A TELESCOPE TO CONDUCT AN INVESTIGATION



TO 'PEN' FOR 4 YEARS SENTENCE ON BURGLAR

Judge Monck Is Severe-Hotelmen Summoned-Victorin Saturday's Suicide-Happenings.

YEARS' WORK OF N.W.M.P.

Shorter Term of Enlistment and More Pay Recommended.

OTTAWA, March 9.—(Special).—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as administrator of the head of the department tabled in the house today the report of the Royal North-West Mounted Police for 1908. The Commissioner Perry reports that the force now consists of 51 officers and 598 non-commissioned officers and men, a decrease of four officers and 100 men, and 14 constables. Because he had not the men available he was obliged reluctantly to refuse many applications for police posts. The loss to the force during the year was 117 men, 15 by purchase, 17 by desertion, 44 by dismissal and 11 for inefficiency. The chief cause for dismissal, he says, was drunkenness.

The three reasons assigned for not securing trustworthy, energetic men are the long engagement of five years, the rate of pay and the discipline. Commissioner Perry recommends a reduction of term to three years and an increase in pay.

Two divisions are armed, he says, with Lee-Scott carbines; the rest with Winchester. "I am in hopes," he adds, "that this year the improved Ross rifle will be issued."

There was an increase compared with 1907 of 1554 prisoners, due to the gain in population. During the year the police entered 1244 cases and secured 637 convictions.

VATICAN ART GALLERY.

300 Famous Pictures Are Now Placed On View.

ROME, March 9.—The new picture gallery of the Vatican is to be inaugurated March 18, but permission was accorded today for a preliminary view of the pictures. The gallery contains 300 pictures, but the new collection embraces not less than three hundred canvases, displayed in the magnificent Belvedere Court. Above each door is a golden inscription dated by the artist. The first hall contains a splendid new gallery is due to the initiative of the present pope.

The additional pictures have been brought from the Lateran Palace and the private apartments of the Vatican. The first hall contains a splendid collection of pictures by foreign artists, second is given over to the Tuscan school, headed by Fra. Angelico; the third contains examples of the Umbrian school; the fourth is the gem of the collection, Raphael's "Transfiguration" which hangs alone on the main wall; the fifth hall is given over to the Venetian school, headed by Titian; the sixth to examples of the sixteenth century and the seventh to pictures by foreign artists, headed by a magnificent portrait of George IV. of England by Lawrence.

The special committee of the Methodist General Conference will, it is expected, meet during the first week in April. The action taken by the general assembly to publicly censure Rev. George Jackson may be dealt with in the way of a motion of endorsement or otherwise.

Higher criticism is again to be discussed by the Toronto Methodist Ministers' Association. Rev. Dr. S. D. Chown will lead the discussion with a paper on modern criticism and the present position of the Bible. The active connection of Rev. COURSE OF THE COUNTRY ARE THE INSECT PESTS

Black Fly in Mining Country and Methods Adopted to Fight Him—Smudging a Tent.

Black Fly—A small dipterous insect (Simulium) with a black body and transparent wings, abounding in mountainous and wooded parts of New York, New England and Ontario, and especially annoying to both man and beast. It is closely related to the buffalo gnat.

When the snows of winter melt from the silver mining fields of Northern Ontario, the prospector and miner have other battles to fight with nature, and the least of these is the black-fly, the curse of the northland.

As long as the forests of Jack pine and spruce cover the north country, that long will the black-fly thrive, and harass the men of the new country.

In the first week of June the black-fly puts in his appearance, hungry and vicious. He continues to buzz and bite every living thing, until towards the end of July, when, if the weather has been hot and dry, his wings and legs get white, and then he causes little further trouble. He may have established as late as the middle of October.

In the meantime the mosquitoes, sand flies, and moose flies appear on the scene, until the miner seems to live by the measure of the appetite of these pests of the north country.

Early in the season the black-fly is at his worst and the battle of the prospector is constant. If he is holding a drill with both hands, his eyes are almost blinded by the biting insects. If he is carrying a pack over a portage his face and neck and wrists will soon be a mass of bites.

When we see the white bloom on the wings of the black-fly we know the worst is over. Said a representative of the Bartlett Mines, who has spent five years in the north.

The bite of the black-fly bleeds, but does not hurt particularly. It is the irritation from the poison which causes the most annoyance. If the blood is in good condition and the man who is bitten exercises some care, the irritation will not last long.

His real identity being disclosed to him by the officers made hasty the explanation that he was in Ottawa arranging to secure the privilege of a street meeting. Having nothing against him the officer departed with the intention of looking him up later should he be implicated with the operations they were investigating.

Upon his return to the hotel, however, he found the man had disappeared and later in the afternoon was informed by Sheriff Wright of Hull that Joseph Wadsworth, who had just made a sale and had on his person \$4,000 cash, a letter of credit for \$500 and his bank book showing a deposit of \$5,000, had suddenly disappeared with three strangers.

Rogers and the sheriff immediately got busy on the wires and tried to cross the border. Chief McCafferty of New York was notified to meet the train there and the sheriff also sent a telegram to Wadsworth on the train notifying him of the company he was in.

At New York Mines and a man named Buckingham alighted from the train alone, and being immediately placed under arrest they said that Wadsworth and a friend got off the train back up the line, but they did not notice what station they were allowed to go Sunday morning, and their passage for Europe. SAYS HEPBURN ADMITTED THAT PERJURY OCCURRED

Brewer, M.L.A., Gives Evidence in Orwell Hotel Scandal, Which Figured in Election.

ST. THOMAS, March 9.—(Special.)—Once more the Orwell Hotel scandal is in the limelight. This time it is the key of an investigation being conducted by Eudo Saunders of the license department into the administration of the liquor license laws by Inspector William Andrews of East Elgin, who asked that a commissioner be appointed to investigate the charges against David Marshall in the by-election of 1908.

Commissioner Saunders ruled that besides the crown counsel, W. K. Cameron, K.C., and counsel for the inspector, A. H. Backus of Aylmer, he would not allow any other witnesses whose character might be seriously attacked, and then only when the witness was present in court. This precluded Hepburn being represented, and also J. B. Davidson, present to represent other Liberal witnesses.

Woman's Evidence. Evidence taken at Fort Huron by commission, given by Wilcox, his wife and Mrs. Stinger, one of the women implicated, none of whom would come to Canada, was presented. Mrs. Stinger charged Hepburn with intimacy with another woman, who had gone to the Orwell hotel, where they met Hepburn by accident. Mrs. Stinger said she had got \$100 to get out of the country, being paid the money by John Glover of Aylmer, who admitted making the payment, but said it was not Hepburn's money, but money he got from the late Lawyer Stevens, who was Hepburn's financial agent. Glover said he had had reasons of his own, wanting to get possession of Mrs. Stinger's chalet, on which he held a mortgage.

Made False Affidavit. Inspector Andrews claimed he had only been sworn the Liquor License Act and denied charges of conspiracy. Dickson, a hostler at the hotel, swore to the events of the night and to being approached by Glover, who admitted Aylmer and of making a false statement to him and taking fifteen dollars therefor.

Tullie contended Dickson came to him with his story and admitted giving fifteen dollars for his affidavit, which witness had not seen. Lawyer Backus asked why Glover, who witness had spent the money for the affidavit, but witness would not tell. The enquiry will resume to-morrow morning.
