."

It was moved and carried,—"That we send an Annual Message to the churches, containing the facts presented to this meeting; as also anything else of interest the Secretary may deem advisable."

Moved by S. P. Leet, Esq., and seconded by Mr. G. Pim,—
"That we extend to our Chairman hearty thanks for his labor
of love in going out to our churches and exerting himself in the
interests of our Mission Field." Carried.

Moved by Rev. W. H. Warriner, and seconded by Rev. J. T. Daley, and carried enthusiastically, — "That our President convey to Rev. W. T. Currie and his co-workers in Chisamba, the greetings of this Society; and assuring them of our hearty support."

Moved by Mr. Thomas Bale, and seconded by Mr. William Shamcross,—"That we present to our Secretary, Rev. E. M. Hill, and to our Treasurer, Rev. W. T. Gunn, a hearty vote of thanks for their efficient handling of the funds of the Society." Carried.

Also,—"That the Minute Secretary convey the greetings and congratulations of this Society to the Secretary, the Rev. E. M. Hill, on this the occasion of his* taking the often proffered advice of his brethren; thus evidencing growth in grace and fellowship."

Mrs. Thomas Moodie and Mrs. W. H. Watson conveyed the greetings of the Woman's Board, and outlined briefly the work for the current year.

Rev. Hilton Pedley, of Japan—returned missionary—addressed the meeting on "The Religious Conditions of Japan"; tracing Shintooism, Buddhism and Confucianism, their influence on the minds of the people, and the relation of Christianity to these things.

The election of officers resulted in the list as found on the first page of this report.

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It was ordered that the President employ all requisite clerical help in type-writing, and charge same to general account.

With regard to a mechanic who shall go out to the field for training purposes, this was left in the hands of the President to find out and interview the suitable man.

The meeting was brought to a close by prayer, in which the following took part: Revs. J. McKillican, M. S. Grey, T. B. Hyde, and Mr. G. Pim.

Adjourned till 1899.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Secretary craves the indulgence of the Society in giving a less full report than usual. A bountiful Providence has crowded his life of late with duties of a different character that have made it well nigh impossible to meet the expectation of claimants on his time.

Always the best part of a year's work in this Society is to stand by our missionaries at the front, with constant and effectual prayer and financial support. Our churches have done this. During the week of Prayer at the beginning of the year, especial prayer was offered; and we have constantly heard how the missionaries have felt the sustaining hand of God; they have been given the power of the Holy Spirit, and have been preserved in a good measure of health.

To develop the spirit of prayer and secure its continued offering, the Executive Committee organized a Prayer Union. A beautiful card was prepared for the members to sign and retain as a reminder. To cover the added expense, a membership fee of fifteen cents was charged. Nearly a hundred have joined already, and we would like to enroll all the constituency of the Society.

We have not ceased to regret that Dr. R. O. Ross found circumstances that prevented his going as our medical missionary to recruit the Chisamba field. The call for another man has been out all the year, without definite results. One man offered, but afterwards withdrew, because he felt that he could

not work in harmony with us. We are still very anxious to secure the right man.

The funds for the Ella F. M. Williams' Memorial Hospital, have been accumulating in the treasury of the Woman's Board,

and the building is probably under way.

The Executive has been dealing with the question of the power and mill asked for by Mr. Currie. We have been hindered by failure to get a reply to definite questions sent to Africa. We fear the letter was lost. But some individuals and churches in the west have made generous offers of equipment, and it seems best to accept them without waiting longer.

The Treasurer's report will be laid before you, and this report will not anticipate it. But the constituency will bear in mind that for this year the expenses have been less than they probably ever will be again. We are called upon for new outlays in sending out a medical missionary, which is a great draft on the Treasury; and we shall be sending out new equipments.

The President has given considerable time to lecturing among the churches about our field, showing stereoptican pictures of it. It has done much good, and the Secretary wishes to record his gratitude for the energetic way the new President

has entered into the opportunities of the office.

It is unfortunate that the annual meeting of the group of stations in Africa is so late that its report cannot reach us before the Union meetings. For the last two years the Executive has thought it best to publish that report and circulate it among the churches. Does the Society consider that a wise method?

The schools and the church in Chisamba have been doing steady work. Some have been added to the church, and the expansion work has also been going on with much interest, maintained by the native Christians themselves. Chisamba not only is a mission, but is doing missionary work.

Further matters of information must be left to be given by the President and Treasurer.

During the year just ended we have paid off our debt to the American Board, and have on hand enough to pay almost all the expenses of the station up to date. In this way we are financially a great deal better off than in former years; yet this is a matter of regret, for though in part due to increased liberality on the part of the churches, it is largely due to the fact that we have

been supporting on y one missionary family instead of two. We hope soon to find one missionary physician and mechanic so that

again we will have to try hard to keep ends meeting.

During the year the giving by Provinces has shown a decrease in all save the Northwest. This has largely been due to the absence of the special Indian and Armenian funds of last year, though over a hundred dollars represents decrease in regular gifts. The total would have been much smaller than last year, had it not been for a legacy of four hundred dollars left us by the late George James, of London, Ontario. The expenses of the station during the year were less than a thousand dollars. The amount sent for the Industrial School is larger than last year. The Canadian Alcove Fund has grown but slowly to nearly fifty dollars. The Gristmill Fund has increased to one hundred and eight dollars; and it is with pleasure that we report the gift of a suitable mill by Mr. Yeigh of Brantford, with the gift of a horsepower by the "Gleaners" of Mrs. Barber's class in Georgetown; and the promise of part at least of the freight by the Hamilton First Sunday School.

