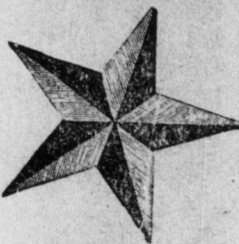

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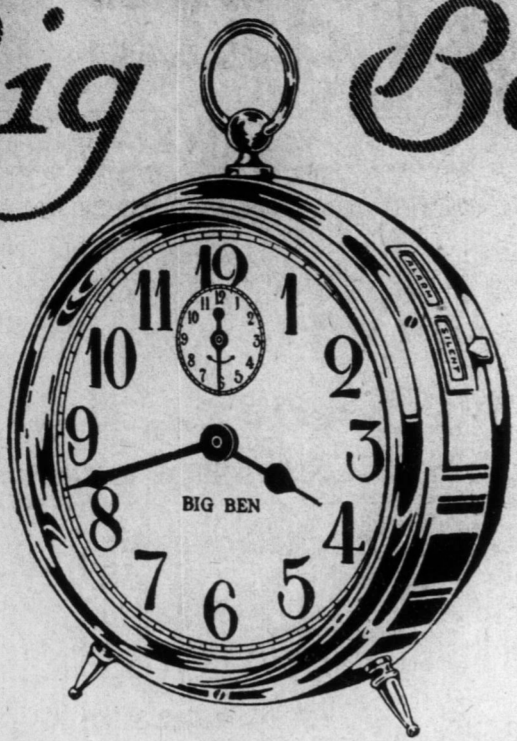

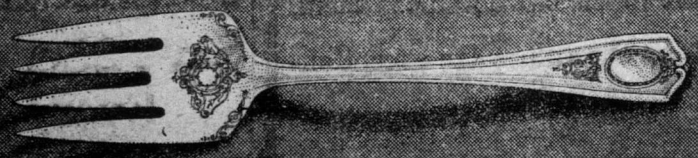

## King George

### As Santa Claus

King George always remembers his tenantry and servants at Christmas. The former are entertained at a play royally commanded, and the humble workers on his estates given substantial presents of beef, etc. To his personal servants the King gives two dances in the New Year, and as evening dress must be worn these aristocrats of domestic servants by no means resemble the usual kitchen-lancers. During the dancing their Majesties are expected to "look in," and it is just this personal touch that lifts the function out of the ordinary. The late King was most particular about the comforts of the large staffs employed at his residence, and King George follows in his father's footsteps in this respect.

But the real Christmas to King George is when he is busy depositing the surprise presents by his children's beds. Only when they are asleep does the King enter their rooms, and, as it takes the youngsters a long time to close their eyes owing to the prevailing excitement, His Majesty does not have much sleep the night before Christmas. But he is first and foremost a family man, and, as everybody knows, Christmas was made for children, and the greatest enjoyment can only be extracted from December 25 when there are youngsters to amuse.

## The Last of The Garrison.

It is fifty years to-day since the last of the Moslem Kings of Delhi, the degenerate descendant of the Mogul Emperors, died in exile at Rangoon. The records of the Indian Mutiny contain few more terrible chapters than the story of Hodson, of Hodson's Horse, hunting down the King of the Delhi, after the capture of the city, taking him prisoner at the Emperor Humayun's tomb, and shooting the King with his own hand after they had surrendered. The wretched old King, Bahadur Shah, who as the titular Emperor of Hindustan, had been used by the Sepoys the figurehead of the rebellion, was tried on the charge of treason, which happily was ineffectual.

The trial took place in the Delhi Fort. An eye-witness has described

how he saw, in the beautiful Hall of Audience, the last of the Moguls crouched before the Court, dressed in a piece of sack, and a coarse turban like a coolie. Lord Dalhousie, the Governor-General, who had proposed some years before the Mutiny that the shah sovereignty should be declared at an end with Bahadur Shah, considered it a fortunate thing that the King was not put to death.

To have hanged as a felon (he wrote) an aged man of 85, a throned King, and the head of the Moslem in India, would have disgusted our best friends—and they are still many—among the Mussulmans of the East and would have produced a revulsion of feeling against us both in Europe and Asia.

He was banished to Burma, lived five years in captivity, and died on November 7, 1862, thus ending, as Dalhousie put it, the house of Timur.

