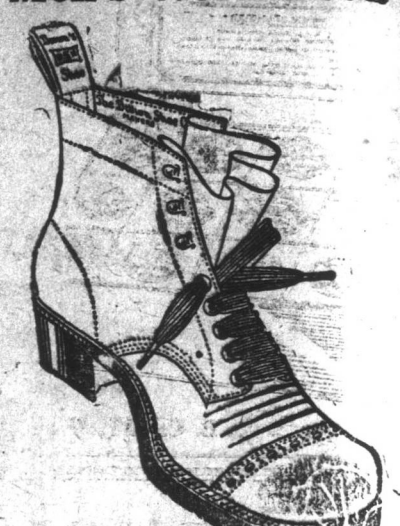

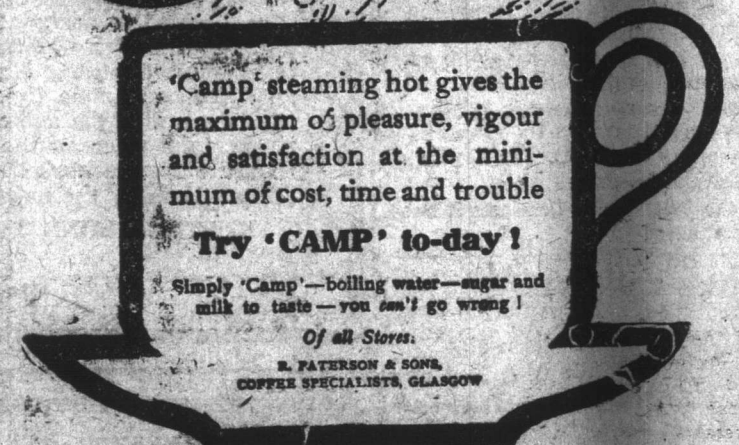

New Zealand Will Send Troops to Near East.

Canadian Cabinet Considering Situation -- Smyrna Laid in Ruins -- Kemalists Oppose Landing of Allied Marines.

CANADIAN PARLIAMENT MAY BE SUMMONED.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17. Interviews with Premier King, travelling in Ontario, and Governor General Byng, travelling in Alberta, elicited nothing in the way of comment regarding the British request for Canadian troops, except to state that it is a matter for the Canadian Parliamentary Council. There is a possibility of an extraordinary assembly of the whole parliament being called to decide the question.

CANADA TO DECIDE TO-MORROW.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17. The Cabinet Council will meet on Monday morning in extraordinary session to consider the Canadian request for overseas troops to take part in the Turkish controversy.

NEW ZEALAND WILL BE THERE.

LONDON, Sept. 17. New Zealand replied to the Government's request for overseas troops by stating she will be represented by a contingent in dealing with the Turkish situation.

KEMALIST DEMANDS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 17. Immediate withdrawal of Greek troops from the Thessalonian region in European Turkey following a convention with Sir Harry Lamb, the British High Commissioner, during a

visit to Kemal in Smyrna. He assured the British High Commissioner he would not attack the neutral zone in the Straits of Dardanelles if the British would recognize the Angora National pact and return Thrace to Turkey.

ALLIES NOT ALLOWED TO LAND.

LONDON, Sept. 17. Kemal forces massed on the quay at Smyrna prevented the landing of a detachment of Allied marines on Saturday morning, according to a despatch to the Sunday Express. The despatch adds that a Greek battleship bombarded the Turkish quarters.

KEMALISTS WILL DISREGARD NEUTRALITY TO FOLLOW GREEKS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 17. The Angora Government has informed the Allies that if the remainder of the Greek army attempted to retreat across the neutral zones of the Dardanelles the Kemalists will disregard the neutrality of the straits and pursue the Greeks into international territory.

SMYRNA WIPED OUT.

SMYRNA, Sept. 17. Smyrna no longer exists. The fire which has been raging for three days with unabated fury has swept the city and extended to the suburbs. Only blackened masonry and a small

vestige of the Turkish quarters now remain.

U. S. YACHTS WIN

BY NARROW MARGIN. OYSTERBAY, Sept. 17. The United States six metre yachts won the series for the British-American cup in the last of the series of races with the British team on Saturday with a total of one hundred and eleven points against one hundred and four.

