Losses in Freight to Richibucto Merchants.
To the Editor of the Tribune.
As the Montreal Times has settled the "Extracted" matter, I would suggest to the editor of this paper the extreme necessity for using his influence with Messrs. Carvell and Taylor towards having an investigation into the numerous complaints of loss of freight and damage to freight between St. John and this port—more directly between Point du Chene and this port. If sufficient complaint cannot be found in writing in the Railway authorities at Montreal, I would respectfully direct the Railway officials to call on or correspond with Messrs. John W. Nicholson, John N. Wilson and other liquor merchants in St. John who have many consumers in this town. The principal commodity in this there is a deficiency in brandy; sometimes whiskey is "sampled"; and occasionally some groceries—a box or two of strawberries—will go missing. On each case one bottle was abstracted. I might mention scores of instances where goods have gone astray, and the importers have been the losers; and although redress has been asked of the Railway authorities at Montreal, the functionaries maintain a "masterly inactivity." The Montreal Times has a large circulation in this town. Its editor is highly respected, and it is said he knows how to look after the interests of his readers. Therefore, would, through the medium of your paper, respectfully suggest that Montreal be asked to cause the loss of so much freight while in the charge of Government officials.

I may further add these losses have been going on for more than one year, and before the merchants and traders here will be imposed on another season, they will seek a different field for making their purchases, and a different mode of having such purchases conveyed to their respective places for sale.

Rowing Matters.
Bernard Biglin has issued a challenge to the world, offering to match his brother John against any man for a five mile race for \$1,000 to \$2,000. The Clipper, having suggested that Brown of Halifax had better accept home challenges before issuing any to oarsmen across the Atlantic, has been responded to from Halifax. Brown's friends intimate that he is not aware of any on this side he has a right to accept, but offer to meet any oarsman in America during the coming season. Biglin wishes to row on the Harten, Hudson or Connecticut rivers.

Common Council.
The Common Council met yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock, at least that was the hour announced, but there was the usual waiting and it was half an hour before they came to order. The Aldermen and Councilors are not prompt men.

A communication was received from the Provincial Secretary calling attention to Act 36 Vic. cap. 22, which provides for compulsory vaccination. The order in Council made under the Act was read, which leaves it optional for the city to accept the law and pay half the expense or not. It was referred to a committee consisting of Ald. Ferguson, McCordock and Rowan.

The East and West side Fishery Company reported that they had sold the lots on each side of the harbor. Report adopted.

The General Committee appointed to consider the Pilot Law reported, recommending that Thomas M. Reed and Thos. McAvity be appointed Commissioners under the new Pilotage Law. Report received and adopted.

The Street Committee's report was taken up section by section. The first section recommended an increase of assessment of \$10,000 for street purposes next year, and that the Legislature be requested to pass a bill to that effect.

Section second asked that a bill be prepared and sent to the Legislature giving the Street Committee power to lay wood-pavements and collect half payment from property owners. This passed, altered by Ald. Ferguson to read "wood or such pavements as the Street Committee may approve."

The third section of the report, recommending certain bills, passed without discussion.

Shipping Notes.
The schooner Edward Alvo, of Lockport, N. S., from Port Royal, Ja., for Boston, was spoken on the 29th ult., in lat. 25. 10 N. 74 W., with a full cargo of twelve feet above deck, foremast, mainboom, and foremast sprung. She would put into Nassau for repairs.

The brigantine Florence, Mayo, master, at Boston, on the 6th inst., from Turks Islands, reports having on the 29th ult., in lat. 33. 102, experienced a hurricane from E. S. E. to S. and W., during which lost bulwark and sustained other damage.

The schooner A. C. Watson—a diver's examination of the A. C. Watson shows her bow, under water, to have been badly damaged by collision with some article causing the leak. She will require to be taken on the Marine railway for repairs.

The schooner Sarah Wallace, of this port, from Troon, with coal, 33 days out was towed up into Galway readstead on the 22nd ult., with loss of mainmast, boom, gaff, sails and rigging, having encountered a severe gale on the 16th, in lat. 18 W.

The bark Ada Barton, McGrath, m. ster, from Liverpool, 18th ult., for Key West, is reported as having put into Lamalab on the 20th, in distress, having been damaged in a recent gale.

