### UKRAINIANS MAKE APPEAL TO OTTAWA

#### In Mass Meeting at St. Catharines Ask Return to Native Land.

St. Catharines, Feb. 27.—Three hundred Ukrainian residents of St. Catharines at a mass meeting, decided to send an urgent appeal to the Dominion government on behalf of the Ukrainians in Canada:

- 1.—To open the borders for the re-emigration of the Ukrainians from Canada to their native land.
- 2.—That correspondence between Ukraine and Canada be renewed.
- 3.—To permit us to organize ourselves for self support for the re-emigration to the old country.
- 4.—To abolish the registration of these Ukrainians who came here from Galicia and Bukovina, for in fact they are not Austrians but a part of the democratic Ukrainian people, which has not and could not have any sympathy towards Austria, in equal with other Slav people who shed their own blood in battle against the Hapsburgs and Hohenzollerns' despotism.

As reasons for the request a memorial prepared by the executive committee and which is being sent to the secretary of state, cites the following: Twenty years ago there appeared in our towns and villages agents of the Canadian government who implored us to emigrate to western Canada to take up homesteads and to toll on farms. C.P.R. agents begged us in turn to come to work on railroads. We Ukrainians, both in Russia and in Austria, not being able to stand any more of the oppression of those two despotic governments, emigrated to Canada.

#### Were Against Austria.

Ninety per cent. of the Ukrainians bought Victory bonds. No one can prove with facts that during the war there was a single spy in our midst, just the opposite, the Ukrainians were eager to see the downfall of Austria.

Investigation showed that the former ruler might legally claim 75,000,000 marks as his own, but the government decided to allow him temporarily only 600,000 marks to meet present indebtedness and future expenses.

The correspondent's informant, in calling attention to the development, declared it put an end to rumors that the former emperor had been able to take large sums of money with him when he fled into Holland.

### YEAR OF PROSPERITY FOR NIAGARA SYSTEM

Municipalities on the Niagara system of the Hydro-Electricity Commission will have a financial report for the year ending October 31st, 1918, which shows a net surplus of \$184,421.10.

The maximum amount of power used when munition factories were in full blast was 145,000 h.p., but in spite of the fact that the munition factories have almost closed down, the municipalities are now using 146,000 h.p. Last year, in fact, was a record in prosperity.

The entire sum of \$44,821 for administration of the street cleaning department was passed without any cuts being made, following a lengthy discussion, in which several spoke at the same time.
