THE FORTUNE BAY QUESTION.

It is known to most of our readers since the Award of the Halifax Commissioners, which proved such a triumph over American diplomacy, our cousins across the border have been grasping at every opportunity to be "square" with us. Fortune seemed to send the opportunity which the Americans sought. This opportunity was the so-called Fortune Bay "outrage," which may not in detail be uninteresting to our readers.

It was Sunday, and all British subjects around the Island of Newfoundland had rested from their labours because it was the Lord's Day. But around such parts of the coast as herring is taken, the smooth water and the fine day afforded every enticement to "look for fish." In a certain part of Fortune Bay, on the South-west of the Island, a number of American schooners were moored, and also a number of English craft. Through the forenoon it appears herring had been "breaching," which means playing upon the surface, and the prospects for hauling were so good that the American Sabbath breakers got into their skiffs, pulled to the casting ground and threw out their seines. Then they landed and proceeded to pull their drafts ashore, but not before the Fortune Bay Fishermen had turned out, cut their seines adrift, and compelled them to desist.

The only "outrage" about the transaction was that the Fishermen unfortunately the law into their own hands instead of apprising one of Her Majesty's ships, whose business it is to protect the fisheries. The American fishermen in taking fish with seines as above described violated two laws: First, the local laws of the Island; second, the statute under the Treaty. The former forbids any fisherman to take fish in the manner resorted to by the American fishermen, and in the Treaty itself American fishermen are subject to the local laws. The latter contains a reservation, which reservation is that the American fisherman shall not take fish within a certain limit from the coast, three miles, we believe.

This then is the "outrage," on the strength of which Secretary Evans wrote a long despatch to the Marquis of Salisbury, claiming \$103,000 damages, alleged to have been sustained by the American fishermen. We may say while this negotiation was pending, the American press were contending that the British fisheries were *non-importe*, yet the small transaction in an obscure cove of Fortune Bay was worth \$103,000! This is however only a sample of Yankee logic.

As was to have been expected Lord Salisbury scouts the idea of the claim, and argues the case from the terms of the Treaty, and the obligations of the local laws. He has informed Secretary Everett that the claim is disallowed, because it does not stand on law, equity or right. The New York press, notably the *Herald* is as a matter of course quite wrathful, and calls for an immediate abrogation of the treaty. Here are some of the *Herald's* words:

We will not pretend to deplore the decision of Lord Salisbury in this matter. So long as the fisheries treaty was

observed by Great Britain and the Dominion we were bound, we believe, to let it run on its fixed term of three or four years longer, but as both the Canadian and the British government have now denied us our rights under it we may justly put an end to it, and the other side, who have so constantly claimed that it was mainly to our advantage, cannot now complain that we give up these advantages.

It is really too bad "Great Britain and the Dominion" will not give America her rights: Why doesn't the *Herald* go for War!

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

FOR some weeks past the press on this side of the Atlantic has been gorging itself on sensational rumours about the Beaconsfield successorship picked up by irresponsible correspondents in England. We would not object to the papers publishing these stories, because the newspaper man has to put up with what he gets very often, the option being with him to "take it or leave it;" but there is no excuse at all for Editors falling into line with these correspondents, and less excuse for them if they are British subjects, and the correspondence impugns the integrity and the impartiality of the Queen. We could not but regret that a paper in St. John who has much to do in moulding public opinion, should with no better ground work than sensational New York telegrams hint that a "bad day" was to come on the House of Brunswick. We who do not prate much about our loyalty, read the same telegrams as the rest, but believing what we did of the character of our sovereign, we utterly discredited the stories. On the 6th of April we wrote—

Some say Earl Granville will form a Government, but others name somebody else. Few say it will be Gladstone, though no one doubts that it would be the delight of that old man's lie to once more stand at the head of our great nation. It has been said the Queen would not consent to Gladstone forming a Government; that she dislikes the man; and this story some try to prove because at the marriage of the Duke of Connaught, Gladstone was ignored. The story is unworthy the greatest Democrat in England, and to speculate on it for a moment is to doubt the sterling qualities of the sovereign.

How true for Moore that
"The friends who in our sunshine lived
When winter comes have flown!"

Loyalty now-a-days is born of the lip, not of the heart: it belongs not to winter, but is a mere fine weather sentiment. So long as the Sovereign moves along in the groove, that we think the constitutional path, we admire and praise, and send up loyal paens; but when the Sovereign's action clashes with our narrow notions of state right and wrong we denounce the wisdom of the Sovereign and make rebellious predictions! Is that it? Is the Queen good, noble, and all her admirers paint her only when she suits our fancy? Shame!

