

London, Aug. 17—(Midnight delayed by censor)—The most important revelation of the day has been that of the landing of a British expeditionary army on the shores of France. Everybody in England has known for two weeks that a large army was crossing the channel. The troops had been assembled at different bases, one of the largest contingents embarking at Dublin. Many other regiments sailed from Liverpool while still others took ship at East-bourne, Southampton and other ports along the coast of the English Channel.

The great canvas camps at the military stations in England, were struck only when it was known definitely that the flotilla of transports conveying the troops, had finished the overseas movement under the escort of strong squadrons of warships,
