TO HELP DEWEY. To Invade Spain.

THE OUTCOME OF MATURE DE. LIBERATION. Washington, June 28.-The decision of the administration to send an American squadron to the Spanish coast and in-to the Mediterranean was not finally The reached until yesterday. Several times since the war broke out rumors to this effect have been circulated, but the project has not matured. The determination to send out this squadron was the outcome of direct official advices, reach-ing the state and navy departments as to the progress of Admiral Cervera's squadron. These advices gave a list of the Spanish ships that are doubtless headed for the Philippines. The squadron is the most formidable Spain has afloat, in total tonnage, strength of individual ships, armor and guns. The eastern squadron which the United States will now send against Spain far outranks this Spanish squad-ron. The Iowa and Oregon exceed the Pelayo and Carlos V. at every point,

while the other United States vessels are far superior, ship for ship, to those of the Spanish squadron, with the single exception of the two Spanish torpedo boat destroyers. RIOTS IN GALLICIA. Vienna, June 28.—Dispatches from Lemberg, capital of Gallicia, say the rioting peasants pillaged Alt-Sandec for several hours on Saturday evening. The houses and stores in the ring square were plundered and then destroyed, their contents being removed in vans, which were in waiting, to the country. An organized attack was also made upon Neu Sandec, six miles from Alt-Sandec, but the cavelry dispersed the peasants after a hand to hand fight, and subsequently the infantry sacked many of the Jewish houses in the suburbs and set fire to several buildings. Troops have been dispatched to Przemysl, 50 miles west of Lemberg, where disturbances are threatened. Przemysl has over 15,000 inhabitants.

MANY LEADERS

Included in the Anglo-American League -A Most Influential Body.

New York, June 28 .- The London correspondent of the Tribune says: The Anglo-American committee is daily receiving new recruits among distinguished men, and is now a most influential body, with 40 members of parliament, as many dukes and earls, four archbishops, nearly all the bish-ops, Cardinal Vaughan, leaders of all the Nonconformist bodies, heads of nearly all the colleges and great public schools, the mayors of 50 and the principal men of letters, painters, journalists, barristers and judges of the United Kingdom. It is the most influential body of leaders of public opinion ever created for action on foreign relations. Mr. James Bryce is chairman, but no formal organization yet exists. It is probable that a meeting will be held early in July, at the residence of some prominent member of the House of Lords, for appointing an executive commit-tee. What work this Anglo-American League will undertake is not yet known, but it is clear that it already provides a powerful agency for direcold-time contention that the classes in England are against America. Whenever the emergency arises this or-ganization will furnish facilities for holding public meetings throughout the United Kingdom, and either forcing the government to move more rapidly, or adequately supporting it in any politics affecting the common in-terests of America and England. The chief organizer is Mr. Lee Roberts, a prominent barrister, who is a Radical Home Ruler; but politics are excluded from the scheme of work. A majority of the members are Unionists, although ministers now in office take no part in it. The league makes a close approach to the throne through the Duke of Fife and the Marquis of

FINEST BICYCLE ROAD KNOWN A correspondent writes: The road I in my mind is in India, and stretches 1,200 miles from Lahore to Calcutta. It is the famous Grand Trunk road. Let me explain its nature, though one cannot do so by comparison, for there is no road for five miles in England that is anything like it. It is level; indeed, there is not above a mile the whole distance where even a lady need dismount to walk. Around Battersea Park is supposed to be the easiest little spin in London. The Grand Trunk road is infinitely superior to Battersea Park. The material with which it is made is called kunker, and if you care to turn that word into concrete you have an idea of what it is like. It is exceedingly hard, and as smooth as a prepared pavement. There is no dust. When I first got on this road and enjoyed the luxury of easy traveling, I said: "This is magnificent; but in a little time I suppose it will become gritty and uneven." I went 50 miles, 100 miles, 200 miles, 500, 600, 700 miles and it was always the same with not even a small stone to give a jog. Nearly the whole of the way is lined with a row of majestic trees. The concrete road runs like a long white ribbon down the center, and along the side are loose soil tracks, over which the native bullock carts creak a slow two miles an

With two friends I rode across India during the hottest time of the year, in April and May, and was never ser-iously inconvenienced by the heat;

for, at a pace of fifteen miles an hour, one could always create a draught.



Snyder's second division, which will first go to Key West, where they will be joined by a strong naval convoy and proceed to Santiago. It is expected that the start will be made today will be made today.

