Another Win For Acadia

LOCAL COLLEGIANS DEFEAT WINDSOR 6 TO 2.

The Windsor hockey team, which a few weeks ago defeated the Wolfville boys in Evangeline Rink, again journeyed to Wolfville on Tuesday evening, this time to play the crack Acadia team. However, they did not again return home with a victory, the college team defeating them by the score of six goals to two. On account of the ice being heavy fast play was impossible, however the game was clean and closely contested. Harry Fraser refereed to the satisfaction of all.

During the first period the play was rather slow and the visitors kept the puck in Acadia's territory the greater part of the time. However, they were unable to break through Acadia's defence. Steeves, the local goalie, was always on the job and stopped some hard shots. Throughout the whole game he played remarkably well. Soon after the period opened Beardsley scored for the home team. Tingley scored a few minutes later and just before the period ended Acadia again scored from a mix-up in front of the goal, making the score 3 to 0 in Acadia's favor.

The play was fast in the second period. Windsor came on the ice determined to overcome Acadia's lead. The play was kept in the collegians' territory and after a few minutes play J. MacDonald scored Windsor's first goal. The first goal of the period the play into the visitors' territory but were unable to score. Windsor got away with the puck and McKenna scored their second and final goal. During the remainder of the period the play was mostly in Windsor's territory. The score now stood 3 to 2 in Acadia's favor.

In the final period the play was fast both teams striving hard to score. Finally about the middle of the period Beardsley added another to Acadia's score, and he was followed in quick succession by Rogers and Tingley. During the last few minutes the visitors tried in vain to score and the game ended 6 to 2 in favor of the home team.

Important Meeting of Life Insurance Men

At a largely attended meeting of the Life Insurance men from Hants, Kings and Annapolis counties at Kentville on Tuesday, March 9th, there was inaugurated a movement in the forming of a local branch of the Life Underwriters Association which should tend to place this business in a position to give better service to the public of the Annapolis Valley than ever before.

The Life Underwriters Association is an association of Life Insurance men formed with the sole idea of bettering conditions in the field. It is within the memory of many men when the conditions under which this universal commodity was sold was such that to be known as a Life Insurance Man was almost a reproach. The greatly improved conditions and the high standing of the business today in the public estimation is in a very large measure due to the efforts of this association both in improving the class of men who were selling insurance and in improving the conditions under which they worked.

The Life Insurance Men have come to realize that they have a definite duty to perform in supplying to the public a sufficient amount of this most essential protection. When we realize that the Life Insurance Companies on this continent are paying out in death claims to Widows and Orphans over \$3,000,000.00 per day and that in the past 35 years the Insurance business has decreased pauperism in the United States by 33 1-3 per cent we get some idea of the magnitude of the business and of the great service the Life Insurance Companies through their agents are able to render this country.

The Life Underwriters Association has certain definite ideals before it. Among the chief of these are the education of the salesman so that he can better advise as to the plan of insurance which is best suited to the individual need of his client and thus give better service to the insuring public. The Association also stands for clean methods of business, making the interests of the client and agent alike, and such practices as twisting policies, misrepresentation of policies or rebating of commissions are directly against the ethics of the association.

There is no doubt that the formation of such an Association in the Annapolis Valley is a step in the right direction and will enable the insurance men in this district to give even better service to the public than it has in the past. Mr. G. H. Oakes, of the Great West Life, Kentville is Secretary of the Association and any of the insurance men in this district who were not able to attend the opening meeting but wish to affiliate themselves with the movement are requested to communicate with him.

New Hockey Trophy Donated

When the St. Francis Xavier hockey team won the intercollegiate championship a few weeks ago they won the Brown trophy for keeps. It was therefore necessary to secure a new trophy for next year. Last week the manager of the Halifax Herald and Mail announced that his papers would donate a handsome trophy for next year's competition, the trophy to be competed for under the same conditions as that of the Brown cup.

Annapolis Valley Flooded

GREAT DAMAGE DONE BY RIVERS OVERFLOWING BANKS

The heavy rains and resulting thaw of Friday and Saturday caused floods in various parts of the province which occasioned considerable damage.

