

He declares that the power of absorption or consumption of food products has at length caught up to the power of production, and that the possible ratio of increase in consumption is much greater than the immediate possible ratio of increase in the growth of food. The census now being completed shows that the cities have grown at a rate of increase of over 45 per cent., while the farming population has increased only 14 per | Prof. Jas. W. Robertson, to establish ex-The disparity between 14 and 45 per cent. has a deep significance in relation to the production and consumption of food. The aggregations of humanity in the cities and towns are in no broad sense food producers, but in the largest sense food consumers and food-wasters. In addition to this there are two important facts-the extent of the an experienced dairyman, Mr. T. J. Dillon, exhaustion of arable soils and the hardly realizable circumstance that no more nev wheat lands remain unoccupied in the United States. One of the most striking signs of the exhaustion of soils on the one hand, and the rapid occupancy of land on the other, is found in connection with the station." WHERE WOMEN HELD THE FORT. It is a singular fact that despite the progress of the movement in favor of woman's political emancipation in Great Britain, the fair sex are still treated with neagre consideration in the chief legislative chamber of the empire. They are caged up in a heavily-grated compartment in the gallery backing the reporters' boxes in the House of Commons. They can properly seen by their husbands and brothers in the Chamber. This caging up days when women auditors were regarded as a hindrance to deliberate debate, and when, by every means short of actua violent expulsion, they were discouraged from attending the sittings of Parliamen Indeed, in the recently published book, "London, Past and Present," there is a passage quoted from a letter written by Lady Mary W. Her ladyship's letter proceeds:

Notwithstanding which determination, a tribe of dames resolved to show on this occasion that neither law nor men could resist them. These heroines, " " the boldest assertors and most resigned sufferers for liberty I ever read of, presented themselves at the ors and most resigned sufferers for liberty I ever read of, presented themselves at the door at 9 o'clock in the morning, where Sir William Saunderson respectfully informed them the chancellor had made an order against their admittance. The Duchess of Queensbury, as head of the squadron, pished at the ill-breeding of a mere lawyer and desired him to let them go unstairs rejected. mere lawyer and desired him to let them go upstairs privately. After some modest refusal he swore by G.—he would not let them in. Her Grace, with a noble warmth, answered by G.— they would come in, in spite of the chancellor and the whole House. This being reported, the peers resolved to starve them out; an order was made that the doors should not be opened till they raised their siege. The case of the Ontario Express Company in their endeavor to force the Grand Trunk Railway to afford them the same facilities over their lines as is granted the Canadian and other express companies was settled so far as the Montreal courts are concerned by Judge Wurtele Wednesday. Early in the spring the Ontario Express Company existing by virtue of a charter chained some time ago was reorganized, and tained some time ago was reorganized, and on May 1 they applied for privileges of transportation, but were refused by the Grand Trunk. Hence the writ of mandamus. Grand Trunk. Hence the writ of mandamus. The most material witness examined for the defense was Mr. Wainwright, assistant general manager of the G. T. R. He testified that the line proper extends over 5,500 miles. There are seven express companies operating over the company's system. The Canadian Express Company is accommodated with 25 complete cars and a portion of a large number of other cars. The other companies are furnished with portions of cars only. The facilities of 25 cars for the Canadian Express Company represent a cost of \$75,000, and it would probably cost about \$150,000 to duplicate bably cost about \$150,000 to duplicat probably cost about \$150,000 to duplicate that company's whole service for another company. With the present very heavy traffic an additional trains on some portions of the line, such as between Montreal and Toronto, each train representing a cost of \$350 to \$400 for running expenses. To give accommodation to a new express give accommodation to a new exprese company at the present moment would exceed \$100,000. With the work now on hand in the shops it would tak many months to duplicate the service; if fact it could not be done at all at present durlicated within two months. express could not be carried with the present trains, and witness informed Mr. Chadwick and Mr. McKay of this. The G.T.R. Company never contracted with the present petitioners to witnesses' knowledge. After a brief deliberation Judge Wurtele quashed the writ, ruling that the proper tribunal to inquire into the difficulty and adjudicate upon the matter was the Parliamentary Railway Committee. The case fell within their jurisdiction and should be submitted to them.
