done with powder? Too much powder is unsightly and only focuses attention to blemishes.

The tint of the powder used must depend on the coloring of the user. Blonds must use one color, brunettes another, and according to the degree of fairness or darkness; also for evening use there are certain shades of powder which are much more becoming than the tints most attractive to

the daylight. The kind of powder? Any pure powder. In cheap powders there will be some sort of adulteration that will harm the skin. The best is the cheap-

The best powder to use is a powder that is very soft and light with clinging qualities-one that does not seen to "pack."

The powder should be used in the morning. If during the day the face shines gently rub over it the powder puff wrapped in a fresh handkerchief.

Nougat Cake.

Cream one-half cupful of butter, add one cupful of sugar and beat until very light. Sift two cupfuls of flour with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder and add alternately with one-half cupful of milk. Flavor with two teaspoonfuls of vanilla, beat thoroughly, then fold in the stiffly beaten whites of four eggs and bake half an hour in a shallow tin. Cool and spread with nougat frosting.

Nougat Frosting .- Chop one capful of almonds and brown them in the oven. Melt one-third cupful of sugar to a caramel, add the almonds, cool and pound to a powder. Boil one cupful of sugar and one-quarter cupful of water until the sirup will thread, add the almond powder, pour slowly into the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs and be at until stiff enough to spread.
