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**BUSY TIME
FOR FIREMEN**
Three Small Fires in Short
Order Handled Promptly
Little Damage

The Campbellton Fire Department had a busy time early this week being called out three times for fires. The first call was sent in about three o'clock in the afternoon for a fire in a shed in the rear of McDonalds drug store, owned by E. G. Kay. This fire is supposed to have originated from a spark from the Shives burner. The department responded promptly when the blaze was soon extinguished but not until it had done considerable damage to the building and badly scorched the dwelling occupied by Mr. LaTourneau. The damage is fully covered by insurance.

At 1:30 a.m. Tuesday morning the department was again called out for a fire in Mr. Wm. LeBouff's house on Sugar Loaf Street, occupied by Police-Man Smith up until a few days ago when he moved out taking with him most of his furniture, the rest being stored in the attic. As this house was unoccupied and the fire having originated on the lower floor, the origin is a mystery. The department responded promptly and soon extinguished the blaze which was confined almost entirely to the inside of the house although several holes were burned through the roof.

Shortly after the fire department was again called out to the west end of the town for a blaze in the house destroyed by fire last fall on Roseberry Street, and owned by Mrs. W. A. Trueman. The fire is supposed to have originated through children lighting matches in the debris which had not been removed, or from a spark from some of the neighboring chimneys. Neighbors kept this blaze down with garden hose until the arrival of the department, which soon put out the fire.

Exempt from tax—Wedding rings, snow shoes, candies and cakes in cartons bearing manufacturers name, selling at ten cents or less per carton; also candies selling for one cent each; band instruments.

**FORMER CHIEF
JUSTICE IS DEAD**
Sir Ezekiel McLeod Passes
Away at Hampton After
Brief Illness.

St. John, N. B. June 12.—Sir Ezekiel McLeod, retired chief justice of the supreme court of New Brunswick, died of pneumonia at 7:15 o'clock last evening at his home in Hampton. He had been seriously ill only a few days, although for a week previous to the pneumonia attack he had not been to the best of health. The news from his bedside during the last day or two had not been favorable and his passing away was no surprise to close friends who were aware of the serious nature of his illness.

The funeral took place on Saturday, June 12th and was very largely attended. All of the pupils of the Hopewood Catholic School, of which he was a student, followed the remains to the R. C. church, Piquet, where a Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Duret, and the remains were laid to rest in the R.C. Cemetery. He leaves to mourn his loss, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Whitton, three sisters and three brothers, who have the sympathy of all in their sad bereavement.

Local Government Votes \$500
To Purchase Necessary
Seeds.
The provincial government has voted \$500 to provide seed for those settlers of St. Quentin and vicinity who lost their crops by the ravages of the recent forest fires. The fire set them back considerably in their farming operations, and on recommendations of Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, who had received a report and request for seeds from Arthur T. LeBlanc, M.P.P. of Campbellton, the appropriation was made. Seed for oats and hay will be supplied. The provincial government in all has appropriated \$2,500 to the aid of the fire sufferers of St. Quentin.

OBITUARY.

John Edward LeTourneau.

Dalhousie, N. B. June 8th. There
is a certain fitness about death which
reconciles us to its approach when its
victims are those already bowed down
to the grave by the weight of years;
but when the days of some are so
precious and useful, the last hour is
a threatening blow, and the heart is
wrung with sorrow, for bright hopes
are brought to dust, and the vista of
life is changed to a barren waste for
those by whom the loss is most keenly
felt. If this truth needs confirmation
none better could there be
than the grief which fills the hearts
of the mourning friends of the late
John Edward LeTourneau, of Dalhousie,
who was the only support of a
widowed mother. He was in his 24th
year of his age. For several years
he filled the position his late father
occupied in the employ of the Dal-
housie Lumber Co., and during the
great war he enlisted in the Cana-
dian Militia. Returning to his work
in good health, he contracted a cold
about a year ago, and in spite of all
the care of a devoted mother, kind
sisters and friends, and expert medi-
cal aid, he passed away on Saturday
evening. He was of a quiet and kind
disposition and was much esteemed
by all.

Besides his mother he is survived
by four young sisters at home, An-
nelia, Marguerite, Gertrude and Phil-
omena and four married sisters: Mrs.
Arsene Allain, Dalhousie; Mrs. Ar-
thur Arsenault, Tracadie; Mrs. Char-
les Lea and Mrs. Adela Belanger,
Campbellton.