REQUEST FOR DOMINION TROOPS.

LONDON, Sept. 16. Great Britain has invited Canada and others British dominions to be represented by contingents in the British force taking part in the effective defence of neutral zone in the near east. It was authoritatively reported today. The Government has also addressed a note to Roumania, Jugoslavia, and Greece asking their participation in defence. A semi-official announcement to the dominions said they had been invited to participate "in defence of those interests here, for which they have already made enormous sacrifices."

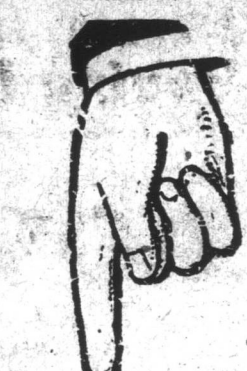

FAVORS JUNIOR LEAGUE.

Editor "Realms of Sport"

Dear Sir—I read with much interest the letter signed "Ranger" in your column of Wednesday, and I wish to express myself as being in entire accordance with the writers views on the subject of forming a Junior Football League. There is no doubt that the formation of this League would do much towards the betterment of football in the city. Anyone who happened to pass by "Buckmaster's," any evening the past summer would have been struck by the interest being taken in football by the boys of the city, every available spot being taken up by boys playing the game, many of them ignorant of the true methods of becoming good players, but if a League was started for these boys and an interest was taken in them there is no doubt that there is material for excellent footballers among the lads. There never was such interest in football as there is to-day; everyone, young and old, seem to have the spirit as evidenced by the record sales at the last two games. Surely, if the League has the right spirit, it is going to foster this interest and do all in its power to preserve the game for the coming generation, and how can it be expected to attain this object, unless something out of the ordinary is done now. The formation of a Junior League is really only a simple matter. It could be conducted on the same rules as the present Senior League, all is needed is a set of medals and a cup presented to the winning team, the cost of which would be paid for in three games, as I am sure many of the games that would be played would attract the same interest as the majority of the present League fixtures. It is probable that there will be no baseball next summer, and, admitting this to be the case, the League could easily hand over the baseball rights to the juniors or at least they could give at least one night a week. It might be argued that the playing of these games would interfere with the boys doing their home lessons, but all the schools have their holidays practically all the summer, and so as this need not be interfered with, it could be arranged to start the games after the holidays begin and have them end before the schools would open again. Come, Mr. Higgins, you are looked upon as King of Sport in this country, here is a chance to prove you are worthy of the name. I should like to see the views of some of the footballers in the city on this subject, surely some of them must be interested.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

BRITISH FLEET FOR SMYRNA.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 18. The entire British fleet is being sent to reinforce the Mediterranean squadron for the protection of Constantinople and the Dardanelles. There is an increased feeling of security among the population of Constantinople as a result of Great Britain's energetic measures. Highest military authorities declare Turkey will not commit the folly of opposing such overwhelming forces. Allied commanders are meeting to-day under the presidency of the British General to discuss measures for the defence of the capital and the Straits. This meeting is expected to bring out the complete unity of British, French and Italian forces.

HUNGARY IN LEAGUE.

GENEVA, Sept. 18. Hungary was elected a member of the League of Nations by the assembly at to-day's session. The vote was unanimous.

PRESS OPINION DIVIDED.

LONDON, Sept. 18. Aside from general concurrence that the neutrality of the straits must be maintained, opinion of the London Press is much divided over the British Government's near east policy. It is apparent that the Government's reference to the employment of force has had a startling effect, and even where it is not condemned, editorial writers express their views cautiously.

IN THE AFFIRMATIVE.

WELLINGTON, Sept. 18. "Only one answer is possible when the British Empire calls its loyal citizens," declared Premier Massey in a statement with regard to New Zealand's decision to send a contingent to assist in the protection of the Dardanelles.

PRESS BACKS TRUSTEES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. The New York World editorially endorses the stand of the Trustees of the International Fishermen's Cup in excluding United States schooner Magflower, declaring that while it is true this vessel has made several fishing trips to qualify for the contest, "no credit is made of the fact that she was built by New England yachtsmen for this race." The Herald also endorses the position of the Cup Trustees, saying, "the idea of a schooner being especially built and designed to win the race was directly opposed to the thought the donor of the cup had in mind in establishing the trophy."

