Since the time when fighting with bare first was made unlawful the tendency of the interpretation of the word "boxing" has been to limit its use to exhibitions of skill, and to use the word pugilism when referring to professional

Modern boxing rules, known as the Queensberry rules, which govern even professional prize fights, have done away with the worst features of the pugilism of antiquity and effected a great improvement in modern methods.

The ancient method was to make the punishment as cruel as possible by wearing a cestus of bronze, several thicknesses of rawhide strongly fastended together and projecting beyond the knuckles and by binding the wrist and forearm with leather thongs, by these means adding to the capacity of the bare hand to inflict injury. The present custom of wearing a padded glove lessens this capacity.

The last remnant of barbarism disappeared from pugilism when wrestling, which played an important part in the contests of the 18th and first half of the 19th centuries, was ruled out. 

NEW ASSESSMENT AND THE TAX RATE.

While the candidates for office in the next city council are counting up their possible votes, the electors would do well to consider the tax-bills, with a view to a selection of the men with a proper sense of responsibility.

Toronto does not want niggardly men, nor wasteful men, nor extravagant me: Necessary expenditures are not to be curtailed merely because there are heavy amounts involved, but among the necessary expenditures there are some more pressing than others, and some that will add to the city revenue, while others will be non-productive.

The recent increase in assessment values makes it possible for an extravagant council next year to raise a large amount of extra revenue without raising the tax-rate. There is an increase in the assessment of about \$41,000,000, the amount for 1910 being \$268,737,000. At 18 1-2 mills the taxes on this would be \$4,966,634.

The assessment for 1909 was \$227,800 .-000, and the taxation was \$4,214,300.

On the assessment for 1910, a rate of 15 7-10 mills would produce this amount and \$5000 over. Will the people elect a council which will strike a 16 1-2 mill rate2

On the assessment of 1909 it would take a rate of 21 7-10 mills to produce th: same amount of taxes that 18 1-2 mills will produce on the assessment of 1916. Will the people elect a council to levy a rate equal to 21 7-10 mills on this year's assessment?

The increase in taxes next year at 18 1-2 mills on the new assessment will be \$752,334. Is it necessary to spend that much more money on 1910 in Toronto, and will the people elect a counoil willing to spend it?


