*Directions for Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed
Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax.*

SAMBRO island and light house is in latitude 44 deg 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E. ; if it bears more easterly, stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward ; then keep it open on your larboard bow ; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note.—The western ledges lie from the light S W. distant two miles, the other W S W. about one league ; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water ; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E N E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chedabucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a-breast of Chedabucto Head, run N $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of George's island.

When within $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile of George's island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meager's beach, run rather nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chedabucto Head as you open Halifax harbour ; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

*Signals made at Fort George, when Vessels are coming
into Halifax Harbour.*

- One ball close, for one square-rigged vessel
- One ball half hoisted, for two do
- Two balls close, for three do

The above are hoisted at the east or west yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard until the vessels can be seen, when one or more of the following descriptive colours, will be hoisted at the mast-head.

An Union for a flag-ship, with or without a squadron.
Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two-decker.
Do. with a blue pendant over it for a frigate.
Do. with a white pendant over it, for a small armed vessel
A red flag pierced white, for a packet.
A blue pendant for a merchant ship.
A red pendant for a merchant brig.
A white pendant for a topsail sloop or schooner.
A red flag for a neutral man of war.
Do. with a blue pendant under it, for a neutral merchant ship.
Do. with a red pendant under it, for a neutral brig.
Do. with a white pendant under it, a sloop or schooner.

Enemy's Signals.

A French Jack for an enemy's fleet.
A blue pendant under a French pendant for do. ship.
A red do. under a do. for a do. brig.
A white do. under a do. for do. sloop or schooner.
A Union Jack over enemy's signals, denotes vessels to be prizes.

Signals of Distress.

In cases where immediate assistance is necessary, a ball at the mast-head, in addition to the descriptive colours of the vessels in distress : and guns occasionally, until the signal is attended to.

Signals made on the Ensign Staff at Fort George.

A red flag denotes a vessel from Europe.
A white ditto from Newfoundland.
A blue ditto from the West-Indies
A red pendant from the U. States.
A white ditto a coaster.
A blue ditto from some part of the world not described by signal.

A white pendant over any of the above denotes the vessel to have sailed either before or at the same time with the one already arrived.

Repeats from Out-Ports at Fort George.

The above signals are worn at the main. Upon a vessel arriving in sight from the Light House so wearing her signal, a similar one is hoisted on the telegraph staff, or at the yard arm of the Signal Staff at Fort George, with a pendant under it, descriptive of the class of vessels she belongs to.

Regulations in the United States on Commerce.

Extracted from Blunt's American Coast Pilot.

NO goods, wares or merchandize, of foreign growth or manufacture, subject to the payment of duties, shall be brought into the United States from any foreign port or place in any other manner than by sea; nor in any ship or vessel of less than *thirty tons burthen*, agreeable to the mode of ascertaining American tonnage, except in certain districts on the northern, north-western and western boundaries of the United States, adjoining to the dominions of Great Britain in Upper and Lower Canada, and the districts on the river Ohio and Mississippi.

No beer, ale or porter to be imported in casks of less capacity than *forty gallons beer measure*, or if in bottles, in packages less than *six dozen*, under penalty of forfeiture, with the ship or vessel.

No refined lump or loaf sugar shall be imported into the United States, from any port or place, except in ships or vessels of the burthen of *one hundred and twenty tons* and upwards, and in casks or packages containing each not less than *six hundred pounds*, on pain of forfeiting the ship or vessel, and the loaf or lump sugar imported therein, except in such casks or packages as aforesaid.

No distilled spirits, (arrack and sweet cordials excepted) to be imported in casks or vessels of less capacity than *ninety gallons wine measure*, on pain of forfeiture, with the ship or vessel, nor in casks or vessels which have been marked pursuant to any law of the United States, on pain of forfeiture of the said refined loaf or lump sugar, and distilled spirits, together with the ship or vessel. (Vessels are allowed 4 galls. for each man; to be inserted in the manifest as sea Stores.)

Any vessel within four leagues of the coast, or within the limits of any district, unloading goods without authority from proper officers, the master and mate forfeit one thousand dollars for each offence, and goods forfeited ex-

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cept in case of accident, necessity or stress of weather ; which shall be proved before the collector, by the master, mate and one other officer or mariner.

If any vessel having arrived within any district, shall depart or attempt to depart from the same, (unless to some more interior port or by stress of weather without report to the collector, the master forfeits four hundred dollars.

Any vessel arriving from a foreign port, the master is to report to the collector, within twenty-four hours after his arrival, and within twenty-four hours thereafter, further to report the name, burthen, &c. in writing, and shall make oath or affirmation to the truth of the same.

Goods found on board any vessel not noted on the manifest, the master to make post entry, previous to any permit being granted therefor.

