GOOD LIBERAL DOCTRINE.

The St. John Sun gives expression to some good healthy sentiments on the question of the right and duty of the Government to take effective action to control the great corporations which it creates, and to secure for all concerned the benefits of united capital without subjecting the public to extortion, or the weak to the rapacity of the strong.

Indeed a man cannot to-day be dubbed an extremist when he advocates some efficient Governmental control of the great corporations. To insist upon such control is not to carry the war into the enemy's country. It is rather to insist upon a defence of territory already acquired and rightly held.

Moreover, there is not in this same demand for Governmental control of trusts any essential enmity to this modern method of finance. It doubtless has yet to justify itself, but there is abundant reason for the belief that the corporation has come to stay and that because of the increased efficiency it affords.

That is the truly Liberal doctrine. The duty of Government is to govern—to enforce justice and to prevent wrong; to compel us to abide by the laws it makes in the equal interest of all, and to remain the great court of appeal of the people.

YORK COUNTY LOAN CO. The rumor sent out from Toronto last week that shareholders of the defunct York County Loan Company were shortly to receive an interim dividend, had a semi-official air, and greatly cheered the 115,000 who are waiting with more or less patience to recover something from the wreck.

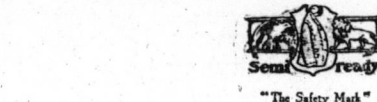
