A DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.

Conseller Dent of Middleburgh, Yorkshire, District of Toronto Club, Alderman E. S. Cox, chairman of the Civic Reception Committee, presided last evening at a dinner given in the Toronto Club to Mr. T. B. Dent, member of the municipal council of Middleburgh, Yorkshire. Among those present were His Worship the Mayor, Mr. J. J. Fry, Mr. L. A. De Puyne, Mr. L. A. Ald. McMurdoch, Dr. Lynd, Dr. Winnett, Messrs B. T. Coady, Larry Armstrong, J. C. Hopkins, Harry Crowe, W. H. Knowlton, Seymour Corley and H. J. F. Wood. After the toast of the King, Ald. Cox gave that of the guest, Mr. Dent, who paid a glowing tribute to the services of the Mayor and the Municipal Council of Middleburgh, and how highly that service was appreciated and how much it had done to build up the Mother Country. He more than hinted that the result would be a great rush of English capital to this country. He had in his pocket a letter from a member of that corps, the Strathcona Horse, which spoke most of the feats performed, but which in England were household words. Canada was henceforth bound to the Mother Country by a tie that could never be broken. Now that the colonies had spoken by deeds, there was a sense of security throughout the Empire that was never before, and that if the might of Europe came against her she was incalculably aided by the support and aid of her sons in far-off lands. Alderman McMurdoch gave the Legislative toast, to which Mr. Fry and Dr. Lynd responded. Dr. Lynd gave the Mayor and Corporation, and in doing so said there was not a man in Canada who would not respond to the call for arms in defence of the Empire. His Worship replied in an opportunity to the Chairman of the Reception Committee, Mr. Dent, who was a member of the Medical, Legal and Engineering professions, dilating in doing so on the glories of the Empire. Dr. Winnett and Messrs. Coady and Corley responded on behalf of the Medical, Legal and Engineering professions. Mr. Knowlton said with modesty to own to the fact that he was knighted by the King when he was here in 1869. Mr. Coady went into the history of various city loans that he had negotiated, describing in doing so how Ald. Cox, when he and Mr. E. P. Clarke were in England, was the highest bidder for \$800,000, and boasted Toronto finances in a manner that was never before. Mr. Coady saved the Games of Canada, and Mr. Armstrong proposed the Press. His Worship proposed the health of the Chairman of the Reception Committee, Mr. Dent, who was dilated upon the coming visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall, saying that all the people would like to join in doing honor to the royal guests, he did not feel that he had a grievous responsibility as the Mayor had described it, but a glorious one that he was glad to assume.

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

A GREAT ISSUE.

Mr. Morgan has at last spoken on the strike question, and his statement shows that he intends to back up his million-dollar-a-year president and manager, Mr. Charles M. Schwab, in a fight to a finish. Mr. Schwab's announcement a short time ago that he was opposed to trades unionism in toto was taken as a challenge by union men all over the country, and the present situation is the result. The contest will be watched with interest. A great concentration of capital is met by a great concentration of labor. Both sides are taking money, and those who have figured it out say the companies are losing the most. Were it possible for the men to hold out long enough they could cripple even the billion-dollar trust by making the enormous plant useless—always provided that the workmen agree to withdraw from the plant and ship building would have to stop, and commerce generally would be paralyzed for want of the products of the steel mill. Building operations also would be tied up to a large extent. But the problem of getting food for themselves and their families will have to be faced by the workmen, and while they may be able to fast for a week or two the companies their necessities will be serious. Mr. Schwab, the strike leader, threatens to order out all the employees of the National and Federal Steel Companies, if necessary, and says he intends to win the fight. The strike is not for hours of work or rates of pay, it is a straight fight for the existence of unionism. Mr. Morgan is not a given in talking much, but when he takes a stand he rarely gives way, and it is pretty certain that, with his almost limitless resources, he will win the controversy that is now being waged.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

It took the United States three years to conquer the Philippines after thrashing Spain in less than three months, and the same bit history from the repeal of the Scrap Iron Assessment Act is shown in the jump of over half a million dollars in the Gas Company's assessment, and the Bell Telephone Company will have to pay toll on \$505,000, instead of \$30,000, as last year. The Street Railway Company also hit hard by the repeal of the same act. With increases of from \$100 to \$500 per foot on Yonge-street property below Shuter-street this will yield a large revenue next year, and should allow a lower general rate than this year would permit. The Board of Revision has also increased revenue. The Court of Revision will probably have its troubles, however, before the new valuations are confirmed.
