Allies Have Retaken Nearly All the Ground Lost To Foe Since the Beginning of March

Victory Smiles on Allied Armies as Huns Retreat on Front from Ypres to Rheims

Paris, Sept. 5.—Victory still smiles on the Allied armies. The enemy is in retreat along the whole line from Ypres to Rheims. Honors yesterday were with the French-Americans of the Allied right wing, which at last gained the reward of several days' persistent effort. Exactly how far they advanced is difficult to say, for the line moved forward hourly. The enemy, who has lost heavily in men, announced by a hurried destruction of material his intention of abandoning, if he has not already done so, Chauny, Jussy, La Fere and probably Ham. There can be no doubt of his retreating in a general direction of St. Quentin to take up the positions of the Hindenburg line, which he held after the strategic withdrawal in 1917. Only this time the Allied troops are forcing his movement and pressing hard on his heels, causing him heavy losses. In a short time now we shall have recovered all the ground lost since March and shall have gained east of Arras a position which is a permanent threat for Douai and Cambrai. In less than six months Ludendorff will have been ruined, as well as the effectiveness and morale of those western German armies, so formidable at the beginning of the year.

HAIG'S FORCES ARE KNOCKING AT THE GATES OF CAMBRAI

Drive of British Forces Through the Hindenburg Line Takes Tommies Within Striking Distance of the Important Town.

The British, after their victorious drive through the Hindenburg defences, are knocking at the gates of Cambrai, but apparently are momentarily pausing before attempting to force an entrance. Prisoners to the number of more than 16,000, and guns exceeding 100 in number, have been taken by them in this advance. CLASS 2 NOT CONSIDERED

Meanwhile the centre of greatest activity has shifted to the Franco-American front, where the Germans are in full retreat on a wide front north of the Vesle, with the French and Americans in pursuit, and reported as having reached the Aisne in their chase. Retween these two sectors another notable German retrograde movement is in progress. The French pressure in the region north and east of Noyon has forced a German retirement on a wide front in this sector, and advances of seven miles have been scored by the French within the past 48 hours. The speedy fall of Ham seems probable.

Ottawa, Sept. 6 .- Sir Sam Hughes, Ottawa, Sept. 6.—Sir Sam Hughes, who is in Ottawa, has lined up with Hon. W. S. Fielding, J. K. L. Ross, and others against the proposed tax exemption of the coming victory bonds. "It is unwise," he said, "to lock up money free from taxation. It simply means an inducement for the big interests and corporations to put their surplus capital in bonds and thus escape being taxed on their investment. I believe the people of Canada are rich enough and patriotic enough to make the coming loan a success without tax exempand patriotic enough to make the coming loan a success without tax exemption. It is a penny-wise policy for which the poorer classes will ultimately pay through the nose, while the others escape from their proper share of the burden. FOURTEEN HELD AS SUSPECTS IN BOMB OUTRAGE

Chicago Police Have Seized Scores as Result of Explosion.

Chicago, Sept. 5.-Fourteen men were held today out of scores seized by federal agents and the police as a result of the explosion of a bomb yesterday in the Federal Building, which killed 4 persons, injured more than 30 others. and did considerable damage to property. A night of activity on the part of federal agents and the police heads of of federal agents and the police heads of the respective departments said they had obtained valuable information which encouraged them to believe they would apprehend the bomb thrower. The four persons killed were near the Adams street entrance, just outside which were found the bodies of the victims—a girl entering the building, a great lakes jackle, also about to enter, and a mailcarrier on his way to work. The fourth victim, a mail-carrier, was leaving the building, having just finished work.

Haig's Forces Advance On Battle Line In Front of Cambrai—Hill 63 and Ploegsteert Near Messines Taken By Tommies --- Franco-American Troops In Pursuit of Germans Retiring North of Vesle.

London, Sept. 5 .- On the battle line in front of Cambrai, an improvement in the British position south of Moeuvres is reported. The positions to the east of Hermies, near the Canal du Nord, just to the south, also have been improved. Still further south the British have captured the village of Neuville-Bourjouval, east of the Canal du Nord.

More than 16,000 prisoners and more than 100 guns have been taken by the British in the past four days.