The part that suffered most was the Annapolis Valley. The Annapolis River, swollen to capacity, carried away bridges and overflowed its banks. People were forced from their homes by the water which flooded their houses, and drowned cattle and horses in the barns. Old inhabitants say that the Valley has never before experienced such a flood.

The worst section of the flood in the Valley was between Bridgetown and Middleton. At Bridgetown the streets were flooded all day Sunday but the water subsided Monday. Early Monday morning the raging water tore away the Bridgetown traffic bridge, carrying with it all the wires, cables and water mains. The railway bridge was also rendered unsafe so that there was no communication between the two sections of the town. The water attained its greatest height at East Bridgetown, where the flood reached almost to the top of the telegraph poles.

Highway bridges at Lawrence town and Bear River were carried away. The lighting poles at Bridgetown, Lawrence town and Annapolis were put out of business. The electric power at Lequere, which formerly supplied Annapolis with light, was seriously damaged and part of the dam carried away. It will probably be a month before Annapolis again has electric power.

At Kentville the Cornwallis River overflowed its banks and flooded the cellars in the lower part of the town. Two miles of track on the Cornwallis Valley Railway were washed out, and the bridge leading out of Kentville was only held in place by putting a shunting engine on it. The traffic bridge across the Cornwallis River at Kentville was so badly damaged as to render it unsafe to use.

The floods did considerable damage to the roadbed of the D. A. R. the tracks in some places being several feet under water. Monday's train from Halifax was unable to get any further west than Port Williams, and the western part of the Valley was cut off from the rest of the province. On Tuesday the train was still unable to get west of Port Williams, but a train was run between Middleton and Kentville and the passengers transferred. Trains are now running as usual between Halifax and Middleton, but west of that place traffic is still interrupted.

Hon. Samuel Walter Willett Pickup, member of the Legislative Council, ex-member of the Federal Parliament, and for thirty-five years prominent in the political life of Annapolis County, died at his residence at Gravelle Ferry, Tuesday evening after a brief illness. His death was unexpected. Mr. Pickup was present at the opening of the Legislature, and returned to his home in Gravelle Ferry on Saturday morning. He had not been in good health for some time, but there was no indication that his condition was serious. He became ill on Monday night and passed away at 4.30 Tuesday afternoon.

Civic Club Meeting

An interesting meeting of the Civic Club took place last Friday evening in the Town Hall. Dr. Elliot was in the chair. The matter of the proposed memorials with bronze tablets in commemoration of our fallen heroes, to be erected on the Post Office grounds, was first discussed and details argued upon.

The report of the Social Survey of the town made by Miss MacIntosh and her pupils, was read by Dr. Wheelock. It was shown that out of 1,537 persons canvassed 96 had left school before 16 years of age. Several suggestions were made, viz—that a regular physical and mental examination of school children be made, that a welfare committee look after the poor, industrial conditions, and that trained play ground directors be appointed.

The School Committee in their report suggested that the teachers' salaries be substantially increased, that a play-ground equipment be procured and that a medical and dental inspection take place annually.

Dr. Elliot next brought up the matter of reviving the Board of Trade and considerable discussion ensued, resulting in the appointment of a committee to consider merging the Civic Club and Board of Trade.

The Montreal Gazette reports that the sugar situation is quiet and easy, and there are no indications of a Cuban raw sugar on the way to New York which are unsold, and that buyers are not anxious to purchase more supplies at present. More raw sugar is being offered than there is demand for at the moment. "This ought to put an end to the propaganda about 'sugar scarcity,'" and it also ought to operate to the benefit of the consumer.

In these days the person who has not at least an elementary schooling is at a great disadvantage, and it is most gratifying to know that so many of our young people realize this fact. Notes and Comments

The coast of the British Isles is so well protected with lighthouses that if a ship sailed right around England, Scotland and Ireland by night, only on six occasions would it be where it could not see the light of a lighthouse lantern.

