Adventures of Nicholas Eramus de Sav

Nicholas Erasmus De Savine, the Nicholas Elashus who once came close occupying the Bulgarian throne, altough stil la young man, has had hany thrilling adventures.

many thrilling adventures.

Savine was born in Moscow less than forty years ago. His mother was Countess of Toulouse Lautrec, one of the oldest and most distinguished families of France, and his father was Genoral France, Savine of the Rusfamilies of France, and his father was General Erasmus Savine, of the Russian army. While still a youth Savine entered the army and was made a lieutenant in the imperial horse guards. When the Russo-Turkish war broke out he went to the front and was in several of the hottest engagements. A big scarred cavity in his left arm shows, where the grapeshot tore through the flesh, taking a piece with it. At the battle of Plevna Savine received wounds that almost cost him his lift. When he recovered the war was over. For heroic conduct on the field the young lieutenant received five medals from Alexander II. For the Bulgarian escapade and suspected sympathy with the nihilists he was stripped of these medals, imprisoned for a year and a half, and then sent to Siberia for five

After recovering from the wounds re-ceived at Plevna he resigned his comceived at Pievna he resigned his com-mission in the army and went for a short time to his handsome estate near Warsaw, Poland, which he still owns. He had been there only a few months when he began a pleasure trip over Europe that lasted seven years. He had an enormous fortune and he poured out money like water. He be-

While Savine was away from his country on his jaunt Russian authorities began to suspect him of sympathy with the nihilists on account of his well-known friendship for several prominent members of that revolutionary narty. The Russian officials finally de-termined to arrest him and bring him home for examination. Detectives were sent from St. Petersburg and in a short time they located their man in Paris. The count was taken unawares and was arrested without a struggle. He says he was guilty of no offense what-ever and resolved that his captors chould not take him far. He escaped ever and resolved that his captors should not take him far. He escaped from his captors no fewer than three limes, and after thrilling adventures, once jumping out of a car while running through a tunnel, Savine finally made his way to Vienna, and there heard of the dethronement of Princs Alexander of Bulgarfa, which had just taken place. It struck him that, in the disordered state of affairs there he might find an opportunity of some kird to simprove his financial condition, which by this time was sadly in need of repair. The prodigal way in which he had spent money in search of pleasto improve his financial condition, which by this time was sadly in need of repair. The prodigal way in which he had spent money in search of pleasure, his losses at the gaming table, and his many flights from officers had reduced him to dire straights. Before starting for Bulgaria he went to Venice to see his old friend Don Carlos for assistance he was accommodated with a loan of 25,000 francs. Then he departed for Bulgaria. Meanwhile he dropped his Russian name, Savine, and was known as Count Toulouse Lautree. Shortly after arriving in Bulgaria he met the great General Stambuloff, then Premier of the Province. Savine had the cool assurance to propose to the Premier that he, Savine, should see what could be done toward negotiating a loan for Bulgaria. Stambuloff proposed that as the "count" was of a family of most noble and ancient lineage he should become a pretender to the throne, and, if the Sultan consented, assume the royal crown. The "count" consented, royal crown. The "count" consented, with the thought, he says, that if he did

if the Sultan consented, assume the royal crown. The "count" consented, with the thought, he says, that if he did step into royal robes he would turn Bulgaria over to Russias. Stambuloft made the proposition with the understanding that he would be king only in name, and that the real power would be furnished from behind the throne. Savine at once set off for Constantinople to consult the Sultan and see if he would give his consent to the scheme. The Sultan was only too glad of an opportunity to settle Rulgarian affairs, and he readily assented to the proposition. Plans were progressing nicely when a most trivial incident stopped this great project of manufacturing a toy king for Bulgaria. One night Savine went out to be shaved, and entering a shop where a sign was out he was confronted by a barber from St. Petersburg. He saw nothing but a plain, every-day barber before him. Hedoesn't even know now that he ever saw the man before. But the barber recognized Savine in an instant. He said nothing, but took off the "count" is beard. The next day it was all over Constantinopie that Savine, for whom Russia was scouring Europe, was in the city. Savine was arrested and hurried off to Russia under close guard, so close indeed that he could not repeat the tricks that had previously helped him to escape. After being kept in prison eighteen months he was relieved of his war medals and sent to live in Siberia for five years.

THE SAILORS' FRIEND SOME FREAK RIVERS.

PLIMSOLL WHO ALWAYS TRIED TO NATURE'S CHEMISTRY TURNS ONE HELP THE SEAFARING MAN. RIVER INTO WINTRY FLUID.

Man of Several Occupations but Pos-sessed of One Idea Through Life, and Through Which Fame and Honorwas

Showered Upon film. Samuel Pimsoll, who is now seriously ill in London, has spent most of his life-in trying to help the seafaring man. For many years he has been called the sallors' friend. He is the fourth son of Thomas and Priscilla Pilmsoll, and was born at Eristol in 1824. When he was but a small child he removed with his parents to Pentith and it was here he was given his he removed with his parents to Penrith, and it was here he was given his early education by the curate of the parish. He was later sent to Sheffield to attend a private school at that place. He started out in life as a clerk in a solicitor's office, then tried clerking in a brewery and was promoted to the position of manager. In that capacity he remained until 1853, when he went to London and opened a business for himself. He successfully coptested Derby in the Liberal interest in 1868 and sat for that town in 1880, when he gave up his seat to Sir William Vernon Harcourt. This was an



act of great unselfishness on the part of the man. He had gone into Parliament for the express purpose of helping the sallors and gave up his seat from the same motive. He was convinced that a Cabinet Minister would be able to render better service to the cause of the sallors than a private member, and hence made way for Harcourt. His career in Parliament was useful, and he was instrumental in 'passing Acts for the amendment of the shipping laws in 1871, 1873, 1875 and 1876. In 1877 Mr. Plimsoil published "Our Seamen," and since then wrote and published a sequel to it.