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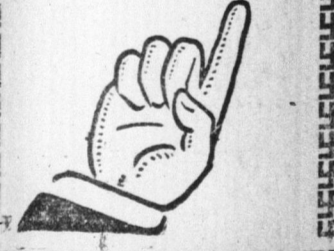

**CAPTAIN AND CREW SAFE. YES. SEL A TOTAL WRECK—PART OF CARGO SAVED.**

ST. PIERRE, Mig., Yesterday. Special to Evening Telegram.

The Lunenburg schooner Aldine drifted in the harbour this morning abandoned, general cargo floating ashore, presumably to be from Boston; will probably be a total wreck; no tidings of crew.

The crew of the Lunenburg schooner Aldine, bound from Boston, numbering probably six men, are believed to have perished in yesterday's gale. To-day the wrecked vessel was found on the north side of St. Pierre roads, but there was no traces of the crew.

CREW SAFE.

Capt. Smithers and crew of schr. Aldine have arrived here. The vessel struck on the sand bar near Pigeon Island during a heavy snow squall at 3 a.m. yesterday. After the crew left her she floated over the bar. They being unable to reach her, she drifted here and stranded and is now a total wreck. Part of cargo was saved.

LISBON, To-day.

The arrival of Dr. Almeida here made occasion of monster demonstration on the part of Conservatives. The Democrats replied with equally imposing counter demonstrations. ### Steeplejack's New Feat

Mr. W. Larkins, the London steeplejack, who climbed the Nelson Column and restored the statue in 1905, the centenary of Trafalgar, has been engaged to repair the monument of the first Duke of Sutherland, near Dunrobin Castle. The journey from London is 625 miles, and the monument stands on the summit of Ben Vraggie, 1,500 feet high. The statue itself stands on a solid stone pedestal 90 feet high, and measures 23 feet in height, nearly twice the size of the statue of Nelson in Trafalgar Square. It takes two hours to climb the mountain, and the work has to cease in time for the descent before dark, the top of the mountain being covered with snow nearly all the winter.

**Incorrigibility.**

Some people tell the neighbors that their children are incorrigible, and then try to cure them with a rum strap, when an application of old-fashioned patience, tact and affection would bring them out. No boy or girl becomes really incorrigible who has seen anything like the square deal in use around the house, and that an eternal fact.

### Leeds Equips Printers.

Technical School Achieving Market  
Success.

So successful were the courses in  
printing given last winter, by the  
Leeds (England) Education Commit-  
tee that an important development has  
been decided upon in this branch of  
technical instruction, by the provi-  
sion of a series of systematic courses  
in lithography.

The equipment of the department is  
thoroughly up-to-date, and the head  
master of the Central Technical  
School and his staff hope to secure  
the active co-operation of employers  
and their workmen in the trade. Last  
year over 150 apprentices and jour-  
neymen employed in printing and pro-  
cess work in Leeds and district at-  
tended the evening classes, and there  
are indications that this number will  
be exceeded during the present ses-  
sion. The classes for instruction in  
linotype operating are already full.  
And it is contemplating to offer ad-  
ditional classes at Christmas for  
those for whom there is no room at  
present.

The work of this department of the  
Leeds Technical School comprises  
evening lectures and practical cours-  
es in typography (composition and  
machine work), process work, princi-  
ples and practice of photography,  
lithography, linotype operating, draw-  
ing and design (school of art), me-  
chanics for printers, and printing ma-  
chine mechanism. The practical work  
is conducted in the special building of  
the Technical School printing depart-  
ment, in which the ground floor is oc-  
cupied by the litho, letter-press, and  
process machine rooms.

### Pygmy Race. Relic Of The Stone Age.

In a race of pygmies recently dis-  
covered in Papua, scientists see an-  
other connecting link between the  
average races of to-day and primitive  
man of the Stone Age. Tapiro is the  
name given to this pygmy race. The  
men are extremely small, but well  
moulded, strong and active. In con-  
trast to the Papuans, they have  
stocky, well made calves instead of  
the thin, straight legs of their neigh-  
bors.

Unlike most savages, they do not  
practice tattooing or cicatrization.  
Their needs for comfort are few. Each  
man may carry all his portable prop-  
erty in a sort of haversack, which is  
slung over his shoulder. This con-  
tains his sleeping mat, fire stick, rat-  
tan for kindling, a flame, tobacco and  
other odds and ends.

