New Methodist Church.

A largely attended meeting of the Cochrane Street Church congregation presided over by Mr. Charles Marhall—was held at the College Hall last night. The object of the meeting was to discuss matters in connecion with the erection of a new place of worship to replace that destroyed by fire last year.

The report of the building committee was submitted to the people, and the plans received from local contractors and others were examined with much interest

The principal difficulty confronting the committee is the lack of funds, and the providing of a church and school of sufficient size to accommodate the large congregation, with the limited means at their disposal, is a problem

that is not easy of solution. However, plans recently arrived from Ross and McDonald, contractors, of Montreal, show a building that would suit all requirements and be within the means of the congregation. After a accept these plans. The style of the proposed structure is North Italian or Byzantine, the features of which are the dome, arches, and pillars, and

the material used will be concrete. The architects have been instructed to prepare working drawings and specifications, at once, and tenders for the work will be called for in this city, Halifax and Montreal.

The choir arrangements and seating capacity will be practically the same as in the old church, but the facilities for Sunday School and League work will be greatly improved. As far as the committee can ascertain at present, the cost of the new edifice will be about \$80,000, over half of which is already available. It is hoped to begin the work as soon as the spring opens.

Sealing Commission.

(Wdenesday, Dec. 16th.) William J. Martin, sworn, exam ined by Dr. Lloyd, is master of the S. S. Florizel, and was navigating officer on the Stephano last spring. He kept the log which was produced. The log at the sealfishery differs from regular ocean work. Records of important events are kept, but not with the same attention to details. The log was written at night from notes taken during the day. On Monday, March 30th, no barometric writings were recorded. Did not remember anything special about the weather. Tuesday, 31st, light southerly breeze, veering to eastward in the morning. Witness verified the entries made in the log as to weather conditions, which showed that as the day advanced the storm increased. Whistle was kept going at intervals. For Wednesday, April 1st, the log record showed the weather to be cold and stormy up to 2 p.m., when it cleared somewhat.

Men picking up seals, but ice tight and ship making slow progress. For Thursday, April 2nd, log showed the weather conditions and first knowledge on board that men from the Newfoundland had perished, also detailed movements on the Stephano for rescue of those alive. Ice heavy, making ship's movements slow. The ship pursued no particular course before the Newfoundland's crew came on board Tuesday morning, as she was picking up seals. The ship was moving while the men were on board, but don't know in what direction. The position of the Stephano is on the chart on board, when observation was chart on board, when observation was taken does not now remember just what it was. Witness was about the ship generally when the Newfoundland's men were aboard. Does not know what took place between Capt. Kean and Geo. Tuff, except that he heard the Captain tell Tuff when he came on board that there was a patch of seals; does not know the direction. The afternoon was devoted to picking up the Stephano's crew. Afterwards the whistle was kept going, and witness thought the ship was looking for men until 6 o'clock when she stopped. Witness felt anxious about the Newfoundland's men or any others that might be out. He does not know the course the ship went, after the last of the Stehpano's men were picked up. The Stephano passed her own pans without picking up the seals on them. He asked Captain Kean what he thought of the Newfoundland's men, and he said he had no doubt they were on board their own ship, as he had on board their own ship, as he had great confidence in Geo. Tuff. Witness also spoke to second-hand Yetman about the crew, and he felt sure they had got to their own ship, and from one of the Master Watches the same opinion was expressed as to weather the men had reached their ship, as if they were caught on the ice they would have a hard time. Witness has no actual sealing experience, has always been engaged in foreign voyages. On board the Florizel there is a sufficiency of life boats for 300 men. There is also for signaling, 300 men. There is also for signaling, the Morse system, whisle, and all modern evonveniences. The whistle of the Stephano could not be heard very far to windward in such a storm as March 31st. On the Florizel there are 320 life belts, which are kept in boxes on deck and in the state rooms. Does not think there would be room for them in sealers' berths or sleeping