The amendment calling for the immediate bringing down of the franchise act, and an immediate appeal to the people, which was introduced in the House of Commons by Hon. Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition, was defeated by a majority of 34. The Unionist Government's majority in the House after the election of 1917 was 71.

There are no indications, Britons declare, that England is suffering extensively from the low rate of exchange. "We should worry; it is the United States next move," is the constant reiteration over there. "So long as the European American exchange is demoralized and the pound sterling keeps its head up in Europe, Great Britain will get along 'jolly well'."

A rush to tap the sugar trees of British Columbia may be expected following the announcement of the American Forestry Association that sugar worth \$66 a pound has been found growing on the Douglas fir tree. The find is of the greatest importance to the scientific world, the Association says. An exhaustive investigation was made by Professor John Davidson, botanist in charge of the University of British Columbia at Vancouver.

A lady now residing at Higham's Park, London, England, writing under date Feb. 15, says: "So far we haven't had any winter at all. It's been beautifully fine. Some of the gardens are a positive sight—primroses, crocuses, snowdrops and violets all in bloom. Everything is sprouting, and the roses are very far advanced. I haven't seen a snowflake this winter, or a real piece of ice—just the thinnest little bit that melts before ten in the morning. I must admit that I like it."

Canadian Indian to be Elevated to Full Citizenship

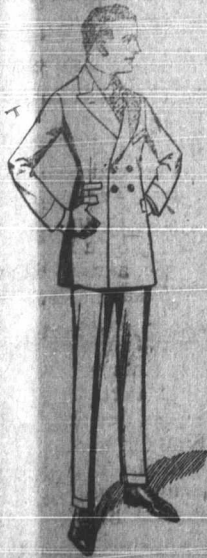

Prohibition Campaign

MRS. DAVID LLOYD GEORGE SAYS SCOTLAND'S PROHIBITION CAMPAIGN DEPENDS UPON WOMEN

Mrs. David Lloyd George, wife of the British Premier, is taking a prominent part in the prohibition campaign, addressing a meeting of 2,000 women at Glasgow recently.

"It is the duty of women to help the victims of alcoholism at home, as it was to help the victims of Prussianism in Belgium five years ago," Mrs. Lloyd George is reported to have said. "Scotland is on the eve of a great campaign, and next year the eyes of temperance reformers throughout the world will be focussed on Scotland. If Scotland is won, the victory will be a great stimulus to the world to do likewise."

Cardinal Mercier, primate of Belgium, the militant prelate of the Catholic Church whose heroic figure stood between his martyred country and the Hun during the war, has taken a stand in favor of general prohibition.

In an interview given to a representative of the New York Times, at the archiepiscopal palace at Malines, on June 18, the cardinal, according to his interviewer, "expressed his views on prohibition with animation, warming to his subject."

"I am a great believer in the repression of all intoxicating drinks such as alcohol and absinthe," he said. "If general prohibition were introduced, more human lives would be saved than by general disarmament."

But the apple growers of British Columbia have created a more modern and expressive one. Shipping apples to Annapolis, and to Grimsby, is the latest activity of the growers of the Okanagan.

"It did my heart good," said Mr. R. C. Treherne, dominion entomologist, just back from the East, "to see boxes of Winesaps and Jonathans on sale in the Niagara Peninsula, and in the Valley of Evangeline."

"The Ontario fellows didn't seem to care, because they have an immediate market in small baskets to the transient motor trade between Buffalo and Toron-

to. But say! don't the blueses roar! They have stuck to the old barrel pack, and our growers have swept down upon them with their fine boxes of rosy, pestless fruit, and are disputing their home market with them.

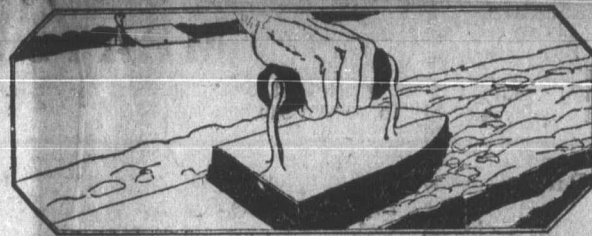
"They say their quality is better than that of the B. C. apples, but the consumers laugh and say 'Forget that quality stuff; what does a girl sell on but her rosy cheeks?'"

