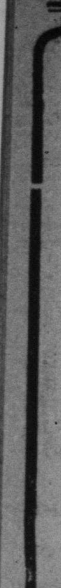

ed. Perhaps the searchlight is not steady enough. If some of those members who make a specialty of attacking his majesty's supplies would look around them they would find more to be astonished at in country and harbor scandals of Nova Scotia or dredging extravagance on the lakes.
