Opposition would have Resulted in Defeat.

The Government, of which Sir John is the head, can not actually glory in its strength. Several times since the House met it had to put its best foot foremost in order to maintain its position. In the Senate on Monday the Government had to submit to the dictation of their opponents to an extent scarcely less humiliating than in the Commons in the matter of the Centre Toronto election petition. Hon. Senator Christie moved for copies of all correspondence between the Government and Sir Hugh Allan, or any other person, re the Pacific Railway, also copies of any agreement entered into with Sir Hugh or any other person; also other particulars relative to stock list and shareholders necessary to a full understanding of the relations between Sir Hugh and the Government. The motion was yielded to very reluctantly by Senator Campbell for the Government, after having discovered that opposition would have resulted in defeat. Not even in the Senate can the Government feel assured of unflinching allegiance.

Defeat of the Government.

Our readers are aware that it is a standing order of the House that proposed election petitions require to be presented within fourteen days after the House meets. The rule is so plainly laid down that no person actuated by honest motives would raise an objection. But when some people get into tight places, they would swear black is white, and such has been the conduct of the Government on the petition against the return of Mr. Wilkes, member for Centre Toronto. The petition was not presented until the fifteenth day, and, of course, was objected to on the ground that it was contravening the established rule. Sir John, and others, argued that the fourteen days should run from the presentation of the Speaker to the Governor-General and organization of the House for business, and not from the day for which it is summoned. The speaker, in accordance with a previous ruling, held that the petition should be received. The House was appealed to, which overruled the Speaker and defeated the Government by a majority of 4 votes, the number being yeas 72, nays 76.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Among the petitions presented were several for the prohibitory liquor law, and one presented by Mr. Young (Waterloo) from the executive of the Canadian Press Association, praying for abolition of the postage on newspapers sent from the office of publication. The argument adjourned from Friday on the reception of the petition against the return of Mr. Wilkes for Centre Toronto was resumed. The speaker, after reviewing the arguments, gave it as his opinion that the petition should be received. Mr. Cauchon asked if the question was one of order, and therefore an appeal from the Speaker's decision. Sir John Macdonald said it was to a certain extent an appeal from the judgment of the Speaker; while Messrs. Dorion and Mackenzie reminded the House of the Speaker's words, to the effect that he had merely given his opinion, not with the intention that it should have an undue weight with the House. The question was therefore simply on the reception of the petition. The House divided when 72 voted for the reception of the petition, and 75 against it. The result was received with cheers by the Opposition. Mr. Bodwell moved to refer the petition paying for the passage of a Prohibitory Liquor Law to a Special Committee. After a long and able speech in support of his motion he named the Committee to whom the petition will be referred. The motion was carried.

Board of School Trustees.

The Board met on Monday evening. Mr. Newton in the chair. Present—Messrs. Kennedy, Mitchell, Munton, Ingles, Bell, Raymond, Stevenson, Knowles and Harvey. The Secretary read a communication from Mr. Charles Walker, asking for a check for the amount of his salary; also a statement showing the studies pursued, and the number of pupils in the school. Considerable discussion took place in reference to the advisability of the erection of a commodious Central School. Mr. Knowles contended that we were a progressive people, and as such should not be backward in providing the school accommodation necessary.

Mr. Raymond said that so soon as the Town knew exactly its financial position, in regard to the Municipal Loan Fund and the Surplus, it would be well for the Board to take action in reference to the erection of suitable school buildings.

Mr. Stevenson had no doubt the Town was prepared to spend six or seven thousand dollars, or ten thousand, for the accomplishment of the object.

Mr. Knowles stated that the requisite number of desks had been ordered.

Mr. Mitchell would like to know what the desks were going to cost?

Mr. Knowles said the desks would cost more than five dollars each.

Moved by Mr. Knowles, seconded by

Mr. Raymond, that the building Committee be instructed to take action in reference to the erection of a new Central School, and report at next meeting of the Board.—Carried.

Mr. Raymond gave notice of motion to the effect that Miss Eliza Walker be requested to take the position of assistant teacher in the Senior Girls' School. Board adjourned.

THE BANK OF ENGLAND FORGERY.—The police proceedings against the Bank of England forgers have been carried to a triumphant close. Nearly—if not all—the plunder has been traced and secured, and the case is likely to terminate without serious loss.

ANOTHER NATHAN TRAGEDY.—The New York Tribune says that the murder of a well-known and estimable citizen of Brooklyn adds another ghastly tragedy to the daily-increasing list. Mr. Goodrich was foully murdered in his own house under circumstances which immediately recall the Nathan tragedy. That mysterious affair has not yet been explained satisfactorily. Will the so-called detective force be able to follow up the slender clues left them in this case, and find the murderer?

Yo, Ho.—Our Japanese friends may have a new foreign difficulty. It is not likely that China will readily yield the great island of Formosa, to which the Japanese lay claim. That part of the island which faces the main land is settled and governed by Chinese, and is included in one of the provinces of the Empire. The rest of Formosa is settled by a wild and inhospitable race, suspected of cannibalism, and not specially desirable as subjects.