The funeral was held on Tuesday
to the R. C. Church and was very
largely attended. A solemn High
Mass of Requiem was celebrated by
Rev. J. A. Harte. The pall bearers
were: Charles Lea, Arthur Arsenault,
Arsene Allain, Adela Belanger,
James Savoie and John B. Walsh.

Mrs. Mayne Price.
The death occurred this morning at
110 Weldon Street, of Mrs. Mayne
Price, aged twenty-eight years and
ten months, widow of Thomas Price,
who was killed overseas in active
service about two years ago. Deceased
had been a patient in the Jordan Mem-
orial Sanatorium, at River Glade, for
some time, and was expecting to have
been discharged a cured patient about
Christmas, 1919. Shortly after re-
turning to her home here, she was re-
admitted as a patient into the Jordan
Sanatorium in January, but returned
home in February last, and since that
time gradually declined until this
morning when death ensued, after
long and patient suffering.

The deceased lady leaves to mourn
two little girls, Grace and Doreen,
aged eight and seven years respective-
ly. Two brothers of hers, these be-
ing the Messrs. Loyal L. and D. Bryce
of the C.N.R. department here. One
sister, Miss Daisy Bishop of this city,
also survives.

Other surviving relatives are de-
ceased's parents, Mr. and Mrs. San-
ford Bishop. Mr. Bishop is foreman
of the C.N.R. Electrical department.
The funeral arrangements will be
announced later. Deceased's rela-
tives have the sympathy of their
many friends in this city and else-
where in which The Transcript joins.
Mrs. Price possessed a lovable dis-
position, and enjoyed the friendship
of a large number of friends, and
sympathy will be expressed to the
little orphan daughters who have been
left motherless at so early an age.—

THE MAORI.

Inhabitants of New Zealand Are
Dying Out.

When Captain Cook, the famous
navigator, landed at Poverty Bay,
New Zealand, in October, 1769, the
natives took his ship for a gigantic
bird and were struck with the size
and beauty of its wings. He spent
nearly a year cruising around the
islands and cultivating friendly rela-
tions with the inhabitants.
They appeared to be amiable and
exceptionally intelligent; but infan-
ticide was commonly practiced, and
cannibalism was an established habit.
The Maoris thought nothing of mak-
ing an armed descent upon a distant
island, rounding up its people, and
accomplishing a thorough clean-up
by eating them all in leisurely
fashion.

Captain Cook estimated their num-
ber at 400,000. To-day there are not
more than 40,000 left alive. Like
other native races all over Oceania,
the Maoris are dying out. They earned
the admiration of Europeans by
the skill and bravery with which they
defended their country in a long ser-
ies of wars against the white in-
vaders. At one time the British had
10,000 soldiers in New Zealand.

The origin of the Maoris is uncer-
tain, but they are presumably of Ma-
lay stock. They have a tradition that
the islands were first settled by an-
cestors of theirs who came from a
distant land in fourteen canoes. Most
derivative of their ancient weapons
are war-clubs made of a translucent
and very beautiful green stone. A
British sea captain once asked a chief
what he would take in exchange for
his club, and the reply was "Your
ship."

The chief explained that the life-
time of one man was required to
make such a war club. Very likely
this was true. For when an attempt
was made to turn out clubs of this
pattern from the same material with
the help of machinery the result was
failure, owing to the extreme hard-
ness of the stone.

The Lesser Evil.
A popular musical comedy star was
taking her summer vacation in a New
England village last year, and good-
naturedly agreed to participate in a
"entertainment" to be given at the
Town Hall for the benefit of local
charities. She procured from New
York one of the costumes from her
last winter's show, and a fetching
poster showed herself in that same
costume. Soon after the poster was
on display a delegation of ladies
waited upon the committee of gen-
tlemen who were engineering the en-
tertainment and protested against the
chic costume of the poster, which
was, in fact, that of the conventional
"prince" of musical comedies with a
frank if pleasing display of silk-
encased limbs.

Now, besides being good-hearted,
Miss de Lancy is high-spirited and
rather thoughtless. The costume
which had been good enough for her
to appear in for some hundreds of
times in New York would do for one
appearance in Haverhill.

"There is no one talking," she an-
nounced with decision. "I'll appear in
that costume or nothing!"
There was a moment of horrified
silence, then quick whispering among
the lady delegation, and a moment
later their protest against the pro-
posed costume was withdrawn.

