Ottawa, June 8.—"Within a week upwards of six thousand of your comrades have fallen. The great majority wounded, are already clamoring to be allowed back into the fray, but many of the gallant lads have gone down. We deeply mourn their loss, but that loss affords an inspiration for tens of thousands more to take their places."

General Hughes made this statement today in presenting the colors to the 77th Regiment under Col. D. R. Street. It is the first official Indication of the extent of the Canadian casualties at the battle of Sanctuary Woods near St. Elol.

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