We have read paragraphs in the St. John paper to which we now refer, that, reading which, we fancied we saw the editor with bared head, and reverently on his knees. No sovereign name was half so pure or so bright as Victoria's: She was not only noble as a Queen but good as a woman. But this was when talk was cheap, when it did not jar on the editors personal feelings to pen the lines.

Now, we regret it, a change has come: there has fallen a frost, a killing frost, over that spring of gushing loyalty. The Queen is no longer "Victoria the Good," but the base woman who to snit an unworthy whim, lays violent hands on constitutional precedent, sets herself against the nation who had loved her, and merits at no distant time some dread punishment at the hands of the people. Now we have never shown more than ordinary loyalty for Queen Victoria, but it would take stronger proof than the whole press of New York, to make us doubt her integrity or her justice. But the paper to which we refer, swallowed all the calumnies floating about, rebuked the Queen whom it a week before lauded to the skies, and on the strength of such evidence, as for the most trivial purposes, we have often known it to throw overboard, it hinted at the undermining of the throne, and muttered evil things about dark days for the House of Brunswick. "How art thou fallen from heaven, O Lucifer! son of the morning!"

OUR CLAIMS BEFORE "OTTAWA."

The claim of this Province for \$150,000 against the Dominion Government on account of Eastern Extension will come up in a few days before a board of arbitrators in Ottawa, and will be settled by appraisal. To represent the interests of New Brunswick, the Attorney General will leave here on Thursday or Friday next, and it is possible that some other legal member of the Government may accompany him. As to the question of the disposal of the sums of the Fishery Award, that matter having been settled by Parliament, even the Attorney General of New Brunswick would

appear ridiculous in trying to resurrect it. Meanwhile we are glad to know our Provincial Government are ready to be on the wing, to any scene of action where Provincial duty calls it. Last year our delegation got \$10,000 on Immigration by storming the capital, and also induced the Dominion Government to take the Tracadie Lazaretto off our hands. It is not unreasonable, therefore, for us to look to a satisfactory solution of the Eastern Extension claim.

SIR LEONARD TILLEY.

But in pointing out to our readers how much the Province is indebted to the persistent and well directed effort of our Local Government in the matter of these claims, we cannot ignore the part Sir Leonard Tilley has played. Our Local Government might make Ottawa being with solicitations outside the gate; but if New Brunswick had not a friend inside, their action would be powerless. In Sir Leonard our delegation found a sympathizing ally who eagerly joined hands with our own claimants, and need we doubt, put their case strongly before the Council of the country. In this connexion it gives some food for surprise that the St. John *Sun* should not have a word of thanks to Sir Leonard for his assistance. We can understand a party hack like the *Sun*, gagged by such an unscrupulous man as Mr Killam, and prevented from doing justice to our Local Government—which is just as well without the support of such a paper—but why the *Sun* should ignore its friends; ignore Sir Leonard who infused into it the breath of life, for the sake of doing injustice to Mr Killam's enemies, we are at a loss to comprehend.

DISGRACEFUL.

We hope none of our readers who sometimes perhaps, find fault with us, will at least accuse us of ever having said our present City Council was creditable to the city. We suppose outside of certain rings composed of men like Kearney, who is now in the House of Correction in San Francisco our Council is without parallel. Here are a few of the acts for which the Council has deserved to be tarred and feathered by an injured community:

- (1) For the past four months city cheques have been floating around the city, unnegotiable save at a great discount.
- (2) A certain usurer in the City Council, in whose interest perhaps this worthless currency has been floating around, has been "shaving" these cheques.
- (3) Several wretched, starving creatures, who were at the first not half paid, had to take these cheques and submit to a large discount before they could get anything for them.
- (4) There was no difficulty in procuring a loan to meet immediate demands.
- (5) The roads, where, under the City control, are impassable, and the public service generally is suffering.
- (6) There are three or four men at the Board, who would be a credit to the city, but that the Communists have the upper hand of them in numbers.

We have truly a disgraceful state of affairs.

THE CONTRACT has not yet been signed by Mr. Lawlor, and it would seem as if a few days more must elapse ere it will.

GLADSTONE has been called upon to form a Government.

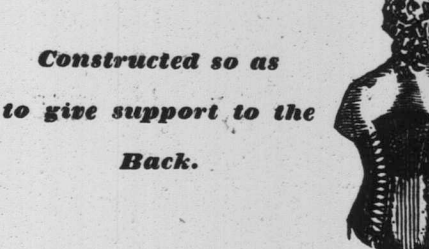
