OF DRAFT ARMY AMERICAN ROADS

Govt. Issues Instructions For Dealing With "Absentee" Cases.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—With the calling up of the first draft next week, strong measures will be taken against men who have failed to register under the military service act. Announcement of a ward "to any civil police or peace reward "to any civil police of peace of-deer for the apprehension and delivery into military custody of a deserter or absentee without leave" is the forerun-ner of further steps to insure that all members of class one comply with the

Who Are Deserters? Instructions for dealing with deserters and absentees without leave have bee and absentees without leave have been issued and the general policy determined. Generally speaking, there are five different groups of men who, from a military point of view, who may be dealt with as absentees without leave. The groups and the penalties to which the men in each case are liable are as follows: follows:

(1) Men who have failed to comply with the proclamation calling out class one—liable for any term of imprison-

ent not exceeding five years, with hard (2) Men who, having reported or claimed exemption under the military service act, have failed to attend for medical examination when ordered to do so—punishable by civil magistrates by a fine not exceeding \$200 and not less than \$25 and to not more than three months' imprisonment. If not fined, punishable by military law as absentees without leave or deserters.

Failing To Report.


(3) Men, who having been ordered to report for duty, fail to do so—punishable in the same way as absentees of the following group, group four, if, before they were required to report for duty, they were taken on the strength of the C. E. F. otherwise, punishable by military law. tary law.

(4) Men, who having been taken on the strength of a unit of the C. E. F. or of the active militia either as volunteers or as drafted men and either before or after the issue of the proclamation under the military service act or the passage of that act, are now, or hereafter become, absentees without leave—punishable by civil magistrates by two years' imprisonment with the consent of the general officer commanding the district in which the presecution is brought, rict in which the presecution is brought (5) Men, who having been granted leave of absence without pay, cease or fall to comply with the conditions upon which their leave was granted—punishable in the same way as men in group Men in all the five groups mentioned,

Peking, Dec. 28.—The Chif'se commander-in-chief at Harbin, Manchuria, on December 25 presented at the Bolsheviki headquarters the demand that the two reserve Ryssian battalions, which were under its control leave Harbin. The Bolsheviki authorities agreed but during the night issued orders to resist.

On the morning of December 25 the 618th Regiment opened fire on the Chinese, who thereupon replied killing the colonel and a number of men. The regiment then surendered. The 559th Regiment also surrendered and gave up its arms.

Brantford, Dec. 28.—The food controller protects only the people in case of maximum prices being exceeded and does not set a fair price for any food commodity. Such is the answer this city has received in response to an appeal to Food Controller Hanna to put an end to a "bread war" here by setting a fair price which would protect the small dealers against being squeezed out by the larger concerns. This bread war raged here for two weeks following a cut in bread to six cents a loaf by a firm with outside capital. The other bakers, in self-protection, decided to keep the price of bread at ten cents, after the war had continued for a week. The foreign minister said Germany was seeking to protract the negotiations with the Russians, reestablishing commercial relations in the meantime, believing that in this way the Bolsheviki might be checkmated later. Referring to the terms which the central powers offered to the Russians, as published today, he said:

"Germany is trying to involve us in her Maximalist negotiations. After suffering as we have, we cannot accept peace based on the status quo. By agreeing with our allies, we are ready to discuss direct propositions regarding peace, but this is indirect.

Lose and Gain Ally.

"Russia can treat for a separate peace with our enemies or not. In either case, the war for us will continue. An ally has falled us, an continue. An ally has failed us, an ally who in preceding years carried off great victories. It is a great success for our enemy, but another ally has come; from the other end of the world a democracy has risen against Germany's appetite for conquest.

"At the conference in Parls a program was drawn up, and in consequence unity of action on the part of the Allies will make itself felt, even to Macedonia. Germany and her allies have undertaken the impossible task of conquering the world. GIVIC EXPENDITURE SHOULD BE REDUCED. SOMERVILLE SLOGAN

Popular Candidate Has Economy Policy Vital to City.

WARTIME LUXURIES

Administration Is Needed in Lon-

don Now.

"I hold that civic expenditure should be reduced to the lowest limit until after the war. I am not making charges of graft or dishonesty, but I am convinced that more efficiency and better judgment in expenditures are required in carrying on the work of the city at the present time."

The foregoing statement, received with approving applause, was made yesterday afternoon by C. R. Somerville, mayoralty candidate, at the close of an address delivered by him before an audience of representative women of London gathered at his campaign headquarters in the former Victory Loan headquarters on Dundas street.

Economy Policy.

Stating his platform, Mr. Somerville clearly outlined his economy policy, which is opposed to the increasing of the city's liabilities through fresh expenditures, and expenditures on what the terms "wartime luxuries" at this time. Referring to the clash this year between the board of health, of which he has been chairman, and the mayor and council over estimates, the speaker declared that this was due to the fact that the council did not recognize the importance of the services of a field officer in running down the sources of communicable diseases and checking and eradicating epidemics, and that this means actual money in pocket for the citizens far beyond the comparatively small outlay required for such service.