BRITISH CAPTURE PLOEGSTEERT AND HILL 63 NEAR MESSINES

London, Sept. 5.-Marked progress was made by the British last night along the Flanders front, according to today's war office report. Ploegsteert village has been captured, as has Hill 63,

North of Hill 63 our troops were continuously engaged in the sector of Witschaete, where the enemy attacked repeatedly, but without success.

"On the Lys front, our troops now hold the general line of Voormezeele-Wulverghem-Ploegsteert-Nieppe-Laventie-Givenchy. "South of Neuve Chapelle, as far as Givenchy, we have regained the old line held by us prior to April 9, and east of Givenchy







REMEMBER THE "Belgian Prince"

The British Admiralty report of August 6th, 1917, reveals one German erime out of the many committed against the men of our MEBOHANT MARINE:-

"The British steamer Belgian Prince was torpedoed by a German submarine on July 31st (1917). The crew abandoned the ship in two boats, and were ordered on to the deck of the submarine by the Gercommander. Under his directions the boats were then smashed with axes, and the crew of the Belgian Prince deprived of their life-belts. The master was taken below and the hatch closed; the submarine submerged without warning with forty-three men standing on her deck. This was the entire crew of the Belgian Prince. With the exception of three, all these were drowned. The three survivers had contrived to retheir life-belts without the knowledge of the enemy. They were picked up after having been in the water eleven hours. The details of this atrocious outrage are supported by the separate affidavits of the three survivors. The cold blooded murder of these men equals, if it does not transcend the worst crimes which our enemies have committed against humanity."

In the affidavits referred to will be found the following statements:-

(1) By Thos. A. Bowman, Chief Engineer: ". . . The main engines were disabled, also the dynamo, which rendered the wireless useless, so there was no S.O.S. sent out. . . . the life-belts taken off most of the crew and thrown overboard. . . the German sailors got into the two lifeboats, threw the oars, bailers and gratings overboard, took out the provisions and compasses, and then damaged the lifeboats with an axe. . . About 9 p.m. the submarine dived, and threw everybody in the water without any means of saving themselves.
... The total loss of life was thirty-

(2) By G. Silessi, Member of the Crew: ". . . The submarine then dived, and all the crew were left in up both lifeboats with axes. . ."

(8) By Willie Snell, an American Citizen: ". . . They were ordered to hold their hands up, then "Take off your life-belts;" were asked if they had any arms, and told to lay their life-belts on the deck. . . . The sub-marine then proceeded east for a number of miles, when she commenced sinking slowly, and quite suddenly submerged. . . .

Admiral Beresford concludes a letter to the Navy League as follows:

"The Navy is enabling us to hold our own at present against a brutal and unscrupulous enemy, but we must never forget the brilliant heroism of the Mercantile Marine.

"The Mercantile Marine has really enabled us to carry the war on so far. It has transported our troops, munitions, millions of men and, more than all, it has fed our people and our fleets and armies, and though some men have been torpedoed as many as seven times, never once has a Mercantile seaman refused to sign on—to their lasting glory be it said.

PURCHASES TO BE GOYT, CONTROLLED

Ottawa, Sept. 5.—Complete control of the purchase and sale for export of Canadian wheat has been assumed by the Government. Control of methods of export has been assumed. Under the new arrangement the situ-tion will be: ation will be:

1. The price for wheat for the crop of 1918 has been fixed and will be maintained for the crop year.

2. The purchase of wheat and grains for export and for internal demands will be thrown open to dealers and shippers as before the war, subject, however, to supervision and control by the Government.

3. The Government will guarantee the purchase of all surplus merchantable

the Government will guarantee the purchase of all surplus merchantable wheat raised by Canadian farmers in the year 1918 at the price already fixed.

4. The apportionment and distribution of wheat for Canadian mills and for export will be under Government control and also will be the supervision and ellotment of cars and lake tonnage, arrangements for lake insurance and shortages, and the mechanism for insuring the steady, speedy and effective transport of wheat from the head of the lakes to the seaboard.

5. The board of grain supervisors whose members represent the interests of grain producers of shipping and forwarding agencies, of the millers and consumers of grain products, has been intrusted by the Government with the carrying out of the above program, and clothed with full powers for executing the same.

ne same. Under the arrangement of last year the sole purchase of wheat for export as placed in the hands of the wheat was placed in the hands of the wheat export company, whose headquarters are in London, with branches in New York and Winnipeg.