Flogging Burglars.
Ancient British law has been re-
vived by London justices in dealing
with burglars and petty criminals.
Lashes on the back with the
cat-o'-nine tails used to be a favorite
sentence, but in modern times it has
practically been abandoned. Alarmed
at the rapid spread of crime, how-
ever, Justice Horridge revived the
old-time law and has sentenced
Walter Wetton and Walter Brown,
convicted highwaymen, to the "cat."
"I want it to be understood that I
shall not hesitate in proper cases
to inflict the punishment I am going
to do on you two men. You will re-
ceive twelve lashes from the 'cat.'"
This was the judge's dictum and
order costs are following suit.

Burglary in England is a profes-
sion followed practically with impunity
at the present time. Government
post offices seem to be favorite places
for the thieves to operate. Bond
Street shops are raided nightly and
frequently warehouses containing
costly silks and furs have been clean-
ed out by burglars using automobile
trucks to carry away the loot. But
few of the offenders have been cap-
tured by the police.

The revival of the "cat" and other
medieval forms of punishment
should, it is thought by the authori-
ties, have a salutary effect on crim-
inals. Prison sentences seem to have
no effect on the hardened offender,
but physical pain will, it is thought,
have the desired effect of preventing
wholesale crime.

Paid for Conversation.
Some of the unconventional "pro-
fessions" which have developed in
after-war England include the man
who guarantees to be able to furnish
an afternoon or evening's pleasant
conversation at a moderate rate. An-
other ex-officer, who says he became
an efficient letter writer while in the
trenches in Flanders, will write
business letters to interesting people
for "so much per." Owing to the
ravages of the war on old-established
fortunes, scores of highly placed
women are trying to obtain jobs as
chaperones or companions to women
and girls who have to travel. Others
are willing to share in the manage-
ment of large houses for a nominal
wage. Thousands of girls, some of
them of title, are applying for jobs
as cinema actresses.

An Island Where Deer are Safe



Listening to the Barking of Hounds on a Distant Island.

The deep music of a deerhound's
voice came faintly down the wind,
shortly it blended with the sharper
voice of a hunting Alredale. The
scream of a hungry cougar is not
more terrifying to the timid deer of
the British Columbia coast than the
bay of the hounds on the trail.
When they hear it they get up and
go—straight for water.
The little spiky bush, born a few
seasons before on the rugged,
forest-clad coast of the Pacific pro-
vince lifted his head. His eyes and
his ears, his very pose displayed the
high tension of his taut nerves. He
looked into the forest of the island
on which he stood, and he saw noth-
ing alarming. He turned and stared
across the water toward Nelson Is-
land. The only thing that caught
his eye that did not denote restful
nature in primitive grandeur was a
smudge of smoke that emanated from
the horizon and showed that a C.P.L.
coasting steamer was enroute from
Powell River. Then the boom of the
hound's voice rolled again across the
waters from Nelson Island. The
deer moved nervously, looked all
round again—and calmly bent his

head to bite a mouthful of grass.
He was safe. He was on Hardy
Island.
Hardy Island is the city of refuge
to all the deer that know about it.
Three years ago it was good hunt-
ing grounds. To-day it is taboo to
men with guns, and bell pups, as the
saying goes, it men with both guns
and dogs appear. It is unlawful to
hunt deer with dogs in British Col-
umbia, but it is still done in certain
districts. In spite of law, two years
ago, or perhaps slightly more than
that, Mr. C. J. Leyland, of England
purchased Hardy Island, a gem of
land situated just off Nelson Island
at the mouth of Jervis Inlet. There
were 2,500 acres of rich lands and
forests, and there was a good
orchard. He placed a watchman,
Tom Brazil, on the property and did
no more toward development, pre-
ferring to await the end of the war.
Brazil, a lover of animals, caught
two of the wild deer that frequently
swam to the island from the other
nearby lands. He named them.

Taking an Apple From the Fin-
gers of a Visitor.

They in turn brought other wild
ones. Many of them had been run
to water by dogs and took refuge
on Hardy Island. There, seeing
how intimate the original tame pair
were with the man who controlled
the orchards where the luscious
apples grew, the wild newcomers
gradually grew intimate too. To-day
a herd of thirty deer, most of them
born in wildness, respond to the
voice of Tom Brazil when he calls.
Some of them will step forward
from the herd when called by name.
They have no fear at all of man,
when on Hardy Island. Sometimes
they swim to other parts of the
coast, and range about a bit, but
they come back, often fagged from
some fierce run and swim.
Tom Brazil's herd is becoming a by-
word on the coast, but no dog and
no man dare brave what might hap-
pen should he try to hunt on the
island of refuge. So the deer are
fast, are bringing new little lives
into the world, and are adding to
their numbers by recruit volunteers
from the wild ranges where such
safety is not known.—L. V. K.

