

Mr. John St. George, of the Horwood Lumber Company, was on the vessel and he and the crew had repeated conversations with the second mate and two sallors of the lost S. S. Florence. According to the story given by the seamen it to the story given by the seamen it became thick at 3 p.m. Thursday with heavy snow and the ship lost her bearings but spoke to the Florizel that night and got her course. The men say the ship struck bow on and that she was running full speed as the captain believed he was outside Cape Pine after meeting the Florizel. The second mate with his watch of four seamen left the ship first and later the others left but found it impracticable to land and returned to the steamer. The second mate and his men were more fortunate and returned to the ship telling Capt. Barr and the crew that they had discovered a good landing place but they refused to leave the ship though she was then parted amidships and all hands were huddled together on the forecastle head and wore life belts on them. Friday morning after the survivors had left the wreck the second time the weather became terrible and the wreck must have gone to pieces hur riedly in the awful sea which raged When the second mate and his mer were making in for the little cove in which they landed, their boat was capwhich they landed, their boat was cap-sized in the surf and all were thrown in the water. Two of the seamen were buried under the boat and all were swept ashore on the crests of the combers. These two were almos drowned and it was only after over These two were almost an hour's hard work rolling them and getting the water out of them that they revived. One of them, when Young left Trepassey, was so ill that fears for his recovery were entertain ed. The seamen told the Young's crew that had the captain and the rest left the steamer when they were asked by the survivors that all would have

been saved. Later no boat could live in the heavy sea which ran. The seamen will arrive here by the Portia. Steeplejack's New Feat

Mr. W. Larkins, the London steeple jack, who climbed the Nelson Column and restored the statue in 1905, the centenary of Trafalgar, has been engaged to repair the monument of the first Duke of Sutherland, near Dunrobin Castle. The journey from London is 625 miles, and the monument stands on the summit of Ben Vraggie, 1,300 feet high. The statue itself stands on a solid stone pedestal 90 feet high, and measures 33 feet in height, nearly twice the size of the statue of Nelson in Trafalgar Square. It takes two hours to climb the mountain, and the work has to cease in time for the descent before dark, to have perished in yesterday's gale. the top of the mountain being covered with snow nearly all the winter.



In a race of pygmies recently disovered in Papua, scientists see another connecting link between the verage races of to-day and primitive man of the Stone Age. Tapiro is the name given to this pygmy race. The men are extremely small, but well noulded, strong and active. In con rast to the Papuans, they have well made calves instead of he thin, straight legs of their neigh-

ractice tattoing or cicatrization. Their needs for comfort are few. Each nan may carry all his portable property in a sort of haversack, which is lung over his shoulder. This con ains his sleeping mat, fire stick, rattan for kindling a flame, tobacco and other odds and ends.

With the settlement of the incident arising from the complaint of ill-treatment by the Austrian Consul at Prisrend, and the announcement from the Ambassadorial conference that it favored autonomy for Albania, and a commercial port on the Adriatic for Servia, every reason for Austrian bilization was apparently ended. The failure of that country to do so coincides with an annuoncement from St. Petersburg yesterday, of the enforcement of a drastic censorship of news concerning military affairs in Russia.

The celebration of the 98th anniversary of Peace between the United States and the British Empire, was made the occasion yesterday, for expressions of appreciation by many public men through the medium of the Belfast Telegraph.

Earl Grey wrote: "The hundred years of Peace have been of untold value ir the political and social development of Britain, the States and the Canadian Dominion. We hope to have a worthy celebration of the event two years hence."

Earl Meath: "War between the two great branches of the Anglo-Saxon race, let us firmly believe, to be an impossibility in future. Such a belief will go far to make it impossible."

Secretary of State Knox: "This 4 anniversary serves to remind us not of the termination of the great struggle, but the passage of an almost century of peace and good-will. In this ong era of unbroken friendship, we English-speaking cousins have realized and benefitted from our kinship and neighbourly intercourse, whiist trade has developed and grown into

colossal proportions." Attorney - General Wickersham: Peace established nearly a century ago now becomes not only a habit but a condition, one which it is unthinkable should ever be altered."

Martin H. Burrell, Canadian Minister of Agriculture: "If, to commemorate special days is a good thing, it is especially pleasant to commemorate a day which has brought a century of peace between cousins so intimately connected by blood and lauguage." guage."