They are remarkably skilful in heu-  
ring rough but absolutely balanced ca-  
noes from the heavy trunks of trees.  
The craft are beautifully carved and  
are propelled by paddles with long  
shafts and wide blades. Skilful as  
they are in the making of canoes,  
their only implements are stone axes  
and bone knives.

In disposing of their dead they wrap  
the body in mats and place it in a  
rude coffin usually constructed of  
broken canoes. The coffin is raised on  
a sort of trestle and left until decom-  
position is complete. The skulls of  
the dead are kept by their relatives  
and friends and in a short time be-  
come worn smooth from handling.

### Shot Station Agent.

Leadville, Colo., Dec. 16.—A band-  
it, suspected of being Frank L. Smith,  
who a week ago, escaped from the  
Brighton jail, where he was held for  
murder, entered the Denver and Rio  
Grande Station at Pando, twenty  
miles west of Leadville, last night,  
held up the Station Agent C. N. Kin-  
ney, and three other men, marched  
them down the track, struck William  
Maxfield over the head with a revolv-  
er, and then shot him dead. An  
hour and twenty minutes after the  
holdup and murder, the bandit was  
captured by members of a bridge crew.  
He now is in jail at Red Cliff. He  
gave his name as Burns, but refused  
to answer any other questions.

### Household Notes.

If there is too much bluing in the  
rinsing water, all bad effects can be  
avoided by adding three or four table-  
spoonfuls of household ammonia.

Croquettes, when fried in deep fat,  
should stand in a warm place for half  
an hour before frying; this will make  
them brown more quickly.

If you have a jacket which is trouble-  
some to iron, baste the pleats in be-  
fore it is washed, then iron and re-  
move the threads. Use fine thread.

To wind a curtain, remove it from  
the brackets, wind it up by hand and  
then put it into the brackets and pull  
it out full length. Repeat if neces-  
sary.

If the baby is too little to hold play-  
things, fasten them by a string sus-  
pended above him in such a position  
that they will not get out of his reach.

Towels should not be put in the  
guestroom when they are brand new.  
Use them until they have been laun-  
dered several times and lose their  
stiffness.

When using oil for frying, the oily  
taste can be taken away by making  
the oil very hot, and then fry a piece  
of onion in it. When brown, take it  
out.

After sitting for a while embroder-  
ing, the eyes and back are apt to be-  
come tired. Try putting a flat pillow  
on your lap. The change of position  
is very restful.

A ball of string in the guestroom is  
a convenience. Often when a guest is  
pecking, there is need of string. A  
bunch of baggage tags in the desk  
will be appreciated.

When planting Lily bulbs, place  
them twelve inches deep and tip the  
bulb a little sideways to prevent water  
from settling at the base among the  
scales, causing decay.

Tomatoes will ripen in the house if  
the vines are pulled up before the  
weather suggests frost and are hung  
in the cellar on nails. The green to-  
matoes will soon ripen.

It is somewhat difficult to fasten the  
trimming on a hat, but do not draw  
the knot in close, and after the trim-  
ing is secured, tie the two ends together  
in a hard knot.

When ironing, the strain on the feet  
can be relieved if a thick pad is made  
of old flannel garments sewed togeth-  
er. Stand on the pad and you will  
find yourself less tired.

When pressing a pleated skirt, pin  
the pleats to the ironing board. Lay a  
fold and pin it at the bottom, then  
hold the waistband firmly and iron  
from the bottom toward the top.

When steaming velvet over the tea  
kettle, insert a small funnel over the  
spout of the kettle. This will spread  
the steam over a larger surface and  
the work may be accomplished much  
easier.

In buttonholing the top of a corset  
cover or fine centre-piece, run a heavy  
linen thread around the scallop be-  
fore beginning the buttonholing. This  
prevents tearing and gives a firm edge  
to work upon.

Wash materials can be prevented  
from fading by using one cupful of  
salt to a gallon of water. Let it boil  
and pour it over the goods while hot.  
Let it stand about ten minutes and  
hang out to dry. Do not rinse.

When linen has a stain from long  
standing, put a teaspoonful of sul-  
phur in a saucer, add a few drops of  
alcohol and ignite. Place a funnel  
over the flame, point upward; wet the  
stained linen and hold it over the  
funnel.

