GOT LARGE DOSE OF STRYCHNINE

Experts Tell of the Analysis of Perkins' Stomach.

Mrs. MacDonald on Stand Again and Gives Evidence Favorable to

the Defense-

Impressive Ceremonies Mark Dr. Oronhyateka's Funeral at Toronto.

Toronto, March 6. - Encased in a permetically-sealed, copper-lined casket, the body of the late Dr. Oronhyatekha, supreme chief ranger of the Independent Order of Foresters, arrived here at 11:03 this morning, and was conveyed to Massey Hall, where this in the side and limbs, or gulping up of afternoon it lies in state, and where this evening a memorial service was

The funeral train moved slowly along between two banks of silent people, who stood motionless, although the air was biting where the sun's rays did not penetrate. As the Temple, swathed in black, was reached, the procession halted, and stood for a moment so that the hundreds of inmates could look down and see the vehicle that carried the remains of the late chief of the order. Every detachment, perhaps by order, but seemingly as if by voluntary inspiration, came to a halt before the Temple.

Massey Hall was reached about 12 o'clock, and the casket was lifted from the hearse and carried in by the pall-bearers, after which came those of the executive council, who were to have acted in this capacity, and then members of the family, none else were admitted to Massey Hall at that time. Everyone was uncovered as the casket was carried into the hall and down the aisle, where it was laid facing the center of the platform. The platform was banked high with flowers, made up in beautiful forms.

Over the casket when the top was lifted off, showing the body of Dr. Oronhyatekha clad in a simple suit of black, such as he generally wore, and showing no decoration or insignia of the order, was thrown a purple velvet pall, the gift of the young women employed in the I. Phone and sprigs of lilies of Le valley, the latter laid in symmetrical order, adhering to the pall, where the latter hung down over the sides of the casket.





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

The season of 1907 promises to be the most successful in baseball his tory. There are more professional clubs under the National agreement, which is the supreme government of baseball, today than at any time

since the league consisted of eight clubs forty years ago. Listed under the head of the legitimate there are thirty professional baseball leagues throughout the United States, and these will average seven clubs to the league. That gives us 210 professional baseball clubs to entertain the sport-loving public from the cosmopolitan cities to the small hamlet. These clubs will "try out" and employ regularly twenty players during a season. That means that 4,200 professional ball players are on the payrells of the various clubs, and through the support of the public, \$840,000, or nearly a million, is paid out to boys and men throughout the country

who can dexterously catch and hit a ball. Aside from the professional players so listed there are hundreds of semi-professional leagues, in which the players receive salaries ranging from \$50 to \$100 a month. If it were possible to reach anything like an accurate aggregate of the money paid out in this way it is very likely that the salaries paid to ball players would easily reach \$1,500,000.
