## ST. GEORGE.

The twenty-third day of April is sacred to George, one of the seven champions of Christendom, and the tutelar saint of England ; a knighterrant who was celebrated for many marvellous feats of chivalry, one - of which was his desperate combat with a dreadful, fiery, flying dragon, covered with impenetrable scales, like the monsters of the Nile. In this encounter George like to have met with his match, and might have'said, as England's modern champion did of Buonaparte at Waterloo, that he " never came so near getting beaten" in all his life. The dragon, not to speak irreverently, was a deuce of a fellow, and the saint had a hard tug to overcome him. But he fixed him at last, and pinned him to the earth with a spear, as any one who doubts the truth of the story may be convinced, if he is lucky enough to obtain a little coin, called a sovereign, on which is a striking and correct representation of the combat, with the death of the dragon, "drawn from life."

The following account of the marvellous exploit of this saint is from the "Legenda Aurea" of William Caxton. The only alteration is, that we have modernized the spelling ; the diction remains the same.

St. George was a knight, born at Cáppadocia. On a time, he did come into the Province of Lybia, to a city which is said (called) Sylene ; and by this city was a pool or pond like a sea, wherein was a dragon which envenomed all the country; and the people of the city gave to him every day two sheep to feed him ; and when the sheep failed there was taken a man and a sheep. Then was an ordinance made in the town, that there should be taken the children and young peeple of them of the town by lot ; and that it so happened, the lot fell upon the king's daughter ; whereat the king was very sorry, and said, "For the love of God, take gold and silver, and all that I have, and let me have my daughter; and the people said, How, Sir, you that have made and ordained the law, and our children be now dead, and now you would do the contrary ? Your daughter shall be given, or else we shall burn you and your hold." When the king saw that he might no more do, he began to weep, and returned to the people, and demanded eight days' respite ; and when the eight days' respite were passed, then did the king array his daughter like as she should be wedded, and led her to the place where the dragon was. When she was there, St. George passed by and demanded of the lady, what she made there ; and she said, "Go your ways, fair young man, that you perish not also." The legend then relates that the dragon appeared, and St. George upon his horse, bore himself against the dragen, and smote him with his spear, and threw him to the ground, and delivered the young lady to her father, who was baptized, and all his people. It says further, that St. George was afterwards beheaded by order of the Emperor Dacian, in the year of our Lord 287 ; and concludes,..." This blessed holy martyr, Saint George, is patron of all this kingdom of England, and the cry of men of war ; in the worship (honor) of whom is founded the noble order of the Garter, and also a noble college in the castle of Windsor, by kings of England; in which college is the heart of Saint George,
which Sigismund, the Emperor of Germany, brought and gave for a great and precious relic to King Henry the Fifh ; and also the said Sigismund was a knight of the said Garter ; and also here is a hair of his head. Which coll ge is nobly endowed to the honor and worship of Almighty God and his blessed martyr Saint George.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

[An apology, perhaps, is necessary, for inserting in our Almanack what may be familiar to many of our readers; but it is often found that simple matters-like those contained in this and following pages-are more impressive when introduced for direct purposes, than when mixed up with an indescribable variety of other subjects. ]

