HOW TO BAKE BREAD FROM CANADA'S BEST FLOUR.

MATERIALS:

3 quarts of Windsor Patent Flour, 1 Tablespoon Salt, 4 Cups Lukewarm Water, Dry Yeast Cake.



PREPARATION

Let yeast cake dissolve in 1/4 cup lukewarm water for about 10 minutes. Put salt into mixing pan. Add water and enough flour to make a stiff batter (about the consistency of pan-cake mixture). Add yeast and beat two or three minutes; put in warm place to rise over night; in the morning sponge should be twice its size. Add enough flour to make a dough stiff enough not to stick to hands or board; after flour is all mixed in, turn mass out on bread board and knead two or three minutes; let rise again about twice its size, then mould lightly into pans, cover well and let rise twice its size. Bake in a modern over until loaf is nicely browned and feels light when taken out of pan. This quantity makes 5 small loaves. If large batch of bread required, increase materials accord-

MAJOR COTTON TAKES PASSEN. GER-IS NOW ON WAY BACK-FLIGHT TOOK TWO HOURS.

Major Cotton to Alexander Bay today. The flight was accomplished in two hours despite an adverse wind. Mr. Blackstad was anxious to reach Alexander Bay quickly and asked Major Cotton to take him there. The Montreal Beauty Powder Tragedy.

BELIEVED BY SOME THAT JAMES BUCHANAN, WHO COMMITTED SUICIDE, INTENDED THE POI-ON FOR HIS WIFE.

Toronto, Jan. 30 .- What caused the father of the "beauty powder" victim to committed suicide has brought out two theories. His solicitor, John Hennings, expressed the belief that James Buchanan, was innocent of the murder of his son, but had been hounded into ending his own life by the mental anguish he endured because from the first he knew that a measure of suspicion rested upon him.

The other view is that Mr. Buchanan had planned the death of his wife from whom he was living apart and had sent the "beauty powder" with the intention that the wife would take it. She did not do so, but instead the son, a promising college student took it as a joke and died almost immedi-

There will be no formal inquest into the death of James Buchanan. Chief Coroner Graham decided that any evidence necessary can be brought out at the adjourned inquest which will be held to-night into the death of the son, Anderson Buchanan, the "beauty

The news that James Buchanan had suicided, just at the time when the people of this city were eagerly awaiting any information as to the success of the search to find a clue that would help unravel the mystery of who sent the fatal powder to the home where Anderson and his mother were living, caused unusual excitement here Saturday. On the day before the case had taken a new turn when the announcementment came from Hamilton that a printer there had printed an order of beauty powder circulars and at once arrangements were made to bring Claude W. McCarthy, an employee of the printing firm to Toronto to endeavor to identify the man who had given the order.

Saturday forenoon detectives went o James Buchanan's home to arrange that he meet McCarthy .but discovered the house locked and on forcing an entrance, found him dead in the kitchen, the house filled with gas flowing from five gas burners of the stove, an empty whiskey bottle on the table and a book of Mark Twain lying nearby. Mr. McCarthy then was taken to view the body but while he could not identify it as the man who had ordered the circulars, the face being discolored by the gas, he at once identified a photograph of the father identified a photograph of the father as the man.

More Than Three Weeks Elapsed

REFORE THE WORLD KNEW

SKACKLETON'S DEATH.

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 30-More than three weeks elapsed between the death of Sir Ernest Shackleton, the British explorer, and its announcement to the world, made yesterday when the body arrived at Montevideo. The delay, La Nacien's Montevideo correspondent telegraphs, was ascribed by Captain L. Hussey, who accompanied the body, as due to a series of wireless mishaps.

Sir Ernest died aboard the steamship Quest, on which he was making another Antarctic voyage, which anchored off South Georgia Island on January 5. His body was taken to Montevideo on the first leg of the trip home abroard the Norwegian steamer Professor Cruvel.

Captain Hussey bore a death certificate made out at South Georgia Is-

land, reading: "I. Alexander Macklin, certify to my best knowledge and belief, that the cause of death was atheroma in the arteries of the heart. Before leata he had not suffered an infectious or. contagious disease."

The certificate was signed by Dr. Macklin, a surgeon of the expedition. The body arrived at Montevideo in a hermetically sealed zinc shell, cover-

ed with wood. Captain Hussey told La Nacien's correspondent that the Quest arrived at South Georgia Island with her main wireless plant out of commission due to heavy storms during the voyage, which was otherwise uneventful. Sir Ernest had been in the best of health throughout the trip. The day before his death he landed on the island to supervise the purchase of provisions and returned to the ship apparently well. After supper he went to the cabin and conversed with his com-

At 3.30 o'clock on the morning of January 5, he felt sharp pains in his back and called the doctor, who had hardly began preparing remedies when the explorer died without uttering a word. When asked why the Quest did not inform the Falkland Islands with her minor wireless set, Captain Hussey said it was not sufficiently powerful. The wireless equipment also was out of order, he declar-