Packages wanting, or goods not agreeing with the manifest, the master forfeits 500 dollars, unless made appear to the satisfaction of the principal officers of the customs, that no part of the cargo has been unloaded since it was taken on board, except such as noted in the report, and pursuant to permits ; and that such disagreement arises from accident or mistake.

The master or person having command of any vessel bound to a foreign port or place, shall deliver to the collector of the district from whence such vessel is about to depart, a manifest of all the cargo on board, and the value thereof, subscribed by such person : the penalty for not delivering such manifest, and obtaining a clearance, previous to departure from such district, is 500 dollars for every offence.

Owners or consignees of goods imported are, within fifteen days after the master's report, to make entry with the collector, detailing the several contents and nett cost of each package particularly, and produce the original invoice, documents and bills of lading, which must be verified on oath or affirmation, by the said parties.

Goods from foreign ports, not to be unladen but between sunrise and sunset, without special license, under a penalty of four hundred dollars on the master and every other person concerned, disability from holding any office under the

government of the United States for seven years, and being advertised in the newspapers, with forfeiture of the goods; and if above four hundred dollars, value of vessel and apparel.

Goods removed before gauged and weighed; and if wines, spirits or teas, before being marked, without permission are forfeited.

Persons giving or offering a bribe, forfeit from two hundred to two thousand dollars.—Inspectors and officers of revenue cutters may go on board, examine and search vessels, have free access to the cabin, and seal packages; and after sunset secure hatches, &c.—Persons in charge of vessels, for breaking fastenings, but in presence of an officer, forfeit two hundred dollars.

Officers may seize within or without their districts—persons resisting or impeding them, forfeit four hundred dollars.

The master or commander of any vessel, that shall obstruct or hinder (or be the cause thereof) any officer of the revenue, in going on board his ship or vessel, for the purpose of carrying into effect any of the revenue laws of the United States, forfeit from fifty to five hundred dollars.

Those who reside on the South side of the Bay of Fundy will please to observe,

THAT in and about Minas Bason, Windsor, and that neighbourhood, at the full and change of the Moon, it is high-water about twelve o'clock, and of course, when the Moon quarters it is high water about 6 o'clock.

At Cumberland and Annapolis it is high water at the full and change of the Moon, about 15 minutes after 11 o'clock. In five hours from the time of high water at Windsor, the river is fordable at Falmouth, and remains fordable for three

hours in the summer, and two hours in the winter season. High water at Windsor about 50 minutes later than at Boston, and in Cumberland Bason and Annapolis Bason, nearly the same as at Boston.

Running of the Mail Coaches.

THE Mail Coach between Halifax and Windsor, Isaiah Smith, proprietor, runs twice a week.—It starts from the Wellington Hotel in Windsor every Monday and Thursday morning, and from the Prince Edward Hotel, Halifax, every Tuesday and Friday, it has accommodation for eight persons; passengers 6 dollars each; children under ten years of age half price.

THE Mail Coach between Halifax and Pictou, Ezra Witter, proprietor.—Starts from Prince Edward Hotel in Halifax every Wednesday at 1 o'clock and arrives at Pictou on Friday; passengers 12 dollars each, they are entitled to carry 12lbs. each.

Precaution to avoid the effect of Lightning.

THE places most dangerous to be in during a thunder-storm, is at a door or window, or near a wall, or under a tree. Persons in houses would do well to get as near the middle of a room as convenient, having the doors and windows closed to prevent damp air from coming in. Those who happen to be out and cannot get to a house at such a time, should not by any means get under a tree, particularly a tall one, or one standing out by itself. Feeling for those who suffer through the fear of thunder, I can assure them, if they would bore holes in the feet of their bedsteads, so as to insert the necks of common quart bottles, and remove the bed two feet from the walls of the room (provided it is a feather bed and the room closed as before directed) the lightning may strike the house in any possible direction, without the least danger of a person lying on the bed being struck or injured.

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THE FARMER'S CALENDAR.

IT is an old custom at this Season to wish our friends a happy NEW YEAR; and I wish mine many, and particularly through the present inclement one, in comfortable fires, without smoky chimnies—sleigh rides without overturning—heavy purses with a liberal hand—full tables with generous hearts, and social enjoyments without contention.

If your swine are well fatted you may now kill them, but unless they are, you'll lose the influence of the moon.

Cattle of all kinds, and especially those made use of for draft, should now be often fed.

Much care is required within doors this month, as there is as much or more judgment exercised in spending out as in laying in. Cut timber for carting.

Permit not your cattle to come at small fruit trees, currant or gooseberry bushes at this season.

