A Good Roads Association has been formed in New Brunswick. Nova Scotia should move in the same line.

The town presents quite a gay appearance in the evenings now. There are a lot of tourists here, and those who are not bicycling are strolling about in animated groups. Such unadvised gaiety is infectious, and gives the whole town a livelier aspect.

The Grand Lodge, I. O. G. T., held their annual session this year in the charming town of Baddeck, C. B. Reports of officers received, show 184 lodges, and 49 temples, with a total membership of 8859, an increase of 460 in the adult branch. Number of lodges put up during the year, 56. The revenues from all sources is over \$2,300. Grand Lodge is clear of debt, with a balance in the treasury.

The last regular meeting of the W. C. T. U. was held in the interest of mothers. Quite a number of women other than white-ribbons were present. It was presided over by Mrs. Homeon, the faithful and efficient superintendent of this department of work, whose genial manner, motherly presence, and intelligent enthusiasm have done much to make these occasions an inspiration to those who attend. Her opening remarks were suggested by the 1st chapter of 2nd Timothy, and dwelt on the far-reaching influence of Christian motherhood. After several offerings of prayer, Mrs. Trotter addressed the meeting, choosing for her subject, The Law of Heredity, pre-natal influence and allied truths. Her remarks were clear, forcible and practical in their bearing, and could not fail to impress every thoughtful mother with a clearer conception of the high honor and privilege conferred upon her in being chosen a co-partner with God in the fashioning of an immortal soul.

Mrs. Tuffs then offered a few suggestions relative to the rights of children, dwelling especially on their right to receive from the mother the teaching of truth pure and simple concerning the origin of life.

After the closing of the meeting, refreshments were served and an opportunity given for social converse and discussion.

The Foresters' Excursion.

The excursion to Partridge Island tomorrow, under the auspices of Court Blomidon, I. O. F., promises to be a most pleasant one. The steamer Hensatha has been engaged for the occasion, and she will leave the wharf at Hortonville (Horton Landing) on the arrival of the early morning train from Middleton, returning in time to make connection with the train in the evening. Every precaution is being made to insure a good time for all who attend. The Wolfville band, which was reorganized last Friday evening, will accompany the excursion and furnish a good programme of music. Refreshments will be furnished on board and a competent committee will see to it that there is no disorder on the steamer. The sail will be a beautiful one, the steamer passing near old Blomidon thus giving an excellent opportunity for a close inspection of points of interest. Excursionists may spend the day at Partridge Island from whose lofty summit most beautiful views may be obtained, or can take a team and after a pleasant drive of two miles visit the pretty town of Parraboro, where a baseball match is to be played between teams from Wolfville and Springhill. The steamer will leave Hantsport in the morning and those who wish to go from that place may go on board there. She will also call at Kingsport going and returning to accommodate those who wish to go from that place. The steamer tickets will be 75 cents each at either Hantsport, Hortonville or Kingsport, while railway tickets at all stations will be issued at one fare good to return at night.

Literary Notes.

McClure's Magazine for August will be a special Midsummer fiction number, with a complete novelette (a story of England and India) by Rudyard Kipling, chapters of a novel by Robert Louis Stevenson, and short stories by A. 

Flower Mission in Chicago.

Now that the cold weather is over and the beautiful spring is here one's thoughts naturally turn to the renewal of life in the world. Every tree, shrub and plant is trying to tell us in its own sweet way that summer is here and that we must rejoice. We, who are able to see and enjoy all these beauties in the country, or even in the outlying districts of the great cities, must not forget that there are thousands of poor souls lying on beds of pain in the hospitals, or in their own wretched homes, longing for some of the brightness that is ours.

Perhaps some of the readers of the Union Signal would like to know just what is done with the baskets and boxes of flowers that are sent to the flower mission in Chicago for distribution during the summer months. The flowers begin to come in May. Though the great blossoms are so fragile they are really the sweetest of all to the sick person as they breathe the fragrance of the cool woods and hillsides.

There was hardly a day last summer that passed without bringing at least one basketful, and sometimes there would be a dozen. After these flowers are made into bouquets and cards of Scripture attached, they are put into baskets and left by different young ladies at the hospitals on their way home.

Sometimes two baskets of loose flowers are taken to the large department stores and distributed to the "cash" boys and girls. It makes one's heart ache to see the eagerness with which each blossom is begged for and carefully treasured to take home to some less fortunate member of the family. In all, over three thousand bunches of flowers were distributed last summer by the flower mission of Chicago. They came from all around the city. A friend in Evansville sent us, from time to time, quantities of sweet peas, which are always so acceptable to the sick because of their fragrance and fresh, bright colors. The unions in towns near by, too, have been very kind, those of North Belvidere, Earlville, La Grange, Malden, Polo, in Illinois, and Sharon, in Wisconsin, should be mentioned as among our most faithful co-workers. Ravenswood, too, has sent many a dewy basket full of the most acceptable flowers—pansies, sweet peas and nasturtiums. Now that Flower Mission day is so near we hope that flowers will begin to come to the mission in great quantities. They are more than welcome, and will be distributed just as quickly as possible to the places where we think they will do the most good.

The Population of the World.

Though the total population of the world is now put down at 1,500 millions we have to bear in mind that it is to some extent founded on rough estimates. Some would doubt whether the number of heathen is really so large as it is sometimes thought to be, or that the pagan population increases at the rate supposed to be the case. The estimates for China differ somewhat widely; while famines, epidemics, civil war, infanticide, etc., occasion great mortality. The probable population of the world has for long been a subject of debate. In the last century Voltaire thought that 1,600 millions was not an excessive estimate, but Volney fifty years later, would not allow that there were more than 437 millions. Then, in the early years of Queen Victoria's reign, Berghaus calculated the total at 1,273 millions, but his contemporary, Balbi, made it no more than 739 millions.