During the year we have spent over a hundred dollars for printing; but of this amount the membership of the Prayer

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Union has already paid that part of the expense; and we feel that the expense in printing our unusually full annual message and *Congregationalist* number will be more than repaid by the interest created.

At present we are hoping and praying for the missionary doctor and mechanic. They cannot now go out until the early spring of next year, but we want to be forehanded and prepare the large amount necessary for outfit and travelling expenses, so that it may be on hand when needed.

We want also more for our Canadian Alcove in the Marash library; more books of the right kind if you have them, more money to get others! In asking for so much, we do so without fear, for there is not more than one church in all our denomination that has not among its members, individuals that could give the whole amount of their church's present gifts to this cause; individuals that ought to do that much at least, and would do more if they did what Jesus would do in their place. "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Yes! but at present we miss a great many, and they miss—Him!

FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONGREGA-TIONAL PROVIDENT FUND SOCIETY.



Report of the Society, have to report the usual steady increase in the accumulated funds, with no special features to report. At the last Union meetings in Kingston we lost the usual Communion Service Collection. Through a misunderstanding it was not taken up.

In the Widows' and Orphans' Branch we have the same annuitants with the exception of Mrs. Peacock's child, who reached the age limit last quarter day, and we have had no applicants as beneficiaries.

Last year 14 churches contributed \$69.95 to this Branch. This year 10 churches have contributed \$71.59.

The surplus this year is \$783.16 to be added to capital account.

As this is the year for revising the annuities, your Directors would ask authority to increase the amounts paid widows, if on consulting an Insurance Actuary it is considered wise to do so.

In the Retiring Ministers' Branch we have had one more annuitant this year than last, and the Rev. S. Sykes, of Keswick Ridge, who is now seventy years of age, has applied to be put on the list of annuitants, and his request has been agreed to, to date from 1st of August next. Rev. Mr. Scholfield whose application to be received as a beneficiary last year was accepted, has been confirmed by the Directors.

Last year 13 churches contributed \$59.36. This year 13 churches contributed \$80.65.

There is a surplus this year of \$379.29 to carry to Capital account, but \$189 of this is arrears of interest due during the previous year and a half.

With the addition of Rev. Mr. Sykes to the Annuitants there will be very little surplus at the end of the year. Consequently we cannot ask to increase the R. M. B. annuities, but would recommend the churches to consider the advisability of devoting more and increased subscriptions to this Branch than

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The Society delegate

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they have done in the past, and we would again remind you that all undersignated subscriptions are divided between the two Branches.

We would also advise that a circular setting forth the objects and needs of the Society, with envelopes, be sent all the churches asking for a general collection in December, not merely a communion collection as in the past.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Board was held in the Congregational Church, Paris, June 2nd and 3rd, 1898. A large number of delegates were in attendance, the papers read were bright and helpful, the discussions animated, the devotional hours uplifting; and the kindness of the Paris pastor and people was unparalleled.

The Convention had for its Missionary speaker Mrs. W. P. Knight, a returned missionary from China. Her address on Thursday evening on the work in her station, under the heads of. (1) "Evangelistic Work," (2) "Itinerating Work," (3) "Medical Work," and (4) Work for Women," was most interesting and practical. Miss Bertha Cassidy, a young lady who is qualifying for medical work in China, interested the young people of the Convention by her talk on missionary work.

The papers read were as follows:—

"What Congregationalism has done in missionary work," two papers; "The work of the London Missionary Society," by Miss Silcox; and "The work of the American Board," by Miss Blake. "Flash-light photos of Home Mission Churches," four papers, by Mrs. Jones, Miss Rawlings, Miss Barlow and Mrs. McLeod. "The Leper Mission," by Mrs. Ross; "The Delegates' return," an echo of the Cleveland Student Volunteer Convention, by Miss Macallum; "Building a program," by Mrs. Nasmith; "Giving," by Mrs. Mills; "How to obtain a missionary library," by Mrs. Bolton; and, "How to use the Monthly Leaflet," by Mrs. Hugh Pedley.

Short biographical sketches of our missionaries were also given. Through the kindness of Rev. E. D. Silcox, the pastor

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of the Paris Church, the Convention was photographed in a body.

The work of the Board will continue as during last year viz.:--

- 1. The support of the Misses Melville, including a share of the station expenses.
 - 2. The scholarship in Miss Macallum's school for "Galene."
- 3. The contribution of \$600 to the C.C.M.S., and of \$15 to the Congregationalist.
 - 4. The continuance of the Monthly Leaflet.

In addition, resolutions were adopted, (1) appointing a committee to enquire into the possibilities of work in the Klondike; and (2) urging upon the women of the Board, especially in rural districts, the necessity of themselves keeping up Church services by reading sermons or conducting Bible readings, when there is no settled pastor or appointed leader.

Invitations for the meeting of 1899 were received from Winnipeg, Embro and Ottawa; that from Ottawa was accepted.