Neglect not to improve sledding while it continues, as much business may be performed with much less expense, by sledding than carting.

I have one more precept to offer, which will close the month, that each assist his neighbour in breaking and clearing out paths when snow falls.

FEBRUARY.

Suffer not your horses to be too frequently harnessed in a pleasure sleigh; and be careful when they are, not to suffer them to be drove by young and inexperienced drivers.

If not already supplied with a year's stock of fire-wood, delay it no longer.

Neglect not your forward cows and ewes. See that cleanliness is strictly adhered to in your barns and cow houses, without which there cannot be thrift or economy.

Fell fencing stuff, if not done already, and before the sap ascends to have it last long.

If you would be master of your business, now see your farming tools put in order, and not subject yourself to borrow of your neighbour, for remember, "the borrower is slave to the lender."

I must still recommend the manuring wet land at this season with coarse winter manure.

MARCH.

Much depends through the ensuing season on your exer-

tions this month—let not your hemp and flax be neglected any longer, but give it the finishing stroke.

When the weather proves unfavourable for flax, shell your Indian corn for seed and summer use; do not put it off to that precarious hereafter—*any time*.

As soon as the frost begins to quit its hold of the sugar maple, be prepared to take its luxuriant juice, as the first taken is much the richest.

He who cuts and cords up his fire-wood at his door at this season, will save himself at least the mortification of being told of it in fall by his female domestics, ending with the epithet—*I told you so*.

Hay will be found to crumble at this season, which should be sprinkled with water wherein common salt has been dissolved, but be careful poultry come not to it.

See that your fields lay not exposed to your cattle at this season.

Now you may cut scions for grafting, lay them at the bottom of a cellar, covering them with fresh earth.

APRIL.

I can remind you of nothing of more consequence at present, than the security of your fields from cattle.

● Lose no time in ploughing your ground for spring grain, especially where flax is to be sown, as that requires several ploughings before sowing.

Gardens intended for early *sauce* fling up in ridges to become warm.

● Plant early potatoes, but be careful not to cover them deep at this season. Early peas may now be planted.

● Roots in your gardens uncover, and move the earth about them. Sow turnips, radishes and early sallads.

● Complete your ploughing for summer fallow, if neglected last fall, as soon as possible.

Prepare grafts for grafting, by putting them into cold water, or sprinkling them often, a day or two before grafting.

Set fruit trees, if neglected last fall. Put out roots for seed. Sow more lettuce seeds.

MAY.

Grudge not the docile ox good feeding at this season, who exerts all his strength in your service; nor ever urge him beyond his strength.

If short of hay, you may now turn out your young cattle to range the woods till your pasture gets a-head.

Sow early garden vegetables, as carrots, parsnips, beets, &c. before the change.

Flax, if not sown before now, should be sown without delay.

Where dung is to be spread on lands for planting, let it be ploughed in as soon as spread, and planted; but if you can afford it, put a shovel full of rotten manure in each hill; it will pay you at least 25 per cent interest.

Neglect no longer to wash and shear your sheep, whose fleecy load must be very burthensome.

Spring calves may now be turned to grass. When you first turn your calves to grass, be sure to give them plenty of salt for some weeks.

Stir the ground often about planted peas, beans &c.

Put out cabbages for early use. Continue to plant beans cucumbers, &c.

JUNE

Vegetation now begins to make rapid progress. Look well to your gardens, lest weeds impede the growth of early sown beds. Breed working oxen and horses, and turn them to grass. Stick early peas. Cross-plough fallows before they become weedy. Sow carrots and beets for winter use. Weed and stir the ground about Indian corn in low moist lands, before it comes to a stand, and of consequence early frost will injure it.

Set more cabbages and hoe the former early in the morning. Let not weeds be permitted to insult the fruits of the field by raising their heads higher, or bringing forth fruit earlier. Tender plants water at evening. Cucumbers plant for pickling. Watch your bees at 10 o'clock. Buck-wheat may now be sown; A small piece of this grain makes fine pasture for bees through the summer. Set F. turnips and tobacco plants. Cut clover.

JULY

Much laborious service is to be performed this month by the husbandman, which will require his best judgment to execute with the least fatigue and to the best advantage. My advice is, to begin each kind of work in season; to rise early and be in the field, at least half an hour before the sun visits the eastern hills; by this means he may perform half his daily labour before the heat of the day, and of consequence may lie still and rest himself during the heat.

Hill Indian corn before it begins to stalk up. In dry

land raise the earth higher from than at the stalk. Forward winter grain cut without delay, and especially if it begins to blast. Reserve your first cucumbers for seed that are of a good growth and nearest the root. Seeds in general gather as soon as ripe. Plow in stubble. Pull flax if lodged. Burn new lands, and prepare them for sowing at leisure.

