JAMES J. HILL IS A CANADIAN AND GENIUS IN RAILROADING. Born on a Farm Near Guelph, He Has Risen by His Own Untiring Efforts to a Position of Prominent Influence—Sketch of His Life.

James J. Hill, the railway magnate, who, with J. Pierpont Morgan and J. P. Rockefeller, brought to St. Paul the partnership that in 1870, Mr. Hill embarked in the St. Paul and Northern Pacific.

Mr. Hill did not originate the railway system of Minnesota and the Northwest, nor did he really become a powerful factor in railroad affairs until a comparatively recent period. His original ventures were in connection with other transportation lines.

Mr. Hill's early life was spent on a small farm near Guelph in Upper Canada. His father was a Scotchman, both frugal, industrious and hardworking.

When he was 18 years old, in 1858, young Hill set out to seek his fortune in the West. He remained for only a short period in the East, and in July, 1859, he sailed for the Northwest.

Mr. Hill's first communication had been opened with St. Paul and Mr. Hill, who had been in the city for some time, was unable to get a freight receipt from any of the railroads.