PENETRATED MINERS TOMB.

JACKSON, Sept. 18. Rescuers, working from the adjoining Kennedy Mine, penetrated the Arzonan Mine, where forty-seven miners have been entombed for more than three weeks, early this morning.

AUSTRALIA READY.

LONDON, Sept. 18. Premier Hughes of Australia, after consultation with his Cabinet, announces that the Australian Government is prepared to send a contingent to the Near East, if necessary, according to a Reuter despatch.

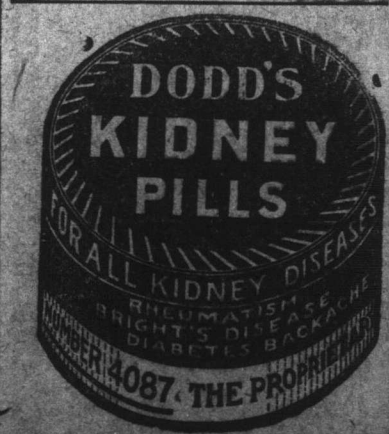

Enquiry Into Manuel's Tragedy.

WILLIAM JAMES KENNEDY
(Sworn)—I am forty-seven years old and am married and reside at Long Pond, Conception Bay. At present I am a farmer but up to three years ago I used to fish. During the captain's season I go out to get captain for my land. I remember Saturday, August 18th last. I was sawing up wood that day near my home. It was a fine day with the wind of the Southward. It was blowing a good breeze. I live near Long Pond. I think I went to my dinner that day some time after 12 o'clock (Anderson's time) and at-

not see the boat except that there was a kind of a kick on the water on account of the wind and the boat was low. The place where I saw the boat disappear was about half way be-



tween the shore and Kelly's Island, and when the sail disappeared the boat would be about S.S.W. from the Island. I do not know the distance between the mainland and Kelly's Island. The first I heard about the boat being lost was the next morning (Sunday) and then I heard that a little boat had left Manuel's and was lost. When I saw the sail disappear first it came to my mind that it was some fishing boat, beating in from some part of the shore and the sail gave out and she was running back for Kelly's Island. Had I thought the boat was in distress and that it were a small boat like Mr. Anderson and Mr. Southgate were in I would have reported the matter to someone. I did nothing more about the matter or did not report it. I have no boat myself. There were some captain skills at Long Pond, but all the gear had been taken out of them and stowed away. In my opinion it would not be possible for any of the fishing boats on the shore to go out to the scene of the accident that day as it was blowing too hard and there was a good top. I was fishing for over twenty years and always fished off from Long Pond in what is called a two-handed punt. I have been out in as much wind that was blowing that day, but not that kind of wind. That wind was right off from the shore and an off shore wind is always regarded as a hard wind and it is very difficult to get back to shore on it. I never left the land in my life in as much wind as was blowing that day from that direction. It would be possible to go out in one of the captain skills with four or five hands if the skills were fitted with cars and sails, but it would take some

time to get them ready and I feel sure that you would not be able to get back to land but you could get behind Kelly's Island for shelter. When I saw the boat first the wind was about S.W., but I am not able to tell the course the boat was steering then as I do not know much about the compass, but I did know the boat was going by the wind with the sheet hauled in tight. The course he was steering he would have to go a long way up the bay and off before he could shape his course for Kelly's Island. The occupants of the boat made a big mistake by reaching so far of the land, as the further off they reached, the rougher the water and the more wind they got. The right thing to do on a day like that was to make short tacks and hug the land as much as possible, as near the land the water was smooth. Only one of the Greenslades at Long Pond has a motor boat, and as far as I know she was on the pond at the time of the accident. You cannot get out of the pond at Long Pond when the water is low, you can only get out when the tide is high. I do not know of any boats along the shore that would be suitable to go out to the scene of the accident that day. I would not care to go out that day in any of the boats along the shore, but I am not able to say what other men thought of it. I do know that motor boats crossed back and forth from Bell Island that day, but they were big boats and fitted out for rough weather and are used purposely for going back and forth to Bell Island. I saw Harold Tilley when he left Long Pond in his motor boat for Bell Island but there was not as much wind blowing at that time as there was blowing at the time of the accident. When I saw the sail of the little boat I did not see any signs of Tilley's boat. There was no person with me that day when I saw the sail disappear. I have no more information to give regarding this matter, but I do say the men made a serious mistake in going off so far from the land. On that day you could row that small boat from Manuel's quite easily, and there would be no danger. The reason why I did not report the matter was because I thought it was one of the fishing boats from Bell Island, and their sail had given out, and that they had gone back again to Kelly's Island before the wind.