CIRCUS DAY AT CAMPBELLTON

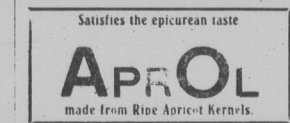
Many Interesting Sightings Free to

There was a Court of Probate held

ILLICIT STILL PUT OUT OF OPERATION

Wash Destroyed and Owner to
Be Prosecuted on Receipt
of Analysis.

On May 26th D. A. Kean, Liquor
Inspector for the County of Resti-
gouche, accompanied by Police Officer
Smith, acting upon reports received
left Campbellton at 2 a.m. for Oul-
lette Settlement where it was claimed
Louis Oullette was conducting an il-
licit still. On arriving there they
found at his camp three barrels of
wash ready for distilling purposes.
The barrels contain about eighty gal-
lons in all. After a thorough search
the still could not be located, but the
officers secured evidence as to the still
having been in operation the previous
day. Samples of the wash were taken
for analysis, and the balance destroy-
ed. The case will be taken up on re-
ceipt of the analysis. The officers
also procured information regarding
other parties in the vicinity of Seven
Mile Ridge operating illicit stills,
which cases will be dealt with at an
early date. It is the intention of
the Inspector to see to it that no illicit
stills are operated in this district.

THE FERTILIZER WAS RICH STUFF

Inspector Made Valuable Seiz-
ure At Madawaska This
Week.

FREDERICK, N. B., June 15.—The
largest seizure of liquor ever made in
New Brunswick was reported this
morning and consists of barrels and
cases of whiskey and other varieties
with a gross weight of more than
twenty tons.

The seizure was made at Baker
Brook, Madawaska County, by sub-
inspector McLaughlin, of Grand Falls,
and Rev. W. D. Wilson, the chief in-
spector, said this morning that he ex-
pected the liquor would arrive here
today by C.N.R. It was shipped out
of Montreal as fertilizer.
The seized liquor is said to consist
of 37 barrels and 200 cases, a
total of 385 de m bottles which at
present prices probably cost about
\$14,000 f.o.b. Montreal.
There is every reason to believe
that the shipment's ultimate destina-
tion was the New England States, as
it was following closely the most pop-
ular route for contraband shipments.
Landed in the United States safely
this shipment would doubtless have
produced in the vicinity of \$40,000.

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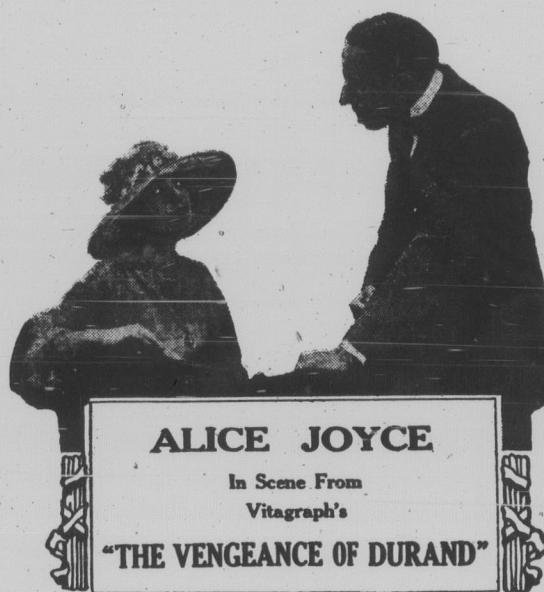

OUR VISITORS.

With almost perfect weather conditions the visit of the National Editorial Association of the United States to Campbellton and Dalhousie last evening was a most enjoyable affair, not only to the visitors, who were loud in their praises of the arrangements made for their comfort, but to our citizens who assisted in entertaining them.

The rugged beauty of the drive down river was charming to the visitors who also spoke of our prosperous looking country and its good roads.

At the Inch Arran, where we became more intimately acquainted with the visitors they were shown points of special interest and facts of our early history. When jokingly reminded that we, as Canadians, generally knew more of American geography and history than our visitors did of such Canadian subjects, we were assured that all were certainly making up for that oversight on this trip and in a very pleasant way.