Adulterated Flour.-When you are about to try the quality of flour, proceed as follows :-Grasp a handful, give it a sharp squeeze, and set the lump on the table. If it holds together and preserves the form of the cavity of the hand, the flour is good; but if the lump soon falls down, the flour is adnterated. When the adulterant is ground bones, or plaster of Paris, the lump of flour falls down immediately; but when whiting or pipe-clay is present, the lump keeps its form a litile longer. The presence of much bran is detected by the colour and feel of the flour ; but in this case also the grasped specimen soon crumbles. Genuine flour retains the fine impressions of the grains of the skin much longer than any'which is adulterated. Rub a litile of the flour between the palms of your hands When they are moist ; if you find any resistance, the flour contains whiting. Moisten the fore-finger and thumb with a little sweet oil, and rub a small quantity of the flour between them. If the flour is pure, you may rub it for any length of time without its hecoming sticky and adhesive ; the flour in the mean time becomes nearly black. But if whiting be present, the flour will soon be worked up into the consistence of putty, which will retain the original white colour, or nearly so. Mix a little flour with water in a tumbler, then drop a little muriatic acid into the water. If any chalk or whiting be present, an effervescence will be produced by the discharge of carbonic acid gas.-London Domestic Chemist.
Application of Leeches,-The npplication of these animals is ofen at tended with perplexity. The hest are of a moderate size, and ought not to have been ou any account used thefore, as disenses of a most formidable uuture have heen produced by such means. The part shouldg be deprived of all hair, well whshed with soap and water, aud then wetted with milk. But the best way of ensuring their biting is, 10 obtnin a small cylinder, made of brass wire, closed at one end (and which is to be procured of any chemist); the brass wire being obnoxious, they will immediately attach themselves to the part, and thus save an immense deal of troutie, time, and disappointment.-Ib.
A Substitute for Bell classes.-To a wooden hoop from twelve to eightteen inches in diameter, fix three segments of a circle to form a sort of dome twelve or thirteen inches high; on this frame glue pieces of calico of the necessary dimensions, and give two coats of the following varnish :-cheese, four ounces; slacked lime, one drachm. Mix well and add linseed oil, four nunces. This being thoroughly mixed, add white of egy and water, of each four ounces, to bring the whole to an even consistence. This varnish dries quickly ; the oil prevents its peeling off, and also give a decree of pliancy to the calico. Plants raised under these bells enjoy a more uniform temperature than under glass. The heat does not rise so high in the day, no does it sink so low during the night The size may, of course, be adapted to the object in view.
The Teeth.-Children for themselves, or mothers for them, take very little care of their teeth, until they approach adolescene, and an anxiety for personal appearance begins to show itself. Then, tooth-powder and toothbrushes are brought into operation : but very often too late, some of the best teeth being already in a state of premature decay, from mere want of at-

Caries should never attack the young and the healthy : it should be the companion only of disease, or old age; and even in the latter, it may be kept off, by proper care, till a very advanced period of life. It is therefore incumbent on ull mothers of femilies to pay most particular and unremitting attention to the teeth of their children. Thiey should be constantly cleaned in the morning, and at night-indeed they should undergo a little
brushing afte. every meal a brushing afte: every meal ; and whatever is between them-and there is always something-should be gently removed with a crowquill toothpick, without making the gums bleed, or pressing or irritating the teeth.
The gums require a stimulating action to keep them in a hea'thy condition. But as persons in easy circumstances, and more especially persons of delicate and luxurious habits, to whom are morever open all the refinements of cookery, are not in the habit of masticating hard crusts, or of using any food that can afford sufficient resistance to affect the gums, it beconnes necessary that artificial action should be applied to keep these in a proper state of health. In cleansing the teeth, therefore the brush shonld be hard enough to give the gume a certain degree of excitement ; and ir they bleed at
tirst, they will soon cease from doing so, gud acguire ite tirst, they will soon cease from doing so, and acg uire the proper degree of firmness.-Magazine of Domestic Economy.
Housing and Preservation of Potatoes.-In digging Potatoes much of that mischief ascribed to disense is, we verily believe, induced by leaving the wet and soil-covered tubers exposed to the cutting frosts, which often come on suddenly at sunsel. Every heap ought to be covered with a mat, or with fitter of fern, straw, the haulm, etc. till it can be removed to a shed. The farmer or gardener should make it his object to render his potatoes dry as soon as possil)le, and then immediately to remove thein to a shed-barn or out-liouse. Once dry, they cannot be kept too cool : any temperature, short of actual frost, will be warm enough.
During the winters of 1885 and 1886 , we neither pitted nor carried to the cellar one single tuber. In a barn or out-house all remained-store and seed-stock-the latter in boxes or barrels, simply covered with a mat and Jittery straw. Every day those for family use were exposed, even when there were twenty degrees of frost, while the required quantity was taken, yet not a tuber was injured. One crop was put into a sort of shallow trench in the earthen floor of a barn, covered merely with six inches of straw and a few boards. But this wass too damp. Perfect dryness is the security ; therefore, pits in damp mould, moist straw, and all such materials, are agents of growth, not of sound preservation. In this, as in all matters connected with the farm, the blundering cristinacy, the wretched prejudice
which adheres which adheres to old routine, are manifest. When the farmer shall condescend to emulate the example of the far wiser manuficturér, he will find out that his land will second his efforts. Productiveness, to profusion, will repay tis labours, and he will no longer spoil the gifts of nature by bad manggement, while he exclaims against losses which are the results of his own miscalculation.-London Magazine.
To prevent Milk froin turning sour.- To each quart of milk, add fiteen graing of bicarbonate of soda; this addition will not affect the tuste of the milk, and it promotes digestion.
To clean Paint that is not varnished.-Put upon a plate some of the hest whiting, theve ready some clean warma water, and a piece of lamnel, which dip into the water and squeeze nearly dry; then take as much whiting a a will adhere to it, apply it to the paint, when a little rubbing will instantly remove any dirt or grease; wash well off with water, and rub dry with a soft cloth. Paint thus cleaned looks equal to new ; and without doing the least injury to the mast delicate colour, it will preserve the paint much Jonger than if cleaned with soap; and it does not require more than half the time usually occupied in cleaning.
Freckles.--For Freckles, butter-milk, when it can be got, is often a menns of removal. Here are two Recipes, copied from the London Domestic Medical Pocket-Book:--
Wash to remove Freckles.--Muriatic ncid, 1 drachm ; apring water, 1 plat; lavender water, 2 drachms. Mix for a lotion, to be applied on a pieee of tinen or aponge twice or three times a day.
Lemon Cream for Sun-burn, or Freckles.-Sweet cream, 2 tablespoenfula;

new milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ pint; add to the above the juice of 1 lemon, half a glass of brandy, 10 grains of alum, and 1 drachm of loaf sugar. Boil the whole together, skimit clean, and put it by for use.
$A$ means of avoiding the Smell of Cooking in a House.--The smell of cooking too frequently extends to the sitting rooms, whether the kitchen is under them or on the same floor. This discomfort may be avoided by forming, in the tunnel of the chimney, a little door on a level with the ceiling of the kitchen, through which the smell will escape. Ifthe top of the door is lower than the ceiling, it should be connected with an iron tube running up to the same height as the chimney, by which means it will te secure from the effeets of sudden changes of weuther, etc. ; or a distinct tuanel may be built up for the same purpose.
Composition for Restoring Scorched Linen..--Boil to a good conslstency in half a pint of vinegar, two ounces of fuller's earth, an ounce ot hen's dung, half an ounce of yellow soap, and the juice of two onions. Spread this compositica over the scorched part; and if the threads are not actually burnt through, it will remove all traces of the scorching, and the linen appear as white and perfec: as before the accident. The composition must dry upon the linen, which will perhaps require a couple of washings before all traces of the scorching disappear.
To destroy Bugs..--O? spirits of wine eight ounces by measure, spirit tarpentine eight ounces. Dissolve first in the spirits of wine half an ounc of camphor, which must be done by breaking it into small bits and adding it gradually to the alcohol. Now mix in the spirit of turpentine. Let the beds infested by bugs be taken down, the bed hang ings hung ip the sun, for a few days until they are clear. The feather-ber, mattresses, and palliasse must likewise ho put in the sun, and a little of the liquid rubbed with a feather round every knob or snot on the mattress. The bedstend must now be taken to pieces and every part of it wetted with the hiquid, as mutt all the remaining furniture in the room, and likewise the walls. Wherever the liquid is put, every bug will dis, and every tgg be destroyed.
How to destroy Weeds.---Docks and some sorts of weeds are very difflcult to get out of the ground, being apt to shout again if any part of the root is leff. The following is a simple and easy method of extirpating them :--Cut off the top of the root with a corner of a hoe, and sprinkle thereon a few grains of common salt ; and such is the effect of the saline particles upon that part of the root remaining in the ground, that it decays in a ehort time.
To preserve Water in Sea-Casks and Cisterns-Water may be preserved quite pure either in long voyages or in cisterns by the addition of about three pounds of the black oxide of manganese powdered ; stir it well together and the water will lose any bad taste it may have acquired, and will keep for an indefinite length of time.

This is occasioned by observing that such exercises are not greatly relished by the mass of AImanack readers,-and to make them so they should be of a more popular character than most of those with which we have been favoured; Mathematicians, of the higher grade, live in a world of their own, and