The new Parroboro Brig, Prince Le Zoo, damaged by being driven ashore on Spruce Island, about two months ago, and brought to this port for repairs, is ready for sea, waiting a fair wind to sail to New York. She has received new planks in place of those damaged, a new keel has been put in, and she has been ironed. Her bottom has been recalcuted outside, and the hull has been repainted. The repairs cost \$2500, two-thirds of which will be paid by the underwriters.

In anticipation of the arrival of Dr. Penry, Messrs. Huntington Bros. have imported large quantities of fresh herbs, roots, &c., in order that his numerous patients can rely on having their prescriptions accurately compounded without delay.

Seaman's Friend Association.
There was a meeting of the above named Society yesterday. From the report of Rev. Mr. Spencer, Chaplain, it appears a large amount of work has been done among that important and much neglected class of men, for whose spiritual interest he labors. The object is certainly commendable and deserves the sympathy and support of the community.

The following is an extract from Mr. Spencer's report:
Your missionary has been permitted to give the invitations of the gospel not only to English and American, but also to German, Italian, Dutch, Norwegian, Danish, Swedish, Portuguese, Russian, Finnish, French and Spanish seamen, through religious literature in their own tongues, and also through religious services and by private intercourse, some of whom we have received them with joy.

In reviewing his work of the year, your chaplain finds he has preached one hundred and eighty-four sermons, attended thirty-six prayer meetings, made one hundred and forty-three visits to the sick, with reading the Scriptures and prayer, visited four hundred and sixteen ships, and distributed in various languages, forty thousand pages of tracts.

Spring Flowers.
The mild weather has had the effect of bringing out some of our early flowers. A daisy in full bloom, picked from the garden of Mr. J. V. Knowles was worn by its discoverer yesterday. Col. Slives has picked his first Mayflower already, and thus displayed his spring bouquet much earlier than ever.

A Political Injunction.
The following document was posted at Chubb's Corner last night:
In the County Court in Equity between Henry Charles McMonagle and Isaac McAvity, Defendants, and William Elder, John Virtuel Ellis, and other Reformers, Plaintiffs. Before His Honor R. B. Weidon, Judge of the County Court in Equity. To the above named Defendants and John Samuel Boies DeVoe, Gilbert Robinson Pugsley, George Ferdinand Everett, Cyrus Perkins Osgood, George Hiram Lawrence and George Verdigris Nowlin, their servants, agents and workmen,
You and each of you are hereby enjoined and commanded under the penalty of One Thousand Pounds, to be levied on your lands, tenements, goods and chattels, and also upon pain of imprisonment, to desist at once from doing anything that shall militate up the political situation any more than it is, until the said Isaac returns to the City of St. John, or the said Henry Charles has an opportunity to communicate with the said Isaac in writing, as the said defendant William Elder, though defendant to the Catholics is popular with all the Reformers, and never did anything except what he was told for, and the said John Virtuel Ellis is a lover of truth, and although he is desirous of running, he would give way to a person that is both an Anarchist and an Anti-Confederate, to run with the said Isaac, subject to the approval of the said Henry Charles, and also because the said plaintiff, Henry Charles McMonagle, does not want to do all the legal business for the Position, as he is engaged that he has not time to look to all the late authorities, and is willing to allow the said defendant, A. A. Stockton to have that part of said business which does not require much thought.

And from doing anything in the premises until, &c., as enough has already been done without consulting the said Henry Charles, and the said Isaac, as witness the late dissolution of our Parliament at Ottawa, until order of this Honorable Court be made to the contrary.

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Spring Hill Mine.
The report of the coal bed lying on the site of the Spring Hill mine. It has been examined by John Rutherford, Esq., of Halifax, and pronounced equal to any imported. As yet it has been found in small quantities, but if found in sufficient quantity to mine it will much enhance the value of the property.

The new car shed two hundred feet long is completed and ready to be occupied, and the first train of twenty-four box cars, manufactured for the special use of the Company, has arrived at the mine. These cars hold five tons each.

The returns for last month show that the coal raised cost at the pit's mouth \$11.14 a ton, and, as they are now working, it is expected the cost will not cost more than ninety-five cents a ton.

The annual meeting of the company will be held on the 27th inst.
A Company is to be formed to work the Sliver, or North Spring Hill, mine.