Product and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)
Culish—The exports this week totalled 50,741 quintals as follows:—
From St. John's—By S.S. Rein 21, 877 qts. to Alicante and Naples from various shippers and by S.S. Silvia 1,567 qts. to West Indies via New York and Halifax from different shippers.

From Outports—By schr. Eva, W. 2 J. Moore Carbonate, 3,510 qts. to Alicante; by schr. Review from Paragar & Co., Bonne Bay, 1,417 qts. to Halifax; by S.S. Kilton, from U.S. Export Co., Templeman and Jan. Ryan 17,850 qts. to Alicante; by schr. Rbel M. Bartlett from Burn Export Co., Burn, 2,300 qts. to Oporto, and by schr. A. B. Francis, Chantrel 431 qts. from W. Howard and E. Pike to Halifax. The market is weak, and it is feared that prices are not going to keep up to the level that prevailed since the new fish season opened. It looks now as if those who sell early this fall will do best.

Cod Oil—There has been fairly active enquiries and business in cod liver oil at moderate quantities. Dealers are not prepared to speculate with a view to any advance in prices, but they have an idea that trade is improving and that a considerable quantity of oil will be wanted. The market remains steady with an occasional bid at two or three dollars per ton over the regular price to fill immediate orders. Price \$115 to \$120 per ton. This week 41,613 gallons were exported.

Cod Liver Oil—We hear of many enquiries from parties interested in this commodity and its kindred products on foreign markets. They are anxious to get information regarding the investigation of the scientists who were with us recently. We have no hesitation in saying that before has cod liver oil required such attention from outside sources. We are living in a wonderful age and what took a lifetime to develop in former times may prove an established industry at short notice. There is an over-supply of cod liver oil as we know it to-day and none selling except at very low prices just now. Buyers are looking for the new product that is expected from the result of these investigations, but they must wait patiently for reports of the British Research Council of London.

Molasses—The market is quiet at Barbados, quotations having advanced 68 to 72 cents per imported gallon wholesale according to size of casks. The schooners Port Union and Annie L. Warren and Novelty are now enroute to Barbados, one of which will load molasses for Newfoundland. The Donald II. is also there loading. The total imports to date are 3,065 puncheons, which is 4,000 puncheons in excess of last year's record at a corresponding date. The local prices are unchanged at 80 cents per gallon for fancy and 70 to 75 for choice wholesale.

Sugar—The sugar situation is unchanged here, quotations being quoted at \$11.60 per 100 lbs. wholesale. The New York market is somewhat irregular this month both as regards refined and raws. In Montreal when prices seemed on the upturn for permanency some wholesalers bought extensively, but when the market reacted they were to be found under the regular quotations of \$12.50 per 100 lbs. for standard granulated. None arrived here last Monday when the S. S. Sable I. landed 500 sacks, 250 barrels and 250 cases. The imports are roughly 70,000 hundredweight to date as compared with 45,000 hundredweight last year.

Potatoes—The local crop has improved greatly since September came in, and fortunately there has been no frost sufficiently heavy to do injury to the crop. In past seasons early frosts have destroyed promising crops. The potatoes are now maturing well in dry weather, which should result in well-flavored, sound potatoes. The home crop will probably be a record this fall, and it will not be necessary to import so heavily as usual. The price of home grown is now \$4.00 per barrel and \$2.00 per half barrel. Island potatoes will not be in till October.

Onions—Steady at \$2.50 a case. Bananas 13 cents a pound. Grapes \$2.75 to \$3.00. Cheaper later, market now rather clean.

