Dates for the C. M. R. L. Matches Fixed.

The Conditions and General Informa tion Regarding Them-The New Certificate.

Circular No. 1, bearing date of March

5,of the Canadian Military Rifle League, has been received by city riflemen. The dates for the league matches for the season of 1897 have been set down as May 15 and 29, and June 12 and 26. The council having decided to discontinue the use of the Snider rifles in these competitions, there will be but two series, viz.: First, Lee-Enfield and Martini-Henry rifle (ranges 200, 500 and 600 yards); second, or cavalry series, first section, Lee-Metrord or Lee-Enfield carbines (ranges 200, 500 and 600 yards); second section, Snider and Winchester carbines (ranges 200, 300 and 400 yards). Teams of ten men will be charged an entrance fee of \$10, and more than one team from the same organization, \$10 for the first, and \$5 for each additional team. These should be sent to Capt. G. W. Cameron, P.O. box 267, Montreal, before April 15, stating which series the entry is for.

The Department of Militia and Defense will issue ammunition free of charge for these matches, and will loan Martini-Henry rifles to such regiments or rifle associations who are not alor rifle associations who are not already supplied. Application for these rifles to be made to Lieut.-Col. John Macpherson, director of stores, Department of Militia and Defense, Ottawa.

There is no doubt that the action of the Department of Militia and Defense in granting free ammunition to the league has greatly improved the shooting of the force. The council would therefore again strongly urge upon all commanding officers and presidents of rifle associations that they should make arrangements for at least one team entry from each battalion to the league matches for 1897. matches for 1897.
