'One will find that taffy is better if made in an old fashioned iron or steel skillet than in porcelain, as there is less danger of scorching. Taffy should boil rapidly. In testing use very cold water, dip a teaspoonful from the center, but do not stir the boiling taffy or it will turn to sugar. Have buttered plates to pour the taffy into and grease the hands with butter to handle it. The best pulled taffy turns chalky if kept a few days and is then very delicious if rolled in unsweetened choco-






