A special committee of the Ontario legislature had before it last week Mr. Lawson Purdy, chairman of the Board of Tax Commissioners of New York City.

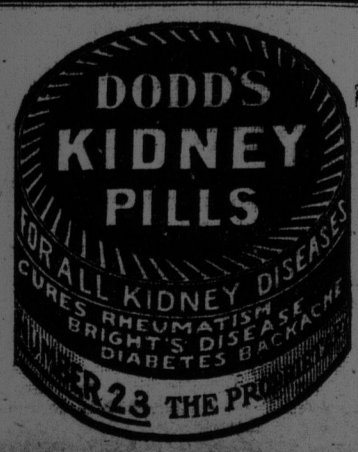

**Shoe Factory For Sydney** (Sydney Record).  
At last night's meeting of the city council, the clerk read a letter from the Nova Scotia Shoe and Leather Company, Limited, asking a concession from the city in view of their intention of erecting their factory within the limits of the city.  
Mr. Gough, who was present representing the company, proposed to erect a factory here at an approximate cost of \$25,000. Ten thousand dollars of this would be for the building, and the machinery to be installed would amount to about the same figure. The company was capitalized at \$100,000, and they would employ about 100 persons, about 50 per cent. male and 20 per cent. female, at an average wage of fifteen dollars a week. He said over \$20,000 of the capital was already subscribed.  
The company asked from the city exemption from taxation for twenty years on lands, buildings, plant and stock, and free water for the same term. Mr. Gough stated that at the rate of 6 cents per 1,000 gallons, about \$100 worth of water would be used yearly.  
A committee consisting of the mayor and Alds. L. X. McDonald, Marvin and Muggah were appointed to meet the members of the company and report to council.

## TO SPEND \$60,000 AT EXPERIMENTAL FARM

Frederick Gleason:—The lay-out of the new dominion experimental farm has just been approved by the director of the experimental farm system, J. H. Grisdale, who came here from Ottawa a few days ago and made an inspection with W. W. Hubbard, the superintendent.  
The plans call for the main farm road to run through the middle of the Gutter property from the river road through to Doak station. The farm buildings will be alongside this road and just northwest of the grove at the centre of the Gutter property. A fine residence is to be erected for the superintendent in the spring, and will occupy a commanding position on the Jewett property not far from the other buildings.  
The main entrance from the Fredericton side of the farm will begin just where the St. John Valley right-of-way crosses the highway and will wind up the hill. The orchard site will take in the lower half of the Gutter property and the upper half of the Adams' property, and running back so as to make about 24 acres in the block. A shipment of 12,000 shrubs and small trees have been ordered from Fredericton and will be set out in a nursery and later used to beautify the farm.  
The main farm road will be 60 feet in width, of which the turnpike will be 20 feet wide with grass plots the same width on each side, and trees will be set out in the centre of the grass plots along each side, making a continuous avenue through the farm which will add much to the beauty of the place.  
It is understood that the intention is to make the farm one of the leading live stock stations of the Dominion Experimental Farm system and that it will be heavily stocked with all kinds of live stock. An addition has been made to the horses at the farm by the purchase of a pair of imported Clydesdale mares from James M. Scott. The mares weigh about 1,200 lbs. each and one of them was imported by the provincial government some time ago.  
The estimated expenditure at the experimental farm here in new buildings and other equipment is about \$60,000.

## TO SPEND \$8,000,000 ON TORONTO HOTELS

(Mail and Empire)  
More than \$8,000,000 will be spent in Toronto within the next few years in erecting up-to-date and larger hotels for the accommodation of the traveling public. It was officially announced that a new hotel to be known as the Hotel McConkey, a 12-story structure with 600 rooms and bath, is to be erected on the new Bank of Toronto building at the corner of King and Bay streets. The building will cost \$2,000,000, and an extra \$3,000,000 will also be expended in acquiring the necessary land.  
Simultaneously E. J. Lennox, a well-known local architect, announced that the King Edward Hotel project will spend \$2,000,000 in increasing the accommodation of their present palatial hotel by putting two stories on the present structure. Mr. Lennox said that the company had decided to make the King Edward Hotel the largest hostelry on the continent. With the proposed addition the building will increase the present accommodation by 300 bedrooms, making a total of 1,000 rooms all told.