An excellent floor mop is made by  
cutting the legs of about a dozen old  
stockings lengthwise and binding them  
with a cord to an old worn-out  
broom handle just above the straws.  
When the stockings are securely fast-  
ened on, immerse the mop in kerosene  
oil, and you have a mop to remove all  
the dust from the floors and the wood-  
work.

### Poisoner Ended His Career.

Winnipeg Physician-Clergyman Was  
Charged With Extensive Frauds.

Winnipeg, Dec. 11.—Dr. J. T. Reid,  
prominent as a surgeon and minister  
in eastern and western Canada, is  
dead, a suicide, following allegations  
that had caused his arrest as a man  
who had swindled Canadians out of  
thousands of dollars in a period of  
twelve years, in the name of charity.  
He was a graduate physician in  
Winnipeg twenty years ago, and then  
minister at Sifton, Ont., and other  
western points. He travelled over  
Canada ostensibly collecting funds for  
the Lord Minto Hospital fund and  
other charities. It is said he carried  
many forged letters from prominent  
people, among others Lady Aberdeen.  
In one month he deposited \$6,000, thus  
secured, in one Winnipeg bank.

Last week he was arrested and at  
once swallowed poison, which result-  
ed fatally.

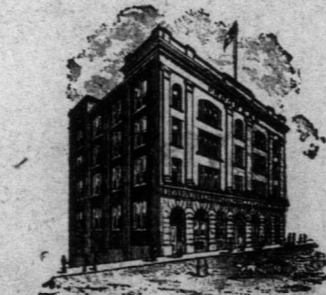

## Cable News.

Special to the Evening Telegram.  
NEW YORK, Dec. 25.  
Sir Thomas Lipton sailed for Eng-  
land, declaring that he hoped to  
come back in 1914 and make a fourth  
attempt for the cup.

TOKIO, Dec. 25.  
An attempt was made yesterday to  
assassinate Prince Arimoto Yamagata  
President of the Japanese Privy Coun-  
cil and Supreme Military Councillor  
of Japan. The Prince escaped unhurt  
His assailant tried to commit suicide.

CAIRO, Dec. 25.  
Yesterday, the Khedive opened the  
gigantic Assouan Dam Works, which  
cost £7,500,000. Lord Kitchener read  
a congratulatory message from King  
George.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.  
The story which the men of the  
financial district were telling at their  
Christmas dinners today, had J. P.  
Morgan, a dentist, and a washer-  
man as the principals. Morgan was  
in the dentist's chair, and it was re-  
lated to him while suffering intense  
pain that dentist's wife's washer-  
man's case of destitution was one of  
the worst he ever knew. Her husband  
had died and left her with thirteen  
children, only five of them being old  
enough to work. While sewing up  
with his dental work he continued  
the narrative in detail. Morgan left  
after the operation without comment,  
but next day the dentist received a  
letter, which is quoted as follow-  
ing: "Dear Doctor, you hurt me like  
the devil, yesterday, and your novel story  
about the widow and her thirteen  
children helped some. Enclosed find  
my cheque for \$10,000, which please  
turn over to the washerwoman. Tell  
her, for me, she was a fool to ever  
have thirteen children."

LONDON, Dec. 25.  
The Turkish delegates, though they  
realize that eventually they must ac-  
cept the conditions laid down by the  
Allies following their usual course  
of procrastination, will take advan-  
tage of every diplomatic device to  
postpone the inevitable dismember-  
ment of the territory, which has been  
their armed camp for five hundred  
years. Meanwhile the Allies are so  
confident that the outcome will be in  
the lines laid down by them, that they  
have already agreed to the boundar-  
ies for an autonomous Albania. These  
will be submitted later to the Amba-  
sadorial conference which has ad-  
journed until early in the New Year.  
The question which looms sinisterly  
in the European sky is not when  
peace will be signed by the belliger-  
ents, but why in view of the settle-  
ment of the cause of quarrel between  
Austria and Serbia, Austria does not  
demobilize. The chances of watch-  
ing with keenest anxiety for  
some signs of demobilization of her  
forces. With the settlement of the  
incident arising from the complaint of  
ill-treatment by the Austrian Consul  
at Pristina, and the announcement  
from the Ambassadorial conference  
that it favored autonomy for Albania  
and a commercial port on the Adriatic  
for Serbia, every reason for Austrian  
mobilization was apparently exhausted.  
The failure of that country to do so  
coincides with an announcement from  
St. Petersburg yesterday of the for-  
mation of a drastic renunciation of  
news concerning military affairs in  
Russia.

