

## 7. - What Ministers have Died during the year?

CHARLES LAZENLY, who was in his 33rd year of age when he met his death by drowning. He was a native of Yorkshire. England; had been brought up in connection with religious influences at home, and attendance at the public means of grace, his father being a local-preacher of the Primitive Methodist Church. Leaving home when sixteen years of age, he met with pernicious company, which, with reading infidel books, had a corrupting effect on his mind, and he lost reverence for the Word of God and the public means of grace. He was converted under the labors of Rev. J. Caughey and Rev. G. Bryant, and shortly became a local preacher; and exercised in that capacity in London, England, during eight years. He came to Canada nearly six years ago, and in a few months entered the Ministerial work, laboring with ability and considerable success on the Bracebridge and Bradford stations. He was a genial, friendly man, given to reading and study, and promised to become a more than ordinary able preacher of the Gos-Passing through four years of Ministerial probation, he was appointed superintendent of Platsville mission, where, after a few weeks settlement, his earthly course was suddenly terminated by being drowned while bathing in the river Nith. His death was much lamented, for it was a loss to the church of a laborious faithful minister.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PRIMITIVE METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA.

Grace, mercy and peace, from God, our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ, be multiplied unto you, and may you abound more and more in the knowledge and power of the Gospel.

Another year has elapsed with all its grand opportunities of Christian living and usefulness, also with its blessings and their results. It would doubtless be wise and profitable for us to ask ourselves the question—Have we lived and worked in the Great Master's service through the past year as has been our bounden duty and privilege? and, also, we might institute prayerful searchings of heart that would lead to renewed consecration, self-denial, liberal-heartedness and burning zeal, in the kingdom and patience of Jesus. The beautiful and stirring words of the Apostle are ever applicable—"Be steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord."

During the last year some very dear to us have passed away from our family circles, and from Church fellowship. We have no longer their presence, sympathy, prayers and co-operation, in the Church and in its field of labor. Homes have been desolated by death; but let us never forget the record—"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, they rest from their labors and their works follow them." Nothing can equal in value a well-spent life and its results. God will certainly say, "Well done" to those who live and work for Him. He will "give to every man according as his work shall be."

In reviewing the connexional year just closed, we see cause for a measure of thankfulness, and yet for humiliation. The increase of

166 members has been realised, notwithstanding the loss of those who have passed to the spirit-land, and of many others who have removed from our midst to localities of the country where they can not unite with the Church of their choice, but who, we trust, will "hold the beginning of their confidence steadfast unto the end." For these additions to our ranks we will be thankful and praise God. Yet have we not reason for strict scrutiny as to our Christian work, that the Church's numerical status has not been lifted much higher! Has there been the thorough, hearty working, in the Lord's vine yard upon which God and the Church have claim at our hands! Have ministers and people been really and truly giving themselves up to service for Christ? Let us confess to God our lack of enthusiasm and unselfish devotion, and pray fervently for his energizing spirit that we may be "endued with power from on high." The whole design of the Church's institution is its spiritual and progressive advancement. The employment of all means and agencies is for this grand end. Extension and upbuilding is the legitimate purpose of all the operations, and indeed the very existence of any section of the Church. Why has Primitive Methodism, or any other Christian organization, a being in the world, but that they may bring souls to Christ, and build up a Spiritual House, a holy priesthood among men, to the praise and glory of His great name! God calls on us to put on strength, and go forth in His might to great and certain victory.

It is cause for gratitude that a goodly number of young men have offered themselves this year for ministerial work; and we trust they are called of God, their only motive being to promote His glory in the salvation of souls. For several years past it has been difficult to supply our stations with the required number of young ministers; but this year the Church is happily in different circumstances in this important respect. May these young brethren be made a great blessing.

In making a few suggestions, we would say, 1st, Be faithful to your Church in every reasonable way, and zealously promote its interests. While it is our duty to accord Christian sympathy and good wishes to all who call Jesus Lord and the Christ of God, we should at the same time feel the deepest concern for the success of the Church into which Divine providence has cast our lot, and in

which it is our special province to labor, for the extension of the Saviour's kingdom. Let there be kindly and active co-operation by ministers and laity in the grand common cause, the success of which we all desire. 2nd. Be punctual and constant at the means The prayer meeting, amid the busy worldly concerns of the passing week, should be allowed its claim on your time and attendance, that it may be the means of blessed profit to yourselves and of spiritual power to the Church. Be ever present, if possible, and take part in its exercises. This will subserve your own Christian welfare and give encouragement and stimulus to others. Also, as Sabbaths return, let the House of God be the place of regular and pleasurable resort, practically exemplifying the words of David: "I love the habitation of Thy house, and the place where Thine honor dwelleth." Gather to the assemblies of the sanctuary, strictly and constantly, to worship God and receive instruction in things pertaining to life and godliness. Worldliness is a great incubus upon the neck of many who are professing Christ in this day. The world, in one form or other, is all-absorbing, and it is allowed to corrode and eat up religious sympathy and life, so much so that with them Christian duty is irksome, and religion little more than form. Brethren, let it not be so with you. Use all proper meansthe prayer meeting, the preaching service, the class meeting, family worship, and the prayerful reading of your Bible-to strengthen and invigorate your spiritual life and growth. Religion is Christ in us-the life of God in man.

We ask you all, dear friends, to sympathise with and aid connexional interests. The Missionary cause needs a larger and more carnest interest on the part of our Church. Local matters must necessarily have their proper share of support; but we may commit a very grave mistake by allowing what is local to supplant those institutions that are designed to advance the general interests of the Church. Local interests are promoted by the mentainence of the more general interests. If we narrow down the general schemes of the Church, that call for hearty co-operation and liberal aid from our people—by doing that, we teach them to be narrow and parsimonious in the use of their worldly means. Calls for benevolence, channels in which streams of liberality can flow, should be

various and not few. This is a blessing to the people who are brought to give and do, and a blessing to the world, while at the same time it is God-honoring.

The Christian Journal needs increased support. Among the thousands of our members and friends, we believe its subscription-list might be doubled. Let us encourage this messenger to our homes and our churches by augmented numbers of paying subscribers.

We would venture a few kind words to Brethren in the Ministry. They are but human, and therefore share in human frailty. We have often been struck with the great difference in the effects which characterize ministerial labors. One man spends his allotted time on stations, and all is stationary, or worse, when he leaves. No enterprise has been engaged in—no churches built—no preparations made for the future progress and higher ecclesiastical position of the cause—and no enlargement of Zion's borders. Little or no marks are left behind, that several years have been spent on the station by Brother A. or B. He has gone his little round, and left no record of moment to be read, alas! Another Brother leaves marks almost every where. The Missionary cause receives a new impulse: Sunday Schools are increased and worked; debts are lessened; churches and parsonages are built; and the denomination takes a Souls should be brought to position it has not taken before.