There is not a doubt but that last evening's visit will hold many pleasant recollections for our visitors.

THE PLEBISCITE.

Organisation for the coming plebiscite on prohibition is going on very well throughout the province. It is necessary that every effort be made to bring out the full vote and make it clear that the people desire a continuance of prohibition. This will serve two purposes. An overwhelming vote in favor of prohibition would leave no excuse for not enforcing the present law to the hilt, and it would leave no excuse for the legislature refusing at its next session to ask for the referendum that would put a stop to the importations from Quebec, which are flooding the province at present. If the members of the Legislature had done their plain duty the referendum would have been asked for and taken the place of the plebiscite, but the buck having been passed there is now nothing to be done but to take first the plebiscite and then the referendum. The law at present is not well enforced. Let the verdict be such that the government will be impelled to put the screws on more tightly, and pave the way for the referendum. The opponents of prohibition will be very active, for they are in the last trench, and it will therefore be more necessary for their friends to work hard and bring out the full vote. There is always a danger that some will think victory is assured and that they need not exert themselves. The majority for prohibition should be made so great as to remove forever any doubt regarding public sentiment in New Brunswick. In St. John especially the fight should be waged with the utmost vigor.—St. John Times.

NEWCASTLE LUMBER MILL DESTROYED

James Robinson's Mill Totally Destroyed by Fire Sunday Morning.

Newcastle, June 16.—At 4 o'clock, this morning Mr. James Robinson's mill was totally destroyed by fire. The fire broke out at 4 o'clock and within an hour had burned to the ground. When the alarm was sent in the building was in a mass of flames and was absolutely beyond control. The firemen realizing that the mill was doomed, turned their services to the saving of the lumber piles which were in close proximity. The morning was calm, and had a wind been blowing the lumber piles which were in front of the mill yard would no doubt have been destroyed as well. A large quantity of boards which were piled on the face of the wharf was also totally destroyed. The woodwork of the Morrissey Bridge caught on fire several times but was quickly extinguished by the Fire Department.

This mill was built in 1919 and last season was its first year in operation and was considered one of the most modern mills on the river. It is estimated that the loss will reach close to \$200,000. It employed about 125 men.

was lost. Not, but that I believe we need an interprovincial bridge, but we need railway facilities worse to develop these two counties.

The Gaspé Peninsula was the first part of Canada that was discovered by Jacques Cartier in 1534 and it is about fifty years behind any other part of Canada on account of the bad railway system. There is no other part of Canada that the farmers are down-trodden as they are in the County of Bonaventure just because the managing system are men from other countries. Take for instance the railway fences, the same fences and posts were put up when the railway was built some thirty-three years or more. Now the railway management is asking the farmers to build the fences at their own expense, furnish posts and labour, and they (the management) pay for the wire. In these times of more production and farm labour being extra scarce, farmers single handed, tell me, where you will find the same question asked: The farmers cattle are constantly getting killed, every cow or makings of a cow killed by the railway takes one hundred and fifty to two hundred pounds annually away from production, every sheep killed means the loss of ten lbs. of wool. I can account for, within a mile and half in the month of May of three sheep and a valuable heifer killed on the said railway through no fences, which goes to prove what I say.

Now again take the business operations, this railway which we have is trying to drive them out of the County as fast as they can.

On the 23rd of May the P. Q. Lumber Company of Nouvelle West, lost property to the value of between forty and fifty thousand dollars, not counting what was destroyed of farm property and merchant buildings, which would amount to some six to eight thousand more. The fire started just after a freight train went through, which started fire along the railway, and an ex-official who claims he has no interest today in the said railway means to say, or says as much that it was not the train, that it was some Paspébiac men, which, I doubt if there were any at all near Nouvelle West at the time, that same freight train started fire in several places along the grade that Sunday and every Sunday and week day during the month of May the trains have been constantly setting fires. And a farmer has not the right to burn a bunch of rubbish the size of a four barrel without a permit from the weather man.

Now, why the County Council voted down Mayor Adams and Dufour's amendment, I will let you see, not that I do not believe an inter-provincial bridge is needed, but we need railway facilities first to encourage immigration into the County of Bonaventure. We have the most valuable timber limits and our fish cannot be best in Canada.