Oats—The oats market is still declining in sympathy with grains. White oats are selling here for \$3.90 per sack and mixed \$3.60. Importers are getting along well for the immediate requirements in anticipation of lower prices later. There is only sufficient coming in to supply present needs. The bottom prices will be quoted when the harvesting is completed about the first week of October. Large importations will then likely come forward by direct Montreal boats thus ensuring low priced oats the coming winter.

Hay—The Canadian market continues weak and local importers are still holding back from ordering large quantities expecting more favorable prices. The market is not settled, which accounts for the small movement in hay. The S. S. Mahoe brought in 400 bales from Montreal this week. The local wholesale price is \$40.00 per ton and 2 1/2 cents per lb. by the bale. Very little hay is sold except to city horse owners. Local farmers have their hay stored in barns and barnyards for the winter. The home crop was 100 per cent. over last year's yield, therefore, imports this fall will be lighter than for many years. It is regrettable that we should have to import any.

Dried Fruit—Currants were offered cheap during the months of July and August but owing to the recent demand the price has advanced 1 and a half per pound at which price currants are held very firm. Thompson seedless raisins are selling here loose in 25 pound boxes at 23 cents per pound and in one pound packages at 24 cents. Seeded Raisins in 35 pound boxes made up in one pound packages at 20 cents per lb. Spanish raisins in 22 pound boxes at 25 cents.

How Electricity Helps Divers.

A new invention has come to the aid of divers who save sunken ships, in the shape of an instrument for cutting through metal plates under water.

The instrument cuts by means of a small but intensely hot electric flame that travels slowly along the submerged plate, melting the metal that comes in contact with it. Although working in water, the electric arc flames almost a way through the iron as easily as a knife passes through butter.

Now the Tool Works.

Down the stem of the tool run a couple of thin tubes through which gas is forced. This gas does not burn but performs the work of driving the water away from the tips of the arc and, further, for blowing the molten metal to one side as it is cut through. When the diver descends to a wreck he marks the iron plate where he wishes to cut it, and then brings his torch into play, the point of the arc slowly moving along the marked line.

The moment the tool is brought to bear, the arc is switched on, and at the same time the gas flows out of the two tubes, so that the hot flames are actually burning in a little pocket of gas.

Salvaging a Ship.

In this way iron or steel plates are cut as rapidly as if they were in open air—a vast improvement on the old method of sawing, or the still more unsatisfactory method of blasting. While in New York Harbour the British ship Lord Dufferin was named. She sank immediately, with sixty-five feet of stern cut off.

At first she offered considerable difficulty to the divers, as a great piece of her steel hull had been bent, and had driven deep into the mud.

But the electric cutting tool solved the difficulty. Rapidly the awkward carrying out the job in a workshop. At the time the river water was nearly at freezing point, but this did not in any way affect the heat of the arc flames! Within ten days of the accident the normal water supply was resumed through the main, a masterpiece of divers' workmanship.

Another instance of the cutting tool repairing an otherwise almost unmanageable break was in the case of a huge water main on the bed of a river, fifty feet below the surface, and badly broken at one point.

Divers went down and soon cut out the shattered section, which was hauled to the surface. Then a new section of pipe was lowered into position and the divers welded it in.

WHERE ROMANCE MINGLES WITH TRAGEDY.

Close to Waterloo Bridge, on the south side of the Thames, there has stood for more than forty years a little coffee-stall, which, if it could speak, could tell of many a heart-breaking tragedy which has had its setting in the neighbourhood of London's melancholy "Bridge of Sighs," with its terrible toll of suicides.

Its occupant, Mr. George Jacoby, who now intends to retire to the more peaceful seclusion of an East-end shop, has been relating his reminiscences.

"Romance," he echoed, "Why, the whole street is full of romance."

"I remember one instance where a meeting at this stall was the means of setting a young fellow on the right road, after he had 'kicked over the traces a bit.' Of course, there was a girl in it—one of the sweetest, most natural young women who ever came out of Hampshire.

Love Finds a Way.

"Her boy, who was serving in the Hampshire Regiment, had quarrelled with his parents, and so bitter did he feel that he would not even spend his precious furloughs in the little country district to which he belonged.