BELFAST, Dec. 25.  
The celebration of the 38th anniv-  
ersary of Peace between the United  
States and the British Empire, was  
made the occasion yesterday for ex-  
pressions of appreciation by many  
public men through the medium of the  
Belfast Telegraph.  
Earl Grey wrote: "The hundred  
years of Peace between the United  
States and the British Empire, is an  
achievement of the greatest value in  
the political and social develop-  
ment of Britain, the States and  
the Canadian Dominion. We have to  
have a worthy celebration of the  
event two years hence."  
Earl Meath: "War! between the  
two great branches of the Anglo-Sax-  
on race, let us firmly believe, to be  
an impossibility in future. Such a  
belief will go far to make it impos-  
sible."

Secretary of State Knox: "This  
anniversary serves to remind us not  
of the termination of the great strug-  
gle, but the passage of an almost cen-  
tury of peace and good-will. In this  
long era of unbroken friendship, we

### Cable News.

Special to the Evening Telegram, NEW YORK, Dec. 25.  
Sir Thomas Lipton sailed for England, declaring that he hoped to come back in 1914 and make a fourth attempt for the cup.

TOKIO, Dec. 25.

An attempt was made yesterday to assassinate Prince Arimoto Yamagata President of the Japanese Privy Council and Supreme Military Councillor of Japan. The Prince escaped unhurt. His assailant tried to commit suicide.

CAIRO, Dec. 25.

Yesterday, the Khedive opened the gigantic Assouan Dam Works, which cost £7,500,000. Lord Kitchener read a congratulatory message from King George.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.

The story which the men of the financial district were telling at their Christmas dinners today, had J. P. Morgan, a dentist, and a washerwoman as the principals. Morgan was in the dentist's chair, and it was related to him while suffering intense pain that dentist's wife's washerwoman's case of destitution was one of the worst he ever knew. Her husband had died and left her with thirteen children, only five of them being old enough to work. While keeping on with his dental work he continued the narrative in detail. Morgan left after the operation without comment, but next day the dentist received a letter, which is quoted as follows:—"Dear Doctor, You hurt me like the devil, yesterday, and your novel story about the widow and her thirteen children helped some. Enclosed find my cheque for \$10,000, which please turn over to the washerwoman. Tell her, for me, she was a fool to ever have thirteen children."

LONDON, Dec. 25.

The Turkish delegates, though they realize that eventually they must accept the conditions laid down by the Allies following their usual course of procrastination, will take advantage of every diplomatic device to postpone the inevitable dismemberment of the territory, which has been their armed camp for five hundred years. Meanwhile the Allies are so confident that the outcome will be on the lines laid down by them, that they have already agreed to the boundaries for an autonomous Albania. These will be submitted later to the Ambassadorial conference which has adjourned until early in the New Year. The question which looms sinisterly in the European sky is not when peace will be signed by the belligerents, but why in view of the settlement of the cause of quarrel between Austria and Serbia, Austria does not demobilize. The chancelleries are watching with keenest anxiety for some signs of demobilization of her forces. With the settlement of the incident arising from the complaint of ill-treatment by the Austrian Consul at Pristina, and the announcement from the Ambassadorial conference that it favored autonomy for Albania, and a commercial port on the Adriatic for Serbia, every reason for Austrian mobilization was apparently ended. The failure of that country to do so coincides with an announcement from St. Petersburg yesterday, of the enforcement of a drastic censorship of news concerning military affairs in Russia.

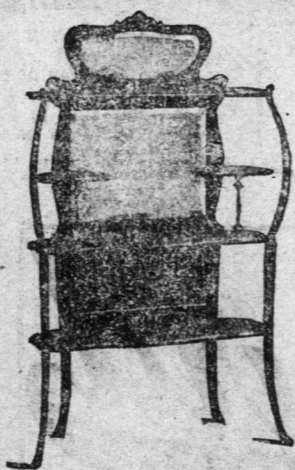