Hoping Mr. Editor I have not taken too much space in your valuable paper I would ask for the benefit of Bonaventure and your own town as well, to be granted the privilege of giving the public a short sketch of the railway since 1890, I remain,

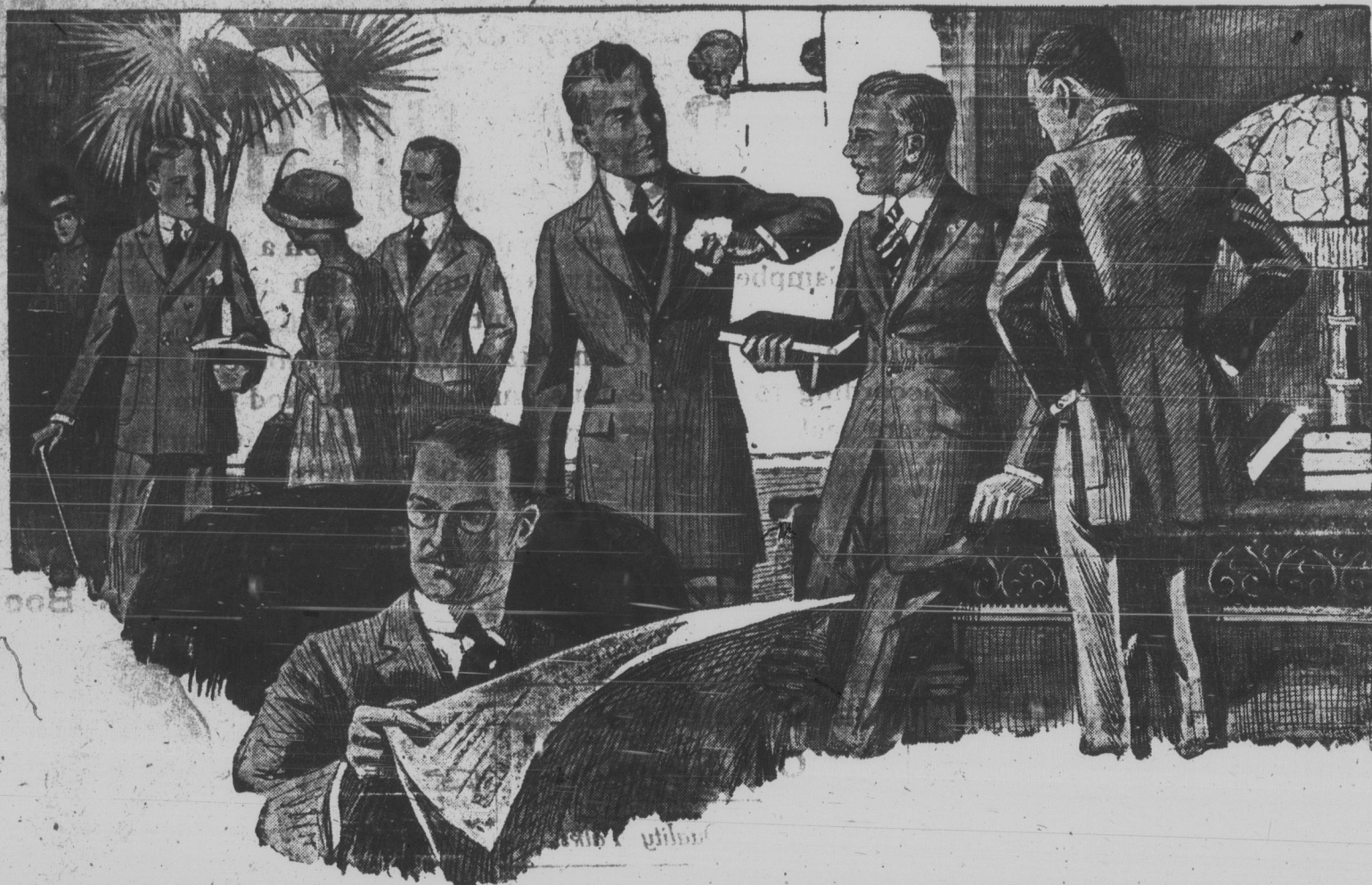

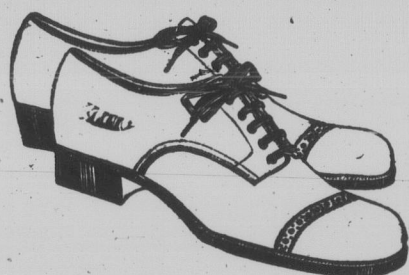

PROHIBITION PLEBISCITE

Two Questions on the Ballot, One as to Retention of Present Law, the Other as to Sale of Beer and Wine.