"He tramped about the streets of London, and as he was staying at a soldier's home in Waterloo Road, naturally enough he used to stop at my stall almost every night for a cup of coffee.

"One night a pretty girl approached the stall. She asked me if I knew anything of a young soldier in the Hampshire, and described our young fellow exactly. Blushing, she told me that she was his sweetheart, and had come to London to find him. He did not tell me all this right away, but, as soon as she gathered that I knew the man, and I had told her that probably he would be along shortly, she related these facts in shy little jerks.

"Then came the meeting. A well-built figure in khaki swung over the bridge and stepped into my stall's circle of light. There was a stifled cry of 'Jim!' an astonished and glad ejaculation of 'Doris!' and next minute they were in each other's arms. Two years later the same couple brought me a piece of wedding cake.

"There is the other side of the picture, of course. I would not like to say how many poor wretches, men and women, boys and girls, have passed by my stall on their way to take that horrible last plunge into eternity. My saddest thought is that perhaps, if they had stopped, and I could have helped them a little by taking away the gnawing pangs of hunger, there would have been no fatal, frenzied leap into the last, chill embrace of the dark, rushing waters.

"Another happy marriage I had a hand in arranging," he continued, "had nothing to do with love's young dreams. The parties were both getting on in years, and they came to know each other through the medium of an egg—yes, a common hen's egg. It happened this way.

Egg as Matrimonial Agent.

"One of my regular customers was a young fellow from Kensington. For years he used to have what he called his supper at my place, and I could have timed my watch by the regularity of his appearance. We used to have a chat over the racing prospects—he liked his little flutter—and often I looked forward to his coming to break the monotony of the long night. Well, for once, he decided to have a hard-boiled egg with his coffee.

"I handed over the egg, and suddenly he said, 'Here, George, there's some writing on this egg.' It was very dimly marked in pencil, and for some time neither of us could make out what it was. Then we discovered it to be a short message, saying something about—'If you're single, write to me; if you're married, pass it on.'"

"There was an address of a farm in Devonshire, and a name as well. My customer looked at it long and thoughtfully. 'I've a good mind to chance this, George,' he said. 'I'm getting old enough now, and a wife wouldn't be a bad speculation.'"

"I heard no more of the matter until a month later, when one night he said to me: 'I wrote to the egg address, George, and she's a widow with two children. Are you going to keep on writing?' I asked him, and he said he thought he would.

"He told me later that he had asked her for her photograph, but the reply was that if he wanted to see her at all, he must come to Devonshire. Well, the correspondence went on for about six months, when my customer made up his mind.

"He wrote asking if she could guarantee him a job, and promptly she told him that she could. Next day he packed up, took the train for the west, and the next I heard of him, he was a married man. The job she promised him was on her own farm, and now he is the happiest husband and the proudest stepfather in Devon."

Tuning a Bell.

To the casual listener a bell has only one note—that produced by the actual contact of the hammer with the lip of the bell, or "bow."

But in addition to this predominant "strike note" every bell has other notes distinctly audible to the trained ear, and before a bell can be said to be in tune each of these must be strictly true.

Produced by different sections of the bell—the nearer the crown, the higher the note—are three notes, a fifth, and an octave above the strike note; and below the strike note is the "hum note"—a low note, representing the sum total of all the notes produced by the mass of metal.

The notes of a bell depend on diameter at various points between the sound bow and the crown. The larger the diameter the lower the note, and it is by varying these diameters that a bell is brought in tune.

The tuner's first task when he arrives at the foundry is to get away all traces of corrosion, though it does not put a bell in tune, dulls its tone.

When cleaned the bell is placed resting on its crown, on a special vertical lathe consisting of a rotating platform with an arm with a sharp cutting tool, so angled as to cut the tool hangs on the inverted bell.

The tool is placed in position against the bell, the platform is revolved, and the diameter of any of the bell can thus be altered, scraping away the metal.

Careful adjustment and manipulation of the cutting tool is necessary to ensure the removal of exactly the right quantity of metal, as in a weighing four or five hundredths the removal of even four or five pounds of metal produces a detectable difference in the note.

To test the notes the tuner uses tuning-forks which vibrate at a known number of vibrations per second. Given the rate of vibration of the strike note, it is a simple calculation to arrive at the rates of vibration of the other notes, and he selects tuning-forks accordingly.

