The Census of Manufactories.

That the last census was imperfect we must admit, or honor it as the only perfect thing on this earth. But the imperfection which is being charged against it seems to be rather made from political spite than on grounds which apply to the collection of such statistics.

The object of the census, so far as manufactories were concerned, was to acquire full information in regard to the industrial occupations of the people. In carrying out this design it was necessary to give statistics, including every form of manufacture, however small their operations or however distinguishable from such as are technically known as manufacturing enterprises.

It is objected that such occupations as "shoemakers, tailors, bakers, cabinet-makers, blacksmiths, etc.," ought not to be comprised in a cansus of our industries, because such occupations are a necessity in every country. The objection is frivolous. Had such a rule been observed the census would have brought the Government into ridicule amongst statisticians all over the model.
