

ROAD EXPERIMENT TO GUIDE

MOTORISTS ROUND BENDS. An interesting experiment in traf- Potatoes, new, gal. . . . fic regulation has been tried on the main roads of Worcestershire during the past two months. All corners and bends have had painted upon them broad white longitudinal strip to mark the middle of the road, so that motorists may keep within it on their proper side when rounding the bend. The mark is exceptionally plain and lasting, and motorists almost without exception follow the guidance afforded them. More than that, it has been observed that where there is a stream of motor traffic the thick white indicators have the effect of preventing that most dangerous of road practices overtaking on a bend. Where otherwise the following driver might be tempted to swing out suddenly to pass a slower vehicle on a bend, he autonatically slows down and pulls in behind the slower car until both are round the curve and he can see his road clear ahead. Mr. C. F. Gettings, the Worcestershire County surveyor, borrowed the idea from the United States. He used a washable paint, which has proved to be cheap and cf-



Saving Niagara Falls

The Falls of Niagara are threatened ith extinction. Chicago's drainage and power canal diverts 16,000 cubic feet of water a second. Yet the power developed is inadequate, and, faced by the prospect of a power famine, engineers and financiers are trying to obtain authority to divert additional water above the Falls.

To see Niagara at its best one must visit it on a Sunday. During the week industry is in full swing. Hundreds of housewives in New York and Ontario have their electric irons at work. Great stretches of rock on the crest of the Falls are uncovered, and the waterfall has retreated a considerable distance from the shore line. By a treaty with Canada in 1909 a limit to diversion of water for power purposes was set at 56,000 cubic feet a second. This amount is one-fourth of the total average flow.

The 56,000 cubic feet now being diverted is not equally divided; Canada gets 36,000 cubic feet and the United States 20,000. The War Department of the United States, which has jurisdiction over the matter on the American side, has arranged that so long as the diversion every twenty-four hours does not exceed 20,000 cubic feet a second on the average, more may be taken during limited times.



Mystery of Sound Board

The sound board of a piano, although it is actually a thin sheet of fir wood, is a wonder not fully understood in its effects. Most people know that every note has a complete and very elaborate set of vibrations which give it its pitch and character, and all these separate sets are reproduced in the soundboard quite independently. Even in comparatively simple music there are frequently thousands of vibrations going on in that piece of thin brittle wood, which we can hear but cannot see; and with all the crossing and recrossing of the vibration lines which must take place there is never any confusion, and it is posible to select any group of vibrations as the one to which we can pay the most attention. Perhaps even still more wonderful is the fact that the planomaker can make the board susceptible to different kinds of vibration without knowing how he does it.