Having set the fork vibrating, he places the pointed end against the bell, which, if correctly tuned, will respond by producing the required note. In this way each note is brought in turn.

Tuning usually consists of flattening the notes. A peal of bells, since there is no need of harmonising with other instruments, need not be tuned, like piano, to a standard pitch. The lowest bell is first tuned and the others brought into harmony with it, so that to sharpen a note is necessary.

Sharpening, however, is possible in certain cases by cutting away the edge of the sound-bow, and thus shortening the note.

Once a bell has been tuned it never gets out of tune, and the tuner's bell-timer owes much of his reputation to the fact that in bygone days the bells were hung the bell-tower had not the implements to tune them with perfect accuracy.

"As to smoking, I can say that I have never smoked a cigar in my life, but I must confess I enjoy an occasional cigarette."

Seeking New Boat.

REID COMPANY MAY PUT ON SHIP
OF LINTROSE TYPE.

According to an item in a recent issue of the North Sydney Herald, passenger traffic crossing Cabot Straits both ways this season has been exceptionally large, and it is understood that the Reid Newfoundland Company is seeking a larger boat of the Lintrose type to put on the service—Port aux Basques, to North Sydney. The idea is to cater to the ever increasing number of tourists coming and going via this route.

Scenes of Horror

TERRIBLE SIGHTS AT FOUNDERING OF S. S. HAMMONIA.

Southampton, Eng., Sept. 12.—The loss of life in the foundering of the German steamship Hammonia, off Vigo, Spain, Saturday, will probably never be definitely known. The passenger list was not saved, and the total of those on board can only be approximated.

Captain Alfred Hofer, commander of the Hammonia, asserts that only fifteen persons are missing out of a total of 557.

The crew, he believes numbered 102 and the passengers 355.

Captain Dave, commanding the steamship Kintausa Castle, which brought 385 survivors here, says he saw possibly eighty drowning, while others place the death list as high as 150. One reason why the number of missing will never be known is that most of the passengers were Spanish or Cuban workmen, whom it will be impossible to trace.

During his fifty years at sea, in which he has saved four ships and their crews, Captain Lay told the Associated Press he never witnessed scenes of horror equal to those of Saturday.

"When we received the S.O.S. on Saturday morning," he said, "we hurried to the scene and stood by for several hours until told that we were not needed. Then when resetting late in the afternoon, we got a second call and hurried back in a hurry sea. We saw the Hammonia on her side, sinking, with the ocean full of life rafts and overturned boats, to which drowning men, women and children were clinging. We got out eight boats and there was a great rush among the sailors to be the first to the rescue."

"They brought on board 385 persons. One of our boats delivered seven to the City of Valencia; another 88 were rescued by the Euclid and possibly sixty by the Tudor Prince. If there were any more they were lost."

Captain Hofer, who formerly commanded the liner Imperator, said he had been going to sea for sixteen years in which time he had never suffered an accident. Then, with lips quivering,

"I lost my ship, and cannot even say why. I will remain one of the mysteries of the sea. When we left Vigo," he continued, "strong winds began to blow and we slowed down. Then I found the ship leaking and put her head to the storm, but the water kept creeping upward. I sounded vainly to ascertain the whereabouts of the ship and the pumps working at 3000 cubic feet per hour. I did not dream that such a stout ship could be in danger, but the water kept climbing and when the ship was listing I sent out the S. O. S."

"Then hoping against hope, I refused aid until the very last. I quieted the passengers and assured them they would be saved. When a number of Spaniards became unruly, I permitted them to put off in two boats which quickly overturned."

It was then that the rest of the boats began pulling off. They were met by those from the Kintausa Castle and picked up. "I refused to leave the ship and nineteen of my engineers and officers declared they would remain. Even Fritz, the ship's cook, and Johann 12 year-old Cadet, stayed when the waters were sweeping the lower decks."

We finally shoved off, but the waves were so powerful that, with two men on each car it was difficult to get more than a few yards, and we were almost caught by the sinking vessel. As she went down by the stern there was a big explosion which shot the green sea a hundred feet into the air."
