London, Feb. 16 .- T. P. O'Connor predicts that Parliament will be dissolved very soon, and says that it seems as if all the Government is waiting for is to have Mr. Gladstone deciare his intentions in regard to home rule and other Irish questions. The Ministers exhibit considerable anxiety The Ministers exhibit considerable anxiety to hear from the Liberal leader on these points, and Mr. Chamberlain evidently has instructions to attempt to draw out the information from the Opposition chief as soon as he can. This state of mind on the part of the Government, Mr. O'Connor thinks, indicates a condition that the Liberals will win at the general elections. If the Liberal programme is one in which the Conservatives think they can pick flaws with tolerable case, they will be willing to go to the country immediately. They are in a mood to shift the thorny burden of making laws for Ireland upon the shoulders of the Liberals, convinced as they are that it will be impossible for Mr. Gladstone to carry out a scheme that will receive the support

be impossible for Mr. Gladstone to carry out a scheme that will receive the support of the country. The Irish education bill is also likely to prove a stumbling block for the Governent and to hasten their retirement. Mr. Balfour, in the judgment of Mr. O'Connor, is incapable of sympathy with Orange bigotry, and no doubt the educational scheme jointly devised by him and Chief Secretary Jackson will be one of justice to all creeds. But whenever an English Minister proposes justice to Catholics the Orangemen sees red, dreams of fire and slaughter. Hence the scheme is certain to alienate Ulster, whose members are capable of making a great deal of trouble for the Government.

SIX HUNDRED LIVES IN PERIL

Burning of an Insane Asylum—The Incendiary the Only Victim.

JACKSON, Miss., Feb. 16.—The four story main building of the State Asylum for the Insane was set on fire about 5 o'clock this morning by J. D. Brown, an inmate of the institution. Brown had recently evcaped and was only returned yesterday. The crew were landed by the life-savers, who suffered dreadfully from exposure. In the counties of Lincoln, Suffolk and Norfolk a regular blizzard is prevailing. The wind is blowing with a force seldom equaled. The weather is intensely cold and the snow is driven fiercely through the alt. Telegraphic communication has been greatly interfered with by the breaking of wires and blowing down of poles. The high winds are causing the snow to drift heavily, and the railway trains are having a hard task to get through. All trains are greatly delayed. The highways are already almost impassable and if the storm continues much longer it will be impossible for them to be used at all.

In the Northern Highlands the storm is particularly severe.

In South Wales the telegraph wires are down, and it is impossible for assertain the damage wrought in that part of the country. It is feared the heavy snow and cold weather will cause a serious loss of life and stock. The London deputation to Toronto to interview the Ontario Government respecting a Normal School at London met Attorney-General Mowat, the Minister of Education and several other members of the Provincial Cabinet this afternoon.

The deputation consisted of the following: Mayor Spencer and Aldermen John Heaman, Fitzgerald and Moule; Dr. Campbell, Mesers. Craig and Love, from the

bell, Messrs. Craig and Love, from the School Board; Principal Merchant, of the Collegiate Institute; Inspector Carson; accompanied by Hon. David Mills, John Cameron, T. H. Purdom, T. S. Hobbs and John Waters, M. P. P. for North Middleror.

The deputation was introduced by Mayor

The deputation was introduced by Mayor Spencer.

The members of the Government were addressed by Hon. David Mills, John Cameron, T. H. Purdom, F. Love, Principal Merchant and Inspector Carson. Among the points brought out by the various speakers were the need of additonal Normal School facilities; the fact that the Toronto and Ottawa institutions were full to overflowing; that of the attendance at Ottawa, 50 per cent. of it was from Western Ontario counties, and an unusually large number from Middlesex; that two-thirds of the total population of the Province was

Ontario counties, and an unusually large number from Middlesex; that two-thirds of the total population of the Province was resident west of Toronto; that London was the only place in Western Ontario possessed of a sufficient school population to furnish the requisite-sized paying Model School attendance. These and many other points were urged upon the Ministers.

In reply, Attorney-General Mowat expressed his pleasure at meeting the deputation, and his interest in the matter presented. The question of the need of additional and more efficient Normal School accommodation had been strongly presented, and the claims of London as the proper location for a Normal School, had been impressively set forth. Of course, he presumed the influential deputation present would hardly expect him to give them an answer off-hand on this important matter. But certainly the deputation had made out not only an interesting but a strong case, and be could promise on the part of himself. only an interesting but a strong case, and he could promise on the part of himself and his colleagues their very best con-

Mayor Spencer thanked the Attorney-General and his colleagues for their courte-ous hearing, when, with cordial expres-sions on both sides, the interview termi-nated.

The assets total \$20,731 67, and the liabilities \$75.

Captain A. W. Porte, president, submitted the annual report of the directors. It congratulated the association on the great success of the last exhibition, to the high standard of the exhibits, to the handsome

congratulated the association on the great success of the last exhibition, to the high standard of the exhibits, to the handsome prizes offered in and the excellence of the dairy section, to the superior display in the main building, the extra accommodation of the new grand stands, the steady increase in receipts and to other matters of interest. Improvements to the grounds, such as shade trees, were recommended and the city and provincial press, the railway and express companies, were thanked for their assistance. The payment on real estate for the past year was \$450, making the total amount now expended for the additional lands acquired \$6,087 50, leaving the balance due on mortgage \$2,812. The expenditures during the year were enumerated and the results approved.

