DETROIT RIVER TUNNEL.

Formal Dedication of Vanderbilt's Undertaking.

Excursion to Grose Lake—Gathering of Railway and Business Men from Canada, Michigan and Ohio—An Enthusiastic Spectacle.

AMHERSTBURGH, Ont., April 23.—At 10:45 this morning a special train left the Central depot in Detroit with a party of 100 guests on board at the invitation of Mr. W. K. Vanderbilt, who has the honor of dedicating the Grose Lake tunnel. Among the party were the leading officials of all the great trunk and Great Western, and many prominent business and professional men. At the island the guests were met by a delegation of miners from Toledo, Michigan, and others.
