MODERN FRENCH PAINTING.

Prof. Squair's Lecture Illustrated by Lantern Slide Pictures.

Prof. Squair concluded his lecture yesterday afternoon in University College on "Modern French Painting." Dealing with the painters of the last half century, he exhibited lantern slides illustrating the realistic school, which was fashionable in the seventies, and the impressionistic school which followed. One of the most realistic scenes was a Socialist meeting in Paris, which portrayed the excited audience dimly visible thru the dense tobacco smoke listening and scribbling their copy, were the reporters. The whole scene was intensely realistic. Other pictures were examples of the impressionistic school of the present day. The lecture on painting was followed by an illustrated lecture on sculpture. The glorious perfection of Grecian art, the modesty which followed and the resurrection of art in the renaissance period were dealt with.

CANADIANS TOO SLOW.

Yukon Official Criticized Them for Neglecting the Gold Fields.

At the weekly dinner of the Canadian Club yesterday, F. C. Wade delivered an instructive address on the Yukon trade. Mr. Wade gave an account of the growth of the Yukon from the staking of the first claim in 1896 down to the present day, showing the production of gold, the development of Dawson City and its neighborhood, and the improvement in the traveling facilities. He criticized somewhat severely the Canadian politicians and Canadian newspapers for lack of interest in the affairs of the Yukon territory. He commented upon the fact that the newspapers of the United States were well represented in the Yukon territory, whereas not one responsible correspondent of a Canadian paper there. It was also an indication of slowness on the part of Canadian business men that only advertisements of American products and manufacturers were in the papers. There were excellent opportunities for Canadian business men, which seemed to be grossly neglected. Casey Wood, president, occupied the chair, and thanked the lecturer for the information given.

WHAT REALLY HAPPENED. How the Nationalists Greeted the News of Methuen's Defeat. The London, Eng., Daily Mail of March 12 says of the Irish outburst in the House of Commons over Methuen's defeat: The day had opened with a pleasant human touch. Mr. Balfour, after a considerable absence through illness, returned to duty amid general cheers. As his seat was vacated behind the Speaker's chair the shouts of satisfaction and congratulation were unanimous and sincere.

In strong contrast with this amiable and affecting token of goodwill were the shouts of sickening and gloating satisfaction that broke from the Nationalists seated below the opposition gangway when the Secretary for War came to the passage narrating the purport of the evidence of Lord Methuen and worse matters and here, Mr. Brodrick went steadily onward treating the disgraceful ebbition with contempt.

The Irish party, never having any accomplishments of their own to crow about, are ever ready to seek solace in the misdeeds of others. The announcement of Lord Methuen's capture aroused them to the highest pitch of hysterical delight. Critical of "shame, shame" came as a counterblast from the ministerial benches. Years ago a former Speaker exclaimed: "The day has come when the British Empire will be of order. One fell yesterday while it was to express resentment at a gratuitous and wanton performance."

Perhaps from the remembrance of old Irish recollections of their former part in the defeat of the Boers, the official Liberator did not reprove their ancient allies with audacity and articulate emphasis. "No tone speaks disgust." And it is justice to say that the ministerial benches were not disturbed. They had good reason. Those who cheered Lord Methuen's misfortune yesterday were the men, save for the wisdom of parliament, would now be the masters and governors of Ireland.

A further saddest proof of Nationalist malignity was provided by Mr. Brodrick's reference to the stamped mention of this unfortunate occurrence, that the War Secretary took no notice of the transports of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman was gratefully passed a compliment to the wounded general for his long and successful conduct of difficult operations, and to extend a word of recognition to a gallant man whose energy and courage had commended admiration.

Continuing, the same paper says: A very unpleasant feeling has been created in Liberal circles by the Irish defeat in the House of Commons for a very long time. Nothing, said an hon. gentleman speaking in the lobby, could possibly do Lord Rosebery so much good or Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman so much harm as this ill-considered outburst of malignant treason.

"It is the worst thing that could possibly happen to the pro-Boers and Home Rule."