CAMARA'S CANAL VOYAGE. Madrid, June 28-10 a.m.-The Spanish officials here assert that there will be no difficulty in Admiral Camara traversing the Suez Canal, as the accompanying transports, they add, have all the coal the squadron re-quires. The Spanish Government does not credit the report that an American squadron is to visit Spanish waters; but the ministers say they have taken all possible precautions, that the ports are all ready, and that 26,000 men will be distributed among the principal Atlantic and Mediterranean ports of Spain.
The United States embassy at Lon-

don has reports from several sources that Spain has purchased the powerful Chilian armored cruiser O'Higgins, last heard from at the Cape Verde Islands, where a transport with Spanish sailors on board is said to have gone to take her over. Manila, June 22, via Hong Kong, June 28 .- There are five German warships here. The Spaniards continue their nightly fusillades, but the volunteers decline to go to the trenches, while many of the regulars are idling about the town. Thousands of trees in the vicinity of the citadel have been cut down, but the botanical gardens remain. All food is held at famine prices. Two thousand Spaniards are working on the sand-bag defenses outside of the moat, on the Calle de Las Agadr. The insurgents are worrying the Spaniards, but there

is no advance, though desultory firing goes on at various points. FOR PORTO RICO. London, June 28 .- According to a special dispatch from Madrid, published here, the Spanish Government "is actively preparing to dispatch reinforcements to Porto Rico by the fast-est available trans-Atlantic lines."

GONE TO THE FRONT. Juragua, Province of Santiago de Cuba. June 27-Kingston, Jamaica, June 28.—Major-Gen. Shafter has gone to the front for a consultation with Gen. Wheeler and the division commanders. Permanent hospital arrangements are to be provided here at once Washington, June 28 .- If the expedition to Santiago gets away today, it will arrive at that place about next Saturday. The trip doubtless will be to the eastward, around Cape Maysi, along the same route as that of the Shafter expedition. This will bring Shafter's force up to about 30,000.

Firing a Big Gun Brings About Many Physical Changes.

products that even chemists do not The explosion of gunpowder is divided into three distinct stages, called the ignition, inflammation and combustion. The ignition is the setting on fire of the first grain, while the inflammation is the spreading of the flame over the surface of the powder from the point of ignition. Combusion is the burning up of each grain. The value of gunpowder is due to the fact that when subjected to sufficient heat it becomes a gas which expands with frightful rapidity. The so-called explosion that takes place when a match is touched to gunpowder is merely a chemical change, during which there is

original solid. It has been calculated that ordinary gunpowder, on exploding, expands about nine thousand times, or fills a space this much larger as a gas than in a solid form. When this chemical change takes place in a closed vessel the expansion may be made to do a work like that of forcing a projectile along the bore of the great gun or test tube in the line of least resistance. on our monitors, a position back of the gun is much easier than one nearer the muzzle. In addition to this force, there is an immense pressure exerted on the sides of the cannon, so that another distinct series of shocks also radiate outward from the barrel of the gun. These lines of force are influenced, besides, by the recoil of the gun, which tends to make the lines curve outward and intensifies

the shock. These are in turn more or less compensated by the forces of the air opposing them as it rushes into the mouth of the cannon when the projectile leaves it. As a result of all these forces the atmosphere is of course violently disturbed. Although no projectile strikes the gunner, who must stand by, it will be seen that the air is full of missles in the form of invisible lines of force, or vibration,

which bombard, as it were, every part of the gunner's body at the same time. An examination and analysis of the effect produced upon the human system and the mind by the firing of a cannon is most engrossing. Men generally accounted courageous tremble violently in the knees; others feel nauseated; some have severe headaches; a few have had their ear-drums split, or the action of their heart affected.

Take the vital organ, the heart, first. In the space between the right auricle and ventricle are a set of fine, threadlike cords called the tendineae. The concussion makes them tremble like timbers in a building when there is an earthquake. In a weak man the chamber of the heart is left open for an instant: the opening and closing springs lose their control; the heart shakes; possibly the chordae tendineae are snapped; contraction or dilation of the organ ensues, and in some instances

death follows. Deafness induced by an explosion may be traced to the sudden pressure upon the inner orifice of the ear and the tremendous vibration set up. The thin, transparent, fairly bright membrane called the drum of the ear is burst like a piece of tissue paper held taut and forcibly blown upon. Sounds are conveyed by the beating of a tiny mallet upon this anvil. If the beating is too rapid and too forcible, the membranes may be ruptured, a temporary disturbance of the mind occurs and

IN RE HAWAII.

Novel Reason for Opposing Annexation-Liable to Sink Into the Sea.

Washington, June 28 .- In the senate yesterday, Mr. Roach delivered an argument against the annexation of Hawaii. After protesting against the bringing under the United States Government of such people as formed the bulk of the Hawaiian population, Mr. Roach advanced the novel argument that the United States should not annex the islands, as their existence was problematic. They were liable to be swallowed up by the sea in an earthquake. Further along he maintained that if annexation was to be effected by resolution, the proposition ought to be submitted first to the Hawaiians themselves for ratification. Any other course would tend to destroy the very foundations of the United States Government by a subversion of the principle that this government is based upon the consent of the governed.

Mr. Caffery, of Louisiana, spoke in opposition to the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands. He said the policy proposed was dangerous to the safety and perpetuity of the United States and opposed to the fundamental principles of the government.

During a brief colloquy about the debt of Hawali, to which Mr. Caffery, Mr. Faulkner and Mr. Morgan wer parties, the last-named said that \$4,000,000 more than covered the debt, and that amount would be the entire sum to be assumed by the United States. In return for this sum, Mr. Morgan said the United States would receive unincumbered preperty to the


