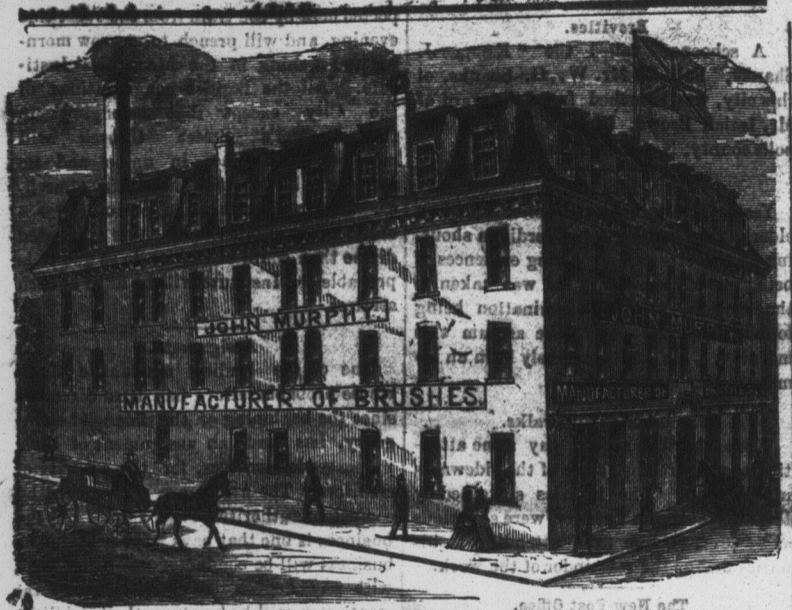

Whence the Watch Thief. Whence the watch thief, who was captured in St. John a short time since and taken to Nova Scotia, appears to have a genius for escaping. On his way over he escaped from Detective Hunt at Halifax, and was recaptured in Halifax and sentenced to a term of imprisonment in the Rockwood prison. On Wednesday last he escaped from this institution by making a bold dash out of the gate while it was opened to admit a horse and wagon, and is still at large. Rockwood, during the past year, has afforded some fine "openings" for enterprising young men.

Narrow Escape from Injury. About eleven o'clock this morning two painless men, James Bell and James Coburn, in the hands of the watchman, James Stewart, had a narrow escape from serious injury, if not death, while painting the upper part of Morris's building, over Greenough's saloon, Prince William street. They were standing at a board platform, a ladder suspended horizontally as a staging by ropes from two other ladders leaning against the building, when a rope broke and one end of the ladder fell to the ground, a distance of about eighteen feet, and the men were precipitated to the sidewalk, but fortunately alighted on the side walk, sustaining no greater injury than a severe shock. A little girl passing by had a narrow escape from being crushed by the falling ladder.

Assault with a Knife. This morning, two boiler-makers named James Timmins and Joseph Gallagher became engaged in a dispute arising out of the question of the right of certain workmen to receive full wages, and after some words had passed Gallagher drew a pocket knife and made a stab at Timmins directly in the region of the heart. In passing through the clothing, the blade of the knife closed, and thus was prevented from entering the body. It, however, made an ugly cut in the coat and vest. After falling in this attempt, Gallagher threw the knife at Timmins with such force that, striking the side of a building, it broke into pieces. The occurrence took place at Lower Cove, in the vicinity of Mr. J. W. Fleming's boiler shop, where Timmins is employed.

Shipping Notes. The schooner "Alma," of St. Andrews, Holmes, hence for Joggins, N. S., went ashore at St. Anthony's Cove, Red Head, on Thursday last. A tug was sent last night to tow her off, it being understood that she floated at high water, but they could not start her. As the schooner is making considerable water she will be temporarily caulked until she can be brought back to ship.

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The French Government lately made a very singular request to the Atia Italia Railway Company. The company declined to accede to the request, and explanations having been exchanged between the two Governments, orders have been given to suspend the boring of the mines.
