THE ANNUAL REPORT,

up to June 30th, 1881, shows a decrease in the earnings as compared with 1880 of \$11,043. The total earnings in 1879 were \$284,947, in 1886 \$319,714, in 1881 \$303,-670. The cost of working has increased from 66.4 per cent. of the gross earnings in 1880 to \$4.7 per cent. in 1881. The floating debt has been reduced to a comparatively small amount, and can be readily managed by the incoming board. The agreement with the Grand Trunk not having been earried out, the line was not handed over to that company. The \$1,000,000 in preference bonds have been issued, and with the proceeds the beard are vigorously pushing the change of gauge andother improvements. The gauge will be changed by November next. No serious accidents have occurred during the year.

THE ENGINEER'S REPORT for year ending June 30th, '81, shows that 700 tops of steel rails were laid, and a number sufficient to lay the whole track purchased, and a considerable number of improvements made. The cattle-guards have been renewed or repaired. The masonry for the Humber bridge has been completed, and in addition thereto 29 other bridges and culverts. The iron for all the bridges, 14 in number, has been contracted for. Out of 189 miles of new steel rails, 125 miles have been distributed along the line, and 80 miles laid in to the standard gauge. The work will be completed by November 1st. The new sidings are not tar advanced. Ballasting will not be pushed till more cars are got. About 140,000 new ties have been laid in the track since July 1st. The junction with the H. & N. W. at Caledon East will be made. The material for the elevator at Owen Sound has been got out. It will be ready by April or May next. Eight new locomotives will be delivered on October 1st, and 65 box cars and 267 sets of trucks in October and November. Four passenger, 2 postal, 3 conductors' vans have also been bought. Six of the consolidation engines are to be converted.

Westminster, Md., Sept. 14.—Interest in the graveyard insurance companies is increasing. In Carroll county farmers are mortgaging their farms to raise money for premiums. A negro named Watson, aged 78, is living in luxury and supperting his children and their families by signing pelicies of insurance on his life in favor of speculators, who paid him \$20 to \$100 per policy. Watson is partially paralyzed and suffering from rheumatism and heart discase. The policies on his life aggregate \$200,000. He has signed one hundred policies, and more are being taken out daily. The premiums on these policies are enormous, some of the companies charging \$100 a week for every \$1000. These premiums are ruining the holders of policies. This is only a sample of dozens of cases in western Maryland. The records of the county court show an astonishing increase of mortgages filed, and it is accepted as an evidence of graveyard speculation for a farmer to mortgage property. The policies are taken out through secret agents of the companies, all of which are located in small towns just beyond the Pennsylvania line. The agents of operate secretly to escape the officers of the law. Sometimes when a man is known to be dying policies for large amounts are taken out good for twenty-four hours or longer. 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