To Judge Johnson, witness said in a big foreign going vessel, life balts are kept in the berts of the crew. The whistle of an average sealer should be heard 4 or 5 miles to !eeward on such a night as March 3ist last. Some men at sea hear whistles much greater distances than others. The Newfoundland's crew were on the Stephano about 25 minutes. Was on deck when the men left. It was dull and cloudy then, with light snow commencing to fall. Witness thought it looked like dirty weather, but the glass did not indicate it. Knew nothing of the men's movements after they left the ship. Only during recent left the ship. Only during recent years, witness thinks, have the sealers carried navigating officers, certificated. Did not think the Newfoundland would do much with the canvas available on board. Thinks a certificated navigator should be on board all sealers, but the ordinary masters are quite capable to look after their ships in case of accident. Did not notice wheeling, but its general trend was

To Judge Emerson witness said that all the men he spoke to felt sure the crew of the Newfoundland were safe on board their ship. Witness did not know whether the Stephano made any effort to find the Newfoundland's crew on Wednesday. He did not see the Newfoundland on that day.

Patrick J. Barklay sworn, examined by Dr. Lloyd, is wireless operator on the S. S. Florizel, and was in that ship at the ice last spring. Witness identified messages which pass-ed from the Florizel to other ships of the fleet at the ice last spring. The operator's record was produced. The time variations were explained by differences of time with New York. Witness had sent a message to the Stephano (unofficial) on Tuesday, March

Doctors and Gas Fires

In an article which recently appeared in the London "Evening News." Mr. W. G. Faulkner stated: "In making my inquiries I discovered one significant fact. This was that one company-the Gas Light and Coke Company-had among their consumers 2,500 doctors who had gas fires instalten or a dozen; that 1,500 of these doctors had become users of gas during the past three years; and that not one had ever given them un."





Mexican Politics.

author of "At Good Old Siwash." For the last six months the United ttention to a study of its politics. narrow in its outlook it is now advisable that the American citizen should look carefully over the politics of Mexico, a remarkably free and easy republic located south of this country and usually about 10,000 miles in the air.

Mexico has also been electing officials. The Mexican system of politics is a very simple one, but it should be understood by the emigrant before he settles down in the country and begins to vote in the carefree American method.

Mexico is governed by a president and a battery of quick-firers. The president is elected by the free-born and unterrified citizenship. The elections occur whenever the incoming president or the one who declines to go out has gotten a good strategic position for the ballot boxes. The method of voting is simple. The voter approaches the polls under a flag of ruce and gives bail. He also gives three chairs for the president. He is then searched and if no incriminating evidence is found upon him he is dismissed with a warning. If he is of an unusually good reputation he is also given a bulletin announcing the result of the election which is being

Mexican politics are continuous but sporadic. In some parts of the country there may not be any politics for several years, during which large crops will be raised continuously, and the people will use their bomb-proofs for wine cellars. In other sections there will be no cessation of politics except when the ammunition of one party or the other is temporarily exhausted. The roorback and the campaign pledge are not used in Mexico, but the charge and countercharge are very popular as are also the pointed and dumdum remarks by both sides. The campaign speech in Mexico is short and simple. This removes one of the chief horrors of the American election. The Mexican candidate simply remarks: "Up guards and at 'em," and the voter fixes his bayonet and does the rest.

Mexican politics are hard upon the country which has become a desert waste during the last few elections. However, they are not much more ruinous than the brand used in the United States. When one party begins to shout hard times as soon as the other party is in power and keeps it up until ten thousand fat and fearful bankers grab the cash of the land and scurry for shelter, we cannot point with pride to the intelligence of our system.

for a cold winter night. Do not expect good, light cakes unless the eggs are perfectly fresh and you have good, sweet butter.

Save every bone-be it beef, mutton veal, ham, poultry or game, and all the juices left, for the stock pot. Do not serve stock soup as the chief dish for the children's luncheon. A cream or bean soup is much more

oroughly before it is sliced. The bacon afte rthe scrubbing should be

allowed to dry. To remove tar stains put a few rops of salad oil on the stains and llow it to remain, and the spots can e easily removed.