## THE JEWISH BOY'S STUDIES

Letter to Montreal Paper on Reasons Why He Looks Pale  
(Montreal Star).  
School teachers and principles often wonder why it is that their Jewish pupils are more in the line for school life for school in the morning than their Christian pupils. They also wonder why it is that the Jewish pupils look so much more slim and pale than their other pupils. They sometimes make themselves believe that laziness is the cause of their being late for school, but they have to give up this idea when they note the activity of the Jewish school boy who always comes to school with his lessons prepared and very often long the class. Their pallid faces they can in no way account for other than by the fact that it is for lack of physical exercise. The truth of the whole matter, however, is that the Jewish religion is responsible for both these reproaches upon the Jewish scholar. A Jewish child from the time he learns to read the Hebrew language, which is usually about the age of five years, must daily offer a prayer to God, lasting about three-quarters of an hour, and this before he eats his breakfast. This same prayer he must daily offer until his death. So it can be readily understood that the reason the Jewish scholars are very often late for school in the morning is that they have three-quarters of an hour less time in the morning than their Gentile fellow scholars. The pallid face and sickly appearance of the Jewish scholar is accounted for by the fact that he uses his intellectual faculties to a far greater extent than the other children that within the reason that within twenty-four hours of the day he not only has to attend the Protestant school and the Hebrew school and do home lessons for it as well. On being dismissed from school at 3:30 in the afternoon the Jewish scholar does not go home or spend his time in play, but he goes direct to the Hebrew school o'clock and sometimes till half-past six, where he usually remains till six o'clock that he finishes his supper. From night and sometimes till the early hours of the morning preparing both his lessons for the Protestant school and the Hebrew school. Besides going to bed so late he must get up early in the morning for he has his prayer to make before he is off to school. Thus the Jewish youth has very little time for recreation, play or physical exercises. Can it be wondered then why the Jewish youth looks so sickly and pale?

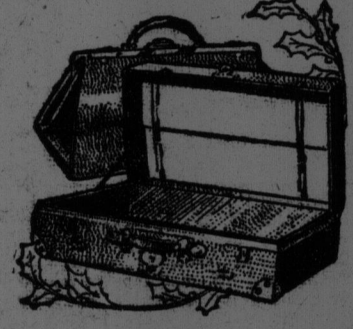

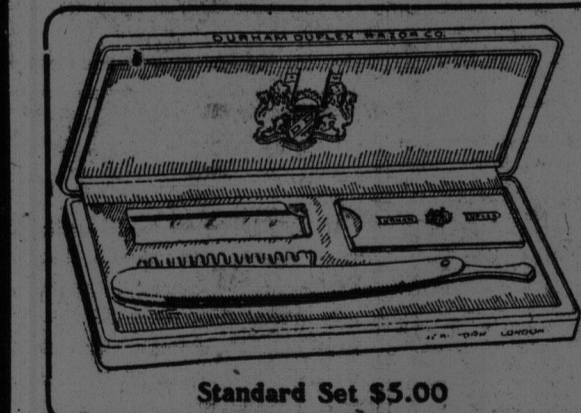

JAMES E. EARLE, LONG TIME MARKET MAN, HAS PASSED AWAY

Was 91 Years Old—Caretaker of Beacon Light on Day of the Saxeby Gale

Market patrons will see no more in his accustomed place one with whom they have long dealings for years for James E. Earle died at twenty minutes after three o'clock this morning, after six weeks' illness. Born in Kingston, Kings county, Mr. Earle had reached the great age of ninety-one. He came to St. John early in life and was engaged in the branches of activity engaged in by him as a policeman here, this in the days when the street had not yet been laid and he was now covered with business houses and homes. In one of his official acts, Mr. Earle received a lance stab and it is thought that the injury then done had its effect through all the years, to his death; too, a fall in Kings street, a few winters ago, in which he broke his leg. Leaving the police life, Mr. Earle became caretaker of the Beacon Light and was in charge there on the occasion of the terrible storm which has come down its history as the Saxeby Gale. Soon after this he was appointed receiver of freight at the old railway quarters in Charlottetown and the later years of his life had been devoted to his business in the country market. There all who had dealings with him came to know him as courteous, honorable and upright in every way. He won the respect of all with whom he had to do and was in contact throughout the years. Mr. Earle was one of the oldest market men, if not the oldest, of the Charlotte street Baptist church in West St. John. His younger days he was a valued member of the choir. His life partner died eleven years ago and one son survives, William F. Earle, of this city. There are also eight grand children and three great grand children. All will have the deep sympathy of many friends. The funeral will be held at three o'clock on Wednesday afternoon from his late residence, 70 St. James street, West End, with service at half past two o'clock.