The whole situation in Mr. Treherne's opinion is the result of close co-operation among B. C. farmers, of excellent selling organization by the growers in the Okanagan, and of scrupulous care in eliminating pests. In these particulars, although B. C. orchards are valued at only twenty million, as compared with Ontario's fifty million, they have absolutely out-classed the latter.—Summerland (B.C.) Review.

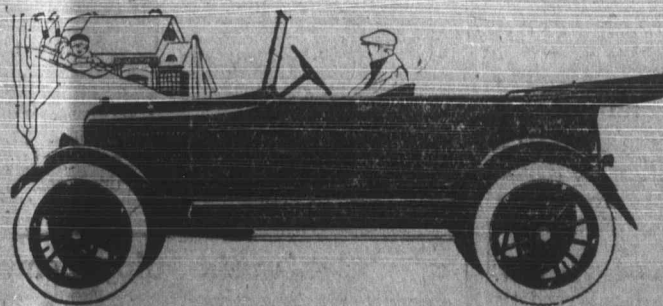

Special Council Meeting

A special meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening, with Mayor Fitch and Couns. Sutherland, Moore, Graham and Nowlan present.

This meeting was held for the purpose of disposing of business laid over from the regular meeting.

The first matter taken up was the communication from the Provincial Health Officer concerning the provision of the Health Act of 1919 which provides for the appointment of clinics throughout the province. The Mayor suggested that in view of the likelihood of hospitals being soon established in Wolfville and at some point in the western part of the county action in this county appeared unnecessary. After some discussion a committee composed of Couns. Graham, Moore and Nowlan was appointed to confer with representatives from the municipality and town of Kentville concerning the proposition.

The proposal to take action to provide for the controlling of building operations in Wolfville, and the establishment of a "brick district" was then taken up. The by-laws prepared by the Recorder were read and discussed. It was decided to establish a "brick district", the bounds being: the Campus on the west, Willow avenue on the east, the railway on the north, and to extend 150 feet south and parallel to Main street. Within this area no buildings may be erected except of brick or other inflammable material.

The regulations also provide for a thorough inspection of all building operations in the town. The Recorder was asked to draft a section giving the necessary authority to require property owners to keep their premises in a fire-proof condition. THE ACADIAN will publish these by-laws in full when finally adopted.

The government's housing scheme and the suggestion of the War Veterans that it be adopted in Wolfville came up, but in the absence of Coun. Shaw, who was to have introduced the discussion and who was prevented by illness from being present, was laid over until another meeting.

The petition from inhabitants of the section of the town to the east, asking that the town boundary be extended in that direction, came up. Mr. C. A. Patriquin and Mr. Robert Bauld were present in the interest of the proposition. The matter was discussed at some length and laid over until next meeting when Coun. Sutherland will submit a by-law to bring the change into operation.

An Opportunity For Improvement

Among many matters of public interest which were laid aside during the war and ought to be again brought to the fore is the condition of that district in the center of Wolfville known as "Mud Creek". It is none to soon for our civic authorities to be considering what is to be done to improve conditions and take steps to transform this blot upon the reputation of our town into respectability and even beauty. The Creek is rapidly filling up and the process might be very materially hastened. Some consistent plan should be adopted and the work energetically carried on. There is no reason why the coming spring and summer should not see a wonderful improvement made. Citizens should be encouraged to dump all refuse matter here and the town authorities provide for having this done in a systematic manner. There is an abundance of ashes and other material that will be required to be looked after during the next few weeks and this Creek is a convenient and most natural place for it to go. When the work of filling in is completed, as it ought to be very soon, the ground neatly graded and a few trees planted, the improvement made will be well worth the expenditure. Citizens in the east end of the town, who have to pass the locality daily, will appreciate the need of something being immediately done. Let the good work begin.