Another man apprehended under the military service act was examined by the medical board at the armories on Thursday. He was Edwin Oscar Michm of Kitchener, who was placed in Category A, fit for service overseas, with a combatant unit, and was sent to the deputy registrar.

Preparations are progressing effectively, if quietly, to interest the citizenship of London and of the whole of Western Ontario, in the child welfare exhibit to be held in this city the first week in February. Early in the new year the house committee, of which Inspector Joseph Sanders is convener, will make arrangements for a building centrally located, large enough to accommodate the Provincial Government welfare exhibit, requiring a space about 60x10 feet and also for the moving pictures, the demonstrations, clinics, etc., which will be important features.

If any institution has been neglected in the matter of Christmas cheer this year or any home or individual has suffered for lack of necessities; if any child has sorrowed because of the failure of dear-old Santa Claus to appear, it is not because the citizens of London are lacking in generosity. It is for lack of a charity clearing house or public welfare bureau to keep accurate tab on the disribution of Christmas cheer.

While Christmas giving has been most unselfish and generous probably exceptional discrimination has been exercised in the choice of gifts, at the same time there is still much room for improvement in London in the mat the same time there is still much room for improvement in London in the matter of seeing that Santa Claus pays a visit to every institution and home in the city and preventing overlapping. More organizations than could be counted on the fingers of both hands were engaged in distributing of Christmas cheer on a large scale, the Great War Veterans' Association, the Mocha Temple Shriners, Salvation Army, to mention just a few of the outstanding "Santa Clauses." There were church organizations and secular organizations, and individuals by the score intent upon making less fortunate people happy. One institution was given half a dozen or so fetes and showered with presents; another had practically none. Yet both organizations make a strong appeal to public sympathy and the situation arose from a lack of knowledge on the part of one organization in regard to what other organizations of the city were doing; the lack of bureau where such information could be filed and obtained.

The grocer's answer surprised me in more ways than one. I thought I would tell you this little incident. You can use it if you think it will awaken women to the fact that they are liable to get better value and save money if they see for themselves what they are buying."

YOUR BABY A PRIZE BABY.

Is your baby a prize baby, the kind of a baby that would command a first place in a baby welfare competition? By this is emphatically NOT meant a beautiful baby, a perfect-featured baby, or an abnormally fat baby, but a baby that would come with flying colors through a scientific test of development according to age, heart action and general conditions. Clinics will take place every day to determine these very things at the Baby Welfare Exhibit. points scored by any individual baby will depend largely upon the care it has received. There will be no possible chance in a competition of this kind for a received. There will be no possible chance in a competition of this kind for a baby to carry-off a prize because it has a particularly ingratiating smile or eyes of the color preferred by the judge. The judge will be a doctor, a baby specialist, who can't be goo-gooed into doing anything he doesn't believe. He has had too much experience with the genus infant to be taken in like that. He is, first of all on this occasion a scientist, and it is on purely scientific principles his judgment will be based. If the baby in such a competition gets first place, it certainly deserves it.

An opportunity is going to be given at the Baby Welfare Exhibition to discover if your baby is a first prize baby, and how it measures up to a "standard efficiency" test. Much has been heard in the last few years about efficiency and standard efficiency. Efficiency for a baby means simply being properly nourished and developed, a healthy little animal. If it is a healthy little animal it has all the better chance to grow into a sturdy boy or girl, and eventually

At the Baby Welfare Exhibition it is proposed to offer prizes to the babies brought into the clinics who measure up most nearly to the standard of perfection at a certain age. A strict record will be kept of each. Separate prizes will be given for the Western Ontario babies, outside of the city, possibly a will be given for the Western Ontario babies, outside of the city, possibly a couple of these prizes, and three or more for the city. The original idea was to offer a prize for the baby under four months; the baby between four and eight months, and the baby between eight and twelve months, found to be nearest the standard of what a healthy baby should be physically between these ages. It is possible that more prizes will be offered owing to the keen interest being manifested in this feature. There will be no "displaying" of the prize babies beyond the publishing of their names. Further announcement in regard to prizes will be made later.

Is your baby having the food that is proper for a little one of its age, and is it clothed as it should be? Is it getting enough fresh air? Is it going to be in better condition by child welfare week than it is now? It is going to take a high place in the examination which will be given free at the clinic?

Valuable time and money were also lost that would have been saved had the estimates been more adequate. From his experience as chairman of the board of health Mr. Somerville knows, as probably few physicians, even, know the vast importance of uncovering the sources of communicable diseases and keeping them in check, and the real economy in the end of making provision for so doing. He realizes that it is dollars in the pockets, and the best kind of business, from the standard of health of the citizenship of London, and thereby promoting the efficiency of the citizenship and saving time and money, have been the aims of Mr. Somerville in his office as chairman of the board of health.
