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

### WAR MAY COME AT ANY TIME.

Russian Fleet Mobilized Outside Port Arthur.

Japanese Have Seized a Corean Rail way and are Landing Guns

naval and military movements have been effected here in response to the Japanese war measures. Simultaneously the third brigade of Siberian Rifies and two batteries of artillery started for an unannounced destination from Liao-Yang, south of Mukden. Altogether 9,000 troops have departed, leaving 10,000 men at Port Arthur, exclusive of the troops manning the fortifications. All the arrivals of Japanese coal have been stopped. In consequence of the military authorities monopolizing the use of the railroad the latter declined to transport any more commerical freight. The telegraph company declines to accept any more press or private messages, so they will have to be routged via Che Foo. Forty-eight hours quarantine has been ordered against Che Foo on account of smallpox. The authorities declare that naval and military dispositions should be regarded as precautionary not as offensive. Port Arthur is quiet.