Fredericton, N. B., June 9.—Premier Foster announced today that the date for the plebiscite on the Provincial Prohibition Act had been fixed by the government for July 10.

There will be two questions referred to the people in the plebiscite, Premier Foster declared, one of which will be on the retention of the present prohibitory law and the other as to the sale of beer and light wines. In other words there will be a simple ballot such as was used in the plebiscite in Quebec, rather than a complicated lot of questions, such as were submitted to the people of Ontario.

The Prohibition Act became law as a "war measure" with a provision that after the declaration of peace the lieutenant-governor-in-council should have authority to name a date for the holding of a plebiscite on the question. It is under that authority that the government is now proceeding in calling on the plebiscite.

The plebiscite will be the first election in New Brunswick under provincial laws at which women will have equal suffrage.

The Premier's Statement

Following is the statement given out by the premier:

"The New Brunswick Prohibition Act was passed by the legislature during the session of 1916, without any mandate from the people. It was passed as a war measure which was the justification for the passing of the act. The promise was made and it was distinctly understood when the bill was passed, that as soon as the war was over and the necessity of the act as a war measure was at an end, the question would be submitted to the people by way of a referendum for decision, and indeed a clause in the act provides that after the act shall have been in force and operation for a sufficient length of time to enable its efficiency to be tested such a course was to be taken. With these facts before us, it is surprising that at a recent meeting in Moncton, according to press reports, the course of the government in submitting this question to the people should be questioned. As I feel it the first duty of the government is to keep faith with the people in this regard, and whatever the will of the people is on this important matter, as expressed at the polls will prevail.

Date of Referendum.

Fixed for the referendum is Saturday, July 10. Since it was known that a referendum was to be held, at an early date, I have had numerous representations made to me and reasons have been advanced by this day or that day or date would not be convenient to some, but recognizing of recent years when dominion and provincial elections have been held, that the end of the week affords a better opportunity for all those whose duties take them from home during the week, or record their votes, we have concluded to name Saturday the tenth of July. In submitting the question to be voted upon the desire of the government has been to submit such questions in the simplest possible form, in order to avoid confusion and in order that there might be the clearest possible expression of opinion. The questions we have decided to submit are as follows:

FOR PROHIBITION Act.

AGAINST Provincial Prohibition Act.

FOR Sale of Light Wines and Beers under Government control.

AGAINST Sale of Light Wines and Beers.

"In arriving at a decision as to the questions to be submitted, we had in view the particular groups into which our people are apparently divided. First, there are those who desire the continuance of the New Brunswick Prohibition Law as it exists today, or with minor amendments. Second, those who favor the retaining of light beer and wine as a beverage but who do not favor the sale of stronger liquors. Third, those who desire the opportunity of purchasing liquors of all kinds for personal and private use, but do not favor consumption in public, or the open bar. Fourth, those who are in favor of returning to conditions as they existed prior to the passing of the prohibitory law.

"Should the first question be answered in the affirmative, then it will be the duty of the government to arrange for the distribution of these beverages under some system of government control and supervision.

"Should the first question be answered in the negative and a vote recorded for the repeal of the act, it will devolve upon the government to substitute some system to give expression to the will of the people in this regard, by making a necessary and proper regulation for the sale through government agencies, of liquors of all kinds for consumption in the homes of the people who desire its use in this way.

"From the statement I have made, and from the wording of the second question which refers to the selling of light wines and beers, you will see that the government have adopted the policy that whatever may be the result with respect to either of the questions submitted, there shall be no return to the old system of the open bar. In the adoption of this policy without placing it upon the referendum ballot, I believe we can safely speak for the vast majority of the

REPUBLICAN CHOICE

Ohio Senator Named for President—Governor Coolidge for Vice-President.

Warren G. Harding, United States Senator from Ohio, was nominated for the presidency of the United States, at Chicago, Saturday night, by the Republican national convention after a dead-lock which lasted for nine ballots and which finally forced out of the running all the original favorites.

As his running mate, the convention named Governor Calvin Coolidge, of Massachusetts, upsetting a plan of a combination of the Harding backers to nominate for the place Senator Lenroot, of Wisconsin.
