Reciprocity Not Wanted.

In former articles on this question we recited in brief the history of our reciprocity treaty with the United States, and the attitude of the Americans towards us in this matter, since the abrogation of that treaty.

As a matter of fact, we have already had on a small scale negotiations fairly indicative of the spirit animating the United States authorities in these matters. The negotiations in question were consummated towards the end of March.

It is not an inspiring spectacle, this toadying of a great country such as Canada to the United States, whenever the ring master of that administration chooses to crack his whip.

They blundering in the past have lessened the prestige of the country. At this very moment British subjects are being deported because they do not possess the \$25 which Mr. Oliver thinks is necessary for them to show before they can land.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

The salary of Premier Bohns, of South Africa, is 4,000 pounds, and of each of the other cabinet ministers 5,000 pounds.

One hundred and fifty quintals of pork were landed on Friday by Stephen Homans, of the steamer Antioch, No. 2, twelve miles off Port Mouton Head, N. S.

W. E. Bagnall, formerly of this Province, an Ottawa broker, hit by a slump in the stock market, has suspended payment. Seventy-five of his clients are said to be hit to the tune of \$100,000.

Five men were killed in the Rickard Mine at Dover, N. H., by the overturning of a car which was being drawn to the mouth of the mine. They fell 700 feet down the shaft.

Great loss of life has occurred in the Eifel Region near Cologne, Germany as the result of a cloudburst, which swept several districts on Sunday night. Estimates place the number of the dead at 150.

Dr. W. J. P. McMillan has opened his office at 148 Prince Street, Charlottetown.

Frank McGonnell, formerly of Charlottetown, a lineman of the Lynn, Mass. Gas & Electric Co., was instantly killed by coming in contact with a charged wire, while at work near the top of a 30 foot pole. 2,300 volts instantly passed through his body.

Hillboro N. B. was visited Monday with a disastrous fire and the handsome Baptist Church edifice and parsonage are now in ashes. At one time, it looked as if the whole town would be fire swept, and it was only by strenuous efforts on the part of the fire brigade, assisted by many other citizens, that the fire was prevented from spreading.

M. C. Delaney, M. P. P. North Tryon was in the city yesterday.

The June term of the Supreme Court for Prince County opened at Summerside yesterday, the Chief Justice presiding.

Premier Asquith has given notice, in the Imperial House of Commons, of a bill to modify the King's Coronation oath.

Fire last Saturday night at Fresno Calif. destroyed 2,000 tons of raisins valued at \$100,000. The raisins were stored in a warehouse.

The steamer Uranian, which arrived at Halifax from Rotterdam had a case of smallpox on board, and the 550 passengers are in quarantine, at Lawlor's Island.

The London "Times" understands Mr. Bryce, Ambassador at Washington, has been authorized to sign the Boundary Claims agreement with the United States.

Canada's total revenue last year was \$101,591,035, an increase of \$16,500,000 over the preceding year. The expenditure on consolidated fund was \$79,409,849, and on capital account \$24,114,994, making the total disbursements \$103,524,843. The increase of the debt during the year 1910 was \$15,335,056. On the 31st March last the net debt stood at \$336,266,348.

A conductor was killed and nine people injured in a train wreck near Constantinople accomplished by revolutionists who believed Sheket Pasha, the Minister of War was aboard the train. The rails had been spread. Sheket changed his plans at the last moment and travelled by steamer.

It is reported from London that King George has desired the Premier to bring about a round-table conference of both political parties for the purpose of arriving at a compromise solution of the deadlock on the veto question. It is said Mr. Balfour has replied to Premier Asquith's suggestion in this direction, and it is believed the reply is favorable.

An unknown Italian had his foot crushed while working on the Transcontinental Railway in New Brunswick. The Assistant Manager Lamont Knight while assisting the injured man to the hospital became unwell from the sight of the blood and fell off the locomotive, his back being broken. Knight is now in a dangerous condition.

A shocking accident occurred at Penobscot, N. B., Wednesday, in which Edward Bower was instantly killed. Mr. Bower was the owner of a portable mill. One of the large saws revolving at lightning speed, broke loose and struck Bower fair in the chest and face. The saw passed right through his body and skull, splitting him open and badly mangling his head. Death was instantaneous.

Thomas Hall, a Newfoundland employed at the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company's limestone quarries at Point Edward, was instantly killed Saturday afternoon by being run over by a car loaded with dolomite. Hall was helping some other men to move a heavily loaded car, and just after it had got under way he stumbled and fell under the wheels, which almost cut his body in two. This is the first fatality at this quarry since they opened eight years ago. Hall leaves a wife and family in Newfoundland.

His Majesty's Ship Cornwall arrived here from Halifax on Thursday afternoon last. The Cornwall is a twin screw armoured cruiser of 9,800 tons and has a complement of over 400 men. She has fourteen 6 inch guns, twelve 12 pounders, two 3 pounders and 2 torpedo tubes. She has two turrets, one fore and one aft, each containing a pair of six inch guns. The Cornwall was here a few years ago as one of Prince Louis of Battenberg's squadron. Commander Cochrane of the Cornwall is a son of Admiral Cochrane and a nephew of Lord Dundonald. Her Captain is James C. Ley. The Cornwall left here yesterday morning.