Suffer not weeds to go to seed in your gardens, and especially purslain, being not only prolific, but a great spunger.

AUGUST.

Let your first attention this month be to remove your winter grain into barns, if not done before. Secure your flax. Mow natural meadows, and take the hay the same day it is mowed; when mowing sprinkle salt among it. Before it be over ripe cut and secure spring grain; you will gain more by the flower and straw than you will lose by the shrinking of the kernel. At this season inoculate stone-fruit.

Plough stubble lands as soon as the crop is off, if intended for tillage; if for mowing, and sowing with grass seed, suffer not your cattle to feed on it for a month or six weeks. Pull hemp not intended for seed and put it to rotting while the water is warm, not to have it quick and be soft. Mow bushes! mow bushes now! if you have any faith in the influence of the moon on them. Collect in seeds as they become ripe, lest birds make waste. Now make it a point to cut bushes that have got a-head in your mowing lands, cut them level with the surface and burn them thereon. Cut and clear out ditches. Prepare your ground for winter grain, sow it, and if the land be very fine, plough it with a light plough. Gather cucumbers for pickling. Eye your corn-stalks.

SEPTEMBER.

The industrious husbandman will now have the pleasure of collecting in the produce of his farm in general; but in the first place see winter grain sown; and in the next, see his corn-stalks well secured. Put your cyder-mills in order and make up your early apples into cyder, otherwise they will rot: if the cyder is not quite so palatable it will make good vinegar. Get off your flax-seed at every leisure hour. Early planted beans and peas will waste now if not collected in. Apples suffered to lay under trees at this season will be found to be much injured; if they do not rot at once the virtue of the apple decays fast; from

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being deprived of the benefit of the air and sun, the apple becomes torpid and sour, and will never make good cyder. You may now put your flax a rotting without being in danger of the sun injuring it. If any leisure offers, you may now complete laying stone wall that was not finished in the spring. I would here observe, and may it be sufficient, that as soon as one barrel of cyder is drank out, you stop the barrel up tight from the air, otherwise it will become musty and ruin the cyder.

OCTOBER.

Winter apples should now be gathered in, as hard frosts hurt them much; remove those underneath the tree, and pick off with the hand all you can conveniently before you shake the tree. Harvest your Indian corn without delay—or the birds and squirrels I am confident will. Potatoes not dug this week will be regretted next. Flax that was put a rotting last month, look to often: the heavy dews at this season will rot it very fast. Indulge not your children in eating too much fruit, and especially that which is hard and unmellow if you would save the doctor a visit. Let not Indian corn lie long in a heap before it be husked. Cyder finish making as soon as possible; to have it fine and clear, grind the apples the evening previous to laying it up, lay it up early in the morning and press it out moderately. Plough for summer fallows at every opportunity that leisure will admit. Roots in general may now be gathered in, and the land manured and hove up in ridges for the next year's crop.

NOVEMBER,

Let your first business be this month, after your yards are cleared of summer manure, to replenish them with new materials from meadows, pond-holes, drains, &c. This particular I have repeatedly and earnestly urged, and am now almost ready to flatter myself that it has had some small influence, as I have the pleasure to observe that almost every farmer in my vicinity appears emulous in increasing this valuable tressure.

Every wise husbandman will now make provision for the security of his fields, by digging and heaping up stones for walls, to be removed the first sledding.

House your farming utensils. It will now be the business of every prudent man to put his house and barn in a posture of defence against the winter, by banking his house, putting

panes of glass in his windows, boards on his barn, &c. Commence threshing as soon as your out-door arrangements are made for winter. Early made cyder should now be racked off; be careful to put it into clean casks. Fattening swine that do not feed well, give a dose of brimstone or antimony.

DECEMBER.

The season is now fast advancing for the use of sleighs and sleds, which you should see in readiness. Most business performed by sledding is done to the best advantage early in the season. The farmer, at this season has generally a supply of cash on hand, which he will do well with, (after paying his taxes) to discharge without delay, those small sums due the doctor, merchant, mechanic and common labourer, or at least to come forward and make a complete settlement with each, and pay what he can conveniently; this will establish his credit in future with them, and be a means of knowing his own income. At this inclement season be ever mindful of that invaluable blessing, your *health*. "Health is the labourer's right hand;"—let him not lose it for want of caution. The healthy and ambitious too often give a strong constitution the mortal wound, while they suppose it invulnerable. The restoration of health is difficult and expensive—the art of preserving it, cheap and easy.—A celebrated physician has comprehended it in three concise maxims—"Keep your feet warm—your back straight—and your head cool."

Time of going through the Falls.

THE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time.—No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in the proportion to the height of them.