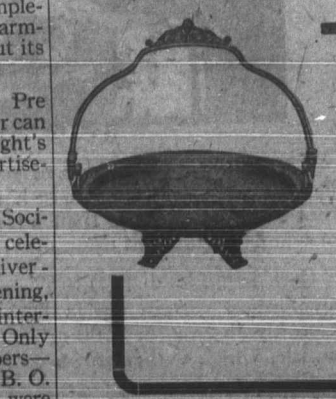

Britain Saves Daylight

(Boston Herald)

The British appear to have finished their discussion of the question of daylight saving during the summer months and arrived at a definite conclusion. At least, the Government has decided what Parliament shall be asked to do. Home Secretary Short has given notice in the House of Commons of the Government's intention to introduce legislation for the purpose of making permanent for what is usually called the Summer Time Act, under which the clocks are set forward one hour. In previous years the arrangement was made only by order-in-council as an emergency measure considered desirable under war conditions. But under those conditions the order had legislative force, and so, in the United Kingdom, "summer time" is not merely a popular, but a legislative phrase for the advancement of the time shown by clocks, legal or clock time, by one hour during a certain portion of the year. In 1917, this summer time was in operation from April 8 to Sept. 17,

in 1918, from March 24 to Sept. 29, and in 1918, from March 24 to Sept. 29, and in 1919, from March 24 to Sept. 29. Three seasons' experience has convinced a vast majority of the people that the daylight saving system is generally beneficial. City dwellers and workers are, apparently, unanimous in the desire for its perpetuation because of the benefits they have derived from it. For one thing, it gave them a healthful hour out in the open sunset "war gardens," and these were so useful as the cost of living increased that there is a strong feeling against allowing the cultivated back yards and small allotments to become waste places. Labor is all for the continuance of the healthy and thrifty habits and the profitable results due to those little gardens. The agricultural opposition is not nearly so strong in Britain as it is in America—and it could not be, because British agriculture produces so small a portion of the nation's food. In Massachusetts and New York, where state laws for daylight saving are under discussion, there is a sharp division between the com-



Dry-Powder Extinguishers

Although dry-powder fire extinguishers are sold to a gullible public in increasing numbers, they are all, without exception, practically worthless. Tubes costing \$3 each contain materials having an average value of eleven cents. Chemical analysis of thirty-one tubes of various makes shows the contents to consist of approximately 60 per cent common baking soda, 26 per cent fine sand, 8 per cent pulverized chalk and 4 per cent coloured matter, chiefly iron oxide. The inefficiency of dry powder extinguishers was made the subject of searching investigation by a special committee appointed by the British Home Office in March, 1916. Their report contained the following statement: "The use of dry powder fire extinguishers is to be deprecated as not only giving a misleading sense of security but being practically useless for extinguishing or controlling fires."

Of an entirely different character are the small one-quart chemical extinguishers sold under different proprietary names but all containing carbon tetrachloride as the extinguishing fluid. These have the great advantage of being easily handled by women and children. When subjected to heat, carbon tetrachloride generates a heavy, non-inflammable gas that will extinguish fires under circumstances where water would be useless.

Music an Asset for Old Age

The value of music of the common man is much greater than we are in the habit of realizing from the standpoint of what it does for his leisure. We are told that the average young person is very thoughtlessly laying up for himself a most stupid old age, that, through his neglect of literature and art and through his insistent craving for action and excitement, through his apparent refusal to think, he is robbing himself of all of the important assets which a man needs when, for any reason, he is cast on his own resources by illness or misfortune or old age. Important Notice!

Department of Finance Dominion of Canada

Your Income Tax Return Should be Filed at Once!!

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on Income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920:

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

NOTE—Individuals comprising corporations must file returns in their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—such penalty shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

Time Limit

All persons in Class 1, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 31st of March, 1920.

All persons in Class 2, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

General Instructions

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation, or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly, and avoid penalties

CLASS 2

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920:

All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must use Form T 2.

PENALTY

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable or otherwise, who fails to make a return of precise information duly required according to the provisions of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100.00 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.