LEPROSY IN CANADA.

An Increase in the Number of Cases on the Pacific Coast.

OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—In view of the in-creased numbers of lépers on the Pacific coast in Canada, Parliament will be asked to increase the annual appropriation on accoast in Canada, Parliament will be asked to increase the annual appropriation on account of the care of lepers at this season. Dr. Smith, in charge of the lazaretto in New Brunswick, reports that on Jan. 1, there were 22 lepers, 11 males and 11 females. During the year six new cases were admitted and two died. Dr. Smith reports that no new lepers have been admitted to the hospital for several years past from Tracadie, so long its hiding place. The new comers were gathered in from outlaying districts, to which relatives of leprous persons in Tracadia had removed years ago. Dr. Smith says: "I am constantly on the watch, and have difficulty in finding some of the cases because they are hidden by their families and their friends. By stamping out each new focus of leprosy I feel quite confident that New Brunswick will soon be clear of the disease. To segregation I shall attribute the happy change. Segregation has already cleared leprosy for ever from Tracadie. ever from Tracadie.

Experiments made by Professor J. W. Sanborn, of the Utah Experimental Station, to decide the best time to water horses show the following results: Horses watered before feeding grain retained their weight better than when watered after feeding Horses watered before feeding had the better appetite or ate the most. Horses the better appetite or ate the most. Horses watered after feeding grain in ratio to the food caten seemed to digest it as well as those watered before feeding. In a prior trial there was a small apparent advantage in favor of feeding after watering, on digestion. It seems advisable to water both before and after feeding.

If any class of men are clearly entitled to If any class of men are clearly entitled to have the pleasure and comforts derived from using the best horses to be found it certainly is the farmers. They breed them, they raise them and they should have the pick and choice when it comes to selecting what they need for their own use. But a little money will often tempt the farmer to allow the buyer to have the choice of the stock. For a few extra dollars a horse worth two or three times as much money as others which are kept is allowed to be taken away from the very place where he can be of most value. The average life of well-cared-for farm horses is perhaps 18 or 20 years. This would make the average time years. This would make the average time of actual service from cach animal from of actual service from each animal from fifteen to eighteen years. The difference between the value of a good horse combetween the value of a good horse com-pared with that of a poor one in dollars and cents amounts to a considerable sum. Multiply this by the number of years that you can reasonably hope to use a horse and you will find wherein it pays to keep the best. Besides all this the satisfaction in being able to own and use good horses is no small consideration. There is some-thing stimulating about drawing the reins over horses of value and pride and vigor.







A FRUITLESS MISSION.

Well, the pilgrims have come and gone What did all they had to say amount to? The same old assertions and empty promises. How did they meet the evidence of the census returns? By telling the people they ought to go on farms. Where are the tall chimneys that were to give them work? How is it, then, that our rural population has been decreasing? Do people leave when they are doing well?

The visitors did not say why, after spending \$50,000,000 on canals, our shipping has gone down until only 3 per cent, of the tonnage through the Detroit River is ours? They know that it will grow less and less as it has done until we have freedom of trade with our neighbors.

The pilgrims failed wholly to explain why our mines are undeveloped in Northern Ontarlo while those of Michigan are increasing their output by tens of millions They failed wholly to explain why our factories are comparatively stagnant while these of all the States about us are increasing rapidly and are prosperous. They failed to explain why their system has left our foreign trade only \$218,000,000 now, while it was that in 1873-4.

In what way have we progressed? If our foreign trade is not greater; if our shipping is practically driven off the lakes and rivers; if our mines are undeveloped; if our factories do not increase one-half as fast as those in Michigan, or Ohio, or New York; if our farmers languish because of the obstructions to the American markets, what has the Government done for us?

Is real estate readily saleable? Is it going up in value as it is in all the towns and cities of the surrounding States? If not, why not? Because restriction has hemm d us in and has made comparatively valueless our natural advantages. There is one remedy, and one only. What we want is freedom to trade with the people sast, west and south of us.

GRAND TRUNK FAVORS RECIPROCITY.

Hon. Frank Smith in his speech last night took occasion to call in question the rathfulness of the evidence given by General Manager Seargeant, of the Grand Trunk Railway, in the North Perth election case. The views of the general manager, as expressed under oath, are known to be in accord with those of that distinguished Englishman, Sir Henry

W. Tyler, M. P., president of the Grand Trunk Company, who has repeatedly expressed himself to the effect that but for the heavy duties which the company has to pay on its iron and on its coal it would be able to make far more money and pay its employes better wages.

But let the general manager speak fo himself. His evidence as given in court is worthy of careful perusal by all persons interested in any way in the welfare of our Canadian railways, and London, as a railway center, is vitally interested. The general manager said:
